While serving in the Navy in 1870, Alexander Forbes-Leith, as he was then, met Miss Mary January, the beautiful daughter of Mr. Derrick Algernon January, an ironmaster of St. They fell in love, and the youngman asked the girl's father for his consent to the marriage. Mr. January, practical business man that he was, pointed out to the young officer that his pay in the Navy was a slender foundation on which to build a home, and offered him a place in his own factory if he would leave the Navy. Forbes-Leith accepted the offer, married the girl of his heart, and began a business life as a clerk in his father-in-law's factory. Within a few years he had become one of the steel kings of America. He retired a millionaire, returned to Scotland, and bought the ancient home of his forefathers. Fyvie Castle, Aberdeenshire, for £175,000. The castle is supposed to have been built from the stones of a ruined abbey in the neighbourhood. One of these stones was thrown into the river Ythan, which runs close to the castle, and according to the legend, until it has been removed there shall be no male heir to the estates. Strangely enough, many of the lairds preceding Lord Leith had no male issue. The "curse" was transmitted to the newcomer. His only son, at the age of 19, died from enteric at Pietermaritzburg during the South African war. Mr. A. R. Burn, his grandson, then became the heir, but was killed by a shell in the trenches in Belgium in 1914. Lord Leith therefore leaves no heir. He is survived by his wife and a daughter, who married Colonel Sir Charles Rosden Burn.

Awoke Too Soon

Lord North (Prime Minister, 1770-82) was accustomed to sleep during the Parliamentary harangues of his adversaries, leaving Sir Grey Cooper to note down anything remarkable. Syrian Views of Syria's Troubles

The campaign against the French Mandate in Syria is gaining ground daily, according to Paris press dispatches, which relate at the same time that France will have soon re-established military control in Syria, without the necessity of using an excessive number of troops, Now the Syrian Press, so little heard from usually. have very definite ideas about the situation, and they contrast interestingly with the views of British and French newspapers. Thus we find some Syrian papers published in this country which defend France's stand in Syria, while others condemn it without qualification. There are those that concede France has committed grave offenses, but they charge that the Syrian revolutionists are far from being without guilt, and they say that the complete independence of Syria, without a guarantee for the security of the Christians there would be a great calamity. But the soreness of many Syrians toward the French appears in the Syrian newspaper Mirat-ul-Gharb (New York), which quotes a line from an old Arab poet that "the sword is more truthful than the pen," and goes on to say:

"How often had the Syrians submitted petition after petition to the League of Nations, complaining of the losses and humiliations their country had suffered under the French mandate but it was as if they were crying out to stones or seeking mercy from idols. To-day, however, when the Syrians have girded on their swords, have shouldered their guns, and marched against the tyrannical Power to address it with tongues of fire, the whole world listens to the voice of Syria, even the Leage of Nations listens, tho it had persistently turned a deft ear to the free sons of Syria—even France listens, which met their every plea with contempt and disdain."

"Wo to the unrighteous murderers," cries Al-Bayan, a Druse newspaper, published in New York, which speaks of France as an "evil nation,' that was "not content with robbing the Syrians of thir rights, their country, and their properties, with putting the chains of slavery around their necks. but makes bold further to slay them in all barbarism, and demolish their dwellings, making no distinction between those who defended themselves and those who were merely peaceful men and women." This newspaper describes the Damascus incident as "an offense unparalleled in the history of mankind," and adds that "there is no doubt that France, who condones in herself what she condemns in others, would, if she could, eliminate the entire population of Syria, in order to establish her hated mandate." Criticizing France from a different angle, Al-Hoda (New York) lays the plame on "three criminals," whom it particularizes as the former High Commissioner, General Sarrail, his subdordinate, Carbillet, and Sultan asha al-Atrash, and it goes on to say: "Again and again we say France is

now reaping in conflict what she sowed in negligence. The revolt against her in Syria is only the result of her policy of favoritism, of indifference, and of putting things in the wrong place. She preferred her enemies to her friends. She ignored those who were sincere toward her, in order to please those who were rebellious. France herself encouraged Sultan Pasha-al-Atrash to revolt, for she had given him and others pardon, when firmness and justice of treatment were her evident duty."

The Syrian Eagle (Brooklyn), which has relentlessly attacked the Druse revolutionary bands for their manner of dealing with the Christian villages of Hauran, Wadi-l-'Ajam and other sections, is indifferent to the nationalist aims of the Syrian revolutionists, and it says:

"No Christian objects to the establishment of a national government in Syria, whether that government be made up of Druses or of Moslems. The Christians in general wish liberty and independence for their homeland, but every Christian protests against the formation of a Syrian Government which should fail to guarantee the security of the Syrian Christians in their own country."

Running all through the editorials of the Syrian press in this country, and from a large part of the discussion in the Syrian papers published in Syria, which have reached the United States, is the fear that the violence of the Druse and Arab revolutionists may lead to a repetition of the dreadful days of 1860, when thousands of Christians in Lebanon and Syria were massacred in a general uprising against them of the Druses and Mohammedans. The fact that most of the revolutionists in Syria are Mohammedans and Druses, altho a great many Christians have joined them, we are told, has given rise to the suspicion of many Christian writers that the revolution is a religious putbreak. But a correspondent of Al-Hoda in Tripoli, Syria, declares that the chief cause of the trouble in Byria is the hatred of the Mohammedans for France, a hatred, he declares, which dates farther back than the appointment of General Sarrail. 



"Alongside the wall were four rifle-I in charge of a gang of trusties. We picked a favorable morning when the wind would be blowing in the diection of the southeast tower. We planned to fire the barns so that the smoke material would obstruct the view of the men in the lower side. We gathered enough material in the power house to make a ladder. We hid the material, which was three by fours in the barn.

"At eleven-thirty on the morning of Monday, September 10, 1923, we sneaked away from the mason gang and went to the barn. The only one there was the stable keeper who was up for 15 years. We invited him to come with us but he refused as he was up for parole. We had to tie him up so he could not give the alarm. We tied his hands but not his feet so he could walk out of the barn when we had set it afire.

Guards Opened Fire.

"We made a ladder with the material we had gathered then went upstairs and set the barn afire in several places. It burned fast and the smoke was good and thick. We put the ladder against the wall and climbed up and over. When we were on top the riflemen opened fire on us from the towers.

The outside gang started firing too. Everybody was shooting at us. Forty feet from the prison wall is a millionaire's estate. Painters were working on it. They had a car. We Ad in. MacMillan drove it. All the ks. scouts, guards and everybody in the prison were firing at us. Mac-Millan was shot through the hand. They chased us in another car. When we got to the woods we jumped out and made our way through the woods and escaped. Mac dropped from loss of blood and was picked up that night. We hid in barns, bushes and moved at night, keeping away from farm houses and roads. We had no food


and suffered severe hardships. "About 12 miles from the penitentiary we were in a barn and the farmer came in looking for eggs. He saw Brown and asked if he was one of the hoys (meaning the escaped presoners). Brown said no, but he looked as if he knew. Three Rewards Offered.

Simpson has been sought by the Toronto and federal authorities over two years. His arrest in Nev York last night closes a hunt that has been going on for over two years Simpson, along with Ryan, Edward McMullen, Wyoming bank rob-Arthur Sullivan, alias Brown, and Wm. Bryant, made a sensationa flight over the walls at Kingston peni tentiary on September 10, 1923. Ryan's Capture.

found until Ryan was arrested in a post-office in Minneapolis in Decem ber, 1923, when he was shot while calling for his mail by Minneapolis police, who were in the post-office waiting for Ryan to call. The Gang Quarrelled.

Ryan came back in custody, pleaded guilty to the charge of holding up and robbing the Bank of Nova Scotia and was given a life sentence and fourteen lashes by Judge Coatsworth. Later the lash penalty was remitted by Ottawa.

Simpson's Mistake.

Simpson when he escaped was serving a five-year term for shop-breaking and theft, having been sent down from Toronto on September 24, 1921. Why he attempted to escape caused much speculation among prison authorities as he had served two years and it was stated at the time he was going to be recommended for ticket of leave that Christmas.

Gordon Simpson is twenty-six years of age. He was sentenced for shopbreaking and receiving. He was a member of the gang led by Tommy Quinn, now serving a ten-year term. which broke into a number of the United Cigar Stores in Toronto and wheeled out the "baby" safes from the stores. He was also involved, it is alleged, in a number of clothing and fur robberies in Toronto, and different parts of Ontario.

Epilepsy and Crime

A DOCTOR'S DISCLOSURES.

A charge of shoplifting was recently dropped at the instance of the Public Prosecutor on the ground that the ac cused was, at the time the act was committed, suffering from "masked epilepsy" and was quite unconscious of what he was doing. It would be difficult to say how

many crimes, more especially murders, have been committed by sufferers from this mysterious complaint. An epileptic fit, even if so slight as to cause no apparent loss of consciousness, often leaves behind it a condition very much resembling sleep-walking. The patient has, in the phrase used by alienists, a "dual consciousness." He performs the automatic routine acts to which he is used, eats and sleeps, walks and talks exactly as he has always done, yet when he recovers or "awakes" can remember nothing of what has occur-

red since his fit. But in this Jekyll and Hyde duality there is another partner, a madman whose diseased brain suggests delusions. Should these, as is often the Corner Water and Prescott S case, take the form of delusions of persecution, the epileptic will stop at nothing to avenge himself upon his supposed tormentor. It is such cases as this, not the raving maniacs. that provide almost all the "very dangerous" patients in asylums.

The cunning Mr. Hyde can plot and plan with diabolical ingenuity, can carry out his plan of revenge, and cover his tracks in a way few sane men could excel, without disturbing the slumbering Dr. Jekyll. And when the latter awakes at last the days or weeks of his sleep will be a sealed book to him.

It is but rarely that one hears counsel for the defence urge that his client remembers nothing whatever of his crime, but such a claim should be an essential to any acquittal on the ground of epileptic insanity.



Now Seek Hubbies

Freed From Harems

ANGORA, Nov. 26 .- Hundreds of beautiful women, highly trained in the social graces, arts of the toflette, dancing, music and religion, who have been freed from harems, now have the Turkish government seeking husbands for them. Most of them are wholly unfitted for the practical

Abandonment of the harem also placed on the hands of the government many eunuchs, but their disposition has not been so difficult. In the absence of regular employment in the cities they have been sent to the provincial districts for work on tae

When President Mustapha Kemal assumed power in Angora, one of his first official acts was to banish the harems and slave households of Sultan Mohammed VI., the princes and members of the Royal Court.

In order to set an example, most of the Nationalist government officials have one, or at most only two wives. Indeed, Mustapha Kemal Pasha has no wife at all, having recently been granted a divorce. Economic conditions also serve to make it almost, impossible for one to indulge in the old luxury of plurality of wives.

Prior to the present social revolution in Turkey, every woman was obliged to veil herself from all except her father, brother and husband. If a man, either Turk or foreigner, entered the sacred precints of the harem, he usually paid with his life, while the master also had the right to kill his unfaithful wife or concu-

Only three foreigners, an American, a Britisher and a Frenchman, are known to have entered a real harem when it was occupied, and they were disguised as Turks and spoke the Turkish language. By posing as governmnet representatives, they escaped the usual penalty.

Any departure from the rules of conduct in the harems were severely punished by the eunuchs, who maintained security of the places and who were euphemistically called "Masters of the Maidens," or "Chiefs of the Abodes of Felicity."

While Sultan Mohammed VI. had only four legal wives he had at his disposal several hundred "ikbals." or favorites. Sultan Abdul Hamid was said to have had 1.000 wives in his harem.

Madam Edibe Halliday Hanoum Bey, a Turkish woman trained in the American Girls' College at Constantinople, was one of the first to agitate a change in the status of Moslem women, insisting that the system was wholly inconsistent with any high ideal of womanhood.

Abandonment of the harem has been noted as Turkey's most radical step in its transition from an Oriental state to a modern Western country.

Where Saul Died

BIBLICAL DISCOVERIES NEAR THE JORDAN.

PHILADELPHIA-One of the most interesting discoveries of recent years is made known in the announcement of the University of Pennsylvania that the University's Palestine expedition has uncovered an ancient Philistine stronghold at the top of the hill of Beth-Shan, near the Jordan. the wall on which Saul's body was suspended after his death, and possibly even the Temple in which, according to the first book of Samuel. Saul's armour was placed.

The hill has been the strategic point of militady operations throughout history, and the excavations , which have been going on steadily for two seasons have penetrated strata indicating man superimposed civilizations including the Greek, Roman, and Christian periods the era of the Crusaders. and so on.

Beneath these have been found the debris of the fortifications of Old Testament fame. These, however, were not built by the Philistines, but at an earlier period by Egyptians who under Ramese II. erected a monument containing the only known record outside the Bible of the sojourn of the Hebrew in Egypt.

Nine-Year-Old **Boy Murdered His** Foster Mother

PORTLAND, Oregon, Dec. 4-A nine year old boy shot and killed his foster mother because some beans happened to be burned, he confessed to deputy sheriffs yesterday. The boy is Frank Thomas, negro, adopted son of Oliver F. Thomas, negro, proprietor of a tavern in the outskirts of Portland.

The boy said he was angered because Mrs. Thomas called him a liar. He had reported to her that the beans, being cooked on the kitchen stove were all right. Soon afterwards she smelled the beans burning and reproached the boy.
