The Veterinary College. The Globe of Tuesday had an article on the Ontario Veterinary College, in which several objections are ma to the proposed transfer of that In-stitution from Toronto to Guelph. would suppose from the way it con-nects Dr. Smith's name with the College that it was his—created and sustained by him. This is quite a mis. take. The College was originated by the Ontario Agricultural Associaby the Ontario Agricultural Associa-tion, and the Leguslature vested in that body the poter of granting dip-lomas. Dr. Smith was engaged by the Association as the ablest and most suitable Professor; the Associa-tion pays him a certain salary, and

tion pays him a certain salary, and besides pays him so much rent for the use of his building. The total cost of the College is about \$550 a year in salarnes, rent, &c. For rent alone the Association pays \$150 a year. The interest on the cost of the new building proposed to be erected in Guelph will not amount the new building proposed to be erected in Guelph will not amount erected in Guelph will not amount to a much larger sum, and when we take into account the fact that the Association has now at its credit in the Bank 11,000, and will soon re-ceive from the Government the yearly grant of 10,000 more, we think it is quite justified in expend. ing 4000 for the erection of a Col-lege in this town. 


