A glimmering of the truth that a political party cannot long exist without a policy appears to be dawning on the grim knook. And the shock of the discovery has knocked both Grip and the Witness into the making of a very damaging admission. How extremely damaging it is destined to be they will surely find out "ere long."

It is said Austria declines to receive Mr. Kieley as U. S. minister because his wife is a Jewess. Secretary Bayard is reported to have represented such an exhibition of narrow-minded bigotry. But there is another side to the matter, namely, Mrs. Kieley's own feelings. We should say that under such circumstances she would not care to risk the treatment that she would be liable to receive at the court of Austria. The probabilities are, however, that the objection has a deeper root than the kind of a wife Mr. Kieley has. In fact, even before the appointment was confirmed it was known Austria would object to Mr. Kieley on account of his offensive language towards the late king of Italy and the strong antipathy he then expressed to kings and emperors generally, and to any form of a monarchical government. It is all very well for Mr. Bayard to make a bold stand against bigotry, but in his conduct in endeavoring to thrust an obnoxious person upon Austria exactly courteous towards a friendly nation?

Joseph Chamberlain, Mr. Gladstone's president of the board of trade, has been making some vigorous speeches in Hull, and his critics want to know if he has now called the flag of socialism to his mast. Mr. Chamberlain declared for loose government, graduated taxation, reform of the land laws, and free education. He stated that as things now are the rich are not taxed as efficiently and the poor pay too heavily. Explaining his views, he said: "I do not want you to think that I suggest to you that legislation alone can accomplish all we desire. Above all I would not lead you into revolutionary projects which would upset unnecessarily the existing order of things as final or as perfect, the existing arrangement under which hundreds of thousands, nay millions of your fellow countrymen, are subjected to untold privations and misery, with the evidence all around them of accumulated wealth and unexampled luxury."

If such views are so-called to be so feared Mr. Chamberlain has a very large following. In a country where the people are called upon to subsidize a crowd of beggarly Canadian princes, to say nothing of providing for a horde of pauper aristocrats, who fatten in government offices and throw their legs on desks intended for more practical purposes, even socialist ideas should be understood if not excused.

M. K. F. says Rus is the chief of trifling with the Afghan question, and wishes to settle the matter once and for all time. That is precisely what everybody else desires to see done, but the prevailing opinion was that Russia was doing all the trifling. It will be gratifying indeed if the war will now kindly take the bull by the horns and have the wrestling match out!

There is a warning well worth heeding by every city in the world, Toronto included, in the cablegram from Lyons, France, announcing the outbreak of cholera there. It says: "The epidemic began this year in houses which were infected last year, and is due to miasmata."

There appears to be an impression in the United States that there is considerable friction between the French speaking and the English speaking people of Canada. The Chicago News, for instance, says: "Canada must meet the French Canadian sooner or later. Why is not the present a good time as any? If Quebec can save Riel from the gallows, what assurance have the people of the dominion that they can ever punish a French law-breaker?"

As far as we know there are absolutely no differences between Quebec and any other province that is likely now or in the future to cause trouble. As to the hanging of Riel there is nothing remarkable or, we think, ominous in the fact of a number of sympathizers and friends endeavoring by constitutional means to get his sentence commuted. If he is hanged it is possible some of the unscrupulous in Quebec will attempt to make political capital out of the matter to the disadvantage of the government, but there is no indication that anything more serious will happen if he is not hanged the enemies of the government in this province will endeavor to do the same; so that things kind of level themselves up in any case.

FRIDAY, AUG. 7. The funeral of Gen. Grant takes place in New York to-morrow, and out of respect to the memory of the dead hero all the American, English and Canadian exchanges will be closed. The present week has been an inactive one in trade circles all over the world. In Toronto it has been exceedingly dull and sluggish.
