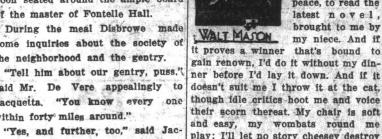





The World's Machines In a great Palace of Engineering at the British Empire Exhibition, every machine known to the ingenuity of ; man has been collected and is shown under this monster roof. It is an undoubted fact that machinery of any kind has an hypnotic attraction on the average person, and here the visitor has ample opportunity to study the complicated me ism of every kind of machine. In one section there is an exhibit of the bridge, deck and upper works of a modern passenger steamer, and visitor can see the mechanism which controls the mass of machinery needed for driving the vessel, for supplying light, heat and ventilation, for operating lifts, pumps, capstans, davits, etc., for maintaining wireless communication with the shore, and for ensuring the comfort and safety of passengers. In these days, when the salvaging of vessels lost during the war is in operation in many parts of the world, the work of submarine divers is of special interest, and here are shown divers at work under water in a specfally constructed lake equipped with the latest type of dress and helmet and telephone apparatus for communi cation with the salvage ship. The Transport Section is thorough ly representative, the displays including full-sized express locomative engines, passenger coaches, dining cars, and freight wagons of the very latest steel construction. The carriage of fruits, meats and perishable goods is fully illustrated by refrigerating wagons and plant. With motor traction every day inreasing its hold on the public ways of the world, it is not astonishing that a large section should be devoted to motor cars and other vehicles. The lopment of oil-burning for transport purposes is illustrated by Diesel engines, and visitors will appreciate how the oil in modern oil-burning ships is distributed from the tanks to the burners beneath the boilers. In the Naval Section large mods of battleships, cruisers, destroyers and submarines are to be seen.
