TWELFTH YEAR

ONLY GRASPING AT A SHADOW

IRELAND WILL NEVER ATTAIN HOME RULE, SAYS BALFOUR. The differences which separate the Conservative and Liberal Parties More Profound Than Ever Before in the Memory of Two Generations of British Statesmen, Says the Commons Leader.

GLASGOW, Nov. 27.—The Rt. Hon. A. J. Balfour was the speaker at the Conservative meeting held here today. He declared very positively that Ireland would never attain her desire to have a parliament at Dublin. He also declared that the Conservative and Liberal parties are more profound at the present time, he declared, than they have been before in the memory of two generations of British statesmen. Before the last five years the Unionists had to fight for principles which hereafter had to be fought for by the side of order and law. The Conservative side of order and law was not to be fought with crime promptly and effectively. They believed that society was founded on certain principles of law and morality and that in obedience to political inducements they relaxed their hold on these principles which they valued to the contrary the most profound injury.

Mr. Balfour said that whatever the success of the Government's policy in Ireland, it, at any event, had been a sincere policy. The first duty of the Government was to see that the laws were obeyed and by wise administration and by the expenditure of money to endeavor to increase the happiness of the people in every part of Her Majesty's dominions.

In conclusion, Mr. Balfour declared that no matter what the future might bring forth it would never bring Home Rule to Ireland.

MODERN BELSHAZZAR'S FEAST

LONDON, Nov. 27.—In a speech to-day at Wolverhampton Mr. John Morley described the recent Conservative Convention as "Belshazzar's feast" and said that the writing was plainly visible on the wall. The speeches of Lord Hastings, Mr. Goschen and Mr. Chamberlain, continued Mr. Morley, proved that the Tories had captured and absorbed the Unionists.

A DEFENSIVE ALLIANCE

The Result of M. De Giers Recent Visit to LONDON, Nov. 27.—According to a semi-official statement based on M. De Giers' declarations to Chancellor Von Caprivi, the Russian statesman had an interview at Paris with President Carnot, M. De Freycinet, Premier and Minister of War, and M. Ribot, Minister of Foreign Affairs, resulting in a definite alliance between the two countries. The alliance is purely defensive. The entente agreed upon according to the statement quoted differs on many points from the triple alliance treaty inasmuch as while that makes the European states the basis of the arrangement, the new Russo-French entente aims at what M. De Giers has called "respect for treaties," meaning especially the maintenance of the Russian grip on Bulgaria and British evocation of Egypt. The differences on these features of the situation are not meant to be regarded as constituting a serious obstacle to the alliance. M. De Giers has further communicated the fact that he has been signing and ratifying the conclusion of a formal contract, as also properly defining the future responsibilities rendering it possible to pursue a distinct policy before Europe, while at the same time avoiding the reproach of cherishing military designs. The Russian ambassador in Paris, M. De Giers, has also assured from the Berlin embassy that the Paris conference of M. De Giers, instead of having an empty character, as generally reported, has resulted in a scheme to maintain diplomatic warfare against the United States and to engage in actual war. M. De Giers communications assume importance, not only because they disclose much as to the nature of the Russian official admission of the Russian Government to the powers that a Russo-French alliance has really been arranged.

CAPRIVI HOLDS ON

Important Debate at the Opening of the German Reichstag. BERLIN, Nov. 27.—The debate on the budget of the Treasury said it was expected there would be a deficit of 8,000,000 marks. The Secretary of the Treasury also said nothing had yet been decided regarding a new loan. At any rate the loan would not be required for a few months. The depreciation in the German 3 per cent, was due to the nervous feeling on the Bourse. The Government would not issue a paper loan. It hoped to entertain more favorable terms. Chancellor Von Caprivi was present at the Reichstag. He said that the Reichstag was a short speech he referred to the rumors which had been circulated that he intended to resign his position as head of the Imperial Chancellor. He said that these rumors were ridiculous. He was by no means tired of his office. He declared that there was a general dissatisfaction throughout the country, but it was not the fault of the present Government. It was an inheritance from Prince Bismarck's policy. He condemned the extravagance shown in the military and naval estimates, but approved the conclusion of commercial treaties which he said the Freisinger party would give their strongest support.

Chancellor Von Caprivi followed. He refuted the reproaches brought against the Government on account of its so-called "military policy." He said that the Kaiser's journey to Russia, he continued, had established friendly relations between the two monarchs, but no political matter had been discussed between them. The press had indulged in too much drumming and trumpeting as regards the visit of the French fleet to Constantinople, which had engendered on the part of France and Russia toward the Reichstag had not changed. All that happened at Constantinople was that the existing conditions were maintained. But there was need of peace. The Kaiser's intentions were most pacific. Only care must be taken to avoid changes in the Reichstag. The Government was in a position to make its will prevail. It increased confidence in the French situation no danger of a German war.

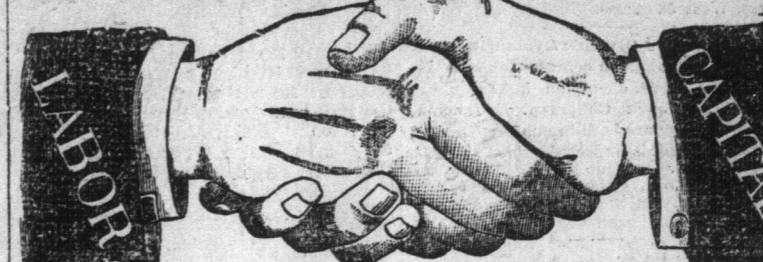
