REPORT OF THE SESSION.

The Session are pleased to be able to present a gratifying report for the past year. Our membership at the close of 1884 numbered 419, and during the past year 86 new members have been added to the roll, 46 by confession of faith and 40 by certificate. There have been removed from the roll during the year in all 54 members, 3 by death, 24 certified to other churches, and 27 who have left us but not yet applied for certificates. The net gain during the year is 32 members, so that the roll numbered at the end of the year 451. There is one fact in connection with our growth worthy of notice that the larger proportion of our increase has come through men and women, old and young, having been led to make public confession of their faith in Christ. The Session consider this fact an indication of a growth of spiritual life among us, and earnestly hope that this year's labors may be crowned with still more abundant success in the adding to the church daily of such as shall be saved.

At the close of the year the Session decided to increase their number by the addition of three new members, and they feel

greatly strengthened by the presence with them of the brethren who were the choice of the congregation. It is anticipated that with the present number it will be in the Sessions power to take more thorough oversight of the flock and to see that all the members are visited every quarter. The pastor has been able to pay over 300 visits during the past year including visits to the sick, and he hopes to accomplish more during the present year in that department of his work than has been possible in the past. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed eight times during the past year, and was attended on every occasion by a large proportion of the members. The frequent observance has been found not only beneficial in itself, but has proved a means of securing the attendance during the year of all the communicants on at least three or four occasions.

The Session would call the attention of the people to the attendance at the ordinary Sabbath evening service and at the prayer meeting. They do not forget that many of the members have good reasons to give for their absence at these services, but they are sure there is room for improvement. Many seem to forget that they have not only their own spiritual interests to consider, but that they form an integral part of the Church, and that their duty in this matter can only be rightly viewed by considering the effect of their absence upon the whole Church. They are bound to consider how their conduct will affect their families, their fellow-members, the thoughtless and irreligious, and the Pastor who has always to prepare himself for every service whether he is to preach to few or many. The Session desire to express their high appreciation of the service rendered to the Church by our choir. The fidelity of the members of the choir in attending the rehearsals on Friday evenings and at each diet of worship on the Lord's day makes it evident that their hearts are in their work, and that they are animated by the best and purest motives. As a congregation we are too apt to accept their voluntary service as though it were ours by right, and to withhold from them the praise they so justly deserve for the high degree of efficiency they have attained, and the faithfulness with which they have discharged their self-imposed duties. The Pastor feels especially thankful to the choir for their hearty sympathy with him in his work and for the help they have given him by rendering with such devotional feeling our psalms and hymns.

The

SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

It is with feelings of pleasure and gratitude that the Sabbath School Teachers' Association accepts the opportunity of reporting, for the eleventh time, upon the results attained in that important department of church work entrusted to its care. The harmony and unity of aim which has characterized all the meetings of the Association, together with the zeal and activity displayed by the individual teachers, could hardly have failed to make the year that has just closed one of the most prosperous and successful which the school has witnessed since its inception. The following comparative figures will assist to elucidate this statement, as far as material prosperity is concerned:—

The gratifying increase in the amount collected for the mission schemes is largely due to the introduction of the system of giving, at present practised in the church, whereby the scholars agree to contribute a small stated sum each week, according to their ability, so that a certain weekly revenue can always be depended upon. Besides the amount collected for missions, there have also been contributed towards the Library and Provincial Sabbath School Association the sums of \$16.78 and \$20 respectively, making a total collection during the year of \$227.94.

The Library, consisting of about 300 volumes, is not at all in keeping with the size and requirements of the school, and the teachers will probably put forth an effort within the next twelve months to have it almost entirely renewed. The books have, for the most part, been read and re-read by the scholars, and although some \$36 has been expended during the year in purchasing new volumes, the demand is so great that this amount has proved altogether inadequate to place it in desirable shape.

Three special collections have been taken up during the year from the congregation, amounting to \$63.42, for which the teachers are very thankful. They hope, however, that this somewhat uncertain method of providing funds for the maintenance of the school will shortly be superseded by the Managers appropriating annually a specified sum for the purpose.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE YOUNG MEN'S BIBLE CLASSES, 1885.

In presenting the Annual Report of the Young Men's Bible Classes, we have much pleasure in congratulating ourselves in the general interest and regular attendance of those members who appreciate the privilege of attending Bible class on Sabbath afternoons.

Since the beginning of the year the senior Bible Class has been conducted by Mr. Macdonald, a teacher whose zeal and faithfulness in the Master's work, we honor and admire, and which we trust bears its fruit amongst us. The attendance at the class has hardly been up to the mark of former years; there are at present 34 names on the roll, with an average attendance of 18 during the last quarter; of those, whose names appear on the roll, four have left or been called away from the city, and one is a teacher in the Mission school; still the attendance is far short of what it might be, and compares very unfavorably with the number of young men who own allegiance to the Church.

The junior class, conducted by Mr. Gzowski, has been carried on with most gratifying success both in the attendance and interest which every member takes in the class. There are at present 17 names on the roll, with an average attendance of 10 during the entire year, and 13 during last quarter, being very satisfactory results and showing the hearty manner in which the members respond to Mr. Gzowski's earnest labors among them.

During the year a general committee was formed from the classes for the purpose of carrying on the active work and devising methods for reducing the floating debt of the church, and in whose report will be found the success of the various schemes carried out for that purpose.

In conclusion would again remind the members of the senior class the necessity of regular attendance, and it is to be hoped during the coming year a marked improvement will take place in this respect, and thereby aid and encourage Mr. Macdonald in his noble and earnest endeavors to impart to us those divine and eternal truths, the benefits of which are unspeakable.

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE YOUNG LADIES' BIBLE CLASS OF CENTRAL CHURCH FOR 1885.

In looking back over the past year we feel that we have every reason to be thankful to our Heavenly Father for His care over us.

The number of names on our roll is 127. The average attendance for the first quarter was 103, for the second quarter 91, for the third quarter 75, and for the fourth quarter 98. The average for the year is 92. We would draw attention to the fact that although the number of names on the roll is not quite so large as last year, several members having left the city and some having classes of their own in the Mission and other schools, still our average for the year is larger than that of last

The members of the class have during the year devoted themselves more than ever to charitable work. They have contributed \$3.50 towards the building of a Presbyterian Church at Grenfell, N.W.T., \$5 to help in sending a sick and destitute girl to Liverpool; \$25.48 was also contributed through the mite boxes for foreign missions, and a large quantity of cast-off clothing has been sent to the Mercer Reformatory and other institutions. Three former members of the class are now teaching in mission schools, three in the Andrew Mercer reformatory, two in the school for Chinese, and four in other Sunday schools. Several members are engaged in visiting the General Hospital, Sick Childrens' Hospital and House of Industry.

Two members have offered themselves as missionaries to India, and several have professed their faith in Christ and united with the Church.

About twenty of the members are engaged in the good work of Tract distribution. We feel very grateful to Mrs. Harvie for the kind interest she has shown each member, and in the class she being absent from it only one Sunday throughout the year and that on account of illness.

In going forward into another year we feel that we have had great encouragement in the past, and we pray that God will continue to pour out His blessings upon us and upon our teacher, Mrs. Harvie, and that each one may feel it to be a privilege to attend the class that we may learn and help to spread the Gospel, and that it may be said of each one of us "She hath done what she could."

CLASSES.

THE FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WILLIAM STREET MISSION.

In presenting the Fifth Annual Report of the Mission the Teachers and Officers have great cause for thankfulness to God, for the measure of success which has attended our labours during this our fifth and last year in William Street, where we have had many pleasant and, we trust, profitable meetings; profitable not only to those who have taken part in conducting them, but also to those who have been attending from time to time. In all, there were about 275 meetings held during the year.

The Sunday School has had about the same number attending as in 1884, namely, number on roll 100; average attendance per Sunday 70; number of teachers, including officers, 16; average attendance, 14; total average attendance of teachers and scholars 84. In the early part of last year an Adult Bible Class was organized, composed of mothers and young women; those attending regularly have been greatly helped on the way by the study of God's Word. We believe many more would have attended if we had a separate room wherein to meet.

The Sunday evening Gospel Services have had about the same number attending as last year; the same may be said of the Prayer Meetings, Mothers' Meetings, and the Band of Hope. In all these meetings we have endeavoured faithfully to make known the Truth as it is in Jesus.

It will be remembered that we resolved to assume all the responsibility of carrying on the mission work for the year just closed. As will be seen by the Treasurer's Report, the Mission Sunday School contributed the \$56.68, and the Sunday evening collections amounted to \$39.94; total \$96.62, and we are thankful to be able to say that we have met all our obligations, and have a small balance to our credit. For this happy state of affairs we are greatly indebted to the many kind friends who so nobly came to our assistance, many of them unsolicited.

We wish specially to refer to the fact that since employing a missionary to labour in the district our Mission has prospered greatly. During the two years Mr. Goforth was with us he laboured faithfully; through his regular visitation from house to house and dealing personally with the people, he made the Mission a household word, and induced many to come out to the Gospel services and prayer meetings. We have also to

bear testimony to the faithful services of Mr. Tolmie, who took up the same work for the summer six months.

We, who are engaged in the Mission Work, cannot give the time to visiting which we know is absolutely necessary to give to it in order to get people to come out to our meetings, and knowing well that it cannot be accomplished without constant and persevering visitation, we would submit that in entering upon our work in Elizabeth Street, the field assigned to us by the Presbyterian Ministerial Association of the city, we feel that the success of the Mission will very much depend upon our being able to secure the services of a missionary for the summer six months at least. We earnestly express the hope that the way may be opened up for the accomplishment of this very important matter.

In concluding our report, we call attention to the fact that, through the generosity of a warm friend of the Mission, the teachers were privileged to select a suitable book for each one of their scholars as a farewell token. These books were presented at our Farewell Meeting at William Street, on Monday evening, the 28th December, and were highly prized by the children. We mention this in the hope that some other friend may have it put into his heart to make a similar gift this year.

The Ladies' Aid Society have much pleasure in presenting their Fifth Annual Report.

There have been twenty sewing meetings during the year, most of which have been well attended. Some of the members who could not spare the time to sew with us, have asked for work to take home and make. This has been thankfully given, as there is always a supply on hand, and clothing is often wanted before we can get it made up.

During the year the plan of charging a nominal price for new clothing instead of giving it away has been tried, and so far has proved satisfactory. By this plan many who would not like to have clothing given them, have a chance of buying at a low rate clothing which they would otherwise have to do without. The children, too, are induced to save up their coppers and buy clothing for themselves. A trunk of new clothing was sent to the William Street Mission a few months ago, each garment being marked with a price, from four cents upwards. In a very short time they were all disposed of, and there was a request for more. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE C. C. AUXILIARY OF THE W. F. M. S. FOR 1885.

At the close of this, the fourth year of our society's work, it is pleasing to notice that the interest in Foreign Misssions did not die out when it ceased to be a novelty, but steadily increased. And if the increase has been small as compared with what we hoped, we may yet thank God for the past and go forward with new courage to the future. "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us; He will bless us."

The auxiliary numbers in all 68 members. Of these 4 are life members and 44 have paid the fee of \$1 and are therefore members of the general society. This is a gain of 20 over last year when we had only 24 ladies who were members of the general society.

There have been 11 meetings held during the year, the average attendance at which has been 17.

The amount subscribed during 1885 has been \$150.26. While we heartily wish the sum were larger, we-would call attention to the fact that all of this has been contributed by the ladies themselves. No means have been taken to raise money in any outside way by lectures or otherwise, and we have had no special collections, so that it has been the free-will offering of those interested in missions.

During the year Mrs. McEwen, one of our most earnest and active members, and who was also a life member of the society, has moved away from Toronto and so has been obliged to leave us. While we are sure that the cause of missions will prosper by her presence in her new sphere of labor we miss her help and ready practical experience. The society also regrets that our faithful and energetic secretary, Miss Gordon, who has been with us from the beginning of our work, was obliged to resign her position towards the end of the year. We feel that we have owed much to her faithfulness and regularity in the discharge of her duties.

While our interest in the missionary cause everywhere has grown as month by month our knowledge of the different fields has increased. This year special interest has been awakened in our own Indians of the North-West. Since the rebellion broke out last spring the church has seen as it never did before that the well-being, the christianizing of the Indians was a matter of vital importance, not only to a handful of faithful and enthusiastte missionaries, but to ourselves. And now the Board calls upon all auxiliaries to increase their gifts so that the sum of \$13,000, which is needed for the growing requirements of the work, may be raised. Let every member of our society while doing her own part faithfully and earnestly strive to interest at least our friend and our share of this large increase will speedily be raised.

Spurgeon says, "Nothing so enlarges and expands the human soul as an active interest in foreign missions." So, at the beginning of the new year, we extend a hearty invitation to all young ladies in the congregation to come and join our Band.

Our earnest prayer for the year is, that, "in His own good way and time, the Master may awaken fresh interest and zeal in our hearts to continue the work which is being carried on in his name.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY COM-MITTEE, CENTRAL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, FOR 1885.

Your Committee desire to report having received in contributions, per the collectors in the several districts, the sum of \$986.35, in which is included several checks handed to the Treasurer, and the amount of \$37.50 made up by a few friends for the Aged and Infirm Minister's Fund, as a special contribution. The amounts contributed vary from 50c, to \$100 per annum. The total amount is greater than was received last year, and mostly from a few contributors.

While we are encouraged at the increase over former years, we are sure that a further increase may confidently be expected, as so many of our friends, as yet, are not on our books as regular contributors.

The number is just about one hundred and thirty-five.

It is to be regretted that so many members give nothing to missions, notwithstanding the urgent needs and the pressing claims of those who are appealing to us for help, both at home and abroad. When we consider the great increase to our membership, and the measure of prosperity bestowed on us as a church, we are led to look for a deeper and more prayerful interest in this very important matter.

The Committee beg to suggest, in accordance with the terms of the circular addressed to our Session by the Toronto Presbytery, the annexed allocation of the money.

The Managers beg to submit the following as their Report for the year.

At the close of the year ending the 31st December, 1884, there were 164 contributors by envelope, and at the close of last year there were 171 contributors by envelope.

The average weekly collections by envelope and loose contributions for the years 1884 and 1885 were as follows:—

At the close of the year 1884 the floating debt of the congregation was \$2,150. At the close of 1885 this debt was \$986.75, the amount having been reduced by \$1,163.25, by special contributions to the Fund known as "The Floating Debt Fund."
