The Great Underground Terminal Station --- Enormous

This lower portion forms pair of tunnels, which pass under the Hudon river from Jersey City. It is consix feet deep to the floor of the sub-station and has dimensions of approximately 210 x435 feet. This sub-structure, which is

with a lmost entirely of concrete, which is built almost entirely of concrete, was really designed and built as an independent base upon which the super-structures of the two buildings rest.

Some idea of the huge quantity of material employed in the construction of the Hudson tunnels is afforded by Walter Mueller in Cement Age. For instance the amount of Portland cement used, over 500,000 barrels, represents the annual individual output of numerous cement companies. All of this cement is being furnished by one concern. The writer states further that the excavation for the substructure of the terminal building involved the removal of 170,000 cubic yards of material. Of this, 50,000 cubic yards, consisting very largely of quicksand, were taken out under compressed air. 60,000 cubic yards of concrete, reinforced with 1,000 tons of twisted steel bars, were employed in the construction of the foundation walls, column footings, and floors. Comparing the material removed with the Singer building tower, 612 feet high, shows that were it piled up on the site of the tower, it would be double its height. The concrete employed would form a block of the same width and length of the tower and two-thirds its height. The reinforcing bars, if placed end to end, would form a line more than 150 miles in length, or greater than the distance between New York and Albany. In the foundation work alone more than 1,700 men were employed.




