



CITY GOVERNMENT

A new experiment in city government is to be tried by the people of Winnipeg. A Board of Control will prepare all estimates of proposed expenditure in all the departments, and make all contracts. The Board will submit monthly reports to the council. All city officers will be under its control. The subject of city deep regrets. under its control. Five of these, four members of the Board of Control and the mayor, will be elected from the city at large and the remaining founteen will be elected by the various wards, each of which will have two aldermen. Of this elective body of nineteen members the Board of Control will practically be the Executive Committee. It will be timeduty of the Board of Control to prepare all estimates of proposed expenditure and those cannot be added to or chauged in any way except by a majority vote of the whole council. To vary the action of the board would therefore require the votes of ten members of the council. In the case of payment of debentures or other debts lawfully contracted the Board has ho discretionary powers.

A common source of friction in the city council and delay in proceeding with model quality works has been in the making of contracts and the awarding of the tenders. The board will be entrusted with this duty in place of the various committees; it will prepare specifications for and award all contracts for material, labor or property that may from time to time be required by the city. No reversion or varying of its decision can be effected except by a majority vote of the council. The board is required to report monthly or oftener upon all municipal works.




