WHEAT RAISERS' BOYCOTT IS THE TEST IDEA

The Proposal is to Have All the Wheat Raisers of the World in it.

NOTHING UNDER A DOLLAR

Will Be Accepted for Wheat, and the Production Will Be Regulated.

A DECREASE OF TWENTY PER CENT.

Is to Be Made in the Amount Raised, if This Great Scheme Goes Through.

Minneapolis, Minn., April 13.—The Journal says: All the farmers of the world in a sort of international trust to restrict the production of wheat and raise prices, is the plan which it is hoped to carry into effect at the International Agricultural Conference in Paris, July 9-16.

The idea was conceived by two men independently. Mr. Hanley has been interested in a "wheat-wheat" scheme, and is prominently associated with the farmers, elevator and various co-operative undertakings.

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PARENTS PREFERRED DEATH

Carl Wilstrom and His Wife Did Not Want to Be Buried in Their Son's Grave.

THEY TURNED ON THE GAS JETS. And the Boy Found Them Both Dead When He Returned From His Work.

New York, April 13.—(Special.)—To relieve the burden of their support from their 16-year-old son, whose small earnings supplied the necessities of the family, Carl Wilstrom and his wife committed suicide yesterday afternoon in their home at No. 325 East Thirty-third-street by turning on the gas.

Wilstrom was a tailor, 35 years old. He had been out of work for some time and his failure to secure employment made him despondent. Carl, their son, is employed as elevator boy in the Rose Building, in Forty-second-street. He left for his work early yesterday morning, bidding his parents good-bye in cheerful tones and encouraging his father with the hope that he would find work during the day.

Wilstrom set out each morning in his quest for employment and returned yesterday more despondent than ever over his failure. Tenants in the house saw him return, climb wearily up the stairs and close and lock the door.

Carl, the younger, returned home for his dinner soon after 6 o'clock. He was surprised to find the door locked. No one responded to his repeated summonses.

Across the hall lives Thomas Rebej. Carl asked him if he had seen his father and mother leave the house. Rebej replied that Wilstrom had returned early in the afternoon, and had not gone out since then.

Fumes of Gas. So Carl went into the back room of his father's flat and climbed through the window out on the fire-escape and tried to open the window in his own home. As he opened the lower sash he was driven back by the fumes of gas, with which the kitchen was filled.

The boy called to Rebej for help, and they entered the Wilstrom flat together. On a cot in the kitchen they found Wilstrom dead. Rebej tried to persuade Carl not to investigate further, but the son pressed forward into the bedroom, where he found his mother lying on the bed. She was also dead. The bodies were taken to the morgue.

Wilstrom and his wife had made careful plans for the suicide. The cracks around the doors and the windows had been carefully stopped up with putty. Then the couple, after turning on two gas jets, lay down to die.

Carl was grief-stricken, and would not be comforted. He has a married sister, Mrs. Deastroy, to whom he is wed.

DEATH OF GEO. H. SCRIPPS. A Newspaper Man, Widely Known All Over the Continent, Victim of Anemia.

San Diego, Cal., April 13.—George H. Scripps died at Mirando, the ranch of his brother, J. H. Scripps, of pneumonia, after an illness of several months. The remains will be cremated at Los Angeles. Interment will be at Inglewood, Illinois, May 1.

George H. Scripps was 68 years old, born in England, but came to this country when four years old, and was reared on a farm at Leavenworth, Kan.

He was a newspaper man, and his journalistic career began in 1870 when he joined the staff of the "Chicago Tribune." He was later associated with the "New York Tribune" and the "New York Herald."

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BOERS HAVE BEEN CHECKED, SO ROBERTS TAKES

British Forces Have Been So Divided as to Head Off the Burgher Advance on Bloemfontein.

Latest News Says That Mafeking Is in Bad Straits—No Force Known to Be Coming From the South—Roberts in Need of Horses.

London, April 14.—(4.15 a.m.)—"The forward movement of the Boers is checked," says Lord Roberts. This is taken to mean not by fighting but by dispositions to head off their advance and bar their way to vulnerable points in the line of British communications. Relief is on the way to Wepener. The Boers in Natal appear capable of developing an aggressive movement at Elandsfontein.

Where Methuen Is. Lord Methuen is at Zwartkopsfontein, 12 miles east of Boshof, and is sending small detachments to other points in the country. Lord Chesham, commanding one of these, encountered a small commando about ten miles southeast of Zwartkopsfontein. He found most of the farms occupied by women and children only.

Mafeking in a Bad Way. An editorial note in the Daily Mail says that Mafeking is in a very bad way, and that the hope of relieving it is far off, as no force is advancing from the south.

Horses Are Needed. The War Office announces that 4000 horses will arrive at the Cape this week. It is well understood that the animals are not fit for work until about ten days after the voyage. Two thousand more are due at the Cape next week.

The War Office has called out the reserve companies of several infantry battalions, which will be sent to South Africa forthwith.

Boer Peace Envoys. The Boer peace envoys have documents, the Home correspondent of The Daily News says, showing that urgent advances to the Transvaal to wage war were originally made by Germany. This correspondent also asserts that Count Von Buelow, the German Foreign Minister, who was said to have gone on a visit to a sick brother, really went to Milan for the express purpose of conferring with the delegates.

It is reported that the Boers lost heavily in the recent fighting at Wepener. There is much weeping among the women, and an urgent message for assistance has been sent to the Rouxville commando. There was fighting at Lebawatskop to-day.

Mount Lebanon at Cape Town. Cape Town, April 13.—The British transport Mount Lebanon, which was disabled at sea by the British transport Bavarian, has arrived here to-day. The British steamer Express, which sailed for the Cape on Tuesday, is expected to-morrow.

Mafeking Not Proceed. Cape Town, April 13.—The admiral in charge of the British fleet in these waters has refused to permit the British transport Mafeking to proceed to Durban. The agents of the vessel announced that the cargo destined for Durban was to be landed at Durban.

The British gunboat Partridge on Dec. 8 captured the steamer Mashona, which had sailed from New York Nov. 3, via St. Vincent Nov. 16, for Algoa Bay, laden with flour for the Transvaal.

The vessel and the foodstuffs were subsequently released under bond, and the prize court, March 13, rendered a verdict that portions of the cargo were condemned, but that the steamer was formally released. The Mashona arrived Algoa Bay April 8 from Cape Town, and was to proceed to Durban and other ports.

Boers Have Been Checked. Wepener is Still Surrounded, But the Little Garrison is Yet Holding It.

London, April 13.—The War Office has received the following despatch from Gen. Roberts: Bloemfontein, April 13.—(1.30 p.m.)—"The Boers' movements south have been checked. Wepener is still surrounded, but the little garrison is holding out well. Troops are being moved to their assistance. The health of the troops is good, and the climate is perfect."

London, April 13.—The Bloemfontein correspondent of The Times, telegraphing Friday, says: "Everything is going satisfactorily. Owing to the Boers' enterprise, another necessity has arisen for a movement in the southern direction. The Boers have monopolized the railway for a short period, but the Boer raids are only what is anticipated as a result of the halt in our main advance."

"We in Bloemfontein are full of admiration for the calm front with headquarters has received these incidents. Half of the object of the Boers has failed since Lord Roberts has refused to be drawn into operations, but has insisted on the Boers' enterprise, making dispositions to checkmate it almost without Bloemfontein being aware that movements of troops have occurred."

Hay Denies It. Pretoria, Wednesday, April 11.—United States Consul Hay, in an interview had here, says that the report that Captain Reichman, the United States military attaché, participated in the fight near Bechnam, is absolutely false. Capt. Reichman, it is said, was occupied most of the time attending upon the wounded Dutch military attaché, Lieut. Nix, who has since died. Consul Hay has no doubt that Capt. Reichman has been confounded with the American, Lieut. Lombard of the Free State Artillery, who took a very active part in the fight.

Boers Need Food. London, April 14.—The Bloemfontein correspondent of The Morning Post, telegraphing Thursday, says: "The Boers have evidently determined to adopt entirely new tactics. Two columns are known to be moving to the south of Bloemfontein. They are relying on Cape carts for transport, and are carrying scarcely any forage, and only sufficient food to meet the immediate requirements of the convoy, with no transport following at a secure distance."

FIGHT OVER A BRIGHT CHILD

People on the Pier Witnessed a Scene When the Big Steamship Lahn Arrived.

FATHER GOT HOLD OF THE BOY. Woman in the Case Had a Lawyer With Her—Child Wants to Stay With Father.

New York, April 13.—When Master Conrad Benjamin Pecker, five years old, and his mother, arrived here in charge of the ship's company of the Lahn, from Bremen, yesterday, he was met by a man and a woman who fought each other for possession of him.

After a bitter contest at the pier, at the Hoboken Pier Station, on a ferryboat, and in the Supreme Court, in this city, Justice Fitzgerald committed the little fellow to the care of the German Society Monday, when he will determine the question of his custody.

The boy was claimed by Charles Conrad Pecker, who was eager to outfit him with a wife and get possession of him. The big steamer reached the pier at 1.30 o'clock in the afternoon, and the mother, Mrs. Pecker, accompanied by her lawyer, George Robinson, was waiting at the end of the pier. She had heard that Pecker had gone down the bay to get the boy, and she declared to the waiting crowd that there would be a "bloody fight" if her husband refused to give the boy to her.

The Police Captain Hayes and Detective Weinstadt and Quinn cautioned her to be quiet. Lawyer Robinson was armed with a writ of habeas corpus, issued by Justice Fitzgerald.

Mrs. Pecker admitted that the little fellow was not her own son, but asserted that she had adopted him from the Babes' Home in Milwaukee, Wis. three years ago. She had since married Pecker, who was a real estate agent in San Francisco, and had come here, separated from her husband, and he had taken the boy to relatives in Germany.

Pecker says he married the woman in San Francisco, in June, 1908, and that she had the boy then. He asserts she confessed to him that she had kidnapped the lad from wealthy parents. She left San Francisco, and he followed her to New York, where she was living with her parents. 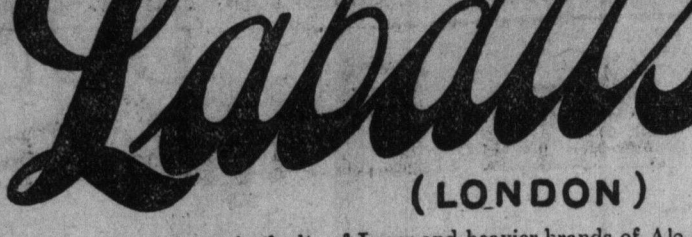

A WIFE'S YEAR OF SILENCE. Peculiar Marriage Customs in Eastern Countries—The Armenian Woman a Perfect Genie.

The conduct demanded of newly-married Armenian women is rather peculiar. It is not permitted to cry at the wedding, and a young Armenian woman, who is betrothed to a man, is not allowed to see him until the day of her marriage.

"John," I said to my neighbor, "what are you going to do, to make the world look better?"

"While among many old Armenian families parents contract for the marriage of their children while they are in their infancy, in the majority of cases the young people are permitted to make their own selections, always with the consent of their parents. Elopements, therefore, are unknown. The marriage is sacred in Armenia, and deep only can break it. If a person has an unreasonable complaint, he must endure it with the same kind of patience he would endure a sore throat, which he may try to cure, he will hardly cut it out."

"With Turkish women their only end in this world is marriage. Accordingly, girls are from their infancy, reared to sleep by their mothers with illusions of future husband, handsome, courageous and wealthy. The real age for marriage is from 12 to 15 years, but unusual wealth or physical attractions call for earlier marriages. Generally speaking, parents are pleased if they find a chance of betrothing their daughters at an early age, for at that age women must be married, and if not married, they are considered as dead. A girl is rarely married if she is either pretty or rich. If she is neither, she is married, and she is a great catch and will have many suitors. About her wealth there can be no doubt, as the estate of the first husband is known to everyone, and she is always very successful. But the puzzling question is about her good looks. It is pretty? That must be discovered, and, of course, as the young man has no means of seeing out for himself, he usually resorts to a Jewess, and if her report is favorable, he then brings the matter to her parents' attention, and his mother, after a call on the girl, brings her to her father's attention. These marriages are extremely fashionable, and the women dress elaborately. A meal of great parties and events is always served, after which comes the speaking of eulogies, and the water pipes—the young seated cross-legged on divans and gossiping the entire time. 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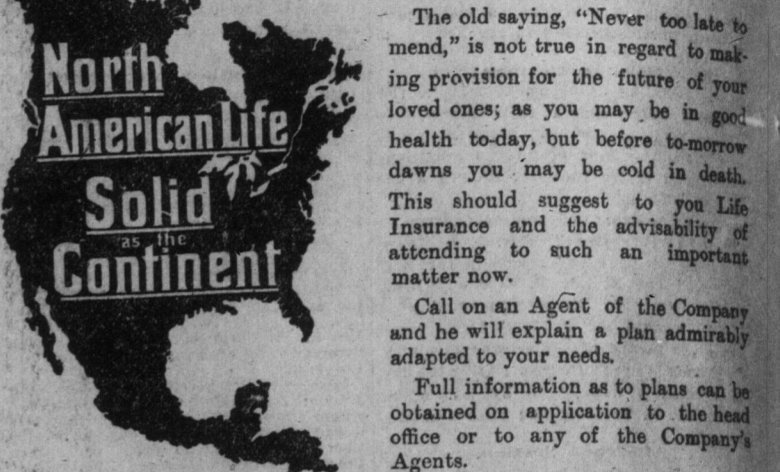

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GROSS ATLANTIC IN 4 DAYS

Hamilton Man Has a New Invention For Propelling Steamships at a Rapid Rate.

PISTON ACTION AGAINST WATER.

Screw Propeller Will be a Back Number if Mr. Baker's Ideas Are Sound.

Hamilton, April 13.—(World's Staff Correspondent.)—At 101 Wilson street, Hamilton, lives H. Baker, a marine engineer. It is an unpretentious house, but here has been thought out an idea in which mechanical men say there are millions.

Thirty years ago, during the Franco-Prussian war, Baker was an engineer on a British steamer that put in an exciting time running the blockade of the French coast, and the knowledge then gained of top-speed running has proved of inestimable value.

But there are other advantages besides. Mechanical experts say that the vibration so distressing to passengers, but so indispensable to the screw propeller, there will be no more breaking of screw blades with the attendant loss of fuel.

Other Advantages. Besides, the screw propeller has been pondering over ever since, and he declares he has now solved them. His scheme is to fit a boat with a propeller that will cover the distance from Montreal to Liverpool in four days, and that, too, at half the present expenditure of fuel.

What the Scheme Is. The Hamilton man's invention, in a few words, is a system of direct propelling action. The screw propeller is done away with entirely and the power is supplied by four water cylinders with direct acting pistons located at the stern of the vessel.

Comes Neerer Home. The invention comes neerer home than an Allan liner, Baker says that with his attachment to the Modjeska she would leave Hamilton at the same time as the C.P.R. and be up at the Toronto wharf only a few minutes before the train had pulled into the Union Station.

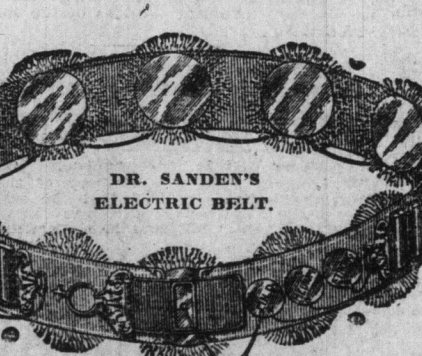
MINERS AND BOSSES SETTLED.
