Abandoned Application George D. Collins abandoned his ap-plication for a rule nisi before Mr. Jus-tice Duff yesterday morning. When the court adjourned the day before His Lordship had asked him to bring an authority for his contention that the Canadian parliament had no power to enact the statute in section 3 of the ex-tradition act, which made the act of 1886 applicable to further arrangements for extradition. When His Lordship took the bench Mr. H. D. Heimcken, K. C., counsel for Collins, said he had con-sulted with his client and they had de-cided to ask that the application for a rule nisi be at present abandoned. The evidence before the extradition commis-sioner was not complete, and the ques-

sioner was not complete, and the ques-tion would have to be brought up at a later stage. In the meantime they had decided to abandon the present position His Lordship, Justice Duff, said there His Lordship, Justice Duff, said there was but one thing for him to do, if they failed to proceed with the application, that was to dismiss it. He regretted the proceedings before His Honor Judge Lampman had been interrupted. He ex-pressed himself as in concurrence with the views of Judge Lampman as to the application of the statute, and he had confidence that the Canadian parlia-ment was able to enact the statute.
