A. Elvidge. a furniture polisher of this city, has assigned. He owes \$2,100, but this is principally composed of accommodation paper given to the absconding furniture man, Stewart. He has no assets to speak of.

THE stock of pickles in the distributing markets has been closely cleaned out, and the growing crop in Westchester, N.Y. and on Long Island is said to be more or less seriously affected by late unfavorable weather.

AT A meeting of the creditors of S. & J. Armstrong, of Mc-Kellar, an offer of 40 cents in the dollar was accepted by all. present. It is understood to be on the basis of 10 cents cash and 30 cents, secured, on time.

THE Parkhill Salt Works of Messrs. W. H. Hutchins & Co. has been in operation since last Thursday. At first the salt was discolored by the oxide of iron from the pan. Now, however, it is quite free from discoloration.

New crop Valencia raisins are offered for August shipment at 25s 6d for layer and 20s 6d for off-stalk. The crop will be somewhat larger than last year.

THE weevil has done great injury to the fall wheat in the vicinity of Malden and Colchester South, Ont.. while the rust as done some damage in low ground.

CHAS. E. CAREY, Dominion Express agent at Ashcroft, B. C., was arrested Wednesday last for embezzling the funds of the company, amounting to about \$2,000.

REPORTS just published show that the wheat crop in Hungary is good as regards both quantity and quality. Rye aud barley are satisfactory, but the crop of oats is poor.

A wild sweet orange has been discovered growing in the northern part of Florida. The fruit hangs on the tree all the year round, often for six months after it is fully ripe.

The report of the Northern Assurance Company shows an increase of fire premiums in 1889 by about \$50,000. There was a large profit, and a dividend equal to 271 per cent was paid.

ROBT. THOMPSON DINAMAN, grocer, has assigned at the demand of Mr. Geo. Lanctot, with liabilities of about \$6,000. The largest creditor is Mr. Lanctot himself, interested for \$3,000.



THE London Free Press says the difficulty into which Mr. Geo. McDowell has been placed is due only to a temporary embarrassment, and no one will suffer by him, as he is perfectly solvent, and always has paid his debts in full.

THE Canadian Interior Conduit company represented by E. H. Johnston and John H. McClement, New York, James Leggatt, Charles J. Clouston, Montreal, and H. P. Dwight, Toronto, have obtained letters patent under the Companies act.

A report by Consul General Severance, of Honolulu, says that the exports virtually all go to the United States. The trade with the United States during the past year has increased 5.78 per cent. Ten per cent of all imports, and 91.35 per cent of all the exports for 1889 were with the United States.

THE grain harvest in California is about over. Both the yield and acreage are far below the average but the quality is good. An abundant fruit crop, with the exception of peaches, is reported from every portion of the California fruit belt.

THE number of deaths from contagious diseases in Montreal for the past six months of the present year is 428, compared with 1,047 in 1889. There was a marked decrease in mortality from measles, the death rate having fallen from 444 to 20.

THE emigration statistics of Italy are beginning to rouse uneasiness. During the year 1889 no fewer than 175,000 Italian laborers left their native land for other countries. Italian statesmen are wondering where the army will be recruited.



Owing to the alleged extensive lumber stealing by Canadians along the northern borders of Minnesota, it is said that the Government has determined to put a stop to it, and with this end in view have authorized the formation of a large expedition which will leave Duluth on August 1st.

The report of the Lancashire Insurance company, as recently made at the home office, shows that the first half of 1890 has been a most prosperous one for the company. The fact is evidenced by the declaration of a dividend at the rate of 17½ per cent annually, which is a remarkable showing.

This year's crop of cocoons in Beyrout is very satisfactory. Last season was a favorable one, but it has been surpassed this year as regards quantity, and spinners speak very favorably also of the quality. Local merchants, however, complain of the prices, which have been raised by the demand for cocoons.

The sardine factories at Eastport and Lubec, Me., are doing absolutely nothing, while at this season of the year business at these factories should be at its height. In the Boston market 1 oils are selling at first hands at \$4.00@4.25; mustards at \$3.40@3.50, and 2 spiced at \$3.60. New York prices are relatively as high.

The agitation in favor of excluding foreign insurance companies from Russia has resulted in a decision by the Russian Government not to admit any more of them to do a direct business and those now operating there will be rigidly supervised by the Government. The reinsurance treaties will not be interfered with.

STATISTICS furnished by the Toronto Board of Health show that while the number of deaths from contagious diseases has decreased by 133 as compared with the first six months of 1889, the total from other diseases has augmented by 285, nearly all of which were caused by the epidemic of la grippe of last winter.

EMANUEL Masson, shoe dealer, of this city has assigned. Masson himself has worked as a foreman in a shoe factory all along. He started this store three years ago, leaving his wife to run it while he went out to work. She has not proved successful and the stock is now advertised for sale. Liabilities are \$2,300.

GEN. MIDDLETON positively declares that he will not indemnify Bremner for the alleged looting of furs during the North-West rebellion. He says he will defend any suit brought against him, and adds, what looks like a threat, that in such an event he will throw considerable light on various incidents connected with the outbreak.

The total arrivals in Europe from the far East for the season just closed have been 93,818 bales of raw silk and 25,497 bales of waste and cocoons. The raw silk total is made up as follows: from Shanghai, 61,500 bales; Hong Kong, 10,705 bales; Canton, 5,538 bales; Yokohama, 13,101 bales; Calcutta, 1,974 bales; other ports, 920 bales.

ROBERT G. SAUNDERS, teller of the Woodstock. N.B., branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia has been arrested on the charge of abstracting a parcel of \$4,000 from the funds. He is now in jail pending an examination. He was found lying insensible on the floor of the bank vault, and claimed to have been sandbagged by some unknown person; but, as no wounds are apparent, the story is received with suspicion.

teas, of Calgary, has assigned. He has recently moved into larger premises and put in a large stock at short dates. This has crippled him, and although he claims his assets exceed his liabilities he has not been able to avoid an assignment.

A. T. HARSHAW & Co., dry goods merchants, have assigned. Harshaw was formerly a partner in the firm of Robt Dunn & Co., of this city, who failed a number of years ago. He then started the present business in his wife's name, but in 1879 he got clear of his old troubles and took the business over himself. He built up a large business, but last year found trade dull and commenced to drop behind. He was believed to be holding his own, although not making any headway, but he evidently has not, for we now hear of his assignment.

THOMAS O. RUSH, grocer of Peterboro, has assigned. The firm was originally Rush Bros., who succeeded W. J. Morrow & Co., in March 1886. They dissolved in June 1886, Thomas Rush continuing alone. The grocery business is a good deal cut up in Peterboro and of late he has been doing very little. B.H. Tesch, a variety storekeeper carrying a number of cheap lines at New Westminster, B.C., was reported as having offered a compromise at 25 cents in the dollar to his creditors. Now he is said to be trying to get out of it, on the ground that he cannot raise sufficient funds to carry it through.

FALCONER & DURNNIG, general storekeepers, of Acadia Mines, have assigned giving preferences to the extent of \$18,000. They succeeded A.C. Sherman & Co., whose stock they purchased giving Sherman a bill of sale which enabled him to close them out at any time if he was not satisfied with the way they were getting on. Naturally their situation has always been precarious. They now show liabilities of \$21,000 and assets of \$28,-000, but these latter are largely in book debts and if forcibly realized the surplus would soon disappear. The chances for ordinary creditors are not particularly brilliant.

E. O'REILLY, clothing dealer, of Aylmer has called a meeting of his creditors. He has been in business for about nine years and although he started with very little capital has worked up quite a large business. He was burned out in the fall of 1888 but was understood to be well insured and to lose very little by During the past year he has not done so much, simply because he did not push his business but devoted his attention to building. A short time ago he attempted to secure an extension from his creditors, offering to pay 10 cents in the dollar every three months. This was declined, and consequently he made an assignment. He puts his liabilities at \$41,000 and claims assets of \$68,000 in value, so that the estate should turn out well.

THE BANK STATEMENTS.

At first blush the statements of the chartered banks for the month of June would seem to indicate a remarkable improvement in the financial condition of the country. An increase of \$1,197,263 in the volume of circulation and of \$2,922,207 in the deposits, coupled with a reduction of \$990,956 in the amount of loans and discounts, would certainly give us good grounds for congratulating ourselves on a marked revival in trade, were it certain that these movements had really arisen from that source. Unfortunately we can find no grounds to corroborate this view of the increase. Trade during June betrayed no signs of improvement sufficient to cause so marked a change in the financial position. It is true that a movement of butter and cheese took place during that month which would account for a portion at all events of the increase in circulation, and were this amount used by the cheese men in paying off previous indebtedness the decline in discounts might be attributed to the same cause; but the balance of the increase it seems difficult to account for. We must, however, remember that, owing to the depressed state of trade during the winter months, and the consequent contraction of the



currency into the narrowest limits, the circulation was left in a peculiarly sensitive condition, so that the least improvement in the state of trade, such as would naturally occur in June, would be certain to influence its volume to an unusual extent. Add to this, possibly, the advances of circulation made by the banks to operators in dairy products, and we can account for a portion, at all events, of the remainder.

In dealing with the deposits a similar difficulty awaits us. We are unable to trace from the returns what portion of the increase is attributable to deposits of large sums involved by the placing of municipal loans, the negotiation of loan companies' debentures, or from the operations of railways, and what is derived from trade sources. Were it possible to extend the already sufficiently voluminous government form of return we would-suggest the division of the present two columns for "other" deposits into four, that deposits of large sums involved by financial operations of the class mentioned might be separated from those made by the public. But so far as it is possible to judge from the data available it would look as if very little of the present increase in deposits were attributable to any increased prosperity of the country generally. The movement in dairy produce was not a large one, payments showed very little improvement during the month, and the lumber trade is almost in a stagnant state. There is really nothing on which to base a belief that even a portion of the increase was derived from the public, except that the transfer of deposits from the Government savings banks to the chartered banks, in consequence of the higher interest paid by the latter, is still progressing. Consequently we can only conclude that the increase is due to the deposit of funds derived from the placing of municipal loans, or the sale of debentures in the English market, in the banks' hands.

That the situation is a little easier is undoubted. It is evidenced in the fact that the banks are no longer calling in their funds from United States centres, and that during the month under review the amount due from foreign agencies was increased by \$1,092,315. If the promise of abundant crops be realized we shall certainly see a marked improvement in the financial situation. But this improvement will not be manifest for months to come, and at present there is nothing in the situation to warrant any departure from the existing attitude of caution.

The sudden increase of over \$306,000 in the total

of "overdue debts unsecured" is due to a clerical error on the part of the Banque Nationale whereby an item of \$303,835 was entered in this column instead of that of "overdue debts secured." As the item in question is secured by timber limits which only a fire or an earthquake could destroy, an enquiry at the bank's headquarters at once disclosed the true state of affairs.

The usual comparative table will be found in another portion of these columns.

MERCANTILE INSURANCE.

The proposition to extend the principle of insurance to mercantile affairs, and to bring under its egis the normal contingencies which tend to cause failures in business, although probably visionary and certainly beset with unusual difficulties, is not altogether impracticable. Looking upon insurance as the outcome of the application of the law of average it would, at first sight, look as if there were no more reason why the working of this law should not be as clearly understood in the case of mercantile success or failure as it is in those of the duration of life or the possibility of accident. The idea of equalizing losses by the plan of intelligent average has proved itself capable of almost indefinite expansion. First applied to compensation for destruction of property by fire or shipwreck it has since gradually expanded with the increasing requirements of the nineteenth century until it protects the insured against loss by death, by accident, by fraudulent employees, by steam boilers, by breakage of plate glass, from damage by cyclones or hailstorms, and from loss by death of live stock. Why should we then pretend that mercantile insurance lies beyond its power?

Unfortunately it is to be feared it does. Not, as some hold, because of the possibility of fraud upon the part of the insured; for it may safely be said that few failures are really fraudulent. They arise usually from lack of the experience or capital necessary to success, or are ascribable to circumstances beyond the insolvent's control, and it is rare indeed to find any deliberate intention upon the part of a debtor to defraud his creditors. The question of fraud as a complication may then be fairly left out of our calculations. But there are other difficulties involved which would seem to be insuperable, and which remove the question of mercantile insurance beyond the pale of possibilities. We are all aware that the great principle underlying all forms of insurance is the law of average and that the working of that law varies in accuracy in commensurate ratio with the number and extent of the data upon which it is based. The wider the scope of the preliminary investigation, and the longer the period over which the statistics extend, and the firmer the foundation upon which to work; while the facts of a single country or the experience of a single year would be utterly inadequate as a basis upon which to construct any really reliable table of average. And yet, owing to the fact that commercial conditions vary necessarily with their surroundings, we are unable to compare satisfactorily the percentage of failures in any one country with those of another, and therefore we should be compelled to base any calculations upon different statistics for every separate community, as well as to take into consideration the question of-local trade customs and local insolvent legislation in the compilation of any data upon which to base deductions.

These facts would seem to be fatal to any general scheme of mercantile insurance and, much as we regret it, it is to be feared that the day is still distant when it will become an established branch of insurance. That it would be an undoubted boon to that vast majority of traders whose sole capital is in their business and to whom failure means, if not absolute ruin, at least very much straitened circumstances, goes without saying. Were it in existence, the payment of a premium that would insure the return of even a portion of their capital in case of failure would be gladly acceded to, and their minds would be lightened of a burden of anxiety that must otherwise embitter their existence; but it is to be feared that the reasons we have just recapitulated preclude its entrance at present into the field of tangible issues, and that until trade laws and customs become universal, any scheme of mercantile insurance, although not altogether impracticable, would certainly be fore-doomed to failure.

THE CHEESE TRADE.

In view of the leading position of cheese among Canadian items of exports it is satisfactory to learn that the volume of our trade continues to increase and that its quality still gives every satisfaction to British and foreign consumers.

Since the opening of the present season the chief features have been a large make and a steadily declining market, with the exception of a slight spurt the first week or two before matters got into a settled shape. A larger proportion than ever of milk is believed to be going into cheese, instead of butter, as at current prices it is found to pay better. The butter trade seems to be more or less neglected, except in the best creamery districts. Last year there was a strong market for cheese up to the beginning of July but this season the situation has been quite reversed. Several causes have contributed to low prices. In the first place, the make is currently reported to be larger than ever it has been. Both in Ontario and Quebec there has been sufficient rain to keep the pastures in excellent condition and the low prices and difficulty of making strictly choice butter, which pays best and is chiefly wanted, has turned the supply of milk from the dairy to the cheese factory. Another cause is that bad weather in England has checked consumption there and the frequent rains have doubtless made the British pastures more productive. A third reason is that past losses seem to have taken the speculative spirit out of the market. There have been fewer 'bull' movements and spasmodic spurts in prices. In fact the Montreal market has rarely been so quiet, most of the buying having been put through in the country with little or no excitement to speak of.

On previous occasions we have referred to the increasing shipments of American cheese via the St. Lawrence. This year cheese has again come forward from Watertown, Canton, Gouverneur, Ogdensburg, Buffalo, and even Utica we believe. Apart from improved facilities for railway transportation now enjoyed here, the cool St. Lawrence route is favored as the cheese is landed in better condition. There is more than a suspicion, however, that the confounding of American with Canadian cheese is an advantage not lost sight of, and it must be some satisfaction to Canadian factorymen to learn that the law against branding American cheese as Canadian is to be rigidly enforced. A certain proportion of the American

product is skim cheese and there is an adulterated article, as 'filled' cheese may be called. This is not appreciated in England and the Americans have found this out to their cost. Bogus cheese possesses very poor keeping qualities and the outlet for it is largely confined to the American home trade. It is important that none of this stuff should go out from Montreal, as Canadian, and give a false impression abroad to the prejudice of the factoryman, who has made sacrifices to gain a reputation for honest, sound cheese.

The shipments to date have been larger than in previous years but they include the American product. From the opening of navigation to the the 19th July the figures are as follows:—1890, 480,551 boxes; 1889, 366,560 boxes; 1888, 386,529 boxes. The buying in the country has been at comparatively higher prices than obtainable here. Holders have recently been asking 84c for white and 84c to 84c for colored. There has been a good demand for colored all along at an advance of to to to on white. Less colored has been made for various reasons, such as difficulty in securing uniformity, etc. Finest French cheese has sold lately at 72c to 72c in Montreal. This cheese is pronounced better than it used to be, but is not equal yet to the western make. As to the packages, more care is also needed and our French Canadian factorymen are advised to make cheese in one uniform size to fit the box.

Inspite of the conparatively low prices it is generally believed that the wholesale houses have been buying largely of the June and July make in a quiet way and the season will doubtless not wind up without some variation from the present dull routine. At the moment, however, the markets are on the down grade and immediate prospects favor lower prices.

CIVIC MANAGEMENT.

The immense expenditures made and in contemplation in this city, in connection with street improvements of various kinds, is bound, sooner or later, to increase the burden of taxation and suggests a glance at the sources of civic revenue. We are painfully familiar, especially at this season, with the house, business and water taxes and they are heavy enough in all conscience. The citizens will not willingly see them increased, in fact much can be said in favor of a reduction in the water and business taxes.

How then, can needed improvements be carried on? It must be admitted that Montreal is backward in many respects and that the spirit of the day and the commercial importance of the city require a large outlay. In the first place we believe that civic stupidity has caused valuable privileges to be bartered away to monopolies which should have been retained under corporation control as sources of revenue. Why could not the street car service and the gas supply be under the control of the city just as the water department is? Could they not be administered with as little jobbery and just as economically? We believe they could and Birmingham and other large cities have proved it and have been enabled to reduce the rate of taxation to a minimum. The same system on a larger scale has given England the control of the telegraph service of the country, now one of the best and cheapest in the world. In fact the contrast with the United States is so marked both as to the number of offices and the service in general that an agitation has been commenced in the United States for government control of the telegraph. The success which has attended corporation and government management of the public services we have mentioned is so marked that the examples before us cannot be ignored. Still in face of all this, our civic rulers have recently bound us down to the rule of the street railway company for another twenty years or more, when nothing could have been easier than to take over the plant at a valuation and run the cars in the service of the city.

Ottawa and Toronto are both moving in the direction of electric street railways, but Montreals' interests having been sacrificed she must be content with the old fashioned horse cars for a few more decades. A feature of the negotiations in Ottawa was that no proposal for a horse car railway was made and if it had been it would not have been entertained. This gives some idea of the improvement in progress in this direction and how Montreal has been relegated to the rear by the ignorance of her rulers from the back wards. The corporation of Toronto having been authorized by the rate payers to expropriate the street railway, if in its wisdom it so desires, the aldermen are now considering how the citizens can benefit by the situation, and are being greatly assisted by the suggestions of the local press. It is pointed out that there are nine different methods existing at present in American cities for obtaining special revenues from street railways. They are as follows:-

- 1. Ordinary taxation of real and personal property.
- 2. Car licenses; either according to the number of cars, or to the inside measurement or car length.
 - 3. Licenses to drivers.
 - 4. General licenses on street railways.
 - 5. Taxation of dividends.
 - 6. Percentage of net or gross receipts.
 - 7. Sale of the franchise.
 - 8. Rent of the franchise.
- 9. Repairs of the streets occupied or a payment equivalent to the cost of the same.

The method of securing a percentage on net or gross receipts has attracted attention both in Ottawa and Toronto and is not without its advantages as it enables a municipality to feel that it is deriving a Pro rata profit from its street railway business. The difficulty is to arrive at what would be a fair and reasonable percentage. In 1859 Baltimore granted a franchise to a street railway company in consideration of the payment of twenty per cent of its gross receipts. Since then the rate has been cut down to nine per cent. The income thus derived was allotted by a city ordinance to the purchase and preservation of public parks, and as a result Baltimore has received for this department of civic enterprise an average during the past ten years of no less than \$100,000 a year. When in New York it was made compulsory on the aldermen to sell the street railway franchise to the highest bidder-namely, in 1886—the bill provided that the franchise must go to the bidder offering the largest percentage of gross receipts. In 1887 two sales were made by auction as ordered by legislation. For one railway franchise a premium of twenty-six and two-tenths was bid, and for another thirty-five per cent on the gross receipts

Whatever system is adopted by Ottawa or Toronto will not be without interest to Montreal. The rate of taxation is high, improvements are needed even in advance of the present civic income and such valuable public franchises as we have mentioned should be made to contribute a sum bearing a fairer proportion to their admittedly large and yearly increasing earn-

ings. The exemption from taxation of valuable properties also bears with undue severity upon the toiling citizens and the commercial classes more than in any other city of the Dominion. Altogether Canada's chief city and port is sadly in need of reform and smarter civic management.

THE LESSON OF THE STRIKES.

The increased pretensions put forward by the workmen in both of the recent strikes, have aroused considerable apprehension, not only among employers of labor, but also among those of their own number who have not yet surrendered their personal liberty to the yoke of the walking delegate. In both cases the strikers put forward two entirely novel claims. They demanded first that they should be paid for the whole of the time they had been out on strike, and further, that all non-union workmen should not only be summarily dismissed but that, if they were allowed to remain on condition of joining the union, they should be mulcted in a heavy fine to be deducted by the masters from their wages. Of course these two demands were instantly rejected; but the fact that they were made at . all shows, first, the increased aggressiveness of organized labor, and secondly that its leaders regard the free workman with as great hostility as the employer.

This is indeed the true state of the case. The attitude of organized labor towards the great majority of their class, the free workmen who decline to surrender their liberty of action to the dictation of a union, is becoming one of open hostility. Whenever possible they resort to violence or intimation to force them into their ranks, and when, owing to the firmness of the authorities, brute force is impossible, they endeavor by abuse and denunciation to frighten them into abandoning that greatest of all civilized rights the privilege of working for whom they please and at what they please. If they do not allow the coarse demagogues, who usually rise to positions of authority in trade organizations to the exclusion of the genuine working man, to dictate to them as to whether their wives and children shall be fed or go hungry they must submit to be called "rats," "scabs or "blacklegs," and to be held up to the execration of the unthinking simply because they venture to exercise that freedom which the laws of the country are framed to support. And this too, in spite of the fact that on both this continent and in Europe they form the large majority of workers, and that only one third of the laboring population of America are enrolled in the ranks of the unions.

It is this feature of trade unionism which is most dangerous not only to the liberty of the free workman but to that of the unionist himself. It involves a perversion of the sense of right which beginning by fettering a man's capacities ends by blunting his moral sense, since it impresses upon him the idea that his duties to the union come first, and that those to his family, his fellow workmen, and his employers, weigh as nothing when they controvert in the slightest the behests of the walking delegate. It tends to make him simply part of a machine blindly subservient to the dictation of irresponsible agitators. It fixes his wages, and as far as possible cuts down the amount of work he shall do for them to the standard of that done by the poorest and slowest of his fellows. In fact it practically makes of him a bond slave to its rulers, and as a natural result causes him to deteriorate into a careless exacting workman upon whom no employer can place the slightest reliance.

Can such a man usurp the title of a representative of labor and stigmatise the free workman as a "scab" because he will not surrender his own volition and the comfort of his wife and family into the hands of the men who "run" the union? He certainly tries to do so, and, thanks to the blatant harangues of demagogues and bar-room politicians, he has to a certain extent succeeded in imposing himself as such upon an unthinking section of the population, and in inducing them to regard the free workman as more or less a traitor to the cause of labor. But on the educated classes and on the commercial world he can never impose. They simply see in him a man trying to do as little as possible and to get as much as possible for it. They look upon him as a man who surrenders his personal liberty in the hopes of getting something to which he is not entitled by means of coercion and intimidation. Like Esau he sells his birthright for a mess of pottage; but only too often he finds he has parted with it in vain, and that the tyranny of the walking delegate is infinitely more grinding than that of the most grasping employer.

ONTARIO ALL RIGHT .- Most of our western exchanges speak hopefully of the outlook. According to the London Free Press, there is every prospect for an abundant harvest-a harvest several millions of dollars in advance of last year. The farmers of the province are fairly prosperous, and as a class do not complain much of hard times, for they have no title to complain. All farm implements can be bought for about half the price they could five years ago, and household furniture, etc., can be bought at a very great reduction of the prices ten years ago. Dry goods and groceries are one-third cheaper than they were in 1880. It is true that farm produce does not bring quite as much as it did ten years ago, but then it does not cost so much to raise it. And then the purchasing power of a dollar now is fully from one-third to one-half more. Farm help is perhaps the only item that has kept up in price, and there is good reason for this. Farm machinery has driven the laborers out of the country to work on railways, the lumber regions, the mines and the cheaper lands of the North-West. This works no inconvenience except in haying and harvesting. The farmers' labors are thus comparatively light when other classes are considered. They have no trouble to get all the money they want at low rates of interest. Thousands of dollars beg to be loaned at a cheap rate for any length of time, as the interest is paid and the security remains good. Money can be had for six and seven per cent., whilst farmers in the United States pay from 12 to 20 per cent., and sell their chief product, corn, at 15 to 18 cents a bushel. The Ontario farmer is in a prosperous condition, especially as compared with the same class of the United States. The agricultural depression in the Eastern States is one of the most remarkable economic facts before the world to day. In Vermont, for instance, a Commissioner of Immigration has been appointed, who is offering great inducements to thrifty farmers. Hundreds of farms are lying abandoned, and these buildings, orchards and all, are sold at the rate of from \$2 to \$5 an acre, the State agreeing to loan \$25 and furnish a cow for a stipulated period for each family. Western farmers are not doing very well, but at least they are prospering sufficiently to keep up the values of their lands.

Messus. Charmeras, Morel & Co., of Lyons, France, write as follows: "Since our last circular of the 6th of June, all the interest of our silk market has been concentrated upon the progress of the crops. In Europe reports have been more contradictory than ever, but finally the outlurn may be considered somewhat better than last season, which had been from 15 to 20 per cent under that of 1888. In China the failure of the second crop will probably reduce the export of white silk to 45,000 bales, against 53,000 last season. The Japan crop is reported equal to or slightly under last. The striking feature is the eager-

ness with which European reelers have secured cocoons, paying on the average 10 to 15 per cent more than last year, so that even taking into account the good yield of cocoons, new silk has been produced at 10 per cent over the cost of last year. This fact has obliged holders to raise their pretensions, and an advance of 1f to 2f has been established on nearly all descriptions of silk, but the volume of transactions has been very limited, as manfacturers have reduced their purchases within the smallest compass. Orders in piece goods are decidedly scarce, and the failure of a large Paris buyer, which is causing a serious loss to our manufacturers, has brought to light the unsatisfactory state of business. This is the summary of our crop reports: Spain, crop about equal to last year. France, crop equal or a little better than in 1889. Cocoons-Cevennes, yellow, 4f 50c to 5f, against 4f to 4f 25 in 1889; Ardeche, yellow, 4f 25c, against 3f 80c to 4f 10c in 1889; Var, yellow, 3f 75c to 4f 25c, against 8f to 3f 30c in 1889. Italy-The crop varies considerably from one province to another, but may be put down in the average 10 per cent better than last season. Cocoons-Lombardy, yellow (average), 4f to 4f 10c, against 3f 70c in 1889; crossed breeds, (average), 3f 50c to 3f 80c, against 3f 20c in 1889; Piedmont, best yellow, 4f 50c to 4f 90c, against 4f 35c to 4f 60c in 1889. Prices last year were particularly high. Brutia and Syria-The crop is reported more abundant than last year, which was already a very good one.

THE following changes have been made in the tariff:-Moulded celluloid balls and cylinders coated with tinfoil or not, but not finished or further manufactured are to be rated for duty at 10 per cent ad valorem. Elastic rubber thread for the manufacture of elastic webbing when imported by manufacturers of clastic webbing to be used for that purpose only in their own factories, is placed upon the free list until it is manutactured in Canada. Calcareous tufa will be admitted free of duty when imported from the States for use in the manufacture of indurated fibre ware, for sulphite fibre and for no other purpose, such exemption from duty to continue until the end of the next session of Parliament. The following have also been placed on the free list until manufactured in Canada:-Rolled iron tubes not welded, under ly inches in diameter; angle iron, 9 and 10 gauge, not over 14 inches wide; iron tubing, lacquered or brass covered, not over 14 inches diameter, all of which are to be cut to lengths for the manufacture of bedsteads, and to be used for no other purpose, imported by the manufacturers of iron bedsteads in their own factories. Hemp paper made on four-cylinder machines for the manufacture of shot shells, primers for the manufacture of shot shells and cartridges and felt boards, sized and hydraulic pressed and covered with paper or uncovered, for the manufacture of gun wads; when such articles are imported by manufacturers of shot shells, cartridges, and gun wads to be used for these purposes only in their own factories, provided always that these articles when imported shall be entered at the port of Montreal and at no other port, and samples to be furnished to the collector of the port of Montreal from the Customs department for the guidance of officers when accepting free entries of such materials.

An interesting trade mark case has been decided in the New York Supreme court. The owners of a certain bitters went into a Maryland court for an injunction to restrain competitors from appropriating their trade mark rights, and the plaintiffs had a good case, apparently, until it was discovered that the labels and wrappers used by them gave false information to the public, by stating that the article was manufactured in a certain locality where it was not, and that the signature attached to the labels was that of the present owner, when in reality the labels bore the name of the original inventor who was dead. On account of these misleading statements the case was dismissed, and the infringing party had a victory for the time being. The complainants, however, pursued a different course by publishing the truth and nothing but the truth on their labels and wrappers which they should have done in the first place. After altering names and giving all the necessary facts, according to instructions received from the Maryland court, fresh litigation was commenced in New York which resulted favorably to the firm seeking protection. As there are doubtless other proprie. tary preparations bearing old time signatures and other material on the outside wrappers which are useless in court, the manufacturers may know what to expect should they be called upon to defend their business against encroachment.

Up to the present time the catch of fish suitable for the packing of American sardines has been extremely light on the New England coast. In sections where a good catch is usually taken during the month of June, the pack has not been more than one-third of that of last year, and Eastport packers, who are generally busy about the middle of July, have done very little work thus far this season owing to scarcity of fish and extremely high prices exacted for the moderate quantity that has been brought in. With a large number of factories in readiness for operations, as at present is the case, the aspect of affairs would be radically changed in the event of a good run of fish even for a short season. As it is, however, old fish has to be relied upon in a good measure to supply the current demand, and, with the aggregate of this supply moderate, prices for the same and for the little new stock on hand continue to advance Should the catch not improve during the next two or three weeks the probabilities are that prices will be moved up considerably higher, doubtless as far as they can be raised without shutting off the demand. In the Eastern market prices have advanced 25@30c per case during the past week, quarter oils selling at \$4 and mustards at \$3.40 to the wholesale trade. In the New York market there has been a similar rise, with transactions reported as \$4.05@4.10 and \$3.50 respectively.

THE Hudson Bay Company's steam barque Erik, Capt. Shaw, from Labrador, has arrived. The Erik left London for Labrador early in June, with a cargo of manufactured goods, and was as far north as the company's post at Rigolet, in 54 lat. The vessel arrived at the post on July 3rd, and found fishing had not yet begun. A large fleet of Harbor Grace fishing schooners arrived about the same time as the Erik, but could not begin fishing as the bay ice was only just beginning to move out. At the company's post it was reported that the winter had been the severest for 30 years and this had interfered with the fur crop, which was very small. Surprise was, however, expressed at the reports that destitution prevailed in Labrabor, as both whites and Indians had plenty to live upon and were fairly comfortable. The company's officers reported that there had been no deaths from privation during the winter. The mate of the Erik reports that there are large masses of ice all along the Labrador coast, and that the fishing vessels have had great difficulty in reaching the coast. The mate added that even in high latitude he never saw such large icebergs as those passed in the Straits of Belle Isle.

THE bottom seems to be falling out of the ice market. The demand at consuming centres for several weeks past has ruled rather slack, the price being paid from \$3.50 to \$4 a ton for immediate delivery. The green men are not the only one who have dropped money in the ice business this season. One of the largest speculative concerns in New York recently had many cargoes of ice arrive at that port, and about that time the price had flattened out so that sales were made at \$2, the frozen commodity having cost them \$6 to \$8 a ton. The new men who went into the business and built stacks find the ice does not weigh out as large as anticipated, and in nearly every case they over-estimated the crop which they harvested. This cuts down the profit materially and, while a majority will make something, there is not the bonaza which dazzled the eyes of the Kennebeckers when the ice craze was on. This tendency to over estimate was illustrated by Waterville parties, who contracted with the Knickerbocker Ice Company, of New York, to deliver them 2,000 tons of ice at Gardener recently. The com, pany sent the vessels to carry that amount, but every ton the the Waterville parties could muster was 246.

The idea that A.T. Stewart began life in New York penniless is so deeply rooted in the public mind that it is doubtful if people will ever comprehend the true facts. Very few men have as good a chance for a commercial opening as had the great dry goods prince. His entire fortune was placed in his hands when he was twenty years of age, and he was allowed to do exactly as he pleased with it. This fortune amounted to considerably over

\$20,000. The first purchase which Stewart made was in the shape of a big consignment of Irish linens in Belfast. A lot of the \$20,000 went into this primary transaction, and, after he had sold the goods at a little shop on the corner of Broadway and Chambers street he found he had nearly doubled his fortune so that a year after he had established his business he had nearly \$40,000 in cash and a good credit already established. With such an equipment at twenty-one years, his subsequent success loses something of its marvellous character, particularly when it is remembered that the war trebled the value of all the big commercial houses like that of A. T. Stewart & Co. Had he started, as some people believe, without a cent, he might have died a dry goods clerk.

The Canadian Pacific railway telegraph crop bulletin reads:

—Reports received from our agents indicate that fully threefourths of the wheat in all parts of the province and the Territories is out in head, and that barley and oats are equally well
advanced. Root and hay crops are in excellent condition, and
there is every prospect of a most abundant yield. Warm, sunny
weather is all that is now required to bring to perfection one of
the most bountiful crops in the history of the country. Haying
has commenced in most districts and the crop will be above the
average. A number of farmers interviewed by our agents express the opinion that if the weather is at all favorable harvesting will begin early in the second week of August. A careful
summary of the reports received indicates that, taken altogether,
the amount of farm produce of the country this year will be
proportionately far in excess of that of any previous year.

An American company has been established to guarantee depositors in National, State, and savings banks and trust companies against loss by reason of the suspension or failure of such institutions in which those guaranteed may have their deposits. In case of the suspension or failure of such an institution in which the party guaranteed has money on deposit, the company upon receiving evidence of that fact and transfer of the claim with power of attorney to collect, pays the full amount due the loser by the insolvent institution. The rates are as follows: For any amount not exceeding \$300, \$1 per year; for any amount not exceeding \$500, \$1.50 per year; for any amount not exceeding \$1.000, \$2.50 per year; and \$2.50 for every additional \$1,000 guaranteed. It is a New Jersey institution and has been incorporated less than a year.

A New York firm has recieved the following jobbing quota tion on new Valencia raisins: For shipment per first regular steamer direct to New York, best 4-crown layers at 8½c, prime off-stalk at 7½c per pound; for shipment by August steamer 7.69c and 7.57c respectively. Specifications as to shipments did not seem to be acceptable to the trade, neither did the fact that the figures are a shade above those at which similar goods opened last year in the face of the favorable prospects for a large crop. Present indications are that the jobbing trade are in no hurry to place orders for either Spanish or California raisins, certainly not to any large extent at prices on line with those asked for first shipments.

One of the managers of a big eastern knitting mill has made a calculation that the shoe strings of a working girl will come untied on the average three times per diem, and that the girl will lose about 50 seconds every time she stops to retie them. Most of the employes have two feet, so this entails a loss of 300 seconds every day for each girl. There are about 400 girls employed in this factory, and therefore the gentleman finds that 43,800,000 seconds are wasted in the course of the year, which, at the current rate wages, is worth \$943. Orders have accordingly been issued that girls must wear only buttoned shoes or congress gaiters, under penalty of discharge.

The report of the Royal Insurance Company, which we reproduce in another column, speaks for itself. Seldom has a more favorable showing been placed before the shareholders. At the close of the year the directors were able to carry \$250,000 to the reserve fund, \$250,000 to the fire fund, and \$150,000 to the building fund, and still leave a sum closely approximating to \$1,950,000 at the credit of profit and loss.

A DESPATCH from the Pinkerton detective agency of New York to W. A. Caldwell, curator to the insolvent estate of Lewis Meyer, the abscending clothier, who left behind him creditors to the extent of \$100,000, announces that he has been located in Jersey City, and that he can be arrosted at an hour's notice if his Montreal creditors wish to institute extradition proceedings against him. These proceedings have been taken, and the Pinkertons will be advised to make the arrest. Extradition will be asked on the grounds of fraud and secretion, as well as on a more serious charge, which, however, is not formulated as yet.

COMPLAINT is made in Brozil that under the new form of government the Commission evil is as great as under the old. "This Commission business," we are told, " is characteristic of Brazil. Whenever a man wishes to make a trip to Europe, and has sufficient influence, he gets a commission to examine lightning rods, breech-loading guns, foreign systems of school instruction, or some such thing, and every one of these Commissioners finds that the best place for examining his specialty is in Paris! The unanimity on this point is admirable." Have'nt we heard of something similar in Montreal?

The iron moulders' strike in San Francisco has lasted over three months, and from the start was ill advised. The union, adopted a rule that moulders should make only a certain number of castings per day, and this limit was the average of the poorest men. The union also declared that there should be only one apprentice to eight moulders. With this was involved the eight-hour question, but the strike was primarily due to the apprentice question and the device to grade all work by the standard of the slowest mechanics. The foundrymen swore they would not submit to such demands, and so the fight.

The British Consul at Tientsin, China, reports that kerosone oil continues to be in greater demand every year. The import has now reached 2,000,000 gallons. One is surprised to find that of this more than two fifths is Russian. The Russian oil is said to give worse light than the American, but there is a difference in its favor of nearly ten per cent, in cost, which is much more than enough to make it preferred by many purchasers in China.

The modus vivendi with regard to United States fishing vessels seems to be more productive this season than last. Eighty-nine licenses have been issued this season, the receipts therefrom amounting to \$11,403. Last year seventy-eight were given, which brought into the treasury the sum of \$9,589.

Mr. J. A. McCarville, an old Montrealer and well known in dry goods circles, but for the past decade a resident of Toronto, has returned to this city and has opened an office in the Glenora Buildings as a manufacturers agent in staple dry goods.

The street railway in Pittsburg now has an electric car which seats 60 people inside and 28 on the top platform. It is thirty-six feet long, and magnificently fitted in hardwood. It cost \$5,000, and rides as easily as a Pullman palace car.

It is expected that Mr. T.L. Alsop will succeed Mr. Duncan as sub-manager at the head office of the Liverpool and London and Globe.

The report that the Bunque National is about to open a branch in Chicoutimi is officially denied. Nothing has been decided yet.

VERY little if any standard canned pincapple can be had at less than \$1.20 in the Balimore market, and 95c@\$1 there is now quoted for seconds.

STANDARD canned apricots were reported sold at \$1.621 in the primary market, and few, if any, spot goods can now be obtained at less than \$1.85 in New York.

CALIFORNIA evaporated peaches were reported as having been sold at 17c in the primary market, and that price was subsequently refused for a first-class article.

Last week offers of 750 on a line of 8,000 cases Southern canned corn, some of it two years old, but all very fine quality, was refused in the Baltimore market.

Tue St. Thomas branch of the Traders' Bank has been closed Mr. Coleman, the late manager, going to Toronto. All deposits not withdrawn are transferred to their Aylmer branch.

Mr. Charles Jackson has been made Assistant Secretary in the London office of the Royal, succeeding Mr. J. Heron Duncan, who was appointed Fire Manager of the Royal Exchange.

Mr. White, of the C.P.R. engineering staff, who has been locating a line from Swift Current to Buffalo lake, looking towards Edmonton, has returned, and reports having passed through a fine country, over which it would be easy to construct a line.

The Amhersiburg Herald says: The creditors of Luther Grasley, the petitioner against the return of Balfour, are after the \$1.000 deposited in the Bank of Toronto as security for costs. They consider that it is an excellent opportunity for them to get square with Grasley and secure their claims against him.

A PETITION has been presented to the Practice court asking that the transfer of property made by the Henderson Lumber company to the Ontario bank before the company's failure be set aside, on the ground that it was prejudicial to the interests of the other creditors. The motion was taken en delibere.

Last Sunday was the hottest day of the year in the greater portion of the state of Kansas, and the heat did still further damage to the corn crop. A most conservative estimate cannot now place the probable yield at half what was raised last year. In many sections the most favorable weather from now on cannot make one fourth of a crop.

Those who are striking in this country for eight hours may be thankful that they are only called upon to work ten. In England the association of middlemen or master tailors, more popularly known as sweaters, have bound themselves not to work their men more than twelve hours daily. Until recently a tailor's day in London has averaged sixteen hours.

Under date of June 23rd the Rio News, in its coffee report says: "Receipts have increased smartly in proportion to preceding weeks, but are after all still very moderate, and the probabilities are that they will be irregular during this season, for, if the published accounts are reliable, the question of labor in the State of Rio de Janeiro is very far from settled."

Bar silver is quoted at 50td per ounce, an precedented price due to the change made in the value of the precious metal throughout the world by the passage of the silver bill. Indian exchanges and the Chinese trade, where silver is the principal currency used, are especially affected. The remonetization of silver is again becoming a prominent topic in Europe.

The latest great railway deal is a traffic alliance between the Northern Pacific and the Baltimore and Ohio. These two roads will join hands at Chicago, and form a continuous line from ocean to ocean, over which freight will be carried without breaking of trains. The construction of the link between the roads at Chicago will also give that city a new suburban railway.

THE verdict of Mr. Chancellor Boyd, upsetting the decision of Mr. Justice Ferguson in the case of Kingston v. The Canada Life Association, deciding that fire and life insurance companies can only be taxed on their net instead of their gross incomes, will have the effect of reducing Brantford's revenue about \$1,000, all the companies last year being assessed on their gross incomes.

REPORTS from Norway dated July 7th state that the catch of summer mackerel has been exceedingly light this year, and only about 600 barrels cured for the American markets, whereas preparations were made for curing at least four times that quantity. The prices paid for fresh fish to fishermen were consequently high. About 70 barrels of Norwegian mackerel have recently been disposed of in New York at \$16 per barrel, the only lot imported so far.

The scheme of bridging the English Channel has gone so far that plans have been drawn, soundings made, and a special Commission appointed by the French Minister of Public Works to inquire into the project. The company is endeavoring to obtain concessions in England and France for its construction, and this week, when the shareholders met, the above facts were announced by way of reporting progress.

The appeal of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company against the assessment of the personal property of the C.P.R. Telegraph Company at St Thomas was allowed by Judge Ermatinger on the ground that there is no telegraph company separate from the railway company, and that the assessment act exempts companies that have the principal part of their means invested in real estate, from assessment on personal property.

The Minister of Customs has decided under authority of section six of the last amended Tariff act to have regulations framed and issued for the better sampling of molasses by which the average saccharine strength, as shown by polariscope test, of each consignment or cargo, shall be accepted as the strength for duty, provided it is shown that such consignment or cargo of molasses comes within the working and meaning of item 156 of the amended tariff. This is in accord with the representations of the deputations of molasses importers who waited upon Hon. Mr. Rowell a few days ago, and is another evidence of the readiness with which the Minister of Customs accepts the suggestions of importers interested in the trade of the country.

Now that the lands of the West are being rapidly taken up, a Denver paper predicts the abdication of the cattle king and extinction of the cow-boy. Of the latter is said:—"The cow-boy, with rattling spurs, his leather trousers, his broad brimmed hat and his defiant swagger, will soon join the stage driver, the hunter, the scout, the trapper and the mountain explorer in the procession that moves reluctantly to the quiet, peaceable, commonplace ways of life."

The water furnished by the Water Supply Co., of Stratford, has been pronounced bad by analysis of Prof. Ellis, of Toronto, and Dr. Robertson, the medical health officer, recommends until the company provides a proper system of filteration that those who use the water should boil it. The source is an admixture of ordinary river, marsh and spring water. There is no attempt made at filtering through change and completely but an attempt made at filtering through charcoal and gravel, but practically the water is not filtered.

Private advices and reports coming in via the Eastern trade journals reflect anything but flattering prospects for a fair supply of good quality mackerel in the immediate future. Most supply of good quality mackerel in the immediate future. Most of the American fleet is in North Bay, where fish seem to be running light and of small size. Schools have been struck in in the vicinity of Block Island, but the fish taken averaged 600 to 700 to the barrel, the greater portion of which, we understand, was purchased by canners. There are on the way, nearly due, about 500 bbls Irish mackerel, and an invoice of 335 bbls. was shipped Saturday to a New York firm, so that there need be no fear of immediate famine under present moderate 'demand. The Irish fish, it is asserted, have been prepared with greater care this year than they were last season, but it is no secret that anything better than 2's is rare and unlikely to come forward in the near future, and the scarcity of really first class stock is likely to continue for some time to come.

THE ROYAL INSURANCE COMPANY.

The annual general meeting of the shareholders of this company, was held on June 13, in the board room of the company's head offices North John street, Liverpool. Mr. Ralph Brocklebank, the chairman of directors, presided and there was a numerous attendance of directors and shareholders.

The notice calling the meeting having been read by the manager, Mr. John H. M'Laren, the chairman said, as the report was in the hands of the shareholders, they would take it as read. The following report was then taken as read:

The directors have the pleasure of reporting the results of the operations of the year 1889, as follows:—

Deducting agents' commission and all management expenses, the net prefit of the fire business amounts to £159,661 17s 10d, and the interest on fire fund and current balances to £27,342 1s 9d.

LIFE DEPARTMENT. During the year new proposals were accepted for £854,464, of which amount £614,714 has been completed, and the corresponding annual premiums obtained to the closing of the accounts were £12,814 6s. 4d. The proposals declined during the period amounted to £75,686 The total income from premiums, after deducting reassurances, amounted to £262,086 7s 3d, and the interwas £130,457 18s 5d. The claims during the year were:—By death
—Original sums assured, £174,384 17s 1d; bonus addition thereon,
£27,907 17s €d. By matured policies (including children's endowments)—Original sums assured, £10,248 9s 2d; bonus additions thereon. on, £1,506 58; total, £214,047 8s 9d

In the annuity branch the purchase money received for new annuities, together with the premiums on contingent annuities, amounted to £6,055 10s 6d, and the interest to £7,823 1s 10d. Twenty-eight annuities have expired during the year, the annual payments on which amounted to £893 1s 8d.

The quinquennial valuation of the liabilities of this department, preparatory to the declaration of a bonus to the assured, has been completed and has now to be reported. Full details of of this valuation in the form prescribed by the Life Assurance Companies' Act are are given in a separate report, and it is therefore only necessary to state here that the surplus available for bonus to the assured amounts to £85,11s. Of this amount £267,817 has been applied in providing a bonus of thirty shillings per cent, per appune to all policyhold. to £ 85,118. Of this amount £251,817 has been applied in providing a bonus of thirty shillings per cent per annum to all policyholders entitled to participate, and £16,993 has been reserved to provide an additional bonus of twenty shillings per cent per annum, in respect of each further complete year survived, to all such profit policies as become claims previous to January 1, 1895. The profit accruing to the shareholders for the five years amounts to £94,936 138 44.

To secure perfect accuracy in these calculations a separate valuation of the liabilities has been made by Mr. Meikle, the actuary employed on the occasion of the last valuation, and the results arrived at by him were practically identical with the valuation made by the officers of the company. The figures of Mr. Meikle have in every instance been adopted in this and the accompanying report.

Tuesday of last week was the hottest day thus far this season—Bellevillle will have its civic holiday on the 12th August.—Westport is shipping frog legs to New York—Kingston wants a grain elevator that will hold one million bushels of grain.—Trenton is seeking the establishment of a branch of another chartered bank in that town—Gillies factory in Gananoque had a narrow escape from destruction by fire the other day.—Edward Best, Carleton place, has been effered \$200,000 by a gentleman in Boston for his oiler.—The government, inspector visited Belleville harbor the other day with an eye to improvements.

The traffic returns of the Grand Trunk Rail way for the week ending July 19th, 1895, show a increase of \$6,010 over the corresponding week of 1889.

Massas Morton Phillips and Bulmer, bookbinders, stationers and printers, of this city, have dissolved, Thos. C. Bulmer retiring, A new firm, composed of Messas. Henry Morton, Chas S. I. Phillips, Hugh Cameron, Major Freeman and Roht. J. Gibson, has been formed, under the name of Morton, Phillips, Co., to carry on the business.

A CORRESPONDENT WRITES :- A person visiting the harbor of Quebec is struck by the almost total absence of steamships and the scarcity of sailing vossels flying the British The Norwegian flag, which, old residents say, used to be seldem seen here in comparison with the British, floats over the great majority of the ships, and one is met everywhere with names as unpronounceable as those of a Russian count. It seems somewhat strange that trade between two maritime nations like Britain and Canada should be carried by Norwegian ships manned by Norwegian crews. There is another revolution of a minor nature that is being worked, slowly, perhaps, but surely, and that is the extinction of full-rigged ships. Thery were objected to on account of the amount of top hamper and the number of men required to handle the sails. All the new vessels are handle the sails. At the new vessels are barque-rigged, and even the old ships are being altered to barques, which are allowed by law to carry five less of a crew than full-rigged ships. The altering, it seems, costs practically nothing, for it is paid for by the sale of the spars and cordage taken down. So general has been the move in this direction that it is exceedingly seldom that a ship is seen in this port, and when three came up the other day there were little crowds of people all along the wharves watching them.

A NEW BILL OF LADING .- Since the first of the present month a change has been made by the railway companies in the bills of lading formerly in uso. It is apparent, says the Drug and Paint Reporter, that the transportation companies feared determined opposition should any announcement be made of the proposed change. It may be, too, that they thought to avoid protests, or at least to secure the acceptance of the new bills without the changes being discovered, and thus perhaps ward off or prevent a general protest. Whatever the reason for the surreptitious substitution of the new form, it has thus far prevented what a transportation agent spoke of as a "general kick" against the new form. The fact that some merchants have accepted the new bills of lading, not knowing that they contained

conditions differing from the old, does not invalidate a protest made upon the discovery of the change. Nor is it necessary that a protest should be sent on the issuance of every bill; one protest against the issuance of all such bills in the future being sufficient. The printing of conditions on the bills of lading absolving the transportation company from liability in certain cases, is not necessarily binding, as by this means they cannot avoid the responsibilities and liabilities of common carriers. In other words, the presentation of the bill of lading as a contract between shipper and trans-portation company is not a bar to the recovery of damages when such are incurred by common carriers. It is better, however, that bills of lading should contain no provisions which may be construed as limiting the responsibility of the transportation companies so that the shipper practically assumes all risk, and prompt and earnest protest should, therefore, be made against the new form. This is a matter that is clearly within the province of the commer-cial exchanges, and prompt action on their This is a matter that is part, united with earnest protests on the part of the merchants themselves, may make an appeal for interference by the Interstate Commerce Commission unnecessary.

Financial.



MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

MONTREAL, 24th July, 1890.

The past week has been uneventful in commercial circles. July is usually a slack month in most branches of trade, and in some lines, such as paints, oils and glass, travellers are now all at home and will not be again on the road before the middle of next month. Still, owing to the caution with which storekeeners have operated, all along, a fair jobbing trade is reported in nearly every line, and in some lines, such as cement and fire brick, a brisk business is reported. The excellent crop reports received from all over the country have given fresh confidence to the retailers and remittances have certainly improved; but the stagnation in the lumber trade and the practical closing down of many of the large lumber mills is a disquieting feature. In the Ottawa district over a thousand men are out of employment, and those who can secure work at all, are willing to accept starvation wages. This naturally has injured the smaller traders throughout that section, and rendered their suppliers cautious. The fact that unfavorable weather might yet reduce the harvest also inclines wholesalers to hold off, and, although a greater feeling of confidence is manifest, and there is a general belief that values have reached the lowest point they are likely to attain this season, a salutary caution is still a a prominent feature and business is conducted on a conservative basis. The outlook is certainly promising, but wholesalers and retailers,

alike, have already felt the danger of counting their chickens before they were hatched, and are not likely to repeat the errors of former years. The most reassuring point about the situation is the fact that stocks throughout the country are light and that the spring trade was light. Therefore, if a fair average crop is harvested, the fall trade should be a good one.

ASBES.—Receipts have been moderate, but somewhat improved. First pots sell at \$4.10 for fair tares \$3.70 for second. Pearls quiet, latest sale reported was at \$5.15 for first sort. Receipts since 1st January, 1,073 brls. pot 260 brls pearls. Deliveries, 1,330 brls, pot 346 brls pearls. Stock in store, 237d, July at 6 p.m., 178 brls. pots; 76 brls pearls.

CEMENT.-Thanks to the stand taken by the commercial journals and the prompt calling of a meeting of cement dealars to boycott steamship lines bringing out cement on ship's account, this trade evil has been put a stop to, and no more cement will be brought in on ship's account this season. This has rendered the market firmer and as the arrivals have been only 1,670 barrels, stocks have been reduced to such a low point that is some cases importers have not been able to fill orders. The demand has been brisk both from local and western buyers, and an active market with considerable business doing has resulted. Advices from Europe are strong and quote an advance of 3d@6d per cask over last purchases. Here prices are also higher and cement is now firmly held at \$2 50@\$2,65 for round lots of London and \$2 65@\$2.80 for small lots. Belgian \$2,45@\$2.60 for round lots and \$2.50@\$2.75 for small. The demand for firebricks has been good and sales of round lots are reported at \$20@\$25 per 1000. Stocks light.

DAIRY PRODUCE AND PROVISIONS,—In butter there has been a lifeless sort of trade, and prices are still too high for export. There have been negotiations about June creamery, but the deals have not been closed. Cheese is dull and weak, and a raview of the trade will be found elsewhere. It is likely that quotations quoted by us will be outside ones by the time this issue is printed, as cables reducing limits and cancelling orders have been received. Transactions have been in small amounts on this market: white has sold lately at 7½ and colored at 8c. The report that the Idaho, with 40,000 boxes for Bristol, had gone ashore, created some excitement until it was learned the vessel had sustained no damage. In Napanee on the 23rd, 1,200 were boarded and 100 sold at 8c, which price was bid for the balance. At Belleville, on the 22nd, 28 factories offered 2,338 boxes, comprising 1,799 white and 539 colored; 50 colored sold at 8½ c,489 at 8 3-16c and 120 white at 8c; buyers offered 7½ of factories of white, which was not accepted. The cheese boarded represented 12 days' July make. Offerings at Ingersoll on the 22nd were 6,000 boxes, first half July make; 1,020 sold at 8½ c and 1,160 at 8½ c. The imports of cheese at Liverpeol from Canada and the United States from the 3rd to the 9th July, 1890, were 62,912 boxes, and from the 1st October to the same date 1,159,594, against 927,573 for the same period in the previous year. The imports of butter at Liverpool from the United States and Canada from the 3rd to the 9th July, 1890, were 5,229 packages, and from the 1st October to the same period in the previous year. Eggs slightly easier at last writing at 14c@15c. Provisions quiet and unchanged.

DRY Goeds.—A cut in flannolettes has been one of the features of the week; ounside of this prices are steady. Payments are fair and have been keeping up well since the commencement of the month and there are less complaints of the way in which notes are met. The failures of the week are few and unimportant, and there is less demand for renewals. This is the slackest month for city trade but the volume of retail business shows very little signs of falling off. The good crop prospects all over the Dominion are rendering traders more confident, and travellers report an improved feeling throughout the country.

FREIGHTS.—Scarcely any lumber has gone from here to South America in consequence of the unsettled state of affairs and the financial panic. Only one recent charter at \$13 is reported. Grain 1s 7d to Liverpool, 2s to Glasgow and outports, 2s 3d to London. Flour 8s@9s; provisions, 12s 6d; pot and pearl ashes, 17s@19s, butter and cheese, 24s@25s; deals, 50s; phosphate, 7s; cattle, 55s by the liners insured; outside vessels, uninsured, 45s, A deal in cattle freights is being attempted, and most of the outside steamers have been secured. It is said quotations will be advanced to 60s and 70s. Money has been lost in cattle this year and this is looked upon as a bold attempt to recover lost ground.

GROCKRIES —The molasses question, referred to by us last week, has been the chief topic. The attempt to draw the refineries into the discussion had not the slightest basis of truth and was quite uncalled for. It may be stated that molasses under 56 test is dutiable in Canada at 1½0 per gallon; over 56 test the duty is 6c per gallon. The Government thought that none, or little, of the molasses coming to Canada, would range over 55 and 56 test but a proportion has exceeded the limit. The Government wanted to tax cargoes at 1½c only when the whole cargo was under 56 test, when it was over and under

that test the uniform charge was 6c per gallon. Owing to the representations of the Montreal deputation they now have decided to average the whole cargo and if the whole average is under 56 test the duty is to be 1½c, and if over 6c. The deputation at first pressed to have the test raised to 60, but the present rangement is equally satisfactory as no cargo is likely to average over 56 test. Teas have moved quietly since our last. Samples ex Batavia are daily expected. The tea trade is likely to keep quiet until there are more supplies on spot to choose from. Sugars are unchanged and the demand has been quiet. An improved feeling is reported at last writing. The grocery business, as a rule is quiet. Only moderate orders are being received and payments are slow. Some houses say there is more disposition to order but there is no great eagerness to sell except to best customers until the country is more prosperous. A traveller says the country looks well except between Kingston and Belleville which was abad last year. It is there rocky and hilly and has apparently suffered from drought and want of care in tilling and fertilizing the soil. If present appearances are realized there will be a good general crop but it is yet too early to be certain. Manitoba and the north-west, will, it is hoped, help the country through with a bouncing yield of grain.



mouth. There is a report from Quebec that shoe houses there are raising prices 5 to 10 cents per pair, and it is evidently a year when jobbers need to be cautious or they will be caught.

PAINTS, Oils and Glass.—The market is perfectly bare of linseed oil for the first time in 25 years and only one shipment of 200 barrels has as yet arrived. The steamer bringing the bulk of oil supplies broke down and had to return to port, and the demand

being good, stocks have run out. There is very little doing in glass. The market is stiffer in Belgium and prices are fully 5 per cent. higher there but there is no rise in this market as glass and oil are "leaders" usually in the trade. This is holiday time in the paint and oil business. Travellers are all in and will not go out until the middle of next month; but as stocks are not heavy and the spring trade was light there is every prospect of a good fall trade. Caustic soda is firmer owing to reports that English manufacturers are on

the eve of forming a combination. We quote \$2.35\(\alpha\)\\$2.60 for 60 p.c. and \$2.60\(\alpha\)\\$2 75 for 70 p.c.

Wool.—Advices from the London market are encouraging. The present series of auctions opened with a decline of 7½@10 per cent, on fine wool but this has been recovered and recent cables predict a firm close. Wool is very quiet throughout Canada, mill men buying only from hand-to-mouth. Cape has sold at 17½@18½c.
