Last week the new Canadian canal at Saint St. Marie, Ontario, was opened for traffic. It is 800 feet long, 60 wide, and 20 deep, and it cost within a trifle of \$4,000,000.

During the past two decades the commerce of the great inland water system of this continent has grown to gigantic proportions. The tonnage passing through the American canal at Saint St. Marie, which was the outlet of the commerce of Lake Superior alone, has of late years exceeded by fifty per cent that passing through the Erie canal.
