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ST. THOMAS BOYS KILLED IN ACTION

One is Survived by Young Widow and Week-Old Son.

FOUR ON LUSITANIA... Hope is Given Up for Three Women and Young Boy.

Special to The Toronto World. ST. THOMAS, Ont., May 10.—The sad news was received in St. Thomas today that four St. Thomas boys had been killed in action at Ypres.

Private James Kelley, aged 25 years, enlisted at St. Thomas, was a roof slater. His young widow and week-old son survive him.

Private Ernest J. Palmer, unmarried, enlisted here with the first contingent owing to ill-health, coming from St. Thomas, was a member of the 25th Regiment for three years, and corporal of "A" Company.

Private Edwin Masceur, who enlisted here, was employed by the Michigan Central Railway, has not been heard from. Fate doubtful.

Hanged Himself. Edward Fredericks, aged 50 years, a well-known farmer of Aldborough township, while suffering from depression owing to ill-health, committed suicide by hanging himself in his barn.

WEST END Y.M.C.A. ANNUAL MEETING

Reports of Various Departments Were Given Well Illuminated Views.

MANY SPLENDID WORKS... Ten Thousand Soldiers Made Use of Offer to Use Swimming Tank.

The annual meeting of the West End Young Men's Christian Association was held last night in the association building with a splendid attendance of members and friends.

Reports of various departments presented were illustrated by stereopticon views which added greatly to the interest and impressed those present with the varied activities of the association.

West End Y.M.C.A. is actively represented at the front by the Assistant Secretary, Captain Pearson, who has been with the men of the first contingent since they left here, and whose services have been much appreciated, and Captain Oscar Irwin, reported missing after the battle of Langemarck.

Another piece of splendid service was that of teaching English to new Canadians, 70 classes meeting weekly in homes, halls, schools, etc., with 89 students and young business men as teachers. The enrollment reached the 1100 mark.

The total attendance at religious meetings, bible classes, etc. was 16,416 during the year.

The social committee put on a program of activities that has not been equaled in the past. The membership report showed an increase of 67 in the senior department and the boys' division a decrease of 141.

It is intended to refer to the board of directors and the friends of the West End Association to know that, notwithstanding the prevailing stringency, thru the splendid efforts of officers and members, committees and directors, they have been able to report a satisfactory financial statement and the West End Y.M.C.A. desire to thank all of the friends who have helped to make this possible.

Music was provided by the association orchestra and Messrs. N. B. McKibbin, Bruce Bradley, Mr. McIntyre and the Bulgarian Male Choir (a representative group from the new countries in our country). Rev. J. A. Woodside of Chalmers Church took the devotional exercises and short addresses were given by prominent association members.

The meeting concluded with refreshments served by the social committee.

REQUIEM MASS THIS WEEK. A Requiem Mass will be celebrated at St. Michael's Cathedral during this week for the repose of the soul of Private C. Pitts of the Second Canadian Airborne Corps, who died from wounds received in action. TORONTO MAN SEIZED LIFE BELT IN WATER

S. L. Lines Took Plunge When Liner Began to Sink.

Canadian Associated Press Cable. LONDON, May 10.—Mr. S. L. B. Lines of Toronto, who has arrived in London, stated that he was seated at luncheon with his wife on the Lusitania when it was lowered safely.

The first thought of every man was to get out. The ship heaved over so sharply that by the time they reached the deck they were falling against the shaft.

He managed to get his wife on to the first-class deck, where three boats were being got a few. Later on the third boat it was lowered safely. Then, as he turned to look for a life belt, the ship began to sink, he fell into the water and grasped a life belt, which was flung towards him. Ten minutes later he was pulled on to a raft.

They cruised around for other survivors and picked up a few. Later on the collapsible boat, raising the number in the deck they were blown up. They were afterwards picked up by one of the rescue steamers.

German Offers Abject Apology... Sincere Regret for Sinking of Dutch Steamer Katwyk Expressed.

ACT NOT INTENTIONAL... Berlin Government Admits German Submarine Sent Vessel to Bottom.

THE HAGUE, via London, May 10.—It is officially announced that the German Government has expressed sincere regret for the sinking of the Dutch steamer Katwyk, which was blown up off North Hinder Lightship on April 14 by a German submarine. Germany explains that the act was in no wise intentional, and undertakes to make compensation.

"A communication from Berlin," says the official announcement, "states that the German Government, having received the report of the crew of the Dutch vessel with that of the commander of one of the German submarines, has arrived at the conclusion that the torpedoing was done by a German submarine. The commander of the submarine was of the opinion that he was dealing with a neutral ship, as the distinguishing marks used by neutrals had not been illuminated on the side which was struck by the torpedo."

WASHINGTON, May 10.—Count Bernstorff, German ambassador, called on Secretary of State Bryan today and expressed "deep regret that the events of the war had led to the loss of so many American lives."

While neither the ambassador nor Secretary Bryan's statement mentioned the Lusitania disaster by name, it was known that the two officials talked of it specifically. It was the ambassador's first visit to the department since the disaster. The secretary received him immediately and greeted him cordially.

The following statement was given out by agreement: "The German ambassador called at the state department and expressed his deep regret that the events of the war had led to the loss of so many American lives."

BOYCOTTED FOR JOINING IN PEACE DISCUSSION... German Council of Women Angry at Hague Delegates for Meeting.

THE HAGUE, via London, May 11.—The German delegates to the recent International Women's Congress received notice on their return home that they had been boycotted by the German National Council of Women owing to their having participated in peace discussions, it is said. The council had refused to join the congress.

Miss Julia Grace of Wales, Wis., has been appointed secretary of the women's embassy, which is proceeding to Scandinavia and Russia to intercede with the rulers of those countries to plead for peace.

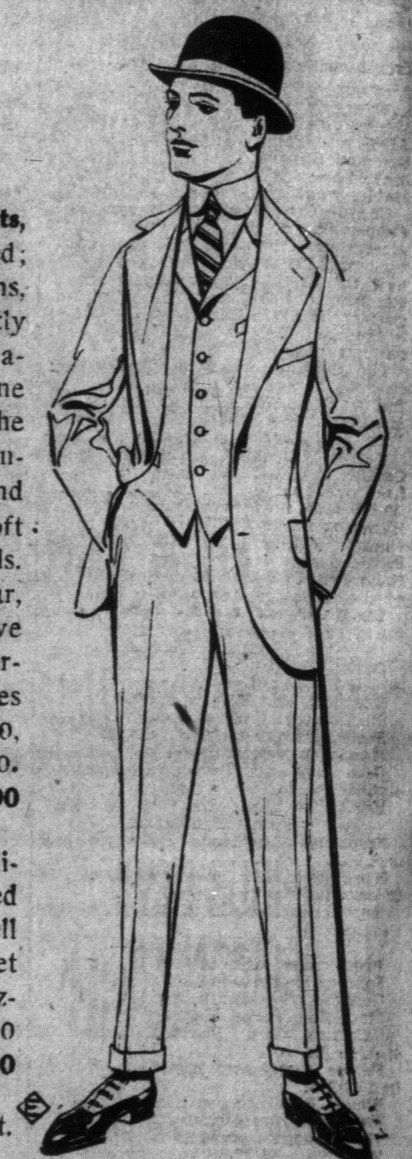

ANOTHER BREAK IN NEW YORK STOCKS

Prices Fell From Four to Fifteen Points Before Rally.

DISTURBING OUTLOOK

U. S. Steel Statement for April Less Favorable Than Expected.

NEW YORK, May 10.—Another readjustment of values, growing out of the liquidation of the market, occurred today. Prices in general fell four to fifteen points, erasing the gains of the week made by the market in the two preceding months.

Lowest prices were registered at midday when the U. S. Steel Corporation announced its tonnage statement for April showing a decrease in unfilled orders. Although the decrease was slight, it proved disappointing in the view that an increase had been expected.

STARTLING RUMORS SHOOK CHICAGO PIT

One Yarn Was That President Wilson's Life Was in Danger.

RALLY AFTER BREAK

Report of Ultimatum by Italy Another Disturbing Factor.

CHICAGO, May 10.—Panic rumors that some harm had been done to President Wilson put sudden additional strain today on the wheat market, which values were tending downward owing to continued uncertainty as to whether the Lusitania tragedy would intensify the pressure of diplomatic and trade relations.

TONE WAS UNSETTLED IN MONTREAL MARKET

Dominion Bridge, Iron and Scotia Steel Were Particularly Weak.

MONTREAL, May 10.—A further break in the New York market set again unsettled off fairly sharply in a few speculative leaders.
