FIRST DAY.

THURSDAY, Sept. 1st, 1898,

THE FIFTH GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH met in the Metropolitan Church Toronto, Ont., on Thursday the 1st day of September, 1898, at ten o'clock, a.m., pursuant to the decision of the General Conference Special Committee. Rev. A. Carman, D.D., General Superintendent, in the chair.

The President gave out hymn, 388; the Secretary, Rev. Opening W. I. Shaw D.D., LL.D., read part of the 6th chapter of Deuteronomy, after which Rev. T. Griffith, Ph.D., and the Hon. J. J. Rogerson, led in prayer. Hymn 192 was then sung, part of the 12th chapter of Romans was read, and prayer offered by Mr. T. Nixon and Rev. W. H. Heartz, D.D.

Rev. W. I. Shaw, D.D., LL.D., Secretary of the last General Conference, laid upon the table the certified lists of the ministers and lavmen elected by the Annual Conferences as members of the General Conference.

On motion the roll of each Conference was then called in Roll Call the following order:-Toronto, Hamilton, London, Bay of Quinte, Montreal, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland, Manitoba and North-West, British Columbia, and Japan, and one hundred and twentyone ministers and eighty-two laymen answered to their names. In subsequent enrolment made by order of Conference seventytwo additional names were reported, making the total attendance two hundred and seventy-five.

Clarke, Mr. W. H. Monkman, the first reserve, being unable to attend; Rev. J. Hall, for Rev. E. Robson, of the British Columbia Conference.

Moved by J. Mills, LL.D., and W. McGibbon: That the Chair nominate a Special Committee to consider the question of the General Conference Fund and report to this Conference, with a view to the payment of the expenses of the present meeting, the liquidation of the debt, and the making of provision by allotment or otherwise for the travelling expenses, board and lodging of delegates at the next meeting of the General Conference.

At this stage an adjournment was moved.

On motion of Rev. N. Burwash, S.T.D., Conference adjourned to meet at 2.30 p.m., and the several Conference delegations were ordered to meet at 2 p.m. and elect their representatives to the Nominating Committee.

The Presidents of the various Annual Conferences appointed places of meeting for their delegations.

Conference adjourned at 12.10 p.m., the benediction being pronounced by the President.

and remove from the roll of membership the names of all who violate any of the commands or prohibitions contained in said foot-note, as well as those of the regular disciplinary rules of the Church.—Lost.

Messrs. W. T. R. Preston and J. J. Maclaren, Q.C., LL.D., moved,—That this Conference has learned with regret that the increase in members is smaller than during any preceding quadrennium since the last union, and that there is a small decrease in the number of class-leaders. It is believed that this should give occasion to earnest heart-searching and humiliation before God. It is strongly recommended that earnest efforts be put forth to make our class-meetings more and more attractive and spiritually helpful, and that more importance should be attached to the holding of leaders' meetings, to the preparation and diffusion of useful literature on the subject, and to the holding of class-leaders' conventions or institutes in connection with our Conferences and District meetings and at leading centres.

Rev. G. Jackson moved that this motion be laid on the table till the report of the Committee on State of the Work is received.—Lost.

Motion was adopted.

To the Hon. the Minister of Militia, Ottawa:

Be it Resolved,—That the General Conference has learned with regret that intoxicating liquors are sold at the canteens in connection with the annual militia camps.

We view with alarm the seductive temptations to which the young men belonging to the volunteer forces are exposed. Parents who have encouraged their boys to join the militia have been grieved to find that the camps have been demoralizing in their influence in this regard. We express the profound conviction that our young men should not be exposed to such peril in the patriotic service of their country, and hereby respectfully request the Government to adopt an Order in Council entirely prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors at the canteens connected with the militia camps.—Carried.

Permits for Sale of Liquor in Yukon Territory Re Permits, Yukon Territory.

The Hon. the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa:

Be it Resolved,—That this General Conference learns with regret that the permit system has been adopted and put into force in the Yukon territory, whereby intoxicating liquors freely find their way into the mining districts, thereby exposing the morals, health and lives of those who have flocked into that territory, and largely adding to the natural dangers of the inhospitable climate. III.-MISSIONS

1. QUADRENNIAL REPORT OF THE GENERAL BOARD OF MISSIONS.

With devout ascriptions of praise to the Head of the Church, whose guiding hand has been clearly seen in days both dark and bright, the General Board of Missions presents this Quadrennial Report.

FINANCIAL.

When the last General Conference was in session, the country was passing through a period of commercial depression that affected every branch of industry, and made itself felt in all departments of Church finance. In 1894-5 the givings of the Methodist people to Missions, including receipts from legacies, declined nearly \$18,000. Providentially the receipts from miscellaneous sources that year were unusually large, and the gross income was \$3,000. in advance of the preceding year. In 1895 6 there was a further decline in ordinary givings of some \$2,500, and in sundries of over \$9,500; but a marked increase in legacies and miscellaneous items gave a net increase of over \$5,000. In the third year of the quadrennial period the society reached low-water mark in the matter of contributions, the regular income showing a decline of over \$3,000, legacies of \$10,684, and sundries of \$10,127. was partly compensated by more than \$5,000 from Epworth Leagues and an increase of over \$6,000 from other sources; still leaving, however, a net decrease of \$12,757, and a deficit, as compared with expenditure, of \$8,841. For the year just closed we are glad to be able to report a growing income, though still far below the needs of the work. The income from regular sources shows a gain, as compared with 1896-7, of \$12,580, the Epworth Leagues alone having advanced from \$5,056 to \$9,497; the legacy account amounts to \$9,653; which is \$4,807 less than last year; sundries, \$1,680, or \$261 more than

in 1896-7; miscellaneous income is \$33,650, being an increase of \$5,035. Total income \$243,051; a gain of \$13,069 over the previous All this indicates that the period of depression is passing away, and that with returning prosperity we may anticipate steadily increasing contributions for religious and benevolent work.

WEST CHINA.

Since the last quadrennial report was presented, our mission in West China experienced a severe check, owing to popular outbreaks, encouraged, there is reason to believe, by Chinese officials, resulting in the destruction

of our mission buildings in the cities of Chentu and Kiating.

The missionaries were compelled to fly from the Province, and for nearly a year the work could not be resumed. By the persevering efforts of Rev. Dr. Hart and others, through the British and American Ambassadors, a settlement was obtained from the Chinese Government; the offending officials were punished, an indemnity for property destroyed was paid, and our missionaries were enabled to return and resume their work under more favorable auspices than before. Better and more commodious buildings have been erected both in Chentu and Kiating; good congregations assemble to hear the preaching of the Word; souls have been converted; a printing press has been set up, and information concerning Christianity is being scattered broadcast; two hospitals are in successful operation-one in Chentu and one in Kiating-bringing medical help to thousands of suffering ones, and opening the way for the Gospel among those who had not hitherto so much as heard of Christ. On the whole the prospects of our work in West China are highly encouraging, and should stimulate the Church to increased prayer and liberality in sustaining it.

JAPAN.

In Japan the progress has not been all that we could desire. Each year there has been some gain in the membership, but opposing forces seem to dispute every inch of ground, and it is only by patient and persistent labor that any advance is made at all. This state of affairs is not peculiar to our own mission, but is common to all the societies laboring in Japan. The causes are various. The reaction against foreign influence, an intense national spirit, the rapid spread of erroneous doctrines whereby some entire missions have been well-nigh paralyzed, the efforts of Buddhism to regain its ancient prestige, the ready acceptance of materialistic science and agnostic philosophy by the student class, the war spirit resulting from the conflict with China, and last but not least, the opposition of the carnal mind to the pure Gospel of Jesus Christ, have all played their part in retarding the progress of the Kingdom of God. But even now there are signs of a brighter day. Native Christians who know the native mind and are competent to speak, are of the opinion that there will be a change for the better in the near future, when the Gospel will spread more swiftly and find more ready acceptance. One thing is certain, the time has not come, nor is it likely to come for years, when the foreign missionary can be withdrawn and the evangelization of Japan be left to the native church. If this view is correct the state of our own

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mission demands serious attention. During the past quadrennium the ranks of the foreign workers have been seriously depleted. Many vacancies have occurred, but they have not been filled owing to the great pressure upon the funds of the Society. This condition of affairs should not be allowed to continue. We should either reinforce the mission at least to the measure of its former strength, or else abandon it altogether. To trifle with interests so vast and momentous is not only unwise, it is

THE INDIAN WORK.

The Indian work has a claim upon the earnest attention alike of the General Conference and the Board. That this department of our work has been in many respects successful, scarcely needs to be affirmed. Whole tribes have been reclaimed from barbarism, and many thousands have been truly converted; but it is questionable if a strong, self-supporting, self-propagating Church can ever be built up among them. Languages and dialects are so various, and the force of immemorial customs so strong, that there seems to be no hope of associating them in large numbers in one locality, or inducing them to pursue any united or continuous line of action. A work so widely scattered, having missions in every Conference from Montreal to British Columbia, and subject to the action of as many Stationing Committees, cannot be administered with anything like uniformity, and in some instances it presents problems which Annual Conferences find themselves unable to solve. This is true especially of British Columbia and the North-West, and in both these Conferences there is a prevailing opinion that the Indian Missions should be grouped by themselves and administered directly from the Mission From some points of view this might seem to be desirable, but it cannot be denied that there are serious practical difficulties in the way, and even if these could be overcome it is not certain that the results would be in all respects advantageous. Nevertheless the question is one which deserves the careful attention of the General Conference.

One of the hopeful features of the Indian work is presented by the Industrial Institutes. With the exception of the one at Muncey, Ont., the history of these Schools is too brief to enable us to guage full results, but enough is known to show that along this line, if anywhere, lies the solution of the Indian problem. During the quadrennium the Industrial work under the control of the Board has been extended. A commodious new building at Muncey supplies much needed facilities, and we have there what is in many respects a model institution. The management of the Institute at Brandon has been assumed by the society on a per capita basis, and there are now one hundred pupils in residence. At Red Deer a second building has been erected, doubling the capacity of the Institute. The Morley School shows signs of growth, and an enlargement of the building has become necessary. The Institute at Chilliwack is full to overflowing, and is doing good work. Provision has been made for an Indian Boarding School at Norway House, and the erection of the necessary buildings will at once be undertaken. With these varied appliances the work of training Indian youth for the duties of citizenship

will proceed under more favorable auspices.

MEDICAL MISSIONARIES.

The employment of Medical Missionaries in the Indian and foreign fields is a comparatively new feature in the mission work of the Methodist Church, but promises to be an important factor in the work of the future. The time has come when general regulations should be adopted respecting the status of medical missionaries, their relation to District Meetings, Mission Councils and Annual Conferences, their ordination under special circumstances, and the disposition to be made of the fees which they may receive in the course of their practice. This may be done by incorporating an additional Section in the Discipline at the present Conference, or by authorizing the Board of Missions to adopt such regulations as may be deemed expedient.

THE HOME WORK.

The Home work has been steadily prosecuted, and notwithstanding the discouragements arising from straitened incomes, the missionaries have conducted their work with zeal and fidelity worthy of all praise. In former Conferences reference has more than once been made to the embarrassment caused by the increase of missions and the multiplication of men beyond the real needs of the work. This unwise policy has not been entirely abandoned, though some few steps have been taken in that direction; but as the matter will probably come before the Conference in a memorial from the Executive Committee, it is unnecessary to refer to it further in this report.

KLONDIKE.

Perhaps the most important step in connection with the Home Work, that has taken place during the quadrennium, is the establishment of a Mission in the Klondike gold fields. The necessity for such an undertaking was too apparent to admit of question, but the pressure upon the Society's resources made it equally apparent that funds to inaugurate the Mission must be sought outside of current income. An appeal was made, therefore, for special contributions, and although the response has not been equal to our expectations, yet enough has been realized to tide over the greater part of the first year's expenditure. Not a few persons, led away by exaggerated report of the enormous richness of the gold fields, were sanguine that a large part of the cost of the Mission could be raised on the spot. Latest advices do not confirm this expectation. Letters recently to hand from our pioneer missionary, the Rev. James Turner, show that by far the greater part of what is necessary for the erection of buildings and the support of the missionaries must come from outside Not only has the richness of the gold fields been greatly exaggerated, but large numbers of persons who went in with the early rush find it difficult to earn their daily bread, while many more will have to be Not a few of those who throng the gold fields are Methofed or starve. dists from the older Provinces, and their circumstances and surroundings constitute a strong appeal for such help as we may be able to give. the opinion of the Board that the special fund for the Klondike should be continued for another year, and that an earnest appeal should be made to the Church to sustain it.

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THE FORWARD MOVEMENT.

The Young People's Forward Movement for Missions may be regarded, from a missionary point of view, as one of the important events of the The remarkable growth of the Epworth Leagues made plain the existence of a vast aggressive force, which, if wisely directed, might become an important factor in the evangelistic work of the Church. The effort among the students in our Colleges to turn the zeal and enthusiasm of the young people into the mission work of the Church, came into play at a most opportune time. Among many of the Leagues a disposition to engage in some independent form of mission work was beginning to show itself, but this tendency was not due to lack of connexional loyalty, but only to lack of information. The campaign inaugurated by the students has resulted most beneficially. The young people of the Church are becoming deeply interested in mission work, and have shown the utmost readiness to be guided by the Board and its officers as soon as the necessary information was placed before them. The first practical outcome of the movement was an addition of over \$5,000 to the Society's income in 1896-7 from entirely new sources, and of \$9,497 for the year just closed. The Board commends this movement to the kind sympathy and wise guidance of pastors and people.

2. REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS FOR MANITOBA, THE NORTH-WEST AND BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The close of another quadrennium furnishes a fitting opportunity to record our gratitude to Almighty God for His continued blessing upon the Methodism of Manitoba, the North-West Territories and British Columbia.

The experiences of previous years have, in their principal features, been repeated.

We have been blessed with what we may venture to call uninterrupted,

though varying degrees of prosperity.

Your Superintendent of Missions has travelled more extensively than ever before, having covered nearly 90,000 miles (since rendering his report to the last General Conference) in studying the varied conditions of the work and affording help in every way possible as occasion has occurred and opportunity, time, and strength have permitted.

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A sense of inability to over-take the work has been ever present. The field stretches over nearly two-thirds of the distance across the ontinent.

It is impossible for any one man to give that particular and thorough supervision which is so desirable, if indeed not absolutely necessary, in a work so vast, so new, so rapidly developing and so important in character.

The results which, in part, I have endeavored to tabulate are, under God, in no small degree, owing to the lives and labors of our devoted missionaries and their no less devoted wives.

An intelligent and loyal laity, in sympathetic and active co-operation with the ministry have done their full share in building up our Church in the west.

In the Manitoba and North-West Conference, our membership now numbers 17,692, their having been an increase of 2,486. The growth of our Church numerically, as indicated in a general way, by the increase in membership, is scarcely what might naturally be expected in a new country. It must be borne in mind, however, that the immigration of the last few years, has added but little to our strength; a large percentage of the strangers having come from Central Europe, and belonging, most of them, to either the Greek or Lutheran church.

The Sunday School continues to occupy a prominent place in our Church operation. In 1894 we reported 216 schools and 12,538 scholars. We are pleased to be able now to report 256 schools and 16,489 scholars; being an increase of 18 per cent. in the number of schools and 31 per cent. in the number of schools and 31 per cent.

Very satisfactory progress has been made in church building. In 1894 we reported 141 churches, valued at \$345,874. We now report 181 churches, valued at \$413,249. The debt on church property in 1894 was \$133,199. On the present property it is \$125,390. Though forty churches have been built during the quadrennium and the value of the whole increased by upwards of \$67,000, the debt on the whole is less than it was on the smaller investment four years ago. In some respects the showing of parsonage property is better than that of the churches.

There were in 1894 seventy-three parsonages, valued at \$84.300. There are now ninety-three, valued at \$117,280. The debt four years ago was \$26,965. Now it is only \$16,800.

It will be noted that though our parsonage property is valued at \$32,980 more than it was in 1894, the debt is \$10,165 less; or, in other words, the debt which amounted to nearly 32 per cent. in 1894 has been reduced to 14 per cent. of the value of the property.

We are pleased to report a large increase in the number of self-sustaining circuits. Four years ago we reported sixty-six, this year we report ninety, an increase of twenty-four, or 36 per cent.

The full measure of advance along this line will scarcely be appreciated without further explanation.

For many years it has been necessary to call into our work a large number of untrained young men. It was feared that when these graduated into the married ranks, the cost of maintenance to the Missionary Society would be very great. These fears have not to any extent been realized.

generosity of the Methodist people of Manitoba and the North-West Territories.

After ordination, the majority of these young men have been provided for by fields that have become self-supporting; and in return these fields have the advantage of the service of a better trained and, in every way,

more capable ministry.

In 1894 there were forty-four married ministers on self-sustaining circuits, now there are sixty-six, an increase of twenty-two. Of the thirty additional married men in the Conference twenty-two have been provided for without expense to the Missionary Society.

You will be interested in the following suggestive table of statistics:

The change in the constitution of the Superannuated Ministers' Fund renders it difficult to present a comparative statement; suffice it to say that the total assessable funds this year is \$88,635, as compared with \$71,198 in 1894. Increase, \$17,435, or 24 per cent.

For years the ardent friends of the North-West have confidently maintained that no more promising field exists for the profitable invest-

ment of missionary money than the Canadian North-West.

These sanguine predictions have been amply justified, as is evidenced by the speedy and large returns which have followed a too meagre expenditure.

My last quadrennial report showed that the net cost to the Missionary Society, of maintaining our Domestic Missions is gradually and rapidly

decreasing.

During the four years ending 1890, the annual cost was \$7,835; that is after deducting the amount raised for missions from the appropriations for Domestic work.

During the four years following the cost was \$6,427. During the quadrennium just closing, Missionary grants to Domestic missions of this Conference, including removal expenses, grants for affliction and supply, etc., aggregated \$60,313. There was raised in the Conference for Missions, \$44,535 (exclusive of amounts contributed in connection with the Indian work). Deduct the latter amount from the former, and you see that the annual charge of the Domestic Missions upon the society has been \$3,944. Our General Conference Fund assessment has, of course, been paid in full as usual.

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The conditions of our work in British Columbia are different from those that generally obtain east of the mountains. The most marked progress has been made in what is known as "The Upper Country," covered by the Kamloops and Kootenay districts.

We have now a chain of Missions across the mountains.

The far-famed Kootenay country is undoubtedly rich in minerals.

The Boom stage has passed.

Although the inevitable re-action has taken place, much that is real, solid and promising remains. Such centres as Rossland and Nelson give promise of continued growth; while smaller towns, such as Trail, Kaslo, Sandon, and others retain considerable vitality and may yet grow to be centres of great importance. There is, however, much of the element of uncertainty in every mining country, which suggests the wisdom of practising the greatest caution in the multiplication of missions, the erection of expensive buildings, or otherwise committing the Church to an expenditure that may involve future embarrassment. At the same time, economical considerations ought not to eclipse the obligations of the Church to preach and live the Gospel among the miners.

Such is legitimate missionary ground. Without the presence of missionaries and churches, life in the mining camp would be intolerable,

except to the very worst classes of society.

No careful observer can visit such camps, and make comparisons from time to time, without being profoundly impressed with the wonderful

results of the leavening power of Divine Truth.

Our missionaries and their families who labor in such spheres are deserving of honorable recognition, and a much better financial support than the funds of the Society have heretofore been able to afford them. Their work is arduous; their difficulties many and peculiar; yet their successes are neither few nor small. These triumphs cannot be measured by ordinary standards. Many of the people to whom they minister are present to-day and away to-morrow. In such work tables of statistics give a very partial and imperfect exhibit of work done and successes achieved.

Our Mission to the Klondike having been managed by the Executive of the General Board, will undoubtedly be reported on by the General Secretary.

The outlook for the great Canadian West was never so promising as it is at the present time. Its extent and resources are becoming better known and more highly appreciated as the years go by. Confidence in

its future is rapidly growing.

Business over its great highways of commerce is rapidly increasing. A second railway across the mountains is in course of construction. In a few years a third will be necessary—one to the north, which will traverse a country including rich valleys in northern British Columbia; wind among mountains and along river banks, rich in silver and gold; pass through great forests of valuable timber; over hundreds of square miles underlaid with coal; and through the immense valley of the Great Saskatchewan—through a country capable of furnishing a local traffic almost all the way (a distance of nearly two thousand miles) from the Pacific Coast to the city of Winnipeg.

Trade with the Orient and other parts of the world, together with the development of the rich and varied resources of British Columbia; her mines, her forests, her fisheries and her agriculture will make Vancouver the San Francisco of the Canadian Pacific, as the vast plains east of the

mountains will build Winnipeg into a second Chicago.

We confidently expect a development west of the Great Lakes such as the most optimistic prophets of other days never ventured to foretell. What part shall Methodism play in this development? And what will be her status in the day of Western Canada's greatness? Just what we are prepared to make it by our action in these years of early opportunity.

The possibilities of influencing for good the coming millions, and helping to lay the foundation of empire in righteousness, appeals alike to the ambitions of our citizenship and to the holy instincts and principles of our

Christianity.

Can we, as a Church, afford at the present stage, with our work but barely begun, to suppress our enthusiasm, relax our efforts, or narrow our policy? No, emphatically No! The successes of the past, the favorable conditions of the present, and the rich promise of the future, should constitute reason sufficient for the adoption of a broader and more vigorous policy, and should be an inspiration to "expect great things from God," while we "attempt great things for God" in the North-Western section of our glorious Canadian heritage.

3. REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE METHODIST CHURCH.—1893-1897.

Looking back mentally is sure to awaken varied, if not conflicting, emotions. The history of four years is marked not only by hopes realized, but by hopes disappointed—plans successfully carried out, and plans frustrated—enlargement in some quarters, curtailment in others—new friends added, others, valued and endeared, promoted to the Home Land

-bright joyous seasons, and some exceedingly painful.

As individuals and as a society, as missionaries in the field, and as workers at home, we have had all these experiences, but, co-extensive with them, and far exceeding, have been the limitless mercy of our God, His abounding compassion and unchanging love. Through the dark as well as through the light, He has watched over and cared for us, and with gratitude to Him we would present the numerical standing of the society, and the record of some of the work done in His name.

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and as tensive r God, dark as is, and of the We have 680 Auxiliaries, increase 143, with a membership of 15,071, increase 1,940. Mission Band membership, 6,476, b-ing a decrease of 164, whereas in the previous quadrennium there was an increase of 3,089. Amount raised during the four years, \$158,068.47. Literature and Publication Department—Average circulation of Monthly Letter, 13,000. Issue of miscellaneous leaflets during four years, 147,250.

JAPAN.

From various causes there has not been as rapid extension in some of our stations as we anticipated or desired, and the hearts of our faithful missionaries have been tried and sorely depressed through seeing depleted numbers and diminished opportunities of reaching the people.

This, however, is only to a limited extent. At some points there has been marked advance, and in all our stations the Divine blessing has been graciously manifested in the salvation of souls, and in the enrichment of Christian character.

We still occupy the same four cities—Tokyo, Shizuoka, Kofu and Kanazawa—and within the last few months, not covered by this report, we have entered Nagano.

Among our various lines of work none has proved more valuable than the boarding-school, both in the direct leading of individuals to Christ, and in the development of sterling Christian character through instruction and encouragement to individual effort. Our girls are taught how to work, so that on leaving they can be true "helpers" wherever they may go. Many of them are doing noble deeds and witnessing faithfully for their Lord and Master.

One, after graduating, returned to her village, in which she was the only Christian, and, with the permission of her father, gathered some children into her own home week by week and taught them of Christ and salvation. This she has continued at her own expense, and this little Sabbath School may yet be the nucleus of a church in that neighborhood.

Those supported by the society enter into an agreement to give, after graduation, two years of service in some capacity as a return for the tuition and training of perhaps seven years.

Many are thus saving the society an outlay for teachers, interpreters or matrons, and are more satisfactory than could be otherwise secured.

About thirty have graduated from our three schools during the quadrennium. Some twenty-nine pupils have received baptism, and over eighty women, largely instructed by the Bible women and our missionaries who have faithfully visited and held numerous meetings with them.

Great emphasis is laid on the daily Bible lesson which our students are required to attend. This frequent, systematic instruction is most valuable, and with the Normal class, formed of the helpers who teach in the Sunday Schools, gives a training not always available even in our own land.

Some of these girls constitute the most efficient teachers in the Church Sunday Schools, while the numerous little groups gathered and taught by others form additional centres of light and blessing which help largely in promoting a reverence for the Sabbath.

Some of our day schools in Kanazawa are among people in such poor circumstances that the children have to spend much of the time in industrial pursuits, but an opportunity is gained, through providing work, to implant truth, and they are secured for Sabbath instruction. Some of the little ones have to handle 10,000 matches to earn half a sen.

Among the obligations taught and practised is that of proportionate and systematic beneficence. In Tokyo the pupils have for years maintained a school for fifty poor children, and in addition their contributions extend to our work in China.

A new Home and School building in Shizuoka, at a cost of \$3,500, has added greatly to comfort and efficiency in the work.

An addition has also been made to the building in Kofu, rendered necessary by increased numbers.

Our work extends to five districts in the city of Tokyo, six towns in the vicinity of Shizuoka, some at two hours' distance, and twelve around Kofu.

The detailed reports from the field, and the letters from our faithful, earnest missionaries can alone give an adequate idea of what is being done, and it may truly be said, "The half was not told me," for there has not been a word yet of teaching in the Boys' Schools in Kofu and Kanazawa, of Bible Classes for young men, for soldiers and policemen, besides many other claims, and the study of the language, which all indicate fully occupied time.

According to their best judgment and with a success which cannot be denied, our missionaries have been carrying on their educational and other work in a way and with a purpose to advance Christian life, and so build up the Church.

Working in co-operation with the pastor they have striven to help in prayer-meetings, in Sabbath Schools, in visiting the poor and sick, in training and furnishing workers and in contributing liberally of their means, doing their utmost to advance the cause of God and Methodism.

CHINA.

At the last General Conference there was but little to report from China, except the presence of two representatives. Four others have since gone to that land, one of whom, two years from the date of her arrival in Chentu, was called to rest from her labors. Miss Jennie Ford is the first of our Missionary Band who sleeps in a foreign clime awaiting the resurrection morning. She was well adapted and equipped for the work, and her removal caused deep sorrow, but we must believe that the Lord knows best when to call His own.

Our Mission passed through an extremely trying ordeal in the riot of May 28th and 29th, 1895, but none showed more bravery than our own Miss Brackbill and Miss Ford. Leaving all behind, they were obliged to flee and remain in hiding for hours. After a few days, with the rest of the missionaries they were sent down to Shanghai.

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riot of ur own liged to rest of Returning to Chentu the following April (1896), as soon as possible a small day school for girls was opened, about twenty attending.

Property was purchased, possession being given in September, 1896, and with the advantage not formerly permitted, viz., to own rather than merely to lease.

Some native buildings on the premises were altered and fitted up for hospital and dispensary purposes, and then began the erection of a brick wall twelve feet high and nearly five hundred feet in length—school rooms—a home for our missionaries, and dormitories. Thirty day pupils and four little boarders, whose feet have been unbound, are the number reported last year.

Medical work has been carried on to some extent, many availing themselves of the relief furnished through the dispensary and some being treated in their own homes.

As far as possible opportunities have been used to tell of our God and Saviour, tracts have been distributed and meetings held with an attendance of thirty to fifty women and children. One woman, who has been connected from the first with the mission, has been baptized.

A form of work has been opened which could hardly be declined, viz., the care of poor little outcasts, and the establishment of an Orphanage has been authorized, to be called "The Jennie Ford Home." Two little waifs have already been happily rescued.

Coming to our own country, the first point we reach on landing is the Rescue Home for Chinese girls in Victoria, B.C. The work indicated by the name is not as extensive as formerly, but it is not a small matter that since its foundation thirty-five to forty girls have, for a longer or shorter period, been sheltered under its gracious influences, and a kindly Christian oversight still guards those who have married and settled in the city.

Its claims on our humanity and love of liberty, apart from spiritual considerations, should enlist in its favor, at least all Canadian people, and should lead to the enforcement or, if necessary, improvement of the law, without adding expense to the society undertaking this difficult work.

We are thankful to report enlargement in other directions. New homes have been opened up to our missionary, not only in Victoria, but in Vancouver, New Westminster, Nanaimo, Union, Steveston and Moodyville. A growing acquaintance with the Chinese language, and some familiarity with Japanese, peculiarly fits our representative for reaching the women and children of both these nationalities.

A day school for Chinese, opened February 8th, 1897, has met with encouraging success, and it is hoped will be the open door to many homes and the starting point of many Christian lives.

The weekly prayer meeting attracts many of the former residents of the Home, who are thus kept in touch with its helpful influence, and nurtured in the ways of the Lord.

While there have been disappointments, yet there are many who are trying to carry out the principles they have been taught, and one, as the wife of a Chinese evangelist, is helping to spread the Gospel among her own people.

Steady, progressive work has been carried on in the Crosby Girls' Home at Port Simpson, B.C. The number in residence has not been as great as was hoped, but of late there has been an increase.

The daily routine of school life with practice, under instruction, of domestic duties and sewing, varied by a little music, has left no time for idleness.

There has been growth spiritually, and some have passed to the better land giving evidence of their faith in Christ.

Untiring devotion has characterized our nurses in Dr. Bolton's hospital, and much good has been accomplished in this direction.

The Coqualeetza Home at Chilliwack, founded by the Woman's Missionary Society, has, during the quadrennium, grown into "The Coqualeetza Indian Institute," supported by both societies, about one one hundred children being taught and trained in various industrial pursuits. Evidence is abundant that this is the most satisfactory way of dealing with the Indian problem—training accompanying teaching.

For two years a small grant has been made to the Rev. Mr. Raley, at Kitamaat, to help him in the support of about thirty Indian children, who are receiving the benefit of a Christian Home with instruction in the day school.

Although not coming in the compass of this report, yet it may be stated that \$300 each were appropriated at the last annual meeting to White Fish Lake and the refurnishing of the McDougall Orphanage.

FRENCH.

During the four years there has been an average attendance of eighty at the French Institute in Montreal, about one-third of whom have been from Roman Catholic families.

Good and faithful work has been done, and not a few have been led to value the word of God and to trust in the "One Mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus."

Besides sharing with the General Society the support of this Institute, the Woman's Missionary Society has maintained two prosperous day schools in Montreal and two small ones in the country.

The teachers have also served as Bible women, visiting as far as strength and opportunity would permit, distributing the Word of Life, inviting to the services of the church, and ministering to sick and needy ones.

Baffled at times by an unseen but not an unknown power, they have patiently done what they could, and have not been without the reward of souls led to Christ and freedom.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

The children of many a brave fisherman, who has been overwhelmed in the deep sea off Newfoundland, have found shelter in the Methodist Orphanage to which a yearly grant has been given.

In addition to the various points named there are many more all through our own land to which come streams of comfort and cheer from another department of our work, the Supply Committee.

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During the four years goods have been distributed to the value of some \$14,000, and this *not* taken from our regular funds.

The past few years have brought much anxiety and deep pain in some relations; the situation many times has been exceedingly trying and the work has seemed imperilled, but through the good hand of our God upon us we continue to this day.

Never, it may be, was a society more blessed with intelligent, faithful, earnest, devoted Christian missionaries than has ours.

To each, it may be said, "Give her of the fruit of her hands, and let her own works praise her in the gates."

In closing this sketch one feeling must have expression, that of humble gratitude, not only for our own exalted position as women contrasted with that of our sisters who know not Christ, but that we have been so honored in being made the dispensers of His bounty, and have been privileged through our representatives to tell the old, old story, to many who otherwise would most likely never have heard it.

To the tender loving Father who accepts the smallest offering given in sincerity, and who has seen the devotion and ofttimes self-denial here represented we commit the work, praying that all which has been unworthy may be blotted out, and that what has been done in "His name" may be accepted.

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RECEIPTS.

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4. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

1. We recommend that the quadrennial report of the General Board of Missions be adopted.

2. That the first clause of the report of the Executive Committee of the Mission Board be adopted, viz.:

"That it is not expedient to recommend to the General Conference a division of the Mission Fund."

3. Formation of New Missions.

(1) "No circuit which has been self-supporting for a married man shall be placed upon the list of missions without the recommendation of the May District Meeting given by a three-fourths' vote, and consented to by a three-fourths' vote of the ensuing Annual Conference."

(2) No new home mission shall be formed by dividing or detaching appointments from one or more self-supporting circuits or stations unless by a three-fourths' vote of the District Meeting and Annual Conference.

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4. Home Missions.

In order to secure, if possible, a more equitable support for ministers laboring upon Home Missions, and to put an end to those deficiencies which are a serious injustice to the ministers and a reproach to the Church, it is deemed advisable to adopt a definite minimum of allowances. The regulations touching this matter shall be as follows:

(1) The term "allowance" or "allowances" shall be understood as including all the items of a minister's support, such as salary, board, fuel and travelling expenses, but not house rent, horse-keep or hire, or incidentals.

(2) The minimum allowance for a married minister on a Home Mission shall be \$600 per annum, with a free house; the house to be provided by the mission. For single ordained men the minimum allowance shall be \$350, and for single unordained men, \$300.

(3) In order to reach the results aimed at in these regulations, namely, the payment in full of minimum allowances, the amounts to be raised by the various missions is a matter of prime importance. And as there is great inequality in this respect, it is recommended that a special committee of each Annual Conference shall make arrangements for a visitation of Home Mission fields by a deputation appointed for the purpose.

The said deputation shall meet the official members, and also the congregations, if they judge it necessary; enquire carefully into the circumstances of the people; point out thei njustice of deficiencies under any circumstances, and the still greater wrong inflicted when amounts actually promised are not paid; indicate methods of increasing circuit finances, and after careful consideration name the amount which, in their judgment, the Mission ought to raise, obtaining, if possible, the consent of the officials to the same. A written report shall be presented by the deputation to the ensuing Financial District Meeting, and shall be taken into account in recommending a grant from the Missionary Fund for the ensuing year.

(4) When grants to Home Missions are finally determined, the proper authorities shall at once furnish an official statement of such grants to the district chairmen concerned, who shall, without delay, notify the superintendents of the Home Missions within his district. The superintendents shall at once notify their official boards, so that steps may be taken, if necessary, to raise such additional amounts as may be required to pay at least the minimum allowance above indicated.

It is to be distinctly understood that the responsibility of providing the minimum allowance agreed upon, rests primarily with the people upon the mission, not upon the Missionary Board, and that grants from the General Fund are designed to aid, for a time, those fields wherein, owing to the limited numbers and scanty means of the membership, the people are unable to support their own pastors.

5. We recommend that the General Conference elect a General Secretary whose duties shall be chiefly administrative, also an Associate Secretary whose duties shall be chiefly to visit as many of our fields as possible, to give information, and awaken interest and enthusiasm in the mission cause. All other details respecting the staff to be left as at present with the General Board and Executive Committee.

The General Board may notify Annual Conference authorities when deemed necessary and advisable, that grants to particular missions shall cease, or be continued on a diminishing scale to terminate at a certain period, and when such notice is given the Annual Conference shall take action thereon, which action can only become final upon a three fourths' vote of the Conference, otherwise the recommendation of the General Board shall be accepted.

6. INCREASE OF MINISTERS.

As the multiplication of dependent fields has been caused, in part at least, by an unnecessary increase in the number of ministers, and the absence of any authority by which probationers for the ministry can be sent to any part of the Connexion where their services are most required, the General Conference is memorialized to enact as follows:

(1) That during the ensuing quadrennium it shall not be competent for any Annual Conference, or officer thereof, to receive any minister or

probationer for the ministry from another church or from abroad.

(2) From among probationers received by the Annual Conferences during the ensuing quadrennium, the Stationing Committees shall appoint only so many as are urgently needed to supply existing fields. All others shall be put upon a list of reserve, which shall be placed in the hands of the General Superintendent, and from this list he shall select, on the request of any President, supplies for vacancies that may occur.

(3) It is to be distinctly understood that probationers are received for the ministry of the Methodist Church, and not merely for that of a particular Conference, and therefore shall be under obligation to proceed, when so directed by the proper authorities, to any part of the Connexion

where their services are required.

7. Indian Missions.

Your Committee recommends that the Indian work in the Manitoba and North-West Conference, and in the British Columbia Conference, be placed entirely under the direction of the General Board of Missions.

We further recommend the following regulations touching the same : In addition to the general powers conferred by the Constitution of the Missionary Society, the General Board shall have exclusive authority

(a) To regulate the number and boundaries of districts in the Indian work.

(b) To designate the number and extent of missions, and the number and character of the laborers to be employed thereon.

(c) To submit to the Stationing Committees of the Annual Conferences each year a list of proposed stations in the Indian work. The confirmation of such stations to be with the Annual Conferences according to Discipline.

 (\hat{d}) To nominate chairmen for the Indian districts; the final appoint-

ment to be with the Annual Conferences according to Discipline.

(e) To recommend to the Annual Conferences concerned the names of suitable persons to be received as probationers for the Indian work, and for ordination for such work. Provided that, whenever practicable, this shall be done through the usual channels of Quarterly and District meetings.

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(f) To authorize the General Superintendent, when deemed necessary, to issue a license, where it can be legally done, under the Seal of the Church, empowering lay workers on isolated stations to solemnize matrimony and administer the ordinance of baptism, such license to be revocable at the pleasure of the Board, and in any case to be surrendered by the person holding it when he ceases to be employed by the Society.-Lay workers so licensed shall not thereby become members of any Annual Conference, nor be entitled to any claim on the Superannuation Fund.

(g) To remove or recall any worker who is found to be unsuitable for an Indian field; and when the worker so removed or recalled is a minister or probationer, to negotiate with any Annual Conference for his employ-

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(1) It is the opinion of this Committee that it is not advisable, unless in exceptional circumstances, to increase the expense of Indian missions by employing high grade teachers to teach Indian children the elements of a public school education. This was referred to the General Board.

(2) That this Committee recommends the application of the principle of close supervision in the Indian missions, schools and institutions of Manitoba, the North-West and British Columbia, and that the question of the superintendency of Indian missions and the inspection of Indian schools and industrial institutions in Manitoba, the North-West and British Columbia be referred to the General Board of Missions with power to act as the facts and circumstances may require.

8. MEDICAL MISSIONARIES.

The appointment of several Medical Missionaries during the past quadrennium, and the possible increase of this class of workers in the future, renders it desirable that regulations should be adopted defining their status and work. Your Committee begs leave, therefore, to recom-

(1) That the employment of Medical Missionaries shall rest with the General Board which shall have authority to institute all necessary enquiries, prescribe a preliminary course of study, and provide for all

necessary examinations.

(2) Medical Missionaries, duly appointed, shall have equal rank with the other missionaries in the field, and their stipends shall be computed on the same scale. Where there is a Mission Council they shall be members thereof, having a voice and vote in all its business.

(3) They shall be members of the District Meeting within the bounds of which they are laboring, and the same questions shall be asked respecting them as are asked concerning other missionaries, except those which strictly pertains to the pastoral office, such as recommending probationers for the ministry, their continuance on trial, ordination, or the like.

(4) Medical Missionaries who are or who shall become probationers for the ministry, shall pursue the course of study prescribed in the Discipline, and shall be subject to the same regulations as other probationers. If deemed expedient the General Board may prescribe a four years' course of study for Medical Missionaries who are not probationers for the

(5) No Medical Missionary shall be received as a probationer for the

(6) Each Medical Missionary who is in receipt of a stipend from the Missionary Fund, shall keep an accurate account of all fees received for medical services, and forward a copy of the same through the Mission Council or Annual District Meeting to the General Board, which shall determine how said fees shall be expended. Where hospitals are established the Medical Missionary in charge shall keep a careful account of income from all sources, and of expenditure for maintenance and medical appliances. A copy of this account shall appear in the annual financial statement from the mission.

(7) Each Medical Missionary shall prepare and forward to the Mission Rooms, through the Mission Council or Annual D strict Meeting, a report of his work, whether hospital, dispensary or general practice, showing number and character of cases treated, and any other information that may help the Board to understand the extent and value of the medical

work as an adjunct to evangelistic effort.

(8) It is to be distinctly understood that all persons employed by the Board are to be, first and foremost, *Missionaries*. While recognizing the value of medical work as a means of relieving physical suffering and prolonging life, its chief value in mission work is to exhibit the humane and beneficent character of practical Caristianity, and to prepare the way for the Gospel message. It is expected, therefore, that all Medical Missionaries will keep constantly in view the spiritual needs of their patients, and lose no opportunity of offering Christ, the great Physician, for their acceptance.

(9) That the question of making provision for Medical Missionaries and their families in case of misfortune, sickness or death be referred to

the General Board of Missions, with power to act.

(10) That years of service of Medical Missionaries after admission to probation for the ministry be accepted *pro tanto* in lieu of the years of probation required in the regular work, provided they pass the prescribed course of study.

(11) That during the ensuing quadrennium the General Board have power to adopt, if necessary, additional regulations respecting Medical Missionaries and their work, not inconsistent with the foregoing regulations.

9. SUNDRY RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. That the letter from Rev. James Turner, of Dawson City, which had been referred to the Committee on Missions be transmitted to the General Board, they to take such action as they may deem advisable.

2. That the General Conference elect six ministers and six laymen as members of the General Missionary Board, and that such election be

by ballot without nomination.

3. That the following memorials and communications be transferred to the General Board, they to take such action in the several cases as may be decided by them:

(a) Memorial from the British Columbia Conference to the Hon. C.

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(b) Memorial from British Columbia Conference re cours: of study for Indian probationers for the ministry.

(c) Memorial from Saskatchewan and Lake Winnipeg Indian District

re appointment of an agent to supervise Indian work.

(d) That we recommend the General Conference to suggest to the General Board the advisability of publishing a missionary manual for the

guidance of the agents of the society.

(e) Regarding the motion of Mr. J. J. Maclaren for a joint Board for all the mission operations of the Church, and a communication from certain officers of the Woman's Missionary Society, it is recommended that the motion be referred to the General Board of Missions, and to the Woman's Missionary Society for consideration by them, and to report to the next General Conference.

(f) Your Committee recommends that the report of the Woman's Missionary Society be printed in the Journal of this Conference.

10. MEMORIALS.

(1) With regard to a memorial from the Hamilton District, endorsed by the Hamilton Conference, asking that there be but one treasurer of missionary moneys on each district, and that the Chairman of the District be that treasurer.

We recommend concurrence with the prayer of the memorial.

(2) Not adopted.

(3) Respecting a communication from Rev. Geo. W. Hewitt, of Willowdale, Toronto Conference, relating to the maintenance of domestic missions on fields occupied by several denominations together, your Committee

That we have recognized the condition referred to in the communication and have endeavored to arrange with other churches, when possible, to relieve the difficulty, but so far without much success. As the way is still open for the adjustment of these difficulties, it is hoped that more favorable results will be reached in the future.

(4) With regard to a notice of motion for such a change of Par. 136 of the Discipline as would make Conference representatives on the Central Board of Missions members of the Missionary Committee of the conferences to which they belong, your Committee reports non-concurrence.

(5) With regard to a communication from Rev. C. E. Manning, relating to the prompt payment to missionaries on Domestic Missions of moving expenses and salary, your Committee recommends the subject to the favorable consideration of the Board.

(6) A memorial of Rev. Dr. Eby, relating to the revision of our Foreign Missionary policy, was before the Committee. It was read and considered as fully as the time at command would permit, but as many of the suggestions contained therein have been covered in the legislation already recommended, your Committee does not see its way to recommend further action at present.

(7) Several other memorials, etc., were before your Committee on which no action was considered necessary, because they had been dealt with previously, namely:

(b) One from Sudbury District, Montreal Conference, relating to stipends of Domestic Missionaries;

(c) One from Nova Scotia Conference respecting rents on Missions;
 (d) One from Wingham District, London Conference, relating to the publication of Missionary subscriptions and collections;

(e) And one from the Japan Conference relating to the length of the pastoral term.

(f) The Financial Report of the Woman's Missionary Society is recommended for publication in the JOURNAL of the Conference.

(g) The report of the Superintendent of Missions in the North-West is also recommended for publication in the JOURNAL.

11. JAPAN MISSION.

Your Committee have carefully considered the recommendations contained in the official report of the General Superintendent, regarding the work in Japan; also certain memorials and other communications referring to the same matters. Respecting the reinforcement of the Mission and the supervision of the work, the following was adopted:

That we are in sympathy with the recommendation of the General Superintendent that the Japan Mission should be reinforced to the measure of its former strength; also, that the work should be under wise, aggressive and prudent superintendency. At the same time we recognize the great practical difficulty arising from the straitened condition of the Missionary Fund. We therefore recommend that both points be referred to the favorable consideration of the General Board, with authority to reinforce the Mission and provide for the Superintendency as soon as the condition of the Fund will render it safe and prudent to do so.

Respecting the General Superintendent's second recommendation, to give the Mission Council its place in the Discipline, etc., we recommend that Clause 2 of Section 13 of the Discipline be altered, amended and arranged to read as follows:

"2. Mission Council.

"(1) The missionaries sent by the Methodist Church to any foreign field, when not less than five in number, shall constitute a Mission Council, with powers and duties as hereinafter defined. When there are less than five missionaries in the field, they may act as a committee to make recommendations, but shall not possess the powers of a Council. The Council shall be subject to such regulations as the General Board of Missions may from time to time adopt, provided the same be not ultra vires of the powers conferred upon the Board by the Discipline of the Church. Subject to this general restriction, the Council shall have authority:

(a) "To elect a Secretary, who shall keep a true record of the proceedings and decisions of the Council. It shall also be his duty to forward to the General Board, or its officers, all resolutions, memorials, recommendations, or other official action of the Council and its Executive, and all

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official communications intended for the consideration of the Board, except such as pertain to the Treasurer's department, as hereinafter defined. The Superintendent of the Mission shall be Chairman of all meetings of the Council when present. In his absence the Council may elect a Chairman pro tem.

(b) "The Council, composed of the missionaries and Superintendent, shall meet together at least once a year for mutual consultation respecting the interests of the work on the various fields comprised in the mis-

(c) "To appoint an Executive Committee to deal with any matters that may arise in the intervals of Council meetings. On the recommendation of the Executive Committee of the Council the Superintendent

shall call a special meeting of the Council.

(d) "To designate the particular field of each foreign missionary, and to appoint or re-appoint him thereto; the department of work -whether educational, evangelistic or the like-to be designated by the General Board. Where there is no organized District Meeting or Annual Conference, the Mission Council shall station the native preachers and other workers.

(e) "To consult, when deemed necessary or advisable, on matters of common interest, with native pastors who may be appointed by the Annual Conference for the purpose, with the view of maintaining the fullest confidence and harmony between the native and foreign workers.

(f) "The Council shall meet in joint session, at least once in the year, with the Council of the Woman's Missionary Society, for consultation on matters of common interest, with the view of promoting harmony and co-operation between the agents of the two Societies in the prosecution of their work. If any question arises in regard to which a majority of either Council cannot agree, it may be referred to the Home Boards for final decision, subject to the provisions of Par. 370, Sub-section 2 of the Discipline of 1894. The Executives of the two Councils shall meet in joint session when deemed necessary. A copy of the minutes of all sessions of the Council and Executive, whether joint or otherwise, shall be forwarded promptly to the Mission Rooms.

(g) "To regulate all matters relating to the property of the Society in harmony with the directions of the General Board; also to appropriate any funds granted by the Board when not specified in detail, but

not so as to change the object of any such grant.

(h) "To review the work of each year, revise reports from all parts of the field, prepare and revise estimates for the coming year, and make such recommendations to the General Board from time to time as they

deem expedient.

(i) "To plan for the evangelistic work of the foreign missionaries, assigning to each a definite centre of operation, with freedom, within limits prescribed by the Council, to plan and develop his work, yet not so as to interfere with the disciplinary duties and powers of native pastors or chairmen of districts. Provided always that the Council or missionaries shall not multiply fields or agents involving increased expenditure, . without the consent of the General Board or Executive Committee. The missionary shall have an advisory relation to all the native workers

(j) "In case of any difference of judgment or conflict of authority arising between a foreign missionary and a native pastor, regarding the arrangement of their work which they cannot adjust, the matter shall be referred to the Superintendent for his decision.

(k) "Each foreign missionary shall send in a quarterly report of his work to the Board. He shall also present an annual report to the Council, which report may furnish a basis for the Council's recommendations to the Board.

(l) "The Council shall prepare and forward to the General Board, at least annually, a full report of the work and any recommendations touching the same which the Council deems it expedient to make.

(m) Struck out.

(n) "All instructions or orders from the General Board to individual missionaries may be communicated either directly or through the Superintendent; but in any case such orders or instructions must also be communicated to the Secretary of the Council, to be laid before the Council for information only, and not for review."

Your Committee recommends that Par. 366 and Sub-sections be further amended to read as follows:

3. Superintendent, Treasurer and Secretary.

The Superintendent of any Foreign Mission shall be the Treasurer and Corresponding Secretary of the General Board for such mission, and the Executive of the instructions of the Board in all matters not committed to the Mission Council and its officers by the preceding regulations. He shall be a member of the Mission Council, also of the Stationing Committee of the Annual Conference, and of the Board of all Educational institutions under the control of the General Board within the bounds of the mission.

His duties shall be-

(a) "To supervise the entire work of the mission; to confer with and advise the Council respecting the appointment and work of the foreign missionaries, also the Stationing Committee of the Annual Conference respecting the work of the native preachers and evangelists; to advise with the missionaries and native pastors on their fields, regarding methods of organization and work; to decide matters in dispute between missionaries and native pastors, respecting their work, and between agents of the General Board and the Woman's Missionary Society, or refer the latter to the Home Boards for adjustment; to open up, with the concurrence of the Council, new fields of work; to initiate, through the Council or the Conference, methods for promoting self-support; and in general so to lead and direct the work of the mission as to build up the Annual Conference and the work under its care."

(b) "As Treasurer for the Board, to take charge of all funds sent from the Mission Rooms, rent of mission property, if any, and of income derived by missionaries, outside their regular stipends, for teaching in schools or the like; keep the books and make all necessary reports

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connected therewith; disburse the money in his possession in accordance with the appropriations authorized by the General Board or Executive Committee, and subject solely to their authority; transmit annually to the Mission Rooms a detailed and audited statement of the accounts of the mission for the preceding year, also the estimates of the Mission Council for the following year."

(c) "As Corresponding Secretary of the Board he shall report fully to the Board concerning his work as Superintendent, and keep the Board informed of all matters of importance connected with the work; lay promptly before the Council all official communications from the Board or Mission Rooms, and discharge such other duties as the Board may from time to time direct."

In case of the death or disability of the Superintendent, or his absence from the field, the General Board or Executive Committee shall designate one of the foreign missionaries as Treasurer and Corresponding Secretary pro tem., who shall discharge the duties specified in sub-sections (b) and (c) of the regulations next preceding, except those of superintendency.

The provisions of Par. 360, Sub-sections 7 and 8, and which are as follows, shall apply to the superintendents of foreign mission fields:

In the event of the death or disability of any of the officers of the Society, the Executive Committee shall appoint a suitable person to fill the vacancy till the next meeting of the General Board, when such appointment may be confirmed or changed pending the meeting of the next General Conference.

The Executive Committee shall also have authority to suspend any officer of the Missionary Society for incompetence or for culpable neglect of the duties of his office, and supply his place till the next meeting of the General Board, which shall have authority to fill the vacancy till the next General Conference.

MISSION CONFERENCES.

Respecting Mission Conferences in the foreign field, your Committee recommends that the sub-sections to Clause 2, Par. 368, on page 193 of the present Discipline, be arranged and amended to read as follows:

(a) The Conference shall not in any way interfere with the administration of the General Board of Missions, nor with the powers and duties of the Mission Council or the Superintendent of the Mission as elsewhere defined.

(b) It shall elect representatives to the General Conference and the General Board of Missions only when authorized so to do by the General Board, which shall also designate the number of such representatives.

(c) To meet peculiar conditions of the work in Japan the Stationing Committee may appoint a native pastor to the same field for five consecutive years; but any extension beyond this term shall be only by a three-fourths' vote of the Stationing Committee, but in no case shall the term exceed seven years.

Your Committee recommends that Clause 3 of Par. 368, page 193, be rescinded as no longer necessary. We also recommend that Par. 369, with its various clauses, be rescinded for the same reason.

Respecting the Woman's Missionary Society your Committee recommends that Clause 5 of Par. 370, page 195, be amended to read—

"5. Plans for new work by the Woman's Missionary Society or its Council, before being finally decided," etc. We also recommend that subsection (b) of said clause be rescinded, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:

(b) "The Mission Council of the Woman's Missionary Society shall meet in joint session with the Council of the General Missionary Society at least once in the year, for consultation in regard to matters of common interest, with the view of promoting harmony and co-operation between the agents of both Societies."

Regarding the status and rights of returned missionaries, your Com-

mittee recommends the adoption of the following:

"When a missionary who has been transferred to a Mission Conference in the foreign field, returns permanently to the Home Work, he shall be received and stationed by the Conference from which he was sent out. Nevertheless, it shall be competent for the General Superintendent to arrange for his transfer into some other Home Conference when the circumstances, in his opinion, justify such a course."

It is further recommended:

That this Conference authorize and direct the Missionary Board to appoint a Superintendent of our Mission work in China.

That this General Conference elect a Superintendent of the Mission

work in Japan.

That it shall be the duty of the native chairmen of districts, pastors and Annual Conferences to co-operate in all possible ways with the missionaries and the Superintendent of the Mission.

IV.—EDUCATION.

1. QUADRENNIAL REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SOCIETY.

The Educational Society has done good service to the colleges during the quadrennium by the grants which it has been enabled to make, amounting to \$44,279.29, and the fees paid for student probationers, amounting to between \$10,000 and \$11,000. The loans for the four years have amounted to about \$14,000, and we have received repayments on account of loans to the amount of \$8,753.49. The notes now held by the treasurers number 753, and aggregate \$38,007.35. The income for the four years has amounted to \$86,002.73.

For the first time in the history of the Society bequests have been made thereto—One, the bequest of the late Rev. W. W. Miller, of Napanee, amounting to \$300, and a similar one from the late Mr. J. Fred. Moore, of Dundas. These sums have been invested, and the interest is placed to the credit of the Bay of Quinte and Hamilton Conferences. The former bequest requires that the interest be credited to the Napanee East Circuit.

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The Equalization Scheme, recommended in my last report and acted upon by the General Conference, has resulted in substantial help to several Conferences, but especially to the Manitoba and North-West Conference. The sums raised by Newfoundland and British Columbia are, by authority of the General Conference, at the disposal of those Conferences.

The notes given by the student probationers read, "payable within ten years." I would respectfully suggest a change either to "within seven years," or that "the amount be paid in annual instalments, dating from ordination." As a rule, nothing is done until the ten years have expired, and at that period family expenses are generally on the increase, so that I believe the men would be benefited by requiring the payment within seven years, or, as I have suggested, in annual payments covering seven years from ordination.

In the last Quadrennial report the attention of the General Conference was called to the importance of interesting the Sunday Schools in the work of Christian education, and two benefits were pointed out: "The Fund would be helped to the extent of several thousand dollars annually, and the young people would be brought into sympathetic and intelligent touch with our educational work, and particularly with the education of the ministry. This plan would be seed-sowing for much harvesting in after years. The Sunday School day for the Educational Society might be the same as the Educational Anniversary for the Church, the minister preaching on behalf of the Society, visiting the school and giving a short address suitable to interest the young people in the educational work of their own Church. The General Conference, acting upon the suggestion of the report, embodied its judgment in the following words: "A special collection for the Educational Society shall, wherever practicable, be taken up in each Sunday School annually, on a Sunday to be appointed by the Superintendent of the circuit, in consultation with the superintendent of the school." I am happy to report that many schools have been acting upon the recommendation, and it is likely that in the near future there will be a general, if not a universal, response which will materially aid the work of the Educational

Conference treasurers render great service to the Society, and yet it seems impossible to have the Educational Society reports and the minutes of Conference exactly harmonize. The lists sent to the office of the treasurers for publication and the minutes differ, sometimes because deputation expenses are deducted and only the net amount reported, whereas, in all cases the gross amounts should be acknowledged to the credit of the circuits. The discrepancies are further accounted for by the fact that the money is sometimes not paid in until after the treasurer's statement is in print.

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2. QUADRENNIAL REPORT OF THE GENERAL SECRETARY OF EDUCATION AND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OF THE TREASURER OF VICTORIA COLLEGE.

The review of the quadrennium is not entirely satisfactory. Educationally, the various institutions have made progress and are doing efficient service. From St. John's, Nfld., to New Westminster, B.C., every College is burdened with debt, and therefore lessened in the progress that would otherwise be made.

In response to an earnest request, the General Superintendent and the Secretary of Education visited British Columbia in the interest of the Columbian Methodist College, holding educational conventions in various parts of the Province. The British Columbia Conference, lay and clerical, came to the relief of the College in a spirit of commendable liberality, and it is hoped that the Columbian College is now on the way to efficiency and permanent usefulness to the Methodism of the Pacific Province.

What is true financially of all our colleges is emphatically true of our chief educational centre, Victoria College. The amount necessary for the efficient working of the institution never was reached, partly because of the divided sentiment of the Church as to its educational policy, but far more largely because of the commercial depression through which the country has been passing of late. There is a brighter outlook, and with returning prosperity it is hoped the colleges of Canadian Methodism shall be made to share the benefits of such prosperity. Several members of the Board of Regents thought that, in view of the hard times, it was not well to push for subscriptions. Things have reached a crisis which demands the serious consideration of the Conference and the Connexion at large. The deficit has caused great anxiety to the Board of Regents and to all the friends of Victoria University.

Since the last General Conference the Board has been able to effect the sale of the old Victoria College property at Cobourg. The property was sold to the Ontario Government for the sum of \$25,000, payable in five annual instalments of \$5,000. Already two instalments have been received.

During the quadrennium, sums amounting to \$13,406.25 have been received on account of old mortgages, and the mortgage held by the Canada Landed and National Investment Co. against Faraday Hall, amounting to \$7,000, has been paid off. A loan of \$3,000 has been effected on good Toronto property. Reductions in rate of interest have considerably affected the revenue of the College.

The most remarkable event in the history of the College during the quadrennium was the bequest of the late Mr. H. A. Massey of \$201,000: \$1,000 to endow two prizes in the English Bible, \$50,000 for a Ladies' Residence, and \$150,000 for Endowment. The principal of the prize money has been received and invested in a debenture bearing interest at $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. While Victoria was thus generously remembered, several other Methodist institutions will be largely helped by the will of our munificent friend. Although this sum is in prospect, there is no

An effort has been inaugurated to establish a Current Income Fund to carry us over four or five years to prevent any serious encroachment upon the endowment. From that source we received in 1897-98 the sum of \$1,105, and we hope for additional subscriptions each year. As all along the history of Victoria, the ministers have been to the front in the movement. One who subscribed to College Federation has also subscribed to the Income Fund at the rate of \$10 a year so long as he is in the active work. There is considerable difficulty in collecting the balance of subscriptions due the College.

The late Dr. C. M. Gould, of Colborne, bequeathed a prize of \$12 per year for five years, and during the quadrennium five Scholarships have been founded—one by Mr. A. E. Ames, of Toronto, of the value of \$60 per year, to be called the William Ames Scholarship—this is in honor of his venerable father, a worthy minister of our Church. Professor Horning and his friends have founded the Nelles Scholarship, worth \$60 per year; Dr. Bell gives a Scholarship of \$60, and Professor Robertson has also given one of \$50. Rev. E. A. Chown, B.D., gives a Scholarship of \$50 a year for a period of five years.

In view of the pressing financial needs of Victoria and of all the other colleges of the Connexion, it is of the utmost importance that this Conference take decisive steps to place the colleges of the Church on a much better financial footing.

Attention has been called in this Conference, and shall be still more emphatically, to the proposed Twentieth Century Fund, which has in it more than a gleam of hope for Christian education. Unless that great scheme be adopted and carried to a successful conclusion, there must be during the present quadrennium many appeals for the colleges, and with perhaps uncertain and limited results. If, however, the Methodism of this land acts like the Mother-Methodism of the world and like the great Methodism of the United States, north and south, it is certain the muchneeded help will be forthcoming. Apart, therefore, from the sentiment and the gratitude to God, which should characterize us as a people for the mercies of the century just closing, it will be seen that such an effort is the best way of aiding our colleges which mean so much for the future welfare of Canadian Methodism.

3. QUADRENNIAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF VICTORIA UNIVERSITY.

Honored Fathers and Brethren:

It is once more our pleasing duty to approach your venerable body with our report of the trust which you have placed in our hands. The importance of that trust we fully recognize, affecting, as it does, the interests of our Church and country for generations to come. In receiving from you that trust we are sensible that you have placed upon us the highest honor as well as the most weighty responsibility.

The period of our history on which we are now called to report has, we think, tested quite thoroughly as well the possibilities as the difficulties and the requirements of our new university relations. The possibilities of our work in its present form will, perhaps, appear most clearly from a statement of the facts of the past four years.

In 1892, the last year of our work in Cobourg, the total number of students who attended lectures or passed examination in the Faculty of Arts was 121. At that same date more than a hundred Methodist students were pursuing their studies in University College, Toronto. In the first two years after removal to Toronto the attendance of students in Arts at our own college had increased to 167. The following are the numbers for the four years just ended:

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The first result of our six years' history in our new relations is that our students in the Faculty of Arts have been doubled in number, and the accommodation afforded by our large and beautiful new building taxed almost to its full capacity. This growth, which is quite unprecedented in our history of over sixty years, can scarcely be expected to continue, especially as the number of university students in the Province has diminished, or at least has not materially increased during the past two years. Our growth is due to the fact that we are now in a position to secure the patronage of the great body of Methodist students of the country. This desirable result has been attained first of all by the thoroughly efficient work of an able staff of professors. As tested by the common university examination, our students have maintained the credit of their college and proved the efficiency of the work of their instructors by winning their full share of university honors and of places of honor in the annual class lists. Twice in the four years they have won the Governor-General's gold medal, and of the two awards of the post-graduate travelling scholarship of £150 sterling, one was given to a Victoria student-another Victoria man, who has since won high honors at Cornell, standing second in the competition. The only award also made in the four years of the medal for general proficiency in the ordinary course was made to a young lady of Victoria, and our students have each year secured a large share of honors in general proficiency.

In addition to these proofs of efficient class work our college has also already obtained a reputation as an attractive home of learning. In the library and on the campus, in our social religious meetings and in the parlors and societies, and especially in our college Sabbath services something of a college home has been created to which our students become so attached that they leave it with sincere regret, and which contributes a most important moral and spiritual element to their education. In this field, quite as much as in the lecture room, we believe we are working out the great end desired by our Church in building up strong and well-furnished men and women for her future work. The training of the college societies, whether literary or more distinctively moral and religious, has proved a most direct and important factor in this respect, and we have been delighted to take note of the work accomplished by these incipient efforts of student life. In many of these respects our college has been a training school for future life and usefulness, and has so made itself truly attractive to all earnest students.

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A decided impetus has been given to the intellectual side of our work, especially in the Faculty of Arts, by the creation of college scholarships. University College, through the liberality of its friends, is able to offer no less than nine scholarships each year to be competed for by students of the College in college subjects. It is evident that if we are to retain the better class of students we must offer equivalent advantages. So deeply has this impressed our Faculty that out of their scanty salaries Professors Bell and Robertson have each contributed a scholarship in classics, while through the effort and personal contribution of Professor Horning another has been established in Modern Languages, and a fourth and fifth have been established by A. E. Ames, Esq., and the Rev. E. A. Chown, B.D., an honored member of our Senate. These scholarships, together with a number of prizes and bursaries, established by such men as Dr. J. E. Hodgins, the late Mr. Massey, the Hon. Senator Cox, the Rev. Dr. Fawcett, A. F. Wallbridge, Esq., the late Dr. Gould and W. J. Robertson, M.A., have afforded not only stimulus but substantial assistance to students struggling for an education. In this connection it would be unjust to pass over the gifts of medals by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, His Excellency the Governor-General, the Rev. Bishop Wilson, the Honorable Senators Sanford and Cox, and Messrs. S. H. Janes and J. J. Maclaren, who have contributed from year to year medals in the various departments and honor courses.

Another element in our college work in which very decided progress has been made has been the Library. A beautiful and attractive feature of our new building was provision for a compact college library of working material, especially in Theology and in college subjects. Provision was made in the stacks for about 10,000 volumes and at the reading tables for about 40 students. Already these limits are too narrow. Through the enterprise of the Alumni, especially led by C. C. James, Esq., who has been both a generous contributor and an indefatigable worker, and through the gifts of numerous liberal friends our library has grown in the six years from about 6,000 to 11,000 volumes, and the appreciation of its usefulness by the students is evinced by the fact that the reading tables are almost daily crowded to excess by diligent workers. Besides the collection of books needed by students in the course of study we have endeavored to collect material bearing on Canadian history, and especially upon the history of Canadian Methodism. Already we have secured, in some directions, exceedingly valuable material and have now probably the most complete collection of Canadian Methodist historical material in existence. We regard this work as of great importance, not only to our college, but also to our entire Church in the future. In this work we are co-operating with mutual advantage with the Methodist churches of the United States, and with their able librarian, the Rev. J. C. Thomas, M.A., of New

The place of the library as an instrument of true university work is now fully appreciated by all the leading institutions of higher learning, and perhaps the greatest advantage which a city like Toronto offers as a university seat is the fact that it contains several of the best furnished libraries in the country. To the completeness of these we are glad to be

able to make at least a departmental contribution. In reviewing the expansion and changes of the past four years in our college work we cannot forget changes which have taken from us familiar names and personal elements of strength. The present year has taken from us two of the last surviving members of the college staff of a generation ago, Dr. John Wilson and Dr. John Beatty. Many of the members of this Conference will call to mind their strong moral and religious character, their rare power to command the confidence and affectionate respect of students, and their ability and scholarship in their respective depart-Each passed beyond the fourscore years, and full of years and honors has now entered into rest. We have also lost another fellowworker, Prof. John Petch, M.A., than whom young men never had a truer friend or a more faultless pattern of noble life. Nor have the honored dead been called from the ranks of the teachers alone. Five members have passed from our Board during the quadrennium. One was the first student who passed from the halls of our college into the ranks of the ministry, the late Dr. Sanderson. Two others, Mr. Massey and Dr. Aikins, were among the earliest students of our college whose long lives of high professional and business success and usefulness reflected the highest honor on their Alma Mater. Two others, Dr. D. G. Sutherland and Rev. J. W. Annis, were honored and beloved graduates whose sun set while it seemed as yet but noon. Besides these two other members of our Senate have passed from us-Dr. Rosebrugh, an early and distinguished graduate in Medicine, and Rev. James Vanwyck, a graduate who occupied a foremost place in the ranks of our ministry. these were men whose lives exemplify the work which such an institution should accomplish for the Church and the world. While these have passed away the full working strength of our staff has been maintained, and in Arts our departments are efficiently manned as follows: In Classics, Profs. A. R. Bain, LL.D., A. J. Bell, Ph.D., A. L. Langford, M.A., and J. C. Robertson, B.A.; in Moderns, Profs. A. H. Reynar, LL.D., L. E. Horning, Ph.D., O. A. Edgar, Ph.D., A. E. Lang, M.A., and E. Masson; in Philosophy, E. I. Badgley, LL.D., B.D.; in Orientals, Rev. J. F. McLaughlin, M.A., B.D. The remaining departments in Philosophy, Natural Science, Chemistry, Geology, Physics, Mathematics, History and Political Science are supplied by the able professors of the University of Toronto, at present thirty-one in number, affording our students the advantages of the strongest university staff in the Dominion and one of the most efficient on the continent.

Doubtless to this court of our Church the theological side of our work is of especial interest. The progress of our Church in advancing the standard of qualification for the ministry is not less noteworthy than the general advance of higher education in our Church and country. The first graduates of our college to enter the ministry of our Church in this country are both members of this Conference, and many of its members can recall the establishment of our first chairs of divinity about thirty years ago. Now a large percentage of our younger ministry and ordination classes are university graduates in Arts and many of them still further in Divinity; while undergraduate status in Arts and a college training in Divinity, and especially in exegetical

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studies is the normal requirement for ordination. Such an advance has thrown large responsibility and work upon all our colleges. In this work our college, as the oldest of Canadian Methodism, has taken its full share, both in extent of curriculum and in number of students. Our present staff of instructors numbers six. The number of weekly lectures delivered is, we believe, greater than in any other Divinity school in the Dominion, and the number of our students is also, we believe, greater than that of any other school. During the four years we have graduated into the ranks of our ministry 104 students, of whom eighteen have taken the B.D. degree and forty-eight have graduated in Arts. The significance of this high intellectual standard, which is surpassed by none of our sister churches, will be apparent to all the members of this Conference.

The legislation of the General Conference of four years ago is already bearing fruit, and while the requirement of matriculation at the entrance and of a college course of from two to five years in Arts and Theology from every candidate for our ministry, may have slightly limited the number of candidates, we are satisfied that it excludes no really desirable man, and the experience of all our central conferences is that we have still a surplus of men, even at this higher standard, and that these only need to be transferred to the more distant fields, and we shall have sufficient men of the highest standard of educational qualification.

The encouraging features of our work have been so numerous and so gratifying that it seems almost invidious even to speak of difficulties. Even the most serious of those with which we do meet are only such as are common to men and as may be overcome by faith and patience, by work and by forbearance, and by a wise use of our opportunities and resources. The difficulties, such as they are, arise chiefly from financial considerations and from our new relations to the University and secondary education of the country.

Many of our people, and even of our ministers, were disposed to look upon federation as a means of avoiding expense in our work of higher education. From the beginning of the movement we sought to guard against such an impression. The arrangement is, indeed, an economical one, as compared with the modern university fitted out with all that would be required for successful independent work to-day. But our foremost aim was to place our students in possession of the best modern educational advantages. We think no one can question the fact that this has been attained; and that whether we consider the general course or the special honor courses, the opportunities of our students are now unsurpassed in any country. In post-graduate work alone are we behind the best universities of the world. The primary object of our new educational policy has thus, we think, been fully attained. It has, indeed, in this respect exceeded our expectations, for the movement has given an impetus to the entire university life of the country, and in all departments the standard is higher and the provisions more ample than were ever before enjoyed in this country. Such advance can not be made without expense, and even the large resources of the Provincial University have been taxed beyond their ability. The

cost of our own college work has very slightly exceeded our estimate, and has been due quite as much to the enlargement of our Divinity School as to the demands of our work in Arts. But our resources have fallen short in two directions. First of all, our endowment is still more than a hundred thousand below the first estimate, and again the fall in interest has made it far less productive than a corresponding amount twelve years ago. Our income from endowment is thus scarcely more than half what we anticipated. This has been in part made up by the increase of students' fees and by the growth of the Educational Fund, but still our treasurers have each year to face a serious At the request of some of the annual conferences your Board have taken the whole matter into most serious consideration, and an able and experienced committee of men, well acquainted with both education and finance, have carefully examined both the wants and the expense of all departments of the work, with the conclusion that efficient work can not be done at any less expense than is now incurred. To maintain our place as a college in full efficiency and not entrench upon endowment funds is, in fact, the chief difficulty of our present situation. The particulars of this difficulty will appear from the report of the treasurers. While it does not obviate the difficulty, it may be a satisfaction to remember that such difficulty is the ordinary, and we might almost say, the normal condition of all growing and effective educational institutions. It has been the condition of our own college for sixty years. If we are to furnish education for our young people at less than cost, the more students we have and the greater amount of education we impart the more money we must raise. Increased educational prosperity implies in its very nature increased financial burden.

Minor difficulties have presented themselves in the adjustment of our new relations to the Provincial University, and to the public system of education. In our new educational policy we have assumed a new relation in both these directions. By federation we have become a part of the Provincial University, exerting our fair share of influence in its entire management and policy, and further, have entered into the educational system of the country, exerting our legitimate influence in working out all its problems. But this change has not affected our college alone. It has already reached out to the whole university life of Ontario, on the one hand, and has largely influenced the structure, relations, and life of the Provincial University itself, on the other. A common educational council has given at least one point of unity to the university work of the entire province, and our position as a full Arts College and our representation on the University Senate have somewhat changed the very constitution of the University itself. It is easy to understand that such changes cannot be wrought without occasional friction and sometimes a little diversity of opinion and difficulty of adjustment. A system like that of Ontario, involving the co-operation of thousands of workers in secondary education and of hundreds in university work, moves slowly into any new order; and few, perhaps, have yet understood how large a change has been introduced by the Federation Act of 1887. In the principles of this change, however, we have strong faith. It is a change from division to unity, which, in its very nature, involves increase

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It is also a change which has given greater scope to all the moral and religious elements of education, and that to all Christian minds must be considered an advantage. Wise direction, liberal support and faithful work will, we think, solve every problem, remove every difficulty, and work out results which will be at once the glory and the blessing of our Church and country.

In conclusion, permit us to call your attention to some of the pressing needs of our college at the present or in the very near future. These arise out of, first, increasing numbers; and, secondly, the nature and perfection of our work as a college. Our college building was planned for three hundred students, and as we are now reaching that number we are already finding our quarters too narrow. This is especially the case in the library, the importance of which has greatly increased in the

Another pressing need is the furnishing of residence for students. For centuries the very idea of a college has been a united life in the pursuit of learning. The University in its very nature is multiple and divided. It embraces all learning, and for the accomplishment of this must have many colleges. But the College is a united body, and as such naturally chooses one field of learning in which all its members may unite. But this unity is never for intellectual ends alone. It must and always will reach the moral, the religious and the social life as well, and so the common college life becomes, in itself, the most powerful of educational College life has moulded all England's great men, and no country in the world has ever had a grander moral, religious and social development than England. And if this is true of college life at large, it is especially true of college life as applied to young women. Their nature is pre-eminently moral, religious and social, and any education which does not provide for this must be for them deficient. They must have a home in which all the elements of home life may grow to full perfection. Already one of our noble friends, the late Hart A. Massey, Esq., had anticipated this want, and in his munificent bequests made provision for a home for women students. For many years this had been in his mind, and we hope that now very shortly it may be fully realized. But for the perfection of our work our young men, as well as our young women, should be provided with the advantages of a strong, healthy, bright home life.

It will not have escaped the attention of the members of the Conference that our age is a time of great movement in which intellectual and religious, moral and social influences are powerfully reacting upon each The results are perhaps in many ways disturbing. methods of work are giving place to new. New ideas are taking the place of the old ways of thinking. There is a development of new phases, even of religious character, feeling and experience. changes cannot take place without grave anxiety on the part of men of conservative spirit. Nor can they proceed without at times undue rashness on the part of the men whose nature urges them to lead the In the past history of the world such movements have in

almost every instance sprung from the universities. Especially has this been the case where they have profoundly touched religious life. The history of Oxford and Cambridge has been the history of all the great religious movements of England. If the world is to move onward, such changes must mark its progress. And perhaps they can begin in no safer place than in the university. There, if anywhere, the watchword and goal of all work is truth. Buy the truth and sell it not. safety of the Church and the world lies in the truth. God is honored by the truth. The kingdom of Christ is the kingdom of truth. But it would be foolish, indeed, for us to dream that we have exhausted all truth. The church that studies, that searches for the very truth, that keeps herself in touch with all the world's progress in the discovery of truth, whose stability of the times and strength of salvation lies in wisdom and knowledge, will be the church of the future. Such was the spirit of our fathers in the early days of this country, and we trust that the same spirit will ever abide with their children.

4. REPORT OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF MOUNT ALLISON COLLEGE.

The Board of Regents of the University of Mount Allison College beg

leave to present the following Quadrennial Report:

The quadrennium has been marked by satisfactory expansion and invigoration in every member of the group of institutions under control of the Board, the University proper, the Ladies College and the Mount Allison Academy. The following comparative statement of the aggregate attendance during each year of the respective quadrennial periods, 1890-94 and 1894-98 is submitted:

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There is thus shown to have been an average annual increase of upwards of seventy during the last quadrennium as compared with the preceding one. The duties of the various Faculties have been performed with conspicuous fidelity and success. Continuously throughout the quadrennium, the gracious favor of Almighty God has caused the work of his servants to prosper. Apart from the liberal patronage extended to the various schools, for whose general oversight your Board is responsible, each year has brought with it proof of the kindly interest taken in their welfare by the Methodist people of the Maritime Provinces, while the generous bequest of the late Mr. Massey, of Toronto, conclusively proves that recognition of the value of their work is by no means confined to their immediate clientele.

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THE UNIVERSITY.

In the University the average attendance during the four years was 145, an increase of 27 over the previous quadrennial average.

The total number of graduates to date is as follows: in Arts, 265; in Science, 6; in Philosophy, 2; in Divinity, 9.

The Arts graduates, during the four years under review, number sixty-seven, as compared with fifty-three registered as graduates during the previous quadrennium.

The University has complete Faculties in Arts and Theology, and has such an affiliation with the Law School of Dalhousie University (Halifax, N.S.), that by virtue of work done at Mount Allison in the regular prosecution of their undergraduate course, our students can abridge the term of study at the latter institution by a whole year. During the quadrennium the Faculty of Arts has been enlarged by the appointment of Rev. R. Brecken, D.D., as Professor of Philosophy and H. A. Powell, Esq., Q.C., as Professor of the Law of Contracts; and the Faculty of Theology by the appointment of Dr. Brecken as Professor of Homiletics, and Church History.

The extension and growth of the work of the University noticed in the last preceding report has been fully maintained throughout the quadrennium just closed. Another generous gift from the Rev. Dr. Brecken places the Library clearly in the forefront of the college libraries of the Maritime Provinces. Increased facilities for practical work in the Department of Science are attracting students and encouraging the prosecution of new lines of investigation.

The residence for University students, the general structure and equipments of which were fully described in the report for 1894, has been in use during the entire quadrennium. The building has fulfilled its designed end in a most satisfactory manner, and the change, from their former restricted quarters, and somewhat inconvenient mode of living, has told beneficially on the health, comfort and morals of the students. It is but right to say that its erection and furnishing have involved the Board in heavy pecuniary obligations and have led, during the past two years, to considerable and of course regrettable deficits in the working of the University. The receipts from the Semi-Centennial Fund, appropriated to the erection of the Residence, fell far short of what was hoped and expected. The invested funds of the University are in a most satisfactory condition, its landed property is very valuable, while its debt was incurred in the erection of buildings absolutely necessary to the conduct of its work. Plans for the liquidation of the debt will, however, be formed at an early date and steps will, in the meantime, be taken to prevent the occurrence of further deficits. Among other matters of interest occurring during the quadrennium, reference may be appropriately made to

THE MARY J. BOWSER SCHOLARSHIP.

By his last will and testament the late George T. Bowser, Esq., of Sackville, bequeathed to the University several thousand dollars' worth of real estate and securities to constitute a fund, named as above, and placed

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under the control of the Faculty of the University and the Superintendent Minister of the Sackville Circuit, the income of which is to be devoted to the education of young men and women preparing for service in the foreign field as missionaries, or teachers under the auspices and direction of the Methodist Church. The property consecrated to this noble purpose was inherited by Mr. Bowser from his sister, whose name and memory are thus perpetuated, and whose wish as to its ultimate disposal has been scrupulously observed. Regulations for dispensing aid under the general conditions embodied in the will will be duly framed by the persons charged with responsibility in the matter.

The Rev. Dr. Stewart, Dean of the Faculty of Theology, presents the

following report of the

THEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

The work of the Theological Department has, during the past quadrennium, been prosecuted in circumstances of encouragement, though not without some adverse influences. Our professorial staff has been most advantageously strengthened. The munificence of a friend provided for an additional Chair, and this has been assigned to the Rev. Chas. H. Paisley, M. A., as Professor of New Testament Exegesis and Church History. In addition to this, the Rev. Ralph Brecken, D.D., has kindly undertaken the duties of the Chair in Homiletics and Church Discipline. It seems reedless to say that these esteemed brethren have brought eminent quantications of mind and heart to their respective tasks, and that we gratefully recognize a gracious Providence in rendering their services available when they were so much needed.

The number of probationers appointed by the three Maritime Conferences to attend our College during the past four years is forty-six; which, with those in our classes preparing for the work of the ministry, have given us an annual average attendance of about thirty students. Of the total number, eighteen have graduated in Arts, besides taking their work in Theology; while of non-resident students of former years, five have been pursuing, under our direction, the course of study for Bachelor of Divinity. One has completed that course and received his degree.

As in former years, the students have taken preaching appointments in Sackville and adjoining circuits as occasion offered, and their services in this respect have been acceptable and useful.

Two causes have operated prejudicially to our success during the period under review.

First, our college is not at the centre of urban population, where our students might find pecuniary help in mission work. Some who would have come to us have gone elsewhere, because inducements of this kind have attracted them.

Secondly, those who were with us have, in several instances, shortened their stay at college. At the last General Conference, it was determined that all the probationers for our ministry should spend part of their term of probation at one of our colleges. But two options were placed before them: One, the usual undergraduate course of four years, to be followed by another year devoted to purely Theological training, requiring five years of residence at college; the other, a course of two years' study at college. In the former case the period of probation would extend to eight years, in

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the latter it would be completed in five. The difference in expense, too, would be as striking as that in time, and this to men who are usually dependent upon hard-earned and very limited resources, means a great deal. The natural effect is to put a premium upon the shorter and less expensive course; and in our experience this has practically been the case. Several probationers who have come to us of recent years, and who had purposed to take the undergraduate course, on finding how matters stood, changed their purpose and chose the easier one. The difficulty of time might have been surmounted, but that of means could not. Hence, while the college has lost some of its prospectively best students, the men themselves have gone forth with a scholarship far inferior to what they might have had, and what they were sensible they ought to possess. One fact in this connection is of marked significance: That while for the last four years we have graduated annually from the ranks of our conference students at the ratio of 4.50 of the whole number, we have the prospect of graduating for the next three years only the proportion of 1.50 of that

But the effect of this arrangement, as it exists at present, upon the ministry is still more to be deprecated. Of the best-trained minds, the pulpit and the pastoral work of our Church have never had a superabundance; but at the present time we can less afford to diminish the supply than at any past time. Just now our country requires the Gospel Ministry at its very best, and it would be eminently unworthy of us, the largest Protestant Church in the Dominion of Canada, to offer the Lord Christ, for this service, anything less than our very best. More especially ought we to guard against the possibility of lowering the educational standard of the men who, at the beginning of the new century, are to be entrusted with its most solemn responsibilities. Some additional financial assistance might be provided for the men who take the course in Arts during their probation; and this itself might well constitute an additional and highly-reasonable claim for the support of the Educational Fund.

The Rev. B. C. Borden, D.D., presents the following report of the

Mount Allison Ladies' College.

This branch of the Mount Allison Institutions enters upon the forty-fifth year of its work with the prospect of increasing usefulness. The consolidation and development of its extended musical courses, the erection and occupation of the new art building with its large collection of pictures, the extensive literary courses made possible through its affiliation with the University, all contribute to give the Mount Allison Ladies' College a commanding position among the institutions of Canada devoted to female education.

The staff consists of eighteen teachers, in addition to the University professoriate, whose lectures the young ladies attend. Courses of study are provided, extending from the primary branches through the University curriculum to the degree of B.A. Special attention has been given to Elocution, Physical Culture, Shorthand, Type-writing, Book-keeping, Commercial Courses and kindred subjects of a like practical character. Funds are now being collected for the erection of a new pipe organ for the use of Conservatory students as an additional practice instrument. It

is thus hoped that the urgent demand for proficient organists will be met, and that opportunities will be provided for the same advanced courses in pipe organ work as have obtained in the teaching of piano, violin, vocal culture, harmony and theory.

The utmost care has been taken to conserve the moral and spiritual life of the school. During the quadrennium a number of the students have professed faith in Christ and connected themselves with the Church, towards which result the Y.W.C.A. of the College has largely contributed.

THE ART BUILDING,

Known as the "Owens' Museum of Fine Arts," the erection of which was foreshadowed in the last quadrennial report, was formally opened by His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick, in May, 1895. The building is 115 x 66, and is divided into galleries for the display of pictures, and work-rooms for the painting and drawing classes. These galleries, connected by archways, provide wall space more than sufficient to hang the 388 pictures recently presented to the Ladies' College by the Trustees of the Owens' Art Trust, of St. John. The light is furnished from skylights in the roof and is further modified by passing through a glass ceiling. The class rooms are provided with high side lights, with a northern exposure, thus furnishing the most favorable conditions for Art work. The building is constructed of light olive stone. The teaching staff consists of an R. C. A., of eminence, with two associates.

J. M. Palmer, Esq., A.M., presents the following report of the

MOUNT ALLISON ACADEMY.

The conditions under which Mount Allison Academy has been conducted during the quadrennium now under review have been different from those which prevailed at the time of previous reports. Prior to the fall of 1894, the students of the University came to the Academy dininghall for all their meals; but the completion of the University residence rendered this no longer necessary, and withdrew from the Academy all undergraduates of the higher institution. While this change was very advantageous in many ways to both classes of students, it very seriously affected the finances of the Academy, inasmuch as it cut off a revenue amounting on an average to \$6,400.00 a year. While the income has thus been greatly diminished, the expense has not been proportionately lessened, as the same amount has still to be paid for fuel, light, insurance, salaries, etc., and the efficiency of the school has still to be maintained and improved. It was not, therefore, expected that the Academy would, unassisted, be able for a few years to meet its expenses. During the first

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y would, the first and second year the debt was, as anticipated, increased; but we are glad to be able to report that the current account for the third year showed a small surplus, while the deficit for the year just closed was insignificant.

The Academy continues to give a good English education in the elementary branches, to prepare students for matriculation into the University and Colleges of Medicine, Law and Dentistry, and to supply a complete Business Course to those looking to mercantile pursuits. This last course was formerly emphasized; but while during the quadrennium the Commercial Department has lost none of its efficiency, special efforts have been made to direct students towards the University, with the result that a larger proportion than formerly have passed from the Academy to that higher institution.

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5. REPORT OF THE WESLEYAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE, MONTREAL, 1898.

The undersigned, on behalf of the Wesleyan Theological College

Montreal, beg leave to report:

In the educational work done by the college, through its own Staff and through its affiliation to McGill University, the following courses have been open to students: The Arts' Course (in the University), the B.D. Course, the S.T.L. Course, and the Ordinary Course for Probationers at college.

The regular staff of the college at present is: Rev. Principal Shaw, D.D., LL.D., Professor of Systematic Theology, New Testament, and Ecclesiastical Polity; Rev. Professor Antliff, M.A., D.D., Professor of Historical Theology, Apologetics, English Bible, and Homiletics; Rev. Professor Patton, B.D., Ph.D., Professor of the Old Testament; and Rev. Professor Harris, M.A., B.D., Professor of English and Church History. Outside of the regular staff, an instructor is employed in each of the following branches: Latin, French, Elocution, and Vocal Music.

The total number of students for the quadrennium has been 259, an average of 65 per session. Of the total number, $11\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. have taken the Arts Course; 34 per cent. the B.D. Course (of those studying in the B.D. Course, 25 per cent. have been graduates in Arts, the remainder graduates in the S.T.L. Course); 27 per cent. have taken the S.T.L. Course; and $27\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. the Ordinary Course for Probationers at The number of candidates to whom degrees have been granted during the past four years has been 60, classified as follows: D.D. (Honoris Causa), 6; B.D., 21; S.T.L., 27; Graduates in Arts of McGill University, 6.

The financial condition of the Institution, while not as encouraging as we desire, is fairly satisfactory. The present endowment, on a most conservative estimate, is \$65,635.97, which is \$2,400 less than was reported in 1894. As a sum of \$6,000.00 which was then counted as a productive asset has had to be written off within the past year and other assets have seriously depreciated, it will be seen that the Endowment Fund has, nevertheless, received some additional support during the quadrennium. The real estate and equipment of the college, together with the endowment, make the total assets \$130,000.00, against which is

The cost of conducting the educational work of the college is over \$8,000.00 per year (last year \$8,400.00); and, as the income in each year of the closing quadrennium has been somewhat less than the expenditure for educational purposes, a debt has been created to the extent above specified. The Boarding Department has been self-supporting.

We are hoping for the augmentation of our endowment. We urgently need it to meet our present requirements, and to advance with the advancing demands of the Church. Though the college has other wants, an increase of endowment is our greatest need at present.

6. REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF WESLEY COLLEGE, WINNIPEG.

The Board of Directors of Wesley College are pleased to be once more able to report to the General Conference of the Methodist Church the close of another quadrennium of marked prosperity. This gratifying announcement is due to the largely increased facilities for carrying on the work of the college afforded by the new building; and, also, in a very great measure, to the continued loyalty and liberality of the friends of the college in the Province of Manitoba, North-West Territories and elsewhere.

The average yearly attendance for the period covered by our last report was 60, that for the period covered by the present report is 119, showing that during the quadrennium just closed the attendance per year has practically doubled. When our last report was submitted the number of our graduates was 28; at present the number is 74—an increase in the last four years of 46. At present 27 graduates from Wesley College and a large number of others who have taken part of the Arts Course there are actively engaged in the work of the Methodist ministry, having taken their theological course in the college. One of these, Rev. James Endicott, is a missionary in China, sent out and supported by the Wesley College Students' Missionary Society. Another, Rev. A. E. Hetherington, has just gone as a missionary to the Klondike. Our staff of instructors now number six regular professors, in addition to which are lecturers and tutors. They have been very heavily taxed to accomplish all the work that is required to be done in instructing the students in their Theological Course and preparing the Art students for their respective examination in the Manitoba University, with which the College is

Such, however, has been the zeal of our professors, and so heartily have our students and tutors co-operated with them in their efforts, that

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heartily rts, that at the University examinations, in which students from all the affiliated colleges compete, we have the great satisfaction of knowing that our students have carried off more than their relative numerical share of University honors.

The following is an extract from the Tenth Annual Report of the

College of the Manitoba and North-West Conferences.

Seventy-five students presented themselves at the recent University examinations. Nine received the degree of B.A. Four medals fell to the lot of Wesley College students.

The amount of scholarships open for competition to the students of the four affiliated Arts Colleges and the two Collegiate Institutes was \$2,160.00, exclusive of \$300.00 competed for solely by students of St. Boniface College. Of this amount (\$2,160.00) students of Wesley College won scholarships amounting to \$1,067.50.

The arrangement entered into by the three affiliated colleges for combined Science teaching, of which mention was made in our last report, still continues in operation. The expense, however, of maintaining Science teaching has hitherto been borne almost wholly by the several colleges; but it is now confidently expected that in the near future the Provincial Government will assume the entire expense of equipping this entire department and of maintaining the teaching therein. This will be a great relief to the affiliated colleges, and will enable them to provide more efficiently for the other departments of college work.

The generosity of those friends who have so munificently assisted in furnishing the library, reading-room, waiting rooms, and gymnasium of

the college, calls for special and grateful mention.

The spiritual life of our College is vigorous. Among our students are to be found many noble instances of sincere piety associated with the highest intellectual gifts. The College Y.M.C.A., and Y.W.C.A. are full of spiritual energy and are exerting a great influence for good over the lives and character of a large number of our students. These and other college organizations supplement the other aims of our college work, and united efforts in all these directions tend to accomplish the great and central aim of the Church in the establishment of such an institution as. Wesley—that is to combine solid mental attainments and mental power with sound religious and moral convictions, and the upbuilding of a true-type of Christian character.

Appended is a statement of the Building Fund account, also the financial statement of the Sustentation or Current account during the four

years just passed, which shows an unbroken record of no debt on such account, at the termination of any of these years. This, notwithstanding the fact that the College is not yet the actual recipient of a dollar of endowment.

The reason for such a record may be found in the Minutes of the Manitoba and North-West Conferences, which give the subscription lists of the college contributors, and is convincing evidence of the loyalty of the people to the institution and their remarkable generosity. We cannot close this report without referring to and expressing our gratitude in respect of the munificent bequest of the late Mr. Massey. Nor can we omit reference to the untiring zeal of our Principal, Rev. Dr. Sparling, in his effort to keep the college self-respecting by keeping its current obligation paid.

7. ALBERT COLLEGE, BELLEVILLE, ONTARIO—QUADREN-NIAL REPORT.

This institution, under the blessing of God, has enjoyed continued prosperity during the quadrennium. A total of 808 students have been enrolled—males 456, females 352:—

The federation of Victoria College with the Provincial University, and the change in the requirement of candidates for the ministry to Junior Matriculation or college equivalent, have very considerably effected the work at this institution; but we are very thankful to be able to say that the institution has met these new conditions successfully.

For some years subsequent to the affiliation of Albert and Victoria Universities, a special examination for both Junior and Senior Matriculation was held at Albert College. In place of this examination, the Senate of Toronto University conducts at Albert College, and at other centres if desired, a June Senior Matriculation, covering both pass and honor work and equivalent to the first year's work in Arts. The institution has prepared for this examination annually from five to eleven persons, with great success, who have continued their work at Victoria University with great credit both to Albert College and to the University.

During the quadrennium a decided advance has been made in the preparation of candidates for teachers' certificates. The success attending the literary work of the college, in the highest grades of collegiate work, has been of a phenomenal character. In 1897, of five Senior Matriculants,

A great many young men attend Albert College in preparation for the Methodist ministry.

The requirement of Junior Matriculation or college equivalent for candidates for the ministry, has had a marked change in producing a better class of candidates, having better literary qualifications, and in every way more desirable.

The special Departments—Music, Fine Arts, Elocution and Commercial Science, have been well maintained. All, especially the Department of Music, have increased in attendance and efficiency.

The young men and young ladies have been most active and energetic in all religious work, both in the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A., as also the Missionary Societies. They have raised several hundred dollars in their Missionary Societies and have during the quadrennium sent out and maintained Rev. F. J. Livingstone, M.D., as a missionary in Africa, at an expense of \$1,200.00, besides having missionaries at smaller outlay in other fields of work.

Regular courses of study in missionary subjects are maintained, both among the young men and young ladies throughout the entire college year, and the students leave the college thoroughly imbued with missionary zeal and ready to become intelligent helpers of our ministers in all missionary work.

The Missionary Societies are now in affiliation with the General Missionary Society of our Church.

The college buildings have been greatly enlarged and improved during the quadrennium. Massey Hall, costing \$26,000.00, has been erected and is devoted largely to auditorium and class rooms; also a thoroughly equipped Gymnasium has been built, costing \$4,500.00.

The college property has throughout undergone great change and improvement and is now heated by steam and contains modern baths and complete sanitary apparatus.

The Board of Management is profoundly grateful to God for the success attending this School during the quadrennium.

The hope expressed in the report of 1894, that the relief agency would speedily reduce the debt, has not been realized, for two reasons: (1) The money collected was only sufficient to pay cost of agency and balance of interest on debt, and; (2), when the London Conference had been canvassed no response could be secured elsewhere, and the agency was discontinued.

The preceding statements show that receipts for the past year from the school were about \$700.00 less than those of the former year and the disbursements nearly \$5,000.00 less, yet the profits of the school failed to pay the interest by about \$1,000, and this amount has been a charge on the Relief Fund.

It is evident that this state of things cannot continue without greatest danger to the present status of the college as the property of the Church, and that at a time when schools founded on benevolence and officered by the religious orders are educating hundreds of girls and young women at rates a debt-burdened college cannot meet, and in surroundings not helpful to the evangelical faith in which they have been reared. To safeguard the interests involved requires at least the removal of the debt, and to fully meet the case an endowment is necessary.

The educational work undertaken by the college provides diploma courses in the University Junior and Senior Matriculations, Music (piano, voice, pipe-organ or violin), Fine Arts, Elocution, Business and Domestic Science; and, in addition, provides for extended studies in Bible work and Christian evidences.

During the quadrennium the college has received from the late Dr. Carman M. Gould, of Colborne, a cash bequest of \$400.00 and provision for a \$12.00 proficiency prize annually, and from Miss R. A. Wass, of

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Oakville, cash gifts of \$305.00 in all. The will of the late Hart A. Massey, of Toronto, also contains a bequest to the College of the sum of \$10,000.00.

Death has removed three members from among the appointments to the College Board made by the last General Conference, namely, Revs. J. W. Annis, M.A., James Van Wyck, B.A., and J. H. Kennedy. One member, Mr. W. H. Wartman, London, has resigned. Two of these vacancies have been filled by the appointment of Rev. Dr. A. L. Gee, of Hamilton, and Mr. Joseph Griffin, St. Thomas.

In the four years the Board of Management has held six meetings, with an average attendance of fourteen members, and the Executive fifty seven meetings, with an average attendance of eight; and with a total expense for all of \$224.00.

At the close of the college year 1896-97 Rev. Dr. Austin, who had held the Principalship for sixteen years, resigned, and Rev. Prof. Warner, M.A., was elected to the vacancy.

During the college year just closed a movement was started by the leading business men of St. Thomas to pay off the floating debt of the college, amounting in round numbers to \$15,000.00. This amount has been secured in subscriptions and pledges as follows: \$10,000 by citizens of St. Thomas, \$2,030.00 within the Hamilton Conference, and \$3,000.00 within the London Conference. These, when realized, will relieve members of the Board of the embarrassment of having to carry on their personal notes \$12,000.00 of the debt.

In view of the hindrances and dangers arising from the college debt and of the necessity for extending the sphere of usefulness for the College, at the same time remembering that the people have given in trust to the Church \$65,000.00 in cash to establish the college as the property of the Church, and also considering the thousands of students and hundreds of graduates who call the college Alma Mater, your Board would venture most respectfully to urge that the matters affecting Alma College are worthy most serious attention and most generous treatment by the General Conference.

9. REPORT OF THE COLUMBIAN METHODIST COLLEGE, NEW WESTMINSTER, B.C.

Fathers and Brethren,—We are pleased to present you a report of our college and the work we are trying to do. While we are much less in proportion than the older institutions of the East, we believe we are as certainly called of Providence to fill a place in the educational interests of our Church in this Western land. Our work includes the preparation of students for all grades of Teachers' Certificates in Commercial branches, Theology, Music and Arts, Mining and Assaying, and the first two years of the Arts Course as laid down in the Victoria Calender. We would

give special prominence to the fact that ours is the only Protestant institution in this province where a home and educational advantages can be secured to our young men and women; and, consequently, we feel we have a rightful claim upon the sympathy and patronage of our friends. Having travelled over a good portion of the Province we are able to say, with a degree of assurance, that there is a growing need for a college such as ours in this part of the Dominion. The resources, mineral, agricultural and otherwise, are almost unlimited; but the present is one of outlay and expenditure for developing purposes rather than of returns. Many young people would like to avail themselves of the opportunity of attending college, but the returns from mining interests are, though reasonably certain, still in the future. While we have many needs in the way of library and other equipment, we feel our financial requirements to be the most pressing. We need not refer to the generous aid afforded us by Mr. C. D. Massey, Toronto, whose opportune assistance, we believe, was very largely instrumental in saving our institution at a most critical time. Our estimated expenditure, income, etc., for the present year, as well as our plan for raising the needful funds, will be before you in the published minutes. You will find our expenses for the year to exceed our anticipated income by about \$2,000; and, in addition to this, a note of \$2,000 is to be met. Our plan for meeting this demand is as follows: Eighty persons to give \$50 each during the year, to every contributor of this amount being given the privilege of sending a student to the College for one year free of tuition fees in the Collegiate course of study. By this means and by discounts we have reached \$2,500, and will still need \$1,500, or thirty subscribers of the above amount of \$50, to meet our requirements. We are glad to say that after a tour of the Province we are more than surprised at the generosity of our ministers, many of whom, with salaries that would equal about \$600 in Ontario, giving \$50 to the college. They have done their utmost and have shown a self-sacrifice for education and Methodism that is heroic. Had they the wealth we should not lack for funds; but, as it is, there is need for \$1,500 which at present we cannot obtain in our constituency. We are doing the best we can, but need encouraging assistance. Last year our students enrolled numbered forty-two, of whom ten were in our Boarding Department. We have reasonable expectations of double the number of boarders and as many, or more, day students. Although our student body was small and few were preparing for examinations we met with gratifying success, and have established considerable confidence in the minds of the people. The institution is young and in a young country, and should not be compared with those of more advanced provinces. We feel assured that a crowning success will be ours for education and the Church in this county, if we can be assisted for a few years. While we expect you to remember those institutions of our Church that are doing greater and grander work, we trust we may have a place in your regard and a share of your patronage. We dare not, we cannot, retreat. In the name of our God we have set up our banner and are determined to push on to victory. Though the odds seem at times against us, we are assured by faith that the "best of all is God is with us."

10. QUADRENNIAL REPORT OF THE METHODIST COLLEGE ST. JOHN'S, NEWFOUNDLAND.

The record of the past four years has been one of steady advance in educational work. This is quite apparent from the results of C. of H. E. examinations, tabulated as follows:

This year the number sitting for examinations were: Associate, 9; Senior, 53; Junior, 78; London Matriculation, 5. The results of these examinations are not yet known.

The attendance each term during the past year was about 380 pupils,

with a staff of thirteen teachers.

Very complete sets of minerals are now in the possession of the college, obtained partly by purchase in England and partly by gift of Mr. Justice Morison. Practical mineralogy will form one of the subjects for examination next year, and all Senior boys will take it.

The Home is in a very satisfactory condition under the careful manage-

ment of Rev. M. Fenwick, assisted by Mrs. Fenwick.

He reports in residence during the past year 51 boarders, viz., 1 lady teacher, 17 pupil teachers, 9 ministers' children and 24 other boarders.

The income of the Home for the year amounts to about \$6,500, and expenditure to \$5,400; balance, \$1,100. Of this sum \$400 goes for furnishing and \$500 to the Treasurer for interest, insurance, etc.

The Treasurer's financial statement of our whole indebtedness to June 30th, is as follows:

This indebtedness will, we anticipate, be reduced by \$500 voted by the Ladies' College Society, and \$500 from the surplus earnings of the Home.

The growing importance of the college, as an educational institution, to the interests of Methodism in Newfoundland, must be apparent to every member of this Conference, and we anticipate in hope and faith that the record of the college during the coming quadrennium will be one of increasing success and efficiency.

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11. REPORT OF THE ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE, WHITBY, ONTARIO.

The Directors of the College take pleasure in presenting this their quadrennial report.

It is with feelings of profound gratitude to Almighty God that the Directors are able to report that the past quadrennium has been a period of continued and increasing prosperity, the enrolment of students, the income of the college and the value of the educational work accomplished having steadily increased during that period.

For many years it has been the aim of the Directors to provide the highest educational facilities and the most culturing and confortable surroundings for the college students. They recognized the fact that the steadily increasing attendance, the want of sufficient accommodation and equipment, and the advance made by the college to the foremost rank amongst the ladies' colleges in the country, rendered it imperative, if the college were to maintain its splendid position, that a comprehensive plan of enlargement should be undertaken. The financial aid furnished by the friends of the college, and especially the munificence of the late Mr. Hart A. Massey, of Toronto, whose interest in Christian education has been so generously exhibited by him, have enabled the Directors to realize their ideal in buildings and equipment. During the past quadrennium they have, at an expense of upwards of \$40,000, erected two large wings of three stories, containing concert hall, science hall, dining hall, besides new kitchen, offices and a large number of first-class rooms for students in residence. The whole building has been fitted up with complete steam heating, electric lighting and the best modern sanitary equipment, and no expense has been spared to secure ample provision for the home comforts and the health of the pupils. This important addition to Trafalgar Castle, with its massive walls, turreted towers, spacious halls, magnificent drawing-rooms, elegant stained-glass windows, combined with the former edition known as Ryerson Hall, now render the college buildings the most perfect, the best equipped, and the best adapted to their educational purposes of any in the country.

The directors are deeply grateful to the friends of higher education who have aided them in their scheme of extension and improvement. It should be, and undoubtedly is, a source of pride and pleasure to the Methodist Church to have under its control such a grand college property, with its ever-increasing possibilities for good.

It is gratifying to the Directors to state that the literary advantages afforded by the college are keeping pace with the exacting demands of the age. During the past quadrennium students have been prepared for Third, Second, First-class C and B Certificates, Junior and Senior University Matriculation, and the first and second years in Toronto University. The fact that the college is the only one in Ontario that has prepared pupils for the latter examinations needs no further comment.

The Musical Department is known as the Ontario Conservatory of Music, and the course in Piano, Pipe Organ, Violin, Guitar, Voice Culture and Theory is as thorough as that of the leading conservatories. The recent addition of a magnificent two-manual pipe organ and concert

The departments of Fine Art, Elocution, Commercial branches and

Domestic Science are similarly efficient and successful.

The Board of Directors is composed of twenty-one members, of whom seven must be ministers of the Methodist Church, appointed by this Conference, and the Directors take the liberty of nominating the following, and respectfully requesting their appointment, namely: Rev. E. H. Dewart, D.D., Rev. John Potts, D.D., Rev. William Briggs, D.D., Rev. John F. German, D.D., Rev. James Henderson, D.D., Rev. Isaac Tovell, D.D., and Rev. J. J. Hare, Ph.D.

Thanking you, the members of this Conference, for your support in the past, and trusting that the standing of the college amongst the educational institutions of this country may make it a pleasure for you to recommend it, they promise to do all in their power to merit your

continued confidence.

12. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

1. We recommend that the report of the Educational Society for the past qua irennium be adopted and published in the printed JOURNAL, also the reports of the following Institutions:—Victoria University, University of Mount Allison, Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal; Wesley College, Winnipeg; Albert College, Alma College, Columbian College, New Westminster, B.C.; St. John's College, Newfoundland; and Ontario Ladies' College, and in the case of the last that the parties therein named be appointed Trustees.

2. That the following be the Rules and By-Laws of Wesley College,

Winnipeg:

The Directors of Wesley College shall have power to establish and regulate a Faculty in Arts and a Faculty in Theology; to appoint on such Faculties, respectively, professors, lecturers and teachers; and to appoint a Principal, a Bursar and a Registrar of such college, and such other officers as the Directors may think proper; to fix and define the duties, salaries, term of service of the said professors, lecturers, teachers, principal, bursar, registrar and other officers; and to suspend or dismiss them.

The college shall have the power of granting, in any such manner as it may determine, the degrees of Bachelor of Divinity and Doctor of

Divinity.

Item 3. Erased.

4. That hereafter remittances of circuit returns for the Educational Fund, when received by a Conference Treasurer, shall be forwarded to the General Treasurers, who shall make provision for loans and fees in the

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several Conferences as required, and that the constitution of the fund be amended to agree with said recommendation.

5. That one fourth the gross income of the society be apportioned to students for loans and fees, together with all refunds of loans, the cost of

management being charged to the remaining three-fourths.

6. That to all students paying their notes before maturity, either in whole or in part, a discount be made of 5 per cent. per annum on unexpired term of loan.

7. That the preferential clause in Par. 281.(1), in favour of the students of the Manitoba and North-West Conference be eliminated.

8. That the following memorials be not entertained:

(1) From the Montreal Conference asking that Principals of our Connexional Colleges and Professors of our Theological Faculties be appointed by the General Conference.

(2) From the Manitoba and North-West Conference, asking that a portion of the Board of Trustees of Wesley College be appointed by said

(3) From the Montreal Conference, asking that the Wesleyan College,

Stanstead, be recognized as a Connexional College.

9. That the St. John's Wesleyan College, Newfoundland, be recognized as a Connexional Institution, on condition that its charter be so changed as to provide for the election of the Governing Board by the General Conference; and, as in the case of other Connexional Institutions, it be under the control of the General Conference.

10. That the charter of the Columbian College be so changed that, as in the case of the other Connexional Institutions, its Governing Board shall be appointed by the General Conference, and it shall be under the

control of the General Conference.

11. That the memorial of the Laymen's Association of the Montreal Conference, That the Educational Fund be reserved for Theological Students and Theological Faculties, be not entertained.

12. That Par. $28\overline{2}$ (1) be changed by substituting the word "shall" for "may" in the third line from the close, and adding to the Par.: "Nevertheless, should there appear sufficient reason for doing so a student may be permitted to attend some other of our Connexional Institutions."

13. That in Par. 115. (11) under (a) we erase "and are sent to college," and add after clause (e), clause (f). "Who are recommended to be sent to college? The names of these shall be referred to the Educational Committee for consideration"; and in Par. 146, (8) (a) the words "attending College" be inserted; and that to Par. 140. (7) there be added, "The names of the colleges to which probationers are sent shall appear with their names in the respective districts in the final draft of stations."

14. That to Par. 140, (7) as above amended there be added, "All probationers in the General Course who have travelled three years and all graduates who have travelled two years are required to attend college for

the prescribed term."

15. That the opening words p. 149. (8) be changed to read, "No probationer appointed to a college."

16. That in Par. 149. (14) the words be omitted, "Within ten years

after his reception on trial."

17. That Par, 283. (1) be eliminated as redundant under existing Provisions of the Discipline.

18. That the opening words of Par. 283.(2) be changed to read, "Before the first of November in each year the Conference Treasurer shall ascertain the names of probationers in actual attendance at college, and shall forward," etc.; and omit the words, "and amount of said aid."

19. That the report of Alma College as to attendance and cost of meetings of College Board, the only report of the kind submitted, be filed.

20. Laid on the table.

21. That in view of the special difficulties in connection with the Columbian College, and more particularly of the recent sad calamity of fire which has befallen the city of New Westminster, all loans and fees for probationers of the British Columbia Conference during the ensuing quadrennium be charged upon the Equalization Fund; and that all the revenue of the Educational Fund for this quadrennium from the said Conference shall be paid to the Columbian College in addition to the grant it receives by scale.

22. That the annexed nominations of governing bodies of our Educa-

tional Institutions be adopted and confirmed.

V.-COURSE OF STUDY.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE COURSE OF STUDY.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

1. With regard to the memorial respecting the matriculation examination held at Albert College for the convenience of candidates for the ministry, we recommend that no action be taken, the memorial having been presented under a misapprehension of the facts of the case.

2. A memorial having been presented asking that a course of study for local preachers be adopted, we recommend that to Section 188, page 105, there be added a new Sub-section 9, as follows: "Any local preacher may be admitted to the examination on the Theological subjects of the Conference preliminary examination, and to the examination on all the subjects of the ordinary course of study for probationers for the ministry for the three years on circuit, Greek being optional; that on the completion of the course, a certificate to that effect be granted; and that should such local preacher become a probationer for the ministry, such examinations shall be credited to him on the course for probationers on circuit."

3. Having carefully considered certain memorials in favor of committing the whole examination of candidates for the ministry to a Central Board of Examiners, we recommend that no action be taken.

4. In response to several memorials concerning the recognition of foreign academical titles in Conference records, we recommend as follows: That in the place of Section 148, Sub-section 3, p. 76, the following be inserted, viz.: "Only British and Canadian Academical titles shall be recognized in the records of the Church, and foreign degrees which, in the opinion of any of our colleges, entitle the holder to admission ad eundem gradum. Such resolution, if adopted by the General Conference, shall not be retroactive. The Secretary of each Conference Examining Board shall report to the Secretary of the Annual Conference the titles thus authenticated."

5. In regard to a memorial seeking the exemption of graduates in Arts from the obligation to attend a theological college for at least one year for work exclusively theological, we recommend no action in this 6. We recommend that the regulations respecting candidates for the ministry and probationers be codified, and placed in two sections under Chapter II. of the Discipline.

7. We recommend that Section 148 re Conference Board of Examiners be transferred to the section on Annual Conferences, and follow Section

136.

8. We recommend to amend Section 146, Sub-section 5, p. 70, by striking out the words "shall be as follows," and substituting therefor the words, "shall not be less than as follows."

9. We recommend to amend Section 146, Sub-section 5, (a) (b), p. 70, by striking out the word "ordination," and substituting therefor the

words "reception into full connection."

10. We recommend to amend Section 146, Sub-section 2, p. 68, by inserting after the words "District Meeting," the words "apart from text-books required in his course of study."

11. We recommend the addition to Section 149, Sub-section 5, p. 78, the words, "All probationers at college are expected to attend the College

District Meeting."

12. A memorial having been presented concerning the form of Probationers' Certificates, we recommend the General Conference to appoint the following a Committee to prepare forms of certificates for the Course of Study, viz.: Rev. Dr. Shaw, Rev. Dr. Ross, Rev. Dr. Stewart, Rev. Dr. Wallace, and Rev. F. B. Stacey, B.A., with power to act, and that the above-named memorial be referred to this Committee.

13. We recommend that in Section 148, Sub-section 1, p. 76, after the word "probationers" (fourth line from the bottom), there be inserted the words, "on forms prepared by order of the General Conference;" and that in Section 148, Sub-section 6, p. 77, the words down to "whole course of the year" be erased, and that after the words "in each subject,"

the words be inserted, "to each candidate or probationer."

14. We recommend to add to Section 149, Sub-section 4, the following That in the case of probationers the Secretary of the Faculty send a certificate of standing of each student at college to the Secretary of the

Examining Board of the Conference concerned.

15. With reference to a memorial in behalf of better training of probationers for Sunday-School work, we recommend as follows: That while we are in full sympathy with the object in view, we do not see how we can add to the work already prescribed in this department without unduly burdening our probationers.

16. We recommend that in Section 147, Sub-section 2, p. 73, the clause, "a non-matriculant . . . be met" be expunged; and that in Section 148, Sub-section 5, p. 76, after the words, "one of our own colleges," the following be added, "provided that a matriculant who has not taken Greek at matriculation must pass on that subject in his Conference preliminary examination;" and that in last clause of the same paragraph and sub-section the word "moreover" be substituted for the word "however."

17. We recommend that for the last clause of Section 148, Sub-section 7, p. 77, the following be substituted, "also a standing of fifty per cent. shall be required in order to pass in each subject of the subsequent course

for probationers on circuit."

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18. We recommend that Section 149, Sub-section 9, p. 79, be so amended that instead of the words "Steven's History of Methodism, Steele's Antinemianism," be substituted the following: "The History of Methodism, Fletcher's Check V. (on Christian Perfection) and Steele's

Item No. 19 erased.

20. Having considered several memorials on the Course of Study and having carefully revised all the items of the course, we recommend the following curricula for the ensuing quadrennium in the Ordinary Course and the Course for Graduates. The said curricula to come into effect after the Annual Conferences of 1899.

VI-SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND EPWORTH LEAGUES.

1. THE QUADRENNIAL REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL AND EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK.

It is gratifying to note that considerable advance has been made in the

Sunday School work during the past four years.

The number of schools in 1894 was 3,251; in 1898, 3,387; increase, 136. Number of teachers in 1894, 30,807; in 1898, 33,018; increase, 2,211. Number of scholars in 1894, 252,546; in 1898, 270,239; an increase of 17,783.

Notwithstanding all the adverse criticism that has recently been directed against the Sunday School, there is reason to believe that never before has so much attention been paid to this department of the Church. Its importance is being realised more and more, and in its ranks many of the most intelligent and consecrated people of the Church are earnestly working, and yet we are far from reaching the ideal. There are connected with the Methodist Church in Canada 900,000 members and adherents. As only 270,239 of these are in our schools, how to reach the other 630,000 is one of the momentous problems which the Church should solve. The Sunday School for every Methodist, and every Methodist in some of the departments of the school, should be the Church's motto for the coming century.

TEMPERANCE.

It is to be regretted that the reports for 1898 show a decrease of 22,930 in the number of scholars who have taken the total abstinence pledge. There is, however, a considerable difference of opinion as to the meaning of the words at the head of the column of schedule, "Number who have taken total abstinence pledge." Some interpret this as meaning the total number of scholars in the school who have at any time taken the pledge; while others consider that it is intended to cover only those who have signed the pledge during the year. It is evident, therefore, that the figures are totally unreliable as affording any information as to the amount of temperance work that is being done. It would, in the opinion of many, be better if the schedule could be changed to read-"Number of pledged abstainers in the school." There can be no more fruitful field for temperance work than among the young. We would urge that every possible means be used to instil the principles of temperance into the minds of our boys and girls and to induce them to become pledged total abstainers.

Missions.

The amount contributed for missions by our schools during the past four years is \$83,781.68, being a decrease of \$14,970.60 when compared with the previous four years. It is possible that the unusual activity

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displayed in missionary work by our Leagues during the past few years may have interfered to some extent with the collecting usually done by the juveniles, but there is really no necessity for this. Each department have a constituency of its own.

The Missionary report shows that in many places nothing whatever is contributed by the Sunday Schools. We would strongly urge superintendents to emphasize the importance of our missionary work, to frequently hold missionary services, and arrange for some systematic method of missionary giving. We recommend that at least one collection per month for missions be taken up in all our schools, in those months in which other Connexional collections are not taken.

HOME DEPARTMENT.

One of the most gratifying features of our Sunday School work during the past quadrennium has been the growth of the Home Department, which now has 7,151 members, as compared with none in 1894. The following figures show the rapid growth of the Home Department:

In 1895 there were 1,856 members. In 1896 there were 3,419 members. In 1897 there were 5,435 members. In 1898 there were 7,151 members.

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This department is intended to interest, in the study of the Sunday school lessons, parents, invalids, travellers and others who, from various causes, are unable to attend the regular sessions of the school. Their names are recorded on the register, they contribute to the collections, receive the lesson helps, and in every respect are regarded as members of the school. So far from decreasing actual attendance at the school sessions the Home Department has tended to increase it. Many of its members have, by the home study of the Word, become so interested in the lessons that they have joined the Bible classes and are now found regularly in attendance. This Sunday School extension movement has created very great and even enthusiastic interest wherever it has been introduced, but there is room for still larger expansion. No school should be considered as fully equipped without a Home Class. It is a grand missionary agency for visiting the neglected, remembering the forgotten, and succouring and saving those that are lost.

While recognizing the great value of the work performed by the Sunday School, the Epworth League and various Church organizations, having as their object the teaching of the children of our homes a knowledge of the sacred Word and arousing in them an interest in the Church and her work, we believe there is a danger (perhaps an unconscious one) that parents, partly through pressure upon their time, which gives them so little leisure with their families, and partly through thoughtlessness, are passing over to the Sunday School and other organizations the responsibility of caring for their children in spiritual matters. The stirring words of the great Law-giver of Israel still hold true, "And these words which I command thee this day, shall be in thine heart; and thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up."

The home, not the Sunday school or Epworth League, should primarily be the centre for the training of our children in the knowledge of God's Word. We respectfully urge upon our pastors the importance of pressing upon the attention of parents, at regular intervals, the necessity of systematic study of God's Word in the home, and would recommend the use of the daily readings on the Sunday School lessons as provided by the International Bible Reading Association.

INTERNATIONAL LESSONS.

The International Series of Lessons are being used almost universally in our schools, and are more popular than ever. The following resolution was recently unanimously adopted by the General Board in relation thereto:

Resolved "That the Board desires to reiterate its devotion to the International Series of Lessons for the Sunday Schools. Few things have so drawn the Evangelical Churches together as the fact that in the Old World and the New many millions of scholars and teachers, Sunday after Sunday, for year after year, study the same portions of the Word of God. We earnestly deprecate any attempt to so modify the uniform system as to interfere with the plan of one lesson for the whole school and for all the schools."

PERIODICALS.

Our splendid Sunday School periodicals continue to enjoy a large circulation. Under the able management of Dr. Withrow they have reached a high standard of excellence, having been increased in number, enlarged in size, and improved in quality.

The following statement shows the circulation and increase in our

papers for the past four years:

The smaller papers also report a substantial increase. The new papers, Dew Drops and Lesson Quarterly, have been most favorably received.

The entire circulation of our periodicals is about one and one-half for every scholar in the school, a ratio which is perhaps unsurpassed in any other Church. We are sorry to note that a large number of papers and periodicals not published by our Book Room are still taken by many of the schools in place of our own. When our publications are so good and so cheap there is no necessity to go elsewhere for Sunday School supplies.

SUNDAY SCHOOL AID FUND.

This fund was established about twenty-three years ago, for the purpose of assisting poor schools in remote and destitute neighborhoods to secure papers and periodicals with which to carry on their work.

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the ds to In some places the population is so scattered and the people so poor that it would be an impossibility to keep up a Sunday School without some such help as this.

The principle of self-help is adopted to as great an extent as possible, and schools receiving aid are expected to contribute one half of the amount of the grant. In this way the schools assisted have contributed during the past four years the sum of \$10,655.66.

In the case of entirely new schools in needy localities an entirely free grant is frequently made for the purpose of giving the workers a fair start.

The collections for this fund should be taken up annually in all our schools. The following is a statement of receipts from this source for the quadrennium:

The largest sum collected in any one year during the entire existence of the fund was in 1896. Four years ago a debt of \$2,758.11 existed. By careful management this has been entirely wiped out. While the income from these collections has been very satisfactory, it might and ought to be made considerably larger. There is reason to believe that in some schools the collection is never taken up, but a small amount is appropriated from the regular funds. Wherever the object of the fund is explained and an appeal made, there is sure to be a liberal response. We trust that the collection will be properly attended to in every school. This fund is greatly indebted to Mr. Warring Kennedy, who, for over twenty years, has acted as General Treasurer. The business-like manner in which he has prepared the annual statements and the interest he has manifested in the welfare of the fund, have been of the greatest value. We trust that the collections in the Sunday Schools for our other Connexional funds will not be forgotten.

THE CATECHISM.

We would call attention to the new Catechism which has been specially prepared for use in our schools. The returns show that 27,504 of our scholars are learning the catechism, which is altogether too small a percentage. It is important that our young people be well grounded in the doctrines of their Church, and no other means are so likely to accomplish this end as a systematic study of the Catechism.

The Committee appointed by the last General Conference have spent much time and care in the preparation of this new book, and it is expected it will be introduced into all our schools, memorized, and carefully studied every Sabbath.

TRAINED WORKERS.

One of the greatest needs of our Sunday School work is trained teachers and officers. While teachers in the day schools are required to undergo a

special and thorough preparation for their duties, Sunday School teachers are in most cases placed in charge of classes without the slightest prepara-

tion. This ought not so to be.

Pastors and superintendents are strongly urged to conduct Normal classes wherever practicable. There should at least be a regular weekly meeting of teachers for the study of the lesson. It is most astonishing that out of 3,387 schools only 296 have such a meeting. Many of the difficulties which seem to stand in the way are imaginary, and the real obstacles might be removed by earnest effort.

The work of a Sunday School teacher is so important that every possible means should be used to reach the highest possible standard of efficiency. We have our fears that the Lesson Helps in the International Series may lead our teachers to think that the weekly meeting for the study is not a prime necessity, and so result, too often, in mere routine and superficial instruction. The Board would urge upon pastors and superintendents to use their best efforts to correct this evident evil.

THE EPWORTH LEAGUE.

The Epworth League is the youngest child of the Church. Although only nine years old it has certainly justified its right to exist by the ever-expanding, practical, and useful work which it has accomplished. During its brief existence it may not have realized the expectations of the Church in every particular, yet, to a very large extent, it has done so, and in some respects the most sanguine prophecies have been more than fulfilled. Every department of the Church has felt the quickening influence of this new movement among the young hosts of God's Israel.

MEMBERSHIP.

The increase in membership has been steady and constant, until we now have 658 Epworth Leagues, and 869 Epworth Leagues of Christian Endeavor, besides a number of affiliated and unaffiliated societies. The returns for 1898 show a total number of 1,947 Young People's Societies, with a membership of 81,935, as compared with 1,032 societies, and 47,175 members in 1894, showing the very satisfactory increase of 915 societies and 34,760 members during the past four years. It is gratifying to note that the active membership is nearly double that of the associate. The legislation of the last General Conference has been loyally accepted by our young people, and nearly all our societies are now either Epworth Leagues or Epworth Leagues of Christian Endeavor. During the quadrennium there has been an increase of 438 Epworth Leagues and 57 Epworth Leagues of Christian Endeavor.

The privilege of affiliation with the Christian Endeavor Society has been taken advantage of by more than half of our societies, the members of which meet with the young people of other Churches in interdenomina-

tional gatherings.

An increasingly strong feeling of denominational loyalty has been developed during the past quadrennium, and it has come to be better understood than ever before that the League is not in any sense a separate affair or a concern run in connection with the Church, but is an integral part of the Church, under its fostering care, and subject to its authority.

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It has also been demonstrated that the broadest spirit of interdenominational fellowship is in entire harmony with the strongest denominational loyalty. Commencing with January, 1899, we shall have a practical illustration of unity of purpose, as the Epworth Leagues, Christian Endeavor societies, Baptist Young People's Union, will all begin to use the same prayer-meeting topics prepared by a Joint Committee.

ORGANIZATION.

During the past four years our young people's work has been organized upon Church lines, with the best of results. Of the Conferences, the following have organized Conference Leagues and held conventions-British Columbia, London, Toronto, Montreal, Hamilton,

Bay of Quinte, Nova Scotia and Manitoba.

Nearly all the Districts have held conventions and elected officers. The District League has proved to be of the utmost value in carrying on League work. It has developed the talent of our young people, and has acted as a great stimulus to every department of the League. The International Convention, which is held every two years, has been the means of drawing the different branches of Methodism on this continent more closely together, and has strengthened the bonds of affection that bind us together as members of one great family.

The convention in Toronto during July, 1897, was attended by fully 20,000 delegates, and the enthusiasm and inspiration of the great occasion

will not soon be forgotten.

The next International gathering will be held in July, 1899, in the city of Indianapolis, when it is hoped that Canada will be represented by a large attendance.

EVANGELISTIC WORK.

The declared purpose of the Epworth League is to save souls, and to promote an earnest, intelligent, practical Christian life in our young Pastors are almost unanimous in declaring that the Epworth League is an evangelistic agency of the greatest value. Its members have assisted in revival services, cottage prayer-meetings have been held, the homes of unconverted persons have been visited, and personal efforts have been put forth for the salvation of the unsaved. It is impossible to tabulate the results of this work, but undoubtedly many souls have been won to the Saviour through the consecrated endeavors of our young people.

What is known as "The Forward Movement in Evangelistic Work and Bible Study," which has been carried on by some of our societies for the past two years, has, by action of the General Board, been made general and commended to all our pastors and Leagues. The following resolution was unanimously passed by the Board at its meeting in

July, 1897:

"That, whereas the Hamilton Conference Forward Movement in evangelistic work and Bible study has been a gratifying success, resulting in the conversion of many souls, the deepening of spiritual life, and giving a great impulse to Bible study, therefore, be it resolved, that this Board would heartily endorse the same; and, furthermore, would urge upon

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all our Conference and District conventions the desirability of inaugurating this movement in the various Leagues and congregations at the earliest moment."

The special features of the plan are:

1. Sermon by each pastor, on the importance of Bible study, with special reference to the Gospel according to John, on Sunday October 2nd.

2. Reading and study of the Gospel of John in twenty-one days—a chapter a day—commencing October 2nd.

3. Young People's Sunday, October 23rd. 4. Evangelistic Campaign, October 24th - 30th.

It should be understood that while this movement is under the auspices of the League, the pastor of the church is the recognized leader, and no steps should be taken towards the introduction of the movement without his consent and co-operation.

MISSIONARY WORK.

One of the most marked features of our League work during the past four years has been the increased interest manifested in missions. The action of the last General Conference in forming a Missionary Department has been fully justified by the results. Frequent missionary meetings have been held, missionary literature has been widely circulated

and systematic methods for giving adopted.

The Conference returns show that our Young People's societies have raised during the past year the sum of \$12,759.80, being an increase of \$5,314.59 over the previous year. To this splendid advance the "Students' Forward Movement for Missions" has contributed not a little. The young men connected with this movement have pushed the campaign vigorously, and a large number of our Leagues have been visited and stimulated. Fifteen of the districts have undertaken the support of a missionary under the direction of the General Board of Missions, and others will soon be organized for the same purpose.

The following comparative statement shows the amounts raised for missions by the Leagues of the different Conferences, and the increase for the past year:

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The success of the Epworth League Reading Course has been almost phenomenal. Commencing in a small way it has steadily and rapidly advanced.

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The purpose of this Course is to help realize one of the objects for which the League was organized, the cultivation of intelligent piety. Reading Circles have been carried on all over our work, and the universal testimony of pastors and others is that the study of the good books provided has been a marvellous blessing to the young people.

It has been the intention of the Committee charged with the duty of selecting this course to put in at least one volume each year bearing either on general church history or on Methodist history. It is specially desirable that the young should know something of the history, doctrines, and polity of the Church with which they are connected. The pioneers of Methodism used to carry good books in their saddle-bags. Our methods of circulation differ somewhat from theirs, but it is gratifying to know that healthy and inspiring literature is still being kept to the front.

Arrangements have been made for holding annual examinations on the books of the course, and for granting diplomas after the same plan as the C. L. S. C. It has been difficult, however, to induce readers to take this examination.

THE JUNIOR DEPARTMENT.

This is one of the most important, and, at the same time, one of the most hopeful parts of our work. The purpose of the Junior League is, to a considerable extent, different from that of the Sunday School, and there should be no rivalry whatever between them. While the Sunday School aims mainly at instruction in the Scriptures, the Junior Society proposes to train our boys and girls in Christian work by opening up opportunities of usefulness to them. One supplements the other. Our statistics show that we now have 330 Junior societies with a membership of 14,020. There is no way of comparing these figures with those of 1894, but the increase is large, as very few societies existed four years ago.

GENERAL EPWORTH LEAGUE FUND.

When a new office was formed at the last General Conference it was feared by some that it would be a financial burden upon the Church. The young people have, however, shown that they are able and willing to make the office self-supporting. The Leagues are only asked to give one collection annually to the General Fund. While the sums contributed are, for the most part, small, the total amount, together with other sources of income, has been sufficient to pay all expenses.

The League is under great obligations to Mr. J. W. Flavelle, for the careful and business-like manner in which he has attended to the duties of General Treasurer during the quadrennium.

GENERAL SECRETARY'S PERSONAL STATEMENT.

During the past three years the General Secretary has attended a large number of conventions, anniversaries, and other assemblies, in pursuance of the duties outlined for him by the last General Conference.

Every Conference in our work has been visited, and meetings held, not only in the large centres, but on many country circuits, which have

been largely attended, and great interest manifested.

Eight hundred and eighty-six public addresses and sermons have been delivered. Leaving out July and August, this is an average of one for every day of the year, with the exception of Saturday. About one-third of these addresses have been in the interests of Sunday Schools, and two-thirds of the Epworth League.

During these three years 52,150 miles have been travelled, an average of 17,383 per year. For travelling expenses the sum of \$1,437.73 has been expended. The collections taken up at meetings attended have paid this with the exception of \$196.44, which has been drawn from the funds of the General Board. This deficit has been brought about by visits to small places where congregations were not large.

In addition to this field work, a large amount of office work has been attended to, the correspondence being so great as to require the employ-

ment of an office assistant.

GENERAL CONFERENCE SABBATH SCHOOL AID AND EXTENSION FUND, 1895-98.

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TREASURER'S QUADRENNIAL STATEMENT, ENDING JULY 1st, 1898.

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We have examined the Treasurer's Statement of the General Conference Sabbath-School Aid and Extension Fund for the Quadrennial period ending July 1st, 1898, with vouchers for disbursements, and found the same to be correct, F. BYRNE, MERRY, Auditors.

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3. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH SCHOOLS AND EPWORTH LEAGUES.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:—

1. The quadrennial report of the Sunday School and Epworth League Board was adopted, and we recommend that it be printed in the JOURNAL

of the proceedings of this Conference.

2. Report of Committee on Catechism. We rejoice that during the quadrennium the Committee appointed by the last General Conference has completed the duties assigned to it, and succeeded in giving us, in the new Catechism, a concise and logical statement of the doctrines of the Methodist Church.

3. Memorial from Nova Scotia Conference, re the wording of the Apostle's Creed in the Catechism. Inasmuch as we find that the Apostle's Creed in the new Catechism and in the Discipline are identical,

we recommend that no action be taken.

4. Memorial from Wingham District, London Conference, re forming Catechumen classes. After careful consideration we conclude that there is sufficient legislation in the Discipline to secure all that the petitioners ask if they themselves will demand its enforcement at the District meetings.

5. Memorial from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference re objectionable features in the new Catechism We recommend that in the next and subsequent editions of the new Catechism, Question 65 shall read as follows: 65. What is the mode of Baptism? "The Scriptures do not prescribe any mode as exclusively valid. The mode

commonly practised by our Church is sprinkling."

6. Clause in the address of the General Superintendent. Having carefully reviewed the statements of the General Superintendent, we most cordially endorse his opinion, "That our Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues should make this Catechism next to the Holy Scriptures their main field of effort and action, and that it should be taught in every school, to every scholar, as a succinct and logical statement of Methodist doctrine."

7. Memorial from Norwich District and Rev. H. M. Hall, Hamilton Conference, and from Manitoba and North-West Conference, re harmonizing Discipline concerning Sunday School Committee of Management. We recommend that the request be concurred in, by making Par. 287, page 144, to read in harmony with the last clause of Par. 173, as follows: "The management of the school shall be vested in a Committee consisting of the minister or ministers in charge on the circuit, the officers and teachers of the school, and not less than three nor more than five other persons, members of the church, nominated by the Superintendent of the Circuit at the second meeting of the Quarterly Board, and elected by said Board. The persons so elected shall enter upon the duties of their office at the next ensuing meeting of the Committee of Management."

8. Notice of motion from Rev. G. J. Bishop, re the election of Sunday School Superintendent by ballot without nomination. Your Committee

does not recommend concurrence with the request.

9. Men ference re Fund. page 151 follows: 3 annual C which the in his abs It shall a and Exter may, or n 311, (a) " Committee Sabbath S ference. Committee

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9. Memorial from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference re Conference Treasurer of Sabbath School Aid and Extension Fund. Your Committee recommends that Par. 309 and Par. 311, page 151 of the Discipline, be amended so that they shall read as follows: 309, "There shall be a Sabbath School Committee for each annual Conference, composed of two members from each district, of which the President of the annual Conference shall be the chairman; but in his absence, the Committee shall proceed to elect its own Chairman. It shall also elect a secretary. A treasurer of the Sabbath School Aid and Extension Fund shall be appointed by each annual Conference, who may, or may not, be the secretary of the Sabbath School Committee." 311, (a) "It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Sabbath School Committee to take charge of the books and papers belonging to our Sabbath School work, and to act as corresponding secretary of the Conference. He shall make arrangements for the first meeting of the Committee, as soon after the opening of Conference as may be convenient, and shall continue in office until his successor is appointed. (b) It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of the Sabbath School Committee to receive all moneys for the Sabbath School Aid and Extension Fund from the financial secretaries throughout the Conference, and forward the same to the General Treasurer, as hereinafter provided.

10. Notice of motion from Rev. George J. Bishop, re election of all officers of the Sunday School by ballot without nomination. We recom-

mend non-concurrence.

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11. Notice of motion from Rev. George J. Bishop, re election of officers of Sunday School other than superintendent. We recommend concurrence, and that the Discipline be amended to read: Par. 290, page 145. (2) The superintendent of the school, after his election, shall nominate two or more persons for each of the other officers of the school, and the Committee of Management shall elect by ballot. teachers shall be elected by the Committee of Management on the nomination of the superintendent. (4) Vacancies that may occur in the lists of officers and teachers shall be filled from time to time by the Superintendent, subject to the approval of the ensuing meeting of the Committee of Management.

12 Memorial from Toronto Conference Epworth League Convention, re more space in the Christian Guardian for the Epworth League. We recommend non-concurrence, but heartily concur in the recommendation of the Book and Publishing Committee for the publication of a monthly

paper devoted to the interests of the Epworth League.

13. Memorial from Rev. R. J. Elliott, re Presidents of Local Leagues being members of the Church two years; and from Hamilton Conference, that Presidents must have been members of the Church one year. Your Committee does not recommend concurrence.

14. Notice of Motion from Rev. T. T. George re honorary members being Church members. Your Committee does not recommend concurrence.

15. Memorial from Bay of Quinte Conference re Annual Conference Treasurer of the Epworth League being member of Conference Committee. We recommend concurrence. Par. 319 page 158 will then read as now with the following sentence added: "The Conference Treasurer of the

Epworth League Fund shall be ex officio a member of the Epworth League Annual Conference Committee."

16. Memorial from Rev. R. J. Elliott, Hamilton Conference, and Notice of Motion from Rev. J. W. Holmes, re method of electing Presidents of Local Leagues. We recommend concurrence. Art. 5, Par. 2, page 162 will then read, (2) The President shall be a member of the Methodist Church and shall be elected at the annual meeting of the League. The Superintendent of the Circuit, who shall be, ex-officio Chairman of the annual meeting, shall nominate two or more persons for

the office; and the election shall be by ballot.

17. Notice of motion from Rev. C. E. Manning re method of electing other officers of the League. We recommend concurrence. Art. 5, Sec. 3, page 162 will then read: (3) The other officers shall also be elected by ballot on the nomination of the Nominating Committee, of which the Superintendent of the circuit shall be ex-officio Chairman; the Committee to be composed of seven persons, who shall be active members of the League, and shall be elected by ballot, without debate, at the regular meeting next preceding the annual meeting. The Nominating Committee shall nominate two or more active members for each office. No officers shall be declared elected by less than a majority vote.

18. Notice of Motion from Rev. W. C. Henderson, D.D., re active members pledge, to take out "except when excusable to my Master." We recommend that the phraseology of the pledge be changed to read, "As an active member of the League, I will, except when excusable to my Master, be present at and take part in the meetings of the Christian Endeavor

Department."

19. Memorial from Toronto Class Leaders' Convention re adding to active member's pledge, "And shall be adjoined to attend class meeting." Inasmuch as the purpose of this memorial is covered by the pledge, we regard any further legislation unnecessary.

The following are the recommendations of the General Board and the Notices of Motion from Rev. A. C. Crews re Constitution of the Epworth

League. We recommend the following changes to be made:

20. Page 159, Par. 4. Eliminate the clause, "Any other Young People's Society in the Methodist Church may become an affiliated branch of the Epworth League." The paragraph will then read: -- "4. Any Christian Endeavor Society, whose President is a member of the Methodist Church and approved of by the Quarterly Official Board, may become affiliated with the Epworth League by adopting the name "Epworth League of Christian Endeavor; and any Epworth League may become affiliated with the Society of Christian Endeavor by adopting as a local name "Epworth League of Christian Endeavor," providing that it adopts its aims and methods of religious work, that its President be elected in accordance with the provisions of this Constitution, and that it report its organization to the General Secretary."

21. Par. 5. Eliminate the clause, "Or other Young People's societies affiliated with the League under the provisions of this Constitution." The paragraph will then read :-- "5. The Presidents of all Epworth Leagues and Epworth Leagues of Christian Endeavor, shall, on being approved by the Quarterly Official Boards, become members of the same, and shall so

continue so long as they remain Presidents."

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22. Par. 8. Eliminate "annually," and insert the words, "once in two years." The paragraph will then read Conference Conventions:—8. The members of Epworth Leagues, within the boundaries of any Conference may organize and hold a Convention of Epworth Leagues and other Methodist Young People's societies once in two years.

23. Par. 9. Add the clause, "Who shall hold office for two years." Also eliminate the words, "any or all of the foregoing," and insert the word "such." The paragraph will then read:—"9. When any such Convention is held, it shall be competent for it to elect one representative to the Sunday School and Epworth League Board, who shall hold office for two years, which election shall be reported to the next ensuing Annual Conference. In case of failure of such elections, the Annual Conference Epworth League Committee may nominate, and the Annual Conference elect, a representative to the Sunday School and Epworth League Board.

24. In the Constitution of Local societies, page 160, Art. 3. Par. 2. Add the words, "but their names may be removed after six months non-attendance upon meetings." Also insert in the last sentence of the paragraph, "by taking the Associate Member's Pledge." The paragraph will then read:—"2. Associate Members.—Persons of good moral character may become associate members of the League. It is expected that all Associate Members will habitually attend the religious and other meetings of the League, and that they will, in time, become active members thereof, but their names may be removed from the roll after six months' non-attendance upon meetings. Associate members may serve on committees, and be entitled to all the privileges of membership by taking the Associate Member's Pledge, but shall not be eligible for office."

25. Art. III., Par. 3.—Add to the first sentence the words, "and shall be allowed to vote on all matters of business except the election of officers and adoption of by-laws." The paragraph will then read:—"3. Honorary Members.—All persons who, though no longer young, are still interested in the League and wish to have some connection with it, though they cannot regularly attend the meetings, may become Honorary Members, and shall be allowed to vote on all matters of business except the election of officers and adoption of by-laws. Their names shall be kept upon the list under the appropriate heading, but shall not be called at the roll-call meeting. It is understood that the League may look to the Honorary Members for financial and moral support in all worthy efforts."

26. Art. IV., Par. Literary.—Be amended by eliminating the words, "and C.L.S.C. readings," and inserting "Reading Course." The whole clause will then read: "Literary—(a) Systematic Bible study; (b) essays and literary work; (c) Epworth League Reading Course."

27. Art. V., Par. 4.—Be amended to read: "The President of the League, on being approved by the Quarterly Official Board, shall be a member thereof, and shall report at each meeting of the Board as to the progress and general condition of the League."

28. Art. V., Par. 6—Be amended, by adding a list of duties of the Vice-Presidents. It shall then read as follows: "6. The Vice-Presidents shall also, in the order named, represent and have charge of the departments of Christian Endeavor, Missionary, Literary and Social work.

They shall aid the President as he may request. (a) The first Vice-President shall have charge of the Christian Endeavor Department, having under his direction the Lookout, Prayer-meeting, Evangelistic and Sunday School Committees. (b) The second Vice-President shall have charge of the Missionary Department and the committees connected therewith. He shall circulate missionary literature, encourage the adoption of some systematic method of giving, and make arrangements for holding missionary meetings. (c) The third Vice-President shall have charge of the Literary Department. It shall be his duty to interest the members of the League in Bible study and wherever practicable organize an Epworth League Reading Circle. He shall give attention to the circulation of our Connexional literature. (d) The fourth Vice-President is expected to arrange plans by which new comers will be visited, strangers welcomed, and the social interests of the League and Church promoted."

29. Art. V., Par. 8.—Add to the paragraph the sentence, "Immediately after his election he shall forward a list of the new officers to the General Secretary, and also to the District Secretary." It will then read :-- "8. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct all correspondence, and, when necessary, write to absent members and read replies before the League at his discretion. In mediately after his election he shall forward a list of the new officers to the General Secretary, and also to the District

Secretary."

30. Art. V., Par. 9.—Eliminate all after the word "collection," and insert, "for the General Epworth League Fund, and shall hand it to the Superintendent of the Circuit, who shall pay it to the Financial Secretary of the District." The paragraph will then read: "9. The Treasurer shall collect all dues and receive all moneys, disbursing the same at the direction of the League, upon order of the Secretary, countersigned by the President. He shall obtain the annual collection for the General Epworth League Fund, and shall hand it to the Superintendent of the Circuit, who shall pay it to the Financial Secretary of the District."

31. Art. V., Par. 10.—Eliminate the words, "of from three to five members." The whole paragraph will then read: "10. For the purpose of enlisting all in the work and rendering it more effective, the Executive Committee shall assign each member to at least one department of Each Vice-President shall name to the Executive Committee, committees for the management of his department, that officer being ex

officio a member of each Committee."

32. Art. V., Par. 11.—Eliminate the words, "pastor of the church," and insert, "Superintendent of the Circuit." The whole paragraph will then read: "11. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Superintendent of the Circuit, the Officers of the League and the Chairmen of the various standing committees. All matters of business requiring debate, recommendations concerning finance, and proposed changes, shall be brought first before this Committee, and by it reported either favorably or adversely to the League."

33. Art. V., Par. 12.—Insert the words, "in writing." The whole paragraph will then read: "12. Each committee, except the Executive, shall report in writing, through its Vice-President, to the League at the monthly business meetings concerning the work of the past month,"

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(d) By a Conference, already orga 34. Art. VII., Par. 5.—Amend the paragraph so that it shall read: "The League year shall close at the same time as the ecclesiastical year; and the Annual Meeting for the election of officers shall be held on the evening in the month of April in each year. The Superintendent of the Circuit shall preside at the annual meeting. Each officer shall present a written report of the work in the department under his charge during the year."

35. Art. VII., Par. 7.—Eliminate the words, "League Treasurer," and make the paragraph read as follows: "7. A collection for the expenses of the Sunday School and Epworth League Board shall be taken up annually, at some meeting previously announced before the Annual District Meeting, and forwarded by the Superintendent of the Circuit to the Financial Secretary of the District, and by him to the Conference Treasurer of the General Epworth League Fund, who shall pay it to the Treasurer of the Epworth League section of the Sunday School and Epworth League Board. The Conference Treasurer may or may not be the Secretary of the Conference League Committee."

36. We recommend that Art. X., page 168 (3rd paragraph on the page), be made to read as follows: "Let me remind you that as an Active Member you are pledged to support your Church and all its interests; to be present at every meeting of the Christian Endeavor Department of the League, unless hindered by some reason that you can give to God; if absent from a consecration service to send a response to your name; and

to pray and read the Bible daily." 37. Laid on the table.

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38. We recommend that the following Constitution for Conference and District Leagues, adopted by the General Sunday School and Epworth League Board, be adopted, and request that it be printed in the Discipline:

CONFERENCE CONSTITUTION OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE.

ARTICLE 1.-NAME.

This organization shall be called "The Epworth League of the

ARTICLE 2.—OBJECT.

The object of the Conference League shall be to aid and help the Leagues and other Young People's societies, and the members thereof, within its jurisdiction, to accomplish the purpose set forth in the Epworth League Constitution,

(a) By increasing their spirituality.

(b) By improving their methods of work.

(c) By becoming better acquainted, so as to be more helpful to each other.

(d) By assisting in organizing new societies in the Districts of the Conference, and promoting in every way possible the efficiency of those already organized by co-operation with the General Secretary in his work.

All Leagues or Methodist Young People's societies whose "aims and methods of religious work" are similar to those set forth in the Epworth League Constitution shall be eligible for representation and entitled to vote, the scale of representation being one official delegate for every twenty members or fraction thereof.

ARTICLE 4.—OFFICERS.

The officers of the Conference League shall be: Honorary President, who shall be the President of the Annual Conference; President, five Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, and the representatives on the Epworth League Board, who shall hold office until their successors are elected at the next Biennial Convention.

ARTICLE 5.—EXECUTIVE.

The officers of the Conference League and the representative from each District League within the bounds of the Conference, elected as provided by the General Constitution of the Epworth League, shall compose the Executive Committee, and may be convened at any time by the President.

ARTICLE 6.—ELECTIONS.

A Nominating Committee, composed of the Honorary President, the President and five other members elected by ballot by the Convention (only one ballot to be taken and the five having the highest number of votes to be declared elected) shall, at each Annual Convention, nominate two or more candidates for each office, to be elected by the Convention by ballot.

ARTICLE 7.—DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

- (a) The President shall perform the duties usually appertaining to that office, and watch over and help forward the interests of the societies in the Conference.
- (b) The first four Vice-Presidents shall, in the order named, be appointed to further the work of the societies in the Conference in the different departments, as described in the Constitution of the Local Leagues.
- (c) The fifth Vice-President shall assist in the organization and development of Junior Leagues throughout the Conference.
- (d) The Secretary shall make and have charge of all records, conduct the correspondence, give notice of meetings, and attend to all the other duties of his office.
- (e) The Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to the Conference League, and disburse the same at the direction of the Executive, upon order of the President and Secretary.

ARTICLE 8.—Conventions.

There shall be a Biennial Convention of this Conference League. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place, unless arranged for at the Convention, and provide the programme.

By-Laws.

By-laws may be adopted in harmony with this Constitution.

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CONSTITUTION FOR DISTRICT EPWORTH LEAGUE.

ARTICLE 1.—NAME.

This organization shall be called "The Epworth League of the

ARTICLE 2.—OBJECT.

Its object shall be to assist its Leagues and members in accomplishing the different purposes set forth in the Epworth League Constitution:

(a) By increasing their spirituality.

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(b) By improving their methods of work.

- (c) By becoming better acquainted, so as to be more helpful to each other.
- (d) By assisting in organizing new Leagues on the District, and promoting in every way possible the efficiency of those already organized.

ARTICLE 3.—MEMBERSHIP.

All members of Leagues or other Young People's societies in the District whose "aims and methods of religious work" are similar to those set forth in the Epworth League Constitution, shall be eligible for membership in the District League, and shall be entitled to vote.

ARTICLE 4.—OFFICERS.

The officers of the District League shall be: Honorary President, who shall be the Chairman of the District; President, five Vice-Presidents, the representative of the District on the Conference Executive, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall hold office until their successors are elected at the next Annual Convention.

ARTICLE 5.—EXECUTIVE.

The officers of the District League and five others elected at the same time, on the nomination of the Business Committee, shall compose the Executive Committee, and may be convened at any time by the President.

At each District Convention, a Business Committee of five persons shall be elected by ballot immediately after devotional exercises; the five receiving the highest number of votes on the first ballot to be declared. elected. This Committee shall appoint the officers for the ensuing year, and report to the Convention, their report to be final.

ARTICLE 7.—DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

The President shall perform the duties pertaining to that office, and watch over and help forward the interests of the Leagues and societies in the District.

The first four Vice-Presidents shall, in the order named, be appointed to further the work of the Leagues and societies in the District in the different departments, as described in the Constitution of Local Leagues. The fifth Vice-President shall assist in the organization and development of Junior Leagues throughout the District.

The Secretary shall make and have charge of all records, conduct correspondence, give notice of meetings, and attend to all the other duties of the office.

The Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to the District League, and disburse the same at the direction of the Executive upon the order of the President and Secretary.

ARTICLE 8.—Conventions.

There shall be an Annual Convention of the District League. The Executive shall fix the time and place, unless arranged for at the previous Convention, and provide the programme.

By-LAWS.

By-laws may be made in harmony with this Constitution.

39. Your Committee recommends as follows:

While recognizing with gratitude the increase in membership of our Sabbath Schools, we feel that the advance has not been so marked as could be hoped for, being only about 7 per cent. during the entire quadrennium, or less than 2 per cent. per annum. In order that this state of affairs may be remedied your Committee suggests that the General Conference recommend that there be an annual house-to-house canvass upon all our circuits and missions, believing that in this way, more than any other, our Sabbath School interests will be furthered.

40. Your Committee recommends as follows:

In view of the decrease in missionary contributions on the part of our Sunday Schools during the past quadrennium, and recognizing the fact that especially at this juncture in the affairs of our Missionary Society there should be a stimulus given to missionary effort in our schools, your Committee would suggest that the General Conference recommend all our churches to support the Sabbath Schools with sufficient liberality to permit at least 75 per cent. of the Sunday School collections being given to the Missionary Society.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

VII.—BOOK AND PUBLISHING INTERESTS.

1. REPORT OF THE WESTERN SECTION OF THE BOOK COMMITTEE.

In presenting the following report of the business done by the Book Room during the past four years, attention is particularly directed to the healthy increase of the assets and the corresponding decrease in the liabilities. We have \$2.63 of assets for every dollar of liabilities. In 1894 the relative proportion stood \$2.33 of assets to every dollar of liabilities.

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UNAVAILABLE Real Estate Machinery, Sinking Fun tures, etc...

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During this Quadrennium the subscription price of the Guardian has been reduced from two dollars to one dollar per year. The Methodist MAGAZINE AND REVIEW and the SUNDAY SCHOOL BANNER have been enlarged and improved without any corresponding increase in the subscription price. The Berean Leaf and the Berean Intermediate QUARTERLY are virtually the same publication, some subscribers preferring the quarterly form while others prefer the monthly, and there is continually a change from one form to the other, so that the two periodicals should be considered together. Dew Drops is our new infant class publication. The subscription price has been made low to enable us to compete successfully with similar papers issued by other As it grows in circulation, which it will, a profit will result. Another new publication this year is the Berean Senior Quarterly. The growth of the Home Department of our Sunday School work made it necessary to provide a periodical devoted to the requirements of this branch of the work—a need which this Quarterly very satisfactorily fills.

The enlargements and improvements in our periodicals were necessary in order that we might continue to compete successfully with similar publications coming from the United States.

Rent account has been affected by reason of the erection of many large buildings and the lowering of rents in consequence.

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The Christian Guardian,

The first number of The Christian Guardian is dated November 21, 1829. During the next year (1899), therefore, our Connexional organ will pass into its seventieth year. Its course for the threescore years and ten makes an honorable and useful record in the annals of the Methodist Church and of the Dominion of Canada.

Our preachers are universally readers of the *Guardian*, and should not hesitate to advise the people strongly as to the best literature.

Our office-bearers in circuit work who subscribe for our own publications are always more intelligent, more Connexional, and more effective because of their knowledge of what Methodism is doing for Christ in Canada and everywhere in lands new and old. All our officials should feel the heart-beat of the Church toward the youth at home and toward the millions abroad who know not God or His love, and should be informed concerning the work of Bishop Taylor and Bishop Hartzell in Africa, and Bishop Thoburn in India; concerning our own Missions in Japan and China; concerning the Methodist Union Movement in Australia; concerning the spiritual triumphs of Methodism in the home of the Protestant Reformation and under the shadows of the Vatican; and concerning the Mother-Methodism of the British Isles, which we would rejoice to see welded into one organization with old-time zeal and success in winning souls. Not for the sake of Methodism merely, but in the cause of good literature, we rejoice in the largely extended circulation of the Guardian. It is true in some degree in Canada that the craving for unhealthy news and weak, sentimental stories makes against the circulation of the best reading matter, and makes plain the obligation resting on the churches and their pastors to cultivate sound minds, delighting only in "whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are levely, whatsoever things are of good report.

The warning of Robertson is timely:

"Multifarious reading weakens the mind more than doing nothing, for it is an excuse for the mind to lie dormant while thought is poured in and runs through like water over unproductive gravel where not even mosses grow."

The General Conference of 1894 adopted a reduced price for the Guardian (\$1, instead of \$2,) with the hope of a greatly increased circulation. The net result is that the paper has more than paid its way for the quadrennium and has registered by far the largest circulation in its history, though we have to regret the unavoidable decrease in the profits as compared with the preceding quadrennium.

This periodical has now nearly completed its forty-eighth volume and twenty-fourth year. No other monthly in Canada has ever reached half this age. Notwithstanding the keen competition of high-class English and American magazines and of the cheap monthlies, it still maintains its hold upon the patronage of the Methodist people. It has been considerably enlarged in size and improved in character. It has called forth the literary ability of a continuously increasing staff of writers from every section of our Church. Their varied contributions cannot fail to be of permanent advantage in this reading age when the press so largely moulds the opinions of the world. Never could the Church less afford to neglect the use of this powerful agent for the defence of the faith, the exposition of the doctrines of Methodism, and the promotion of vital godliness. Special attention has been given to the discussion of social problems of the times, to missionary and religious intelligence, and to character-studies of the world's greatest leaders of thought and action. Its interesting and uplifting serial and other stories, its high standard of illustration and its racy sketches of travel and exploration have contributed to its popularity as a high-class family magazine. In an age of frivolous and pernicious reading this is a consideration of very great importance.

The last year, however, shows a slight increase.

Sunday School Periodicals.

This important department of our church work has made marked progress during the quadrennium. This is the more gratifying inasmuch as the previous rapid increase of these periodicals has made it the more difficult to surpass that record. The Sunday School Banner has been a great deal enlarged and improved to keep it abreast with the foremost Sunday School periodicals of the day. Much attention has been given to that important Sunday School extension movement known as the "Home Department," which possesses possibilities of widest usefulness. This department has nearly doubled every year for the last Quadrennium, and promises to create a very large demand for our Sunday School and other Connexional literature. Most important of all, it is uniting parents and children, the invalids and shut-ins, and others unable to attend Sunday School, with the school-going part of the family in the study of the same portions of the Word of God.

Our Senior Young People's paper, ONWARD, has more than main nined

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its previous large incomplete attention of loyalt. These pay the Churche most Methodis

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its previous record and popularity. Every year has been marked by a large increase. Our whole series of illustrated papers devote special attention to the subject of missions and temperance, and to inculcation of loyalty to Queen and country, and have won warm commendation. These papers present a grand opportunity for moulding, in large degree, the Church and nation, and will influence for piety and godliness during the most susceptible period the minds of the young people of Canadian Methodism.

Of our Sunday School periodicals 212 different issues go to press during the 310 working days of the year, or four every week. Of these, 190,000 pages are printed every day, or 19,000 every working hour. An average of one and a half periodicals are printed for each scholar It is doubtful if any Church in Christendom has a higher average than this.

The circulation given in our report is that of the 31st of March. It does not represent the maximum circulation of our periodicals, but rather its minimum. During the summer season about 1,200 schools are open which are closed during the winter. This very greatly increases the circulation of our periodicals during the six summer months. For this large amount of Sunday School literature our schools paid last year \$54,922, an average of over \$1,000 a week.

Printing Department.

The increase in work done in this department has made it necessary to increase the number of presses and replace several old and out-of-date presses with new and improved ones. Our press room had also to be enlarged to provide room for the additional machinery.

For many years our whole establishment has been dependent on one engine, and any accident happening to it would have necessitated the closing down of the entire factory. To provide against such a calamity a new engine has been put in to be held as a reserve.

During the winter months the heating of the building by steam makes it necessary to maintain a higher pressure than during the rest of the year. Recognizing that in addition to heating the building we might economically utilize this power for operating an Electric Light Plant, such a plant was installed during the last year, and has resulted in a very considerable saving in the cost of lighting, besides adding greatly to the healthfulness of the work-rooms.

Our Press Rooms now contain 21 power presses, three being Gordon presses.

The Book Publishing Department.

During the four years just closed the book publications, in both numbers and importance, have exceeded those of any previous quadrennium. The position of the House in the publishing business has been distinctly advanced, and the number of valuable works now in press and arranged for indicates still further progress.

Real Estate.

Extensions and improvements to the buildings have increased the value of this asset by \$10,098.50. These consist of the purchase of the

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adjoining lot to the east of our present building on Temperance Street, on which there is a dwelling-house now rented. This property was acquired to secure right of way over the lane, to prevent any interference with our light, and because we will need the lot for the extension of our manufacturing department in the near future.

A system of fire protection, in the shape of a stand-pipe with hose and nozzles attached, was laid to each floor, both in the front and rear of the building.

Our coal cellar was enlarged by excavating under the sidewalk on Temperance Street and covering the same with a granolithic pavement.

Our Press Room was enlarged by an addition of 17×50 feet to accommodate additional presses.

Our Sheet Room was enlarged by raising the roof and extending the walls of a portion.

The Superannuated Ministers' Fund.

During the quadrennium just closed the Book Room contributed \$31,000 to the Superannuated Ministers' Fund. The amount contributed during the previous quadrennium was \$26,300, an increase this term of \$4,700.

The Montreal Book Room.

Notwithstanding that the last four years have been years of remarkable depression, especially in the Province of Quebec, and that three departmental stores have been established in Montreal where books are sold, it is a gratifying fact that the Montreal Branch has yielded a profit every year, that the liabilities have been reduced \$1,297.35, and that the net capital is now \$8,094.28.

The following summary of the business is taken from the annual statements presented to the Western Section of the Book Committee, which statements have been carefully and thoroughly audited by Rev. Wm. H. Sparling, B.A., and J. H. Carson, Esq.

The foregoing financial statements will indicate the business transacted during the last four years and the present condition of the establishment. The net profits are small, but considering the general state of trade, and especially the limitations to which we are subjected, it is gratifying to find the results even as favorable as now reported. The building which has been occupied by the Book Room for several years has been purchased, and after making some improvements is now well adapted for business purposes. It is a good building, centrally located, and purchased at such a price as to effect a considerable saving in annual expense of rent.

The Wesleyan has been published for upwards of sixty years. Last year it printed and circulated a larger number of copies than at any period of its history—the figures for 1897, according to the mechanical counter on the press, being 218,002, giving an average weekly issue of 4,192. During last year the receipts equalled the expenditure, and it may be fairly said that the paper stands to-day in a better position than it ever did.

3 .REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BOOK AND PUBLISHING INTERESTS.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

- 1. That having received and considered the report of the Western Section of the Book Committee, your Committee desires to express gratitude to God for the splendid report of the work done during the past quadrennium. The business ability of the Book Steward, the loyalty of our people to the Book Room, and the very successful results of the four years' operations are all matters which we appreciate, and we trust that Dr. Briggs will long continue in the position for which he is so eminently qualified. We recommend that the report be printed in the JOURNAL of the Proceedings of this Conference.
- 2. The Christian Guardian has ever wielded an influence upon our people and country, and continues with unabated force to do so, being among the foremost of the religious papers of our day. We desire to express gratification at the large circulation during the past quadrennium, and at the same time press upon our ministers and people the urgent necessity of increasing the circulation of this our Connexional organ, that it may yield a larger income, and wield a still greater influence throughout our Canadian Methodism.

We further desire to express our appreciation of the faithful and able editorial work of the Rev. Dr. A. C. Courtice.

- 3. Your Committee regrets that the demands upon the space of the Christian Guardian make it impossible to devote more of its columns in the interests of the Young People's societies. At the same time, we express our entire sympathy with the work of the young people of Methodism, and pledge ourselves to the advancement of their worthy interests.
- 4. Having considered the advisability of some alternative proposal of the present arrangement of two full pages in the *Christian Guardian* given to the Epworth Leagues and Sunday Schools, we advise that the Book Committee be empowered to publish a monthly Epworth League paper, the responsibility for the editing of which shall rest with the

Epworth League and Sunday School Secretary, under the direction of the Western Section of the Book Committee, or make such other arrangements as may be found wise at the time.

5. The Methodist Magazine and Review and Sunday School periodicals should receive our hearty support, your Committee being gratified to learn of the large increase in the circulation of the Sunday School periodicals, and we appreciate their high literary quality. Further, we are pleased with the continued excellence of the Magazine, and recognize the eminent ability of the Rev. Dr. Withrow, Editor of these Connexional periodicals.

6. Your Committee received and considered the report of the Eastern Section of the Book Committee, and while recognizing the difficulties they, of necessity, must encounter, cannot but express the satisfactory manner in which the affairs of this section of our Book Committee is managed, the fidelity and ability with which the Book Steward, Rev. S. F. Huestis, and the editor of the Wesleyan, Rev. Geo. J. Bond, B.A., have discharged the important duties connected with their respective departments.

7. In respect to the Notice of Motion regarding Registration of Births, Marriages, etc., your Committees recommend that the ministers of the Methodist Church be required to keep a register of baptisms, marriages and burials in a book provided for the purpose by the Official Board, such register to be the property of the circuit, and remain among its records (but in any Province where a circuit register is kept under Provincial law, it shall be accepted as a compliance with this requirement). It is also recommended that this requirement be incorporated in the Discipline so as to make it compulsory.

8. Your Committee, in considering the question of cheaper Hymn-books, recommends the reference thereof to the favorable consideration of the Book Committee, with the request that the 30-cent edition be placed at 25 cents or lower.

9. With reference to the memorial respecting the printing of the ritual in the Methodist Hymn-book, we recommend that this be referred to the Book Committee for their action.

10. Your Committee consider that the memorials respecting the publishing of minutes of Conferences in one volume, or as a year book have much to recommend them, but, inasmuch as the Annual Conferences have not sent up any memorials upon the subject, and realizing the advisability of having their judgment on a matter of such importance, we would recommend the General Conference to refer the whole subject to the ensuing Annual Conferences, and would request that Rev. Dr. Briggs, Book Steward, prepare as fully as possible estimates of cost, etc., for their consideration, the Annual Conferences to report their decision to the Book Committee, which shall have power to act.

Item No. 11 laid on table.

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12. With reference to the memorials regarding the price of the Guardian, your Committee recommends that the price of the Christian Guardian be not now increased, but that the Western Section of the Book Committee be empowered to raise the price to \$1.25 if it be found

necessary during the quadrennium, to prevent loss owing to imposition of postage.

13. That the Western Section of the Book Committee be authorized to appoint an assistant editor of the Christian Guardian, or provide such assistance for the Editor as may be deemed expedient.

Your Committee recommends that the following be inserted in the Discipline:

Under page 32, Section 69, Sub-section 3: To keep a register of baptisms, marriages and burials for the circuit in a book provided for the purpose by the Quarterly Official Board, said book to remain among the records of the circuit. Section 3 to be numbered 4; also to eliminate from the Discipline all the words in Section 76, page 36, after the word "baptism."

Subsequently this last paragraph was reconsidered, and Item No. 1 of Report No. 3 of the Committee on Discipline was substituted therefor,

GENERAL SUMMARY.

In this our Fifth Quadrennial Statistical Report we have pleasure in presenting to the General Conference figures which indicate progress in all departments of our work, and among all the numerous agencies employed by the Church.

Delay on the part of some of the Secretaries of the Annual Conferences, in forwarding their Conference Schedules, rendered it impossible for me to prepare a summary in time for publication in the Minutes of the Conferences, but each year a carefully prepared report has been given to the Church through the Christian Guardian and the Wesleyan. A great deal of extra work has been made necessary by errors in many of the Schedules, which ought to have been corrected by the Auditors appointed by the District Meetings and by the Conference Statistical Committees.

The Schedules constituting this Report number thirty-one, and in membership and finances include the annual as well as the general report of the Quadrennium, thus making the fullest and most complete statistical compendium yet given to the General Conference. We think they will be valuable for future reference and study.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS AND SCHEDULES.

1. We recommend that the Report on Statistics as prepared by the General Conference Statistician, and by him presented to the General Conference, and referred to this Committee, be adopted by the Conference and published in the Conference JOURNAL.

2. That the memorial from the Hamilton Conference re the providing of a Schedule F for the Individual Epworth League or other Young People's Society, asking for such facts as are requisite for the filling up of the Circuit Epworth League Schedule F, be granted.

3. That the memorial from the Hamilton Conference re the publishing of a District Ledger, be not granted.

4. That in Schedule C, Connexional Funds, a column be provided for General Epworth League Fund Collections, and also a column for the Temperance Fund Collection, which is called for under Discipline, page 228, Paragraph 470.

5. That in Schedule G, Sunday Schools, the question, "Who have taken the Total Abstinence Pledge?" be changed to read, "Number who are now Pledged Abstainers."

6. That in same Schedule, the words, "in the school," be added after the words, "average attendance," so as to read, "Average attendance in the school," that it may be clear that "Home Department" is not included.

7. That the memorial from the Bay of Quinte Conference *re* question concerning the number of Conference Minutes required by each Quarterly Board, be not entertained.

8. That in reference to the memorial from the Manitoba and North-West Conference re Schedule E and net deficiency in salary, no action be taken.

9. That in reference to the memorial from the Nova Scotia Conference re Schedule A, asking that members on trial be not counted in the total aggregate membership, no action be taken.

10. Eliminated.

11. Re memorial from the Hamilton Conference, that in order to have a full census of the membership of the Church, the ministers and probationers for the ministry be counted in the Annual Membership Report of the circuit or mission on which they may be stationed.

12. That in reference to the memorial from the Montreal Conference re certain questions to be asked at District Meetings concerning attendance at public worship, class-meetings, etc., no action be taken.

13. That the memorial from the Toronto West District asking for new schedules be not complied with, as the memorialists make no suggestions

concerning their needs, or propose any new plan.

14. Re notice of motion by Rev. T. W. Jackson, That in order to secure greater accuracy in all circuit and district statistics, Section 157, page 84, of Discipline, be amended by adding after the word "purpose," "and also appoint a Statistical Secretary, whose duty it shall be to tabulate all statistics, and who shall also be exofficio member of the Annual Conference Statistical Committee." Also in second line of same section, the word, "Secretary" shall be preceded by the word, "Journal"; and in line three substitute the word, "Journal" for the word, "book." Also conform line six therewith. The whole Paragraph 157 will then read as follows: "After the Chairman has opened the meeting by the usual devotional exercises, a Journal Secretary shall be elected by ballot, who shall keep a record of the proceedings in a journal procured for that purpose; and also appoint a Statistical Secretary, whose duty it shall be to tabulate all statistics, and who shall also be ex-officio a member of the Conference Statistical Committee. At the close of each meeting the minutes shall be signed by the Chairman and Journal Secretary. The Journal shall be kept by the Chairman and brought to the Conference, and be delivered by him to his successor."

15. That on page 62, Discipline, Paragraph 139, Sub-section (2), there be added after the word, "Secretary" and also appoint "a Statistical Secretary," who shall be Chairman of the Statistical Committee. That it be an instruction, when receiving young men on probation for the ministry, to record in the District and Conference Journals and publish in the Minutes of Conference their full Christian name, and that in the List of Stations at least one of the Christian names of each minister and probationer be published, instead of the initials only.

18. That we place on record our high appreciation of the painstaking and valuable services rendered by the General Conference Statistician, Rev. Dr. Cornish, during the past quadrennium.

19 and 20. Dealt with in connection with the Report of the Com-

21. That the Chairman and Secretary of this Committee and the Rev. Thomas W. Jackson be a Committee to revise and superintend the publication of the Schedules and Circuit Register.

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IX. TWENTIETH CENTURY THANKS-GIVING FUND.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Your Committee had before them the various amendments proposed in the Conference to the Committee's first report; and after due consideration, submit the following propositions:

1. Re St. James' Church. Item eliminated.

2. Re DISTRIBUTION OF FUND.

That the contributors to this Fund be allowed to designate the object for which their subscriptions shall be used. That the following be stated as the interests from which this choice shall be made:

(a) Educational Institutions.(b) Missions (Home or Foreign).

(c) Superannuation and Supernumerary Funds.

(d) Local church debts.

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Donors, if they prefer, may have their contributions to be distributed among the foregoing institutions, funds and objects, as the Board to be appointed by the General Conference may deem advisable.

The expression, "educational institutions," shall be interpreted as giving each donor the liberty to designate the institution to which his

contribution shall be applied.

If any one wishes to contribute forthwith to the Twentieth Century Thanksgiving Fund by making a special donation to any of our educational institutions, the Missionary Society, the Superannuation or Supernumerary Funds, or any local church debt, their contribution shall be credited to said fund.

*As to methods of raising the Fund, your Committee deems it of great importance that such plans be devised as will result in a thorough and systematic canvass of every field within the bounds of the Church, so that the last man, woman and Sunday School scholar may be reached, and no one be denied the privilege of contributing.

Your Committee therefore recommends:

1. That a board consisting of fifty members, ministers and laymen in equal numbers, be appointed by this Conference to be known as "The Board of the Twentieth Century Thanksgiving Fund," who shall have the oversight and general direction of the movement. The Board shall prepare literature, collecting books, subscription cards, etc., etc.; promote as far as possible uniformity of action and effort throughout the whole Connexion, and render all needed assistance to the Annual Conference committees in carrying out the scheme.

2. That the Annual Conferences be requested to appoint at their next sessions a Conference Committee, to have charge and direction of the campaign for the Fund within the Conference. The Committee so appointed shall be responsible for the complete and early organization of

every district and circuit, with a view to reaching the entire Methodist constituency, so that no one who bears the Methodist name may be without an opportunity of contributing to the Twentieth Century Thanksgiv-

3. That from this time forward earnest and continuous efforts be made by means of articles in all our Connexional publications, and frequent reminders by ministers from the pulpit, to prepare the people for a prompt and enthusiastic response when the appeal is finally made. Above all, it is recommended that from first to last the religious and thanksgiving aspect of the undertaking be made its most prominent feature; that everywhere the people be exhorted to connect their gifts with earnest prayer and renewed consecration; so that the movement may become the occasion of a great spiritual uplift that shall carry the

Church into the new century on a tide of revival power.

4. That it is deemed important that before public meetings are held in the interest of the Fu. d, plans be carefully matured and machinery provided for a thorough canvass; that a date be set apart to be known as the Twentieth Century Fund Sunday, and it is suggested that the second Sunday in October, 1899, be that date; that in all our churches public meetings be held on that day at which the scheme shall be definitely brought before the congregations, and offerings solicited; that prior to these meetings, the leading members and adherents of the Church be prepared, by personal interviews, to pledge the amounts that should be contributed by each, in order to reach the sum required; and that immediately after these meetings a thorough and systematic canvass be made, and the whole effort, including the payment of all contributions, be concluded by the 1st day of October, 1900.

5. That while it is very desirable that all subscriptions be paid at the time they are made, yet, to meet the circumstances of many contributors, it is recommended that provision be made to receive subscriptions in

monthly instalments from such as desire to pay in that way.

6. That as little benefit would result if this enterprise were carried through at the expense of other Connexional interests, it should be understood from the very beginning that givings to the Twentieth Century Thanksgiving Fund must not be allowed to interfere with customary

givings to our various Connexional funds.

7. Your Committee believes that this undertaking will prove a benediction to the Church in proportion to the universality of the effort; that far greater good will result from the fact that every Methodist bears a share in raising the million dollars than if the whole fund were contributed by a limited number of wealthy men, if that were possible. It is therefore recommended that resolute effort be made to reach the largest possible number; and we suggest to our more wealthy members the plan of associating themselves with a given number of the poorer, and aiding them, if necessary, to contribute to the Fund.

8. That from the canvassing books furnished to the several circuits and stations, and used by them, a roll be made up containing the name of every subscriber, and the amount of his subscription, the same to serve as a permanent record, and to be bound and kept in the archives of the

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its ne ve he 9. That we express our profound sympathy with St. James' Church, Montreal, and authorize the pastor, the Rev. T. G. Williams, D.D., to canvass the Connexion in its behalf.

REPORT No. 1.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

1. It has considered the notice of motion by James Mills, LL.D., seconded by S. F. Lazier, Q.C., "That the addition to Wesley's Rules of Membership, as contained in Par. 35, page 24, of the Discipline, be struck out and the following paragraph be substituted therefor, viz., 35: Note.—The foregoing rules shall be understood as enjoining upon members of the Church whatever is required in the Holy Scriptures, and forbidding whatever is contrary to the letter or spirit thereof." And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of this Conference.

2. (1) Your Committee has also considered the memorial of the Manitoba and North-West Conference to amend the note appended to the General Rules by inserting after the word "beverage," the words, "or signing a petition for the sale of such." (2) Also the memorial of the London Conference to amend the General Rules as follows: "In Par. 35, page 24, of Discipline, strike out the word 'note,' and incorporate said paragraph among the General Rules, and insert the following after the word 'beverage': 'signing petitions for granting liquor licenses, or in any way aiding or abetting the liquor traffic.'" And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of the Conference.

3. Finally amended and adopted as in Item No. 32, Report No. 3.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

1. It has considered the memorials of the Montreal Conference, and of the Sarnia District, in the London Conference, and the notice of motion of Rev. S. P. Rose, D.D., and W. I. Shaw, D.D., for amendment of the section of Discipline, "Of Receiving Members into the Church," and related sections; also the memorial of the Huntingdon District, in the Montreal Conference, and the notice of motion of Rev. J. M. Harrison, relating to "catechumens." And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of this Conference.

2. Your Committee has considered also the memorials of the New Brunswick and P. E. I. Conference, of the Lay Association of the Bay of Quinte Conference; of the St. Thomas District, in the London Conference, and of the Quarterly Official Board of Walkerville, in the London Conference, in favor of the introduction of laymen into the Stationing Committee; and the notice of motion of Rev. J. S. Williamson, D.D., and Rev. F. Chisholm, in favor of reducing the number of members of the Stationing Committee. And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of this Conference.

1. Your Committee has considered a recommendation of the Book and Publishing Committee, referred to this Committee by the Conference, in favor of a register of baptisms, marriages and burials, and the memorial of the Brockville District, in the Montreal Conference, for a baptismal

And recommends in pursuance thereof that the Discipline be amended by adding to Sub-section 6, of Par. 174, page 99, the following: "To keep a register of baptisms, marriages and burials in a book provided for the purpose by the Official Board, such register to be the property of the circuit, and to remain among its records."

Note.—"In any Province where a circuit register is kept under provincial law, it shall be accepted as a compliance with this requirement."

2. Your Committee has considered also the notice of motion of Rev. S. Bond for amendment of Section 8, of Par. 109, of the Discipline. And recommends in pursuance thereof that said section be amended so as

"8. The court shall keep a full and correct record of its proceedings; such record shall include (a) the ruling or decision appealed against; (b) the grounds of the appeal; (c) the grounds of resistance of the appeal; (d) the decision of the Court; (e) a summary of the reasons of the decision; (f) and that the decisions be published in the Guardian

3. Your Committee has considered also the notice of motion of Rev. W. Kettlewell and Rev. Dr. Cornish to amend certain paragraphs of the

And recommends that Par. 115 be amended

(1) By striking out after question (e) "Who are probationers on the list of reserve?" on Par. 55, all the words from "a probationer on the list of reserve," to "obligation to attend college," inclusive.

(2) By transferring the sentence on page 55, commencing "Notwithstanding irregularities or defects," etc., from its present position in Par. 115, to the end of Par. 113.

(3) By placing paragraphs now numbered 116 and 117, next after 113, and renumbering.

(4) By adding the following questions to Par. 115, between questions 3 and 4, and renumbering, viz.:

Who are recommended to a superannuated relation? Who are recommended to be superannuated for one year?

Who are recommended to a supernumerary relation?

(5) By adding the following questions, to follow question 12: is the report of the Committee on Conference Relations?

(6) By adding the following questions: What is the report of the Committee on the Pastoral Address? Who are the Committee on the Pastoral Address for next year?

(7) Par. 266, page 132, be amended by striking out the words "or probationers for the ministry," in the fourth line of the paragraph.

(8) Also that Par. 139 be amended by transferring Question 11 to a place after Question 21, and renumbering.

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4. Your Committee has considered also the notice of motion by Dr. Maclaren for amendment of Par. 116, and recommends in accordance therewith that Par. 116 be amended so as to read as follows:

"When a minister is so unacceptable, inefficient or secular as to be no longer useful in his work, the ministerial session may request him to ask a location, and if he refuses to comply, he shall be borne with until the next annual session, at which time, if he persist in his refusal, he may, without a formal trial, be located by a two-thirds vote of the ministers present and voting," etc., as in balance of paragraph.

5. Your Committee has considered also certain notices of motion by Rev. Dr. Shaw, for amendments of Discipline, and recommends, pursuant

to certain of them,

(1) That Par. 133 be amended by adding thereto the following: "When a principal delegate's place has been declared vacant and filled by a reserve, such principal delegate shall not afterwards be permitted to take his place, either during the regular, or an adjourned, or special session of the General Conference.

(2) That Par. 138 be amended by substituting for the word "ex-President," in the second line, the words "last ex-President, who is at the

time a member of the Conference."

6. Your Committee has considered the notice of motion of Dr. Mills for amendment of Par. 80, "Of Public Worship" and recommends that the figure and word "(2) invocation" be inserted after the word "doxology" and the remaining items renumbered.

7. Your Committee has considered the notice of the motion of Rev. S. Bond and Rev. W. Rigsby to amend Par. 121, and recommends in concurrence therewith that Par. 121 be amended by adding at the end

thereof the words "In the Journal of the Annual Conference."

8. Your Committee has considered the memorial of the Manitoba and North-West Conference for the election of alternates to District meetings, Annual Conferences and important connexional Committees, and recommends in reference thereto:

Sub-item (1) That Par. 158, Sec. 19, be amended by adding the words

"and what layman is elected as alternate."

Sub-item (2) Lost. Sub-item (3) Lost.

9. Your Committee has considered the memorial of the lay members of the Toronto Conference, for the recognition of meetings of lay members of Annual Conferences, and recommends that the following paragraph be inserted after Par. 134:

"The lay numbers of each Annual Conference may hold a special session during the sessions of the Conference, and their proceedings may

be reported to the Conference for information."

9. (a) Your Committee has considered the notice of motion of Rev. S. Bond and Rev. W. Rigsby for amendment of Par. 139, and in concurrence therewith recommends that after question 2 in said paragraph the following be inserted:

(3) What decisions has the President rendered on questions of law during the year? And the following questions renumbered.

10. Your Committee has considered the notice of motion of Rev. A.

Brown and Rev. Dr. Langford for amendment of Par. 140, and recommends that Par. 140 be amended by inserting after the word "representatives" in line 2 of Sec. 2, the words, "properly authorized in writing," and by inserting after the word "appointed" in said line the words, "from among its members," so that the first part of said subsection shall read, "Any Quarterly Official Board interested may also appear by not more than two representatives, properly authorized in writing, appointed from among its members at a regular meeting of the

11. Your Committee has considered the notice of the motion of Rev. S. Bond and Rev. Dr. Antliff to change position in Discipline of the section "Of the Formation of Districts and Circuits," and recommends in concurrence therewith, that Sec. 2 of Chapter 3 of Part 4, page 132, be united with Sec. 6 of Chapter 1 of Part 2, page 64.

13. Your Committee has considered the memorial of the Guelph District, endorsed by the Hamilton Conference, for amendment of Par. 149, and recommends that Par. 149 be amended by striking out of the second and third lines of Sec. 6 the words "the District Meeting from which they were recommended," and substituting therefor the words, "such District Meeting as the Conference may determine."

14. Your Committee has considered the notice of motion of Rev. A. D. Morton and Rev. W. H. Langille for amendment of Par. 158, and

recommends in partial concurrence therewith as follows:

That the following question be added to those in Sec. 13 of said para-

graph: "Have the Circuit registers been properly kept?"

15. Your Committee has considered the memorial of Rev. R. W. Woodsworth, endorsed by the Hamilton Conference, for the amendment of Par. 158, and recommends in amendment thereof:

That Question 1 in said paragraph be struck out and the following

substituted: "(1) What members are now present?"

16. Your Committee has considered the notice of motion of Rev. Dr. T. G. Williams and Rev. Dr. Griffith for amendment of Par. 162, and recommends, in concurrence therewith,

That Par. 162 be amended by striking out the words after the word "until" in the last line of the paragraph and substituting the words,

"the opening of the ensuing Annual Conference."

17. Your Committee has considered the notice of motion of Rev. A. D. Morton and Rev. W. H. Langille, for amendment of Par. 164, and recommends, in concurrence therewith,

That Par. 164 be amended by adding thereto the following words:

"the day and place to be determined by the Chairman."

18. Your Committee has considered the notices of motion of Rev. T. Albert Moore and H. P. Moore, and of Rev. Dr. Crothers and Rev. W. J. Jolliffe, re Par. 173, Sec. 4, and Par. 287, and recommends, in concurrence therewith,

That Par. 287 be amended by changing the word "seven" in line four to "five."

19. Your Committee has considered the memorial of the Manitoba and North-West Conference for the amendment of Par. 174, Section 6, and recommends, in partial concurrence therewith,

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That Par. 174, Section 6, be amended by adding the words "and a list of adherents," at the end of the section.

20. Your Committee has considered the motion of Rev. H. S. Matthews, indorsed by the Toronto Conference to provide for the auditing of funds controlled by Quarterly Official Boards and recommends, in pursuance thereof,

That Par. 195, Section 3, be amended by inserting the words "an audited" before the words "financial statement" in said section.

21. Your Committee has considered the notice of motion of Rev. T. M. Campbell for amendment of Par. 208, and recommends, in amendment thereof,

That after the words "good standing," be added the words "but such

representative shall not be a professional counsel."

22. Your Committee has considered the notice of motion of Rev. Dr. Crothers and Rev. W. J. Jolliffe, to amend Par. 215, and recommends, in amendment thereof,

That Par. 212, be amended by adding thereto the words "and as to law and procedure."

23. Lost.

24. Your Committee has considered the notice of motion of Rev. Dr. Ross to amend seventeen paragraphs relating to administration of discipline, rulings and appeals, and recommends, in concurrence with certain portions of said notice,

(1) That Par. 121 be amended by inserting after the words "appealed

against," in the last line but one of said paragraph, the following:

"Where the President of the Conference is interested in the appeal, either personally or because of having been concerned in any way in the trial appealed from, the appeal may be taken directly to a General Superintendent or to the Court of Appeal."

(2) Also that Par. 161 be amended by adding at the end of Section 8

of said paragraph the following:

"Where the Chairman is interested in the appeal, either personally or because of having been concerned in any way in the trial appealed from, the appeal may be taken directly to the President of the Conference."

That the word "court" in line 4 of Par. 244, be changed to "Committee."

27. Your Committee has considered the memorial of the Goderich District respecting prompt prosecution of appeals, and recommends

That Par. 220 be amended by adding thereto the words (1) "And in all such cases not more than thirty days shall elapse between the giving of notice and the presentation of such appeal to the proper officer who is to deal with the same."

(2) Also that Par. 109 be amended by inserting the following section

after Section 6, to be numbered "7. In all cases of appeal against the action of an Annual Conference the appeal must be taken within sixty days after the closing of said Conference, and the decision be given before the opening of the next Annual Conference," and renumbering the remaining sections.

28. Your Committee has considered the notice of motion of Rev. T. W. Jackson and Rev. Geo. Richardson to amend Par. 247, and recommends

That Sections 1, 2 and 3 of Par. 247 be amended to read as follows:

"1. The appropriation for salary of a married minister shall not be less than \$600 per annum, exclusive of the necessary expenses for horse keep, rent or free use of parsonage and incidentals.

"2. The appropriation for the salary of an ordained single minister shall not be less than \$350 per annum, exclusive of the necessary expenses

for horse keep and incidentals.

31. Your Committee has considered certain points presented for the consideration of the Conference by the General Superintendent in his quadrennial address, and referred to this Committee, and recommends, in pursuance thereof,

"That Par. 170 be amended by inserting, after the word "class" in the 6th line, the words, "the leader of each catechumen class, approved

by the members of the Quarterly Official Board."

Also that Par. 94 be amended by striking out the words after the

word "re-election" in the second line thereof.

As to the other points submitted, your Committee recommends no action.

- 32. That instead of the Quarterly Ticket, a yearly card of membership be given to each member of the church, but wherever any Quarterly Official Board by resolution expresses its desire for the continuance of the present system of the quarterly renewal of the ticket within the bounds of its circuit, it shall be at liberty to arrange for the same.
 - 33. Sub-Items 1, 2, and 3 were disposed of in other reports.

34. Item No. 32, as above, was substituted therefor.

35. Your Committee has considered a resolution of the Toronto Conference re interpretation of word "layman," etc., and

Recommends that it be referred to the Committee on Memorials.

36. Your Committee has considered

(1) The memorial of the Lay Association of the Montreal Conference re election of General Conference officers.

(2) Memorial of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference for legislation creating it a body corporate to hold property.

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(3) Memorial of Woodstock District, in Hamilton Conference, re time limit to permission for sale of church property.

(4) Notice of motion of J. J. Maclaren, LL.D., and J. A. M. Aikins,

Q.C., re creation of corporations within the Church.

(5) Notice of motion of Rev. Dr. T. G. Williams and Rev. W. H. Elmsley to amend Par. 398.

(6.) Minute from General Board of Missions re constitution of Epworth Leagues.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:—

1. It has considered the notice of motion of Rev. Dr. Dewart, to change the name of our Church to "The Methodist Church of Canada."

And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of this Conference.

2. Your Committee has also considered the memorial of the Nova Scotia Conference and the notice of motion of J. J. Maclaren, LL.D., and Rev. E. B. Ryckman, D.D., in favor of reducing the representation of Annual Conferences in the General Conference;

Also the memorials of the Barrie District, in the Toronto Conference, and of the Wingham District in the London Conference, and the notices of motion of Rev. W. R. Parker, D.D., of Rev. S. J. Allin, and of Rev. J. F. Ockley, in favor of changes in the mode of election of members of the General Conference.

And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of this Conference.

3. Also the notices of motion of Messrs. J. J. Maclaren, LL.D., and H. P. Moore for the appointment of an Executive Committee of the General Conference Special Committee;

Of Rev. Thos. Griffiths, Ph.D., and Rev. E. B. Ryckman, D.D., re vacancies in General Conference, and reserve delegates; and

Of J. J. Maclaren, LL.D., and Rev. E. B. Ryckman, D.D., that, until Annual Conference otherwise orders, the Rules of Order of General Conference shall govern.

And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of this Conference.

4. Your Committee has considered also the memorial of the Collingwood District in the Toronto Conference, that the Conference year be made to begin and end on or about the 1st of May.

And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of this Conference.

5. Your Committee has considered also the memorials of Wesley and Centenary Churches, indorsed by the Hamilton Conference, for equal lay and ministerial representation in the Annual District Meetings;

The memorial of the Goderich District, in the London Conference, that no chairman of a district hold office more than two years in succession;

The memorial of the Barrie District, in the Toronto Conference, re

minutes of Annual District Meeting;

Three notices of motion of Rev. A. D. Morton and Rev. W. H. Langille re biennial district visitations of circuits and missions.

And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of this Conference.

5a. With respect to the notice of motion of Rev. S. F. Huestis and Judge Chesley, that the Recording Steward be ex-officio a member of the Financial District Meeting,

We recommend "That where a Quarterly Board fails to elect a representative to the Financial District Meeting, the Recording Steward

of the Circuit shall be such representative."

6. Your Committee has considered also the memorial of the Nova Scotia Conference respecting invitations and correspondence with the Stationing Committee.

And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of

this Conference.

7. Your Committee has considered also the memorial of the Orange-ville District, endorsed by the Toronto Conference, and the notice of motion of Rev. Dr. Williamson and Rev. H. S. Matthews, relating to the examination of ministerial character.

And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of

this Conference.

8. Your Committee has considered also the memorial of the Bay of Quinte Conference, and the notices of motion of Rev. John Kay, of Rev. W. Swann, of Rev. H. P. Cowperthwaite and of Rev. M. Fenwick, respecting candidates and probationers for the ministry.

And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of

this Conference.

9. Your Committee has considered also the memorial of the Boissevain Quarterly Official Board, in Manitoba and North-West Conference, for a constitution and representation on the Board for Ladies' Aid Societies; the memorial of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference respecting the Chairmanship of the Quarterly Official Board; and the notice of motion of Rev. H. S. Matthews and Rev. J. F. Ockley, respecting the fixing of a quorum of said Board.

And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of

this Conference.

10. Your Committee has considered also the memorial of the Manitoba and North-West Conference respecting return of members and revision of lists; the memorial of Victoria District Meeting, in British Columbia Conference, for legalizing union of Quarterly and Trustee Boards for tinancial purposes, when desired; the memorial of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference for the appointment of at least one Steward for each appointment on a circuit; and the memorial of Westminster Quarterly Official Board, endorsed by the London District Meeting, for the appointment of two Stewards at each appointment.

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And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of this Conference.

11. Your Committee has considered also the notices of motion of Rev. A. E. Russ, M.A., and of a member of the Hamilton Conference respecting the selection of sites and the securing of funds for the erection of churches and parsonages.

And recommends that in lines three and four, Par. 249, page 126 the word "parsonage" be substituted for the word "churches."

12. Your Committee has considered also the memorial of the London Conference for amendment of Par. 266 respecting division of circuits.

And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of this Conference.

13. Your Committee has considered also the memorial of the Manitoba and North-West Conference for assessment of circuit contributions for salaries and connexional funds.

And does not recommend this Conference to take further action in this direction beyond what has already been taken in regard to the General Conference Fund.

14. Your Committee has considered also the notices of motion of Mr. R. W. Clarke and Rev. W. R. Young, to amend the General Rules by striking out the words "the putting on of gold or costly apparel," and to amend paragraph 86 of the Discipline.

And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of this Conference.

15. Your Committee has considered also the notices of motion of Rev. Dr. Heartz and Mr. R. K. Bishop, and of Rev. Dr. Langford and Rev. Dr. Ryckman, for changes in the order of public worship.

And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of this Conference.

16. Your Committee has considered also the memorials of the Hamilton and Nova Scotia Conferences, and of Rev. T. L. Wilkinson, for revision of the ritual in reference to baptismal and burial services; and of Rev. Dr. Withrow for the use of the Ten Commandments and Apostles' Creed in our liturgy, and the notice of motion of Rev. Dr. Williamson and Mr. John Mann respecting the ritual for baptism of infants.

And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of this Conference.

17. Your Committee has considered the notice of motion of Rev. T. M. Campbell and Joseph Tait, that the General Conference itself shall fix the salaries and allowances of all its officers.

And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of this Conference.

18. Your Committee has considered also the memorial of the Montreal Conference, the memorial of the Norwich District, in the Hamilton Conference, and notices of motion by Rev. Drs. S. G. Stone, T. G. Williams and J. S. Ross, to amend Part III of the Discipline.

And does not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of this Conference.

19. That Par. 121, page 58, seventh line from the top, after the words "he shall also," be amended by adding the following words:

"within sixty days from the date of the appeal," so as to read "He shall also within sixty days from the date of the appeal hear and determine appeals," etc.

20. Also that Par. 161, Sub-sec. 8, page 89, fourth line from the top, after the word "and," be amended by adding the words: "within sixty days from the date of the appeal," so as to read "and within sixty days from the date of the appeal hear and determine appeals," etc.

XI. COURT OF APPEAL.

QUADRENNIAL REPORT.

The Court of Appeal begs leave to report as follows:

During the past quadrennium the Court has held three sessions, including eight sittings. Ten cases have been inscribed for hearing. In nine of these judgment has been rendered as follows:

1. An appeal was made against the ruling of the President of the Toronto Conference, 1894-5, to the effect that it is competent for a Board of Trustees from its ordinary revenue to engage and pay musicians for purposes of religious worship. Appeal dismissed.

2. An appeal was made against the action of the Secretary-Treasurer of the Supernumerary Ministers' and Ministers' Widows' Fund in refusing to accept the annual fees tendered him by certain two ministers of the Newfoundland Conference who, the previous year, were left without an appointment at their own request. The Conference in giving them the position indicated, did not make it a condition that this year should not be counted in determining their ultimate claim. The constitution of the Fund shows the action of the Treasurer to have been unauthorized. Appeal sustained.

3. In the case of a member of a church within the Toronto Conference, obtaining a Certificate of Membership and presenting it for admission to another church within the limit of one year referred to in Discipline, Par. 174, 7, the Superintendent of said church, for reasons which he deemed sufficient, but which this Court declines to consider, as not affecting the issue in the present appeal, refused to receive such certificate. The said Superintendent was charged before the Toronto Conference of 1896 for mal-administration for so acting. The President of the Conference was asked to decide whether "the Superintendent of a circuit has any discretionary power as to receiving or not receiving into the membership of the Church of which he is pastor, any person who brings a proper letter of standing as a member of the Methodist Church." Upon this question the President ruled in the affirmative. Against this ruling appeal is taken. Appeal sustained.

4. In the case of a minister of the Bay of Quinte Conference, who had been tried on certain charges of immorality and deposed from the

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ministery. Appeal was taken September 7th, 1894, against this action for irregularity of procedure, and the appeal was sustained. No new trial was had, nor was his relation designated as located or supernumerary or superannuated. In the intervening years the District and Conference record showed his character to be clear. Still no appointment was given him. At the Conference of 1896 an agreement extraneous to disciplinary provision was made between the Conference and Appellant, in which, after admitting previous impropriety of conduct, though denying guilt on the major charges, he seeks to have his name continued on the Journals of Conference, and agrees "not to preach or exercise the functions of a minister within the jurisdiction of the Methodist Church in Canada, subject to the will of the Conference." Appeal is taken against the said action of Conference. Appeal sustained.

5. An orphan child of a deceased minister claims that there is discretionary power in the Superannuation Fund Board to afford her a grant beyond the age of sixteen years, which limit is referred to in Discipline, Par. 406. The General Superintendent, as presiding officer of said Board, ruled that such discretionary power does not exist. Appeal is made

against this ruling. Appeal dismissed.

6. In the case of a minister of the London Conference, he was superannuated in 1895 "for one year." In 1896 his name was transmitted by the Stationing Committee to the Committee on Conference Relations, with a recommendation for renewed superannuation, and also by the District Meeting to the said Committee with a recommendation to its "favorable consideration." the meaning of which recommendation is not clear. He was thereupon superannuated without any application on his part, such as referred to in Discipline, Par. 389. Respondent pleads usage in favor of compulsory superannuation. The plea of usage is admitted by this court when usage is uniform and not contrary to existing law. Appeal is taken against the action of Conference in superannuating the Appellant. Appeal sustained.

7. In the case of a minister of the Bay of Quinte Conference, his academic title was recognized in the printed minutes of said Conference from 1889 to 1895, except one year. Respondents, the said Conference, contend that this was without the order of the Board of Examiners required by Discipline, Par. 147, 4. Appeal is made against the Conference

for elimination of the title from the records. Appeal dismissed.

8. Appeal is made by a minister of the London Conference against the legislation of the last General Conference. This case was regarded

as ultra vires of this Court. Appeal dismissed.

9. In the case of a minister of the Bay of Quinte Conference, described above in No. 4. Appellant—He asks that the resolutions of Conference of 1897, 1898, requesting him to locate and locating him be declared beyond the power and jurisdiction of the Conference: (1) Because Section 116, Discipline, proceeding without trial is ultra vires under Section 92, (2) History of Section 116 shows there should be a trial. Sub-section 3. (3) Power to locate applies only to ministers in active work, which Appellant was not. (4) That admonition and formal trial are required by Section 238. (5) Resolution locating did not find that Appellant was unacceptable, inefficient, or secular. (6) A minister of over twentythree years' service cannot be located because of his relation to the Superannuation Fund. (7) The Annual Conferences of 1895, 1896, 1897, and the District Meetings of 1896, 1897, 1898, found and recorded that there are no objections to the Appellant's moral and religious character, and that "he has competent ability for our itinerant work." Conference so taking away the basis of its own action in the location. Appeal dismissed.

In the following case it has been found that, in fact, no decision was

given which could supply a basis of appeal.

A charge of mal-administration under eleven specifications against a Chairman of a District, who was at the same time President of the Conference, was brought before a committee or court of chairmen of districts, called by the Senior Chairman of the Conference. The Chairman arraigned, that is, the President of the Conference, objected to the power and jurisdiction of the Court to try said charge of mal-administration. The presiding officer of the Court, that is the Senior Chairman aforesaid, ruled the Committee or Court has no such jurisdiction. This ruling of the Senior Chairman was appealed against in due course to the President of the Conference, who is the party originally arraigned for mal-administration. Said President informed the representative of the original Complainant as to mal-administration, that he (the President) had found it impossible to give the appeal a hearing.

The Respondent contended, that in fact, he gave no ruling as alleged, and that his refusal to rule was based on the physical impossibility of his doing so, for the Appellant delayed four months in making his appeal after giving notice thereof, and when the communication was received the duties of the Respondent, as presiding officer of the Conference, took up all the time at his disposal, so that he could not during his brief remaining

term of office give any decision in the premises.

The Court, having carefully considered the arguments, resolved as follows: As yet there has been no decision given by the President of the London Conference on a question of law in the case from which an

appeal could lie to this Court.

The Court records its deep regret at the very unsatisfactory way in which important church records in many of the Conferences are kept. At one sitting of the Court frequent and painful evidence of negligence in this matter was afforded. In two instances the Journals of Conference were not available because not yet written up, although four months had elapsed since the sessions were held. It would be a serious misfortune if the Court were reluctantly compelled to dismiss any case simply for want of proper official documents.

It is recommended that hereafter appellants prepare a factum in each case for the General Superintendent and Secretary and other members of the Court, and transmit copies of the same in advance. The factum should be printed or type-written and contain, briefly and clearly stated, 1st, The decision or action of officers or Church Court which occasions the appeal; and 2nd, the legal grounds on which the appeal is based without

ag ument.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

Item 2. With reference to the rulings of Rev. F. B. Stratton, President of the Bay of Quinte Conference, on certain questions submitted to him at the Conference of June, 1895,

Re (1) Authority of Conference Secretaries to change the record,

(2) Power of Examining Boards in dealing with degrees,(3) Power of Secretary of Examining Board to deal with titles

not previously submitted to him,
Your Committee is of the opinion that the provisions of the Discipline
are adequate and the rulings in harmony with those provisions, and re-

are adequate and the rulings in harmony with those provisions, and recommends that no action be taken.

Item 3. In regard to the ruling of Rev. William Kettlewell, President

of the Hamilton Conference, February, 1896, in reference to an appeal from the decision of Rev. J. H. Robinson, who refused to appoint a committee to try a case that had been dealt with by his predecessor which had issued in a failure to agree on the part of the Committee of Trial,

Your Committee affirms the same judgment as in the foregoing case.

Item 4. Stricken out.

Item 5. That on questions of the administration of Discipline, appeals on questions of law, and respecting all other unfinished official business, it shall be the duty of the President of the Annual Conference to administer upon such of the above-named questions as may have been left unsettled by his predecessor in office; and in general the principle of the continuity of the presidential office, from year to year, is hereby affirmed.

The following are the rulings referred to in the above Report:

1. Ruling of the General Superintendent as President of the Hamilton Conference, 1895.

Under question, "Who are elected to fill vacancies in the General Conference Delegation?" this peculiar situation appeared: The General Conference of 1894 had changed the number and boundaries of the Annual Conferences, forming Hamilton Conference and London Conference from the former Niagara, Guelph and London Conferences, with a slight change to Toronto Conference, without making provision for the distribution of lay and clerical delegates to the General Conference in order to preserve their equality in number and their constitutional and regulating ratio of one to twelve for ministers.

The Chair gave direction: (1) The General Conference had made no provision to meet the case or to mark the succession of the Annual Conferences, as should have been done. (2) The matter would be of practical importance only in case of the necessity of calling a special General Conference, and might be left to be determined in case such necessity arose.

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(3) Meantime, that the lists of delegates from both Niagara and Guelph Conferences, as by the redistribution these Conferences have come within the bounds of the Hamilton Conference, should now be entered upon the Journals of the Hamilton Conference as composing its delegation to the General Conference should a special session be called during the quadrennium. The other Conference doing the same the membership of the General Conference may be well preserved. Any question arising can be dealt with when it arises.

2. Ruling of the President of the Bay of Quinte Conference, June, 1895.

(1) The President, Rev. F. B. Stratton, read a statement of his ruling in answer to three questions submitted to him by Rev. M. E. Wilson, as follows:

Ques. 1. Has the Secretary of a Conference any authority to alter or change any record of Conference after said record has been accepted and

adopted by said Conference? Ans. No.

Ques. 2. Does Section 3, page 76 of Discipline empower the Examining Board or the Secretary of Examining Board to deal with titles previously acknowledged and accepted by Conference, or does the said clause give the Examining Board retroactive power? Ans. The section gives full power to the Board over all titles, old or new, appearing in the records of present Conference, but it cannot alter the records of past Conferences.

Ques. 3. Does the said section empower said Secretary of Board to deal with titles never submitted to him or them, and without inquiry as to nature of title? Ans. It gives them power to inquire into all titles worn or assumed by any of our ministers which are proposed to be

entered on the minutes of the year.

3. Ruling of Rev. W. Kettlewell, President of Hamilton Annual Conference, February, 1896.

In re Appeal: Livingstone vs. Robinson.

Mrs. B. D. Livingstone, of Tilsonburg, appeals against the decision of Rev. J. H. Robinson, Superintendent of Tilsonburg Circuit, in which he refuses to appoint a committee to try charges preferred by appellant

against Mrs. T. T. Brown.

It would appear that practically the same charges were tried by a Committee summoned by the Rev. J. W. Cooley, and that said Committee heard a large number of witnesses, and gave long and careful attention to the evidence furnished; and that owing to the contradictory character of the evidence they failed to agree upon a decision, and that for this reason the Committee was discharged by the presiding officer on or about the 25th of May, 1895.

The Discipline provides in Par. 216, that "If the Committee do not agree upon a decision within a reasonable time, the presiding officer may summon another Committee, and proceed as if no trial had taken place." The presiding officer did not avail himself of the authority to summon another Committee, nor was he under obligation so to do; the law as contained in Par. 216 is permissive, not mandatory: the presiding officer is

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to use his own judgment, and in the exercise of this discretionary power, Mr. Cooley discharged the Committee and did not summon another.

Under these circumstances it becomes a serious question whether the new Superintendent, Mr. Robinson, has power to entertain the charge and summon a Committee. If he possesses the authority it must be under a li eral construction of the term "presiding officer" in Par. 216, for this appears to be the only section in the Discipline applicable to the circumstances; and if authority to summon a Committee is conferred upon the new Superintendent by Par. 216, the alternative power to refuse to summon another Committee is also conferred.

The appeal is therefore dismissed.

2. GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT'S COURT OF APPEAL.

Besides the appeal cases adjudicated upon in the full Court of Appeal, upon which the Registrar or Secretary of said court will duly report to the Conference, several causes were tried in the preliminary court, and

settled as appears in the following statements:

1. From the Nova Scotia Conference—Appellant complained that having been granted a supernumerary relation in 1892, that having gone to Colorado for his health, of which absence from the country the Secretary of the Conference had been duly notified; that after correspondence with the Halifax District Chairman of 1893, having been recommended by the District Meeting for a continuance of the supernumerary relation, and then by the Annual Conference not having been given an appointment, but entered as having leave of absence for one year, which leave of absence he did not request, thus being cut off from the Supernumerary Fund and not given a circuit, that by said action of the Conference he was deprived both of supernumerary allowance and circuit pay for year

The appeal was allowed, and an argued statement duly presented to the Conference.

2. New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference—Complainant urges that a case of acceptance of resignation of membership by the pastor, which resignation was subsequently withdrawn, though accepted, and notice of acceptance given before said withdrawal, was in reality an expulsion from the Church without charges and due forms of discipline. This cause as affecting the administration of the minister in charge was duly appealed to the Chairman of the District, then to the President of the Conference and them to the General Superintendent, who confirmed the action of the lower courts, dismissed the appeal, and forwarded an argued decision.

3. New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference-Appeal was taken to the President of Conference as to the insertion of names other than those of the ministers and probationers in the Station Sheet,

or draft of Stations as read to the Conference under provisions of Discipline. The President of the Conference ruled, and Conference voted that names of hired local preachers may appear in full in the Station Sheet as presented to the Conference, like the names of ministers and probationers. Appellant complained of this as violation of Discipline, and carried the matter forward to the General Superintendent, who sustained the appeal.

4. New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference—The question arose whether permission to be and remain without a circuit for a year in order to engage in Connexional work, should be granted by the Annual Conference in full session of ministers or laymen, or by the Ministerial Session of the Annual Conference. On appeal to the Chair, the President of the Conference decided that granting said permission is the prerogative of the Ministerial Session. Appeal was taken from this decision to the General Superintendent, who dismissed the appeal and confirmed the decision of the Chair of the Conference.

5. London Conference—In the case of a probationer who had travelled three years, with studies not completed and years not yet fully credited, when the question was raised whether he was obliged to pay the annual subscription for the year to the Superannuation Fund, the President of the Conference ruled that until the probationer had been fully allowed the years he had travelled (that is both as to studies and time) he was not required to pay the said subscription. Appeal was taken to the General Superintendent against the ruling of the President, mainly on the ground that "travelling," in the Disciplinary sense, and allowance for studies are separate and different things. The General Superintendent allowed the

6. Hamilton Conference—Appeal was taken against the action of the Conference as exceeding its jurisdiction in apportioning and allotting funds raised ostensibly for salary or ministerial support, but actually for the Superannuation Fund, to the Superannuation Fund column in the Returns, without consulting the parties subscribing the same; and so reporting in the minutes of Conference. The appeal was dismissed and

the right of the Conference to review the matter upheld.

7. Bay of Quinte Conference -A probationer, who claimed to have travelled three years, but had not finished the studies of the three years, being still behind in other subjects besides Greek, demanded of the Conference under Discipline to be sent to College. The Conference resisted the demand and appointed him to a circuit. The probationer appealed to the General Superintendent, who dismissed the appeal; "on a circuit" for three years, in a Disciplinary sense, being held to be different from "travelling three years."

8. Manitoba and North-West Conference—Appeal is taken under last sentence of Par. 201, p. 111 Discipline, against the decision of the President of the Conference, that the Chairman of the District or President of the Conference not disqualified in appointing a duly qualified substitute, must appoint a Chairman or President, as the case may be, in order to comply with the requirements of equal status as set down in said Par. 201. Appellant held that the sense of the Discipline is, that inasmuch as the Superintendent of the Circuit, not a Chairman or President, should have presided at the first had he not been disqualified as accuser,

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the Chairman of the District was entitled to appoint some other superintendent of Circuit, though not a Chairman, to preside, this position the Court of Appeal affirmed. Appeal being allowed.

9. Manitoba and North-West Conference-A vacancy had occurred during the year in Chairmanship of a District by transfer. This vacancy had been duly filled under authority and by process of Discipline, Par. 162, p. 90. When the question was asked, Par. 139, Item 2, p. 62, "Are there any vacancies in the office of chairmen of districts?" the President of the Conference ruled that it is the intent of the Discipline that the Chairman duly appointed under Par. 162, aforesaid, is as truly and fully Chairman as though he had been appointed at the previous Annual Conference; and that, therefore, there was in this case no vacancy. Against this ruling of the President appeal was taken.

The appeal was dismissed.

10. Newfoundland Conference—In the Annual Conference of 1897, protest was entered against the standing of a minister who had been tried for immoral conduct in 1895, when the Ministerial Court of the Conference passed the case over to the Annual Conference Special Committee, in view of certain restitutions, which Committee restored the said minister, who had been suspended, to his standing. In 1897 the President of the Conference ruled out said protest against his standing. Appeal was taken on the ground that the Ministerial Session of 1895 exceeded its jurisdiction in appointing the Special Committee of that Conference to finally dispose of the case. The General Superintendent sustained the President's ruling as to the protest. He further pointed out that if appeal had been taken in 1895, or even in 1896, when the Annual Conference Special Committee reported upon the case, or in all the intervening months, the issue might now be joined and a judgment given on the special point of appeal. But as the standing of the brother arraigned had been at least ostensibly restored in 1895, and he had been recognized as in good standing at the Conference of 1896 when the Annual Conference Special Committee reported and the books were closed on the case, and up to the Conference of 1897, the Court of Appeal declined then to re-open the case on an alleged irregularity of procedure in 1895, wherefore the point raised in appeal of the authority of the Annual Conference Court to employ the Annual Conference Special Committee in the final disposition of the case was not brought under review or adjudicated or pronounced upon. But the ruling of the protest out of order in the Conference of 1897 by the President thereof was sustained.

11. Newfoundland Conference—Bonavista District in electing laymen to the Annual Conference had elected some from within the boundaries of the St. John's District. Exception was taken to such election, on the grounds that the equality in number of laymen and ministers might thereby be destroyed, and appeal so laid: which appeal was dismissed.

12. Newfoundland Conference-Appeal was taken against the admission by the Conference of a candidate on probation who had failed in one of the subjects of the Preliminary Course besides the Greek, in 1896, and in 1897 failed of due recommendation by the Quarterly Official Board and the District Meeting. Appeal allowed, the Conference having exceeded jurisdiction.

In all these twelve cases reasoned decisions were given, covering in all thirty-six pages of letter-paper. These, as well as those given in the report of the Court of Appeal, demonstrate the urgent need of uniformity

of administration throughout the Conferences.

(APPEAL.)

RESOLUTION OF THE HAMILTON CONFERENCE, 1895.

Resolved, That whereas the General Conference of 1894 did enact legislation which has changed the term of ministerial probation from four to five years, contrary to the Basis of Union (Discipline, p. 313, Section 11) thus affecting the rights and privileges of the Annual Conferences:

That this Annual Conference, in Special Ministerial Session assembled, does hereby respectfully appeal to the Court of Appeal to so construe the aforesaid legislation of the General Conference, that its intent shall be to determine only the Course of Study to be pursued, and not to interfere with the right of Annual Conferences to elect into full Connexion any probationer who has travelled four years and passed all examinations in the Course of Study.

The party appointed to prosecute this appeal was informed by the Preliminary Court, that the appeal was of a character not within the jurisdiction of the court, which might possibly deal with a specific case, if appeal were taken, but not with a general interpretation of the relation of constitution and law as above presented. Here the matter dropped; but it involves a question claiming the consideration of the General Conference.

TRANSFERS.

In the matter of transfers, over and above those effected by the several committees, eight instances are found in the books of the General Superintendent in which he effected the transfers under provisions of Discipline.

By the several committees of 1895, 19 transfers were effected.

By the several committees of 1896, 21 transfers were effected.

By the several committees of 1897, 24 transfers were effected. By the several committees of 1898, 21 transfers were effected.

GENERAL CONFERENCE XIII. FUND AND FINANCE.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

In respect to the extracts from the address of the General Superintendent, submitted to this Committee, it is recommended that the following paragraphs be returned to the table of the Secretary of the Conference, for the reason that the subject matter therein embraces questions not properly within the class coming under the notice of this Committee.

Membership of the General Conference.

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Superine followaference, ions not tee. 2. Legal succession of Annual Conferences.

3. Effect of transfers on lay representation in Annual Conferences. (The above subjects were referred to the Committee on Discipline).

4. In relation to the fourth clause of the General Superintendent's communication, your Committee directs attention of Conference to the fact that instructions for the guidance of those interested are explicit in the Discipline.

5. In respect to the memorial from the Toronto Conference, your Committee recommends that suitable provisions shall be made for auditing all Connexional funds and resources, in connection with which adequate provisions do not now exist in the Discipline,—Referred to the Committee on Discipline.

6. Re memorial Bay of Quinte Conference, General Conference Fund,

—Your Committee does not recommend action therein.

7. In respect to the resolution from Mr. C. A. Birge re the billeting system, your Committee find that on account of the multiplicity of large conventions frequently held in central towns and cities, it is becoming increasingly difficult to secure suitable accommodation for the billeting of the General Conference, and as it is desirable that the burden of expense should be distributed as equitably as possible, therefore, it is recommended: "That the members of the General Conference, not paying for themselves at boarding-houses or hotels, shall pay to the Treasurer of the Billeting Committee the sum of five dollars each, to provide a fund for billeting delegates."

8. In respect to the resolution from the Toronto Conference, suggesting an equitable method by which the indebtedness of the General Conference shall be paid, your Committee have ascertained that the annual charges upon the General Conference Fund, including the cost of the General Conference session, approximate \$6,000 each year, and whereas it is important that not only should the debt not be increased within the next quadrennium, but be reduced as much as possible, without placing too heavy a burden upon the resources of the Connexion, it is recommended that the following be the annual apportionments for the next quadrennium upon the respective Conference as a series of the context.

10. Your Committee recommend that the Treasurer of the Superannuation Fund shall be the Treasurer of the General Conference Fund. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Your Committee, in reply to the instruction of Conference to prepare and submit to Conference a constitution relating to the General Conference Funds, to recommend a Board to be charged with the management of this Fund, to intimate such expenses as are legitimate claims on this Fund, and to provide for an annual audit, recommends the following constitution:

25. General Conference Fund Constitution.

Art. I. The name of this Fund shall be "The General Conference Fund of the Methodist Church."

Art. II. The object of this Fund shall be to provide for:

- (a) Salary, office and travelling expenses of the General Superintendent.
- (b) Expenses of Standing Committees and Boards of General Conference not otherwise provided for.
 - (c) Expenses of Fraternal delegates appointed by General Conference. (d) Travelling expenses of delegates to General Conference.
- (e) Other necessary expenses incident to the meeting of General Conference.
 - (f) Payment of General Conference indebtedness.

Income.

Art. III. The sources of income shall be from the following annual apportionments for the next quadrennium, and until the same shall have been altered or amended by General Conference:

Art. VI. The Board of Management shall fill any vacancy that may

occur in the Board during the quadrennium.

Your Committee recommends the appointment of Messrs. W. T. R. Preston, Chester D. Massey, R. C. Hamilton and Rev. J. F. Ockley, with the Treasurer of the Fund, as the Board of Management for the coming quadrennium.

XIV.-CHURCH PROPERTY.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

It has considered that part of the address of the General Superintendent relating to land titles in Manitoba and the North-West Territories, and also the memorial from the Calgary District Meeting on the same subject, and the motion of Mr. J. J. Maclaren as to making Trustee Boards minor corporations, etc., and begs to recommend as follows:

1. That the whole question of the obtaining of the legislation

necessary as to such titles, be referred to the General Conference Special Committee.

2. That the said General Conference Special Committee also consider the proposal to constitute each Trust Board a minor or subsidiary corporation auxiliary to the corporation, the Methodist Church.

3. That if the said Committee is of opinion that legislation is necessary in the interests of the Church it shall have power to take steps to secure it.

4. In that event it may also secure legislation to carry out the decisions of this or previous General Conferences which may require such legislation. Also for power to reduce the number of members of Trustee Boards where it is found to be too large, but not below the minimum of five, and to reduce the quorum of Trustee Boards below an absolute majority, as fixed by Section 22 of the Model Deed; also any minor provisions that may be found necessary, not inconsistent with General Conference Legislation.

5. The said Committee shall also consider the propriety of imposing some reasonable restrictions on the power of mortgaging Church property,

and may embody such in such legislation, if obtained.

The whole is respectfully submitted.

XV.—CHURCH AND PARSONAGE AID FUND.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

1. The capital of this Fund on the 31st March, 1894, was \$24,983.21. Of this amount \$5,449.52 consisted of worthless and unavailable loans. During the past quadrennium, however, some substantial payments have been made in several cases on these loans; principal and interest were paid on account, on loans which had never realized anything previously. These payments have not only immediately benefited the Fund, but, we believe, have restored loans hitherto considered valueless, to the class of good loans, so that it can now be said that none of the loans are considered bad. Of the \$5,449.52 bad loans in 1894, the sum of \$3,948.67 has been written off. Deducting this amount and the expense of management, and adding the profits from interest on loans belonging to the general branch of the Fund, the capital now stands at \$23,790.01. The amount of this capital invested in mortgages is \$19,799.29, and the balance, \$3,990.72, is on deposit in the Imperial Bank.

2. We had before us the financial statement and the report of the Standing Committee for the past four years, and find that the statement shows satisfactory and prudent management of the business for the term.

3. Regarding the memorial of the Victoria Street Church, Goderich, your Committee has carefully enquired into the whole matter, and recommends that the request of the memorialists be granted, and that the sum of \$1,000, instead of \$700, be paid in full for the reduction of their church debt.

4. In reference to the document referred to the Committee, as coming from Robert Alder and William Scott, Prescott, your Committee recommends that no action be taken.

5. Your Committee would recommend that the Treasurer's report be published in the JOURNAL of the General Conference as follows:

7. Your Committee would recommend that, in recognition of the valuable services of Mr. J. N. Lake, Treasurer, for the past twelve years, the sum of two hundred dollars be paid him.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION APPOINTED BY THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF 1894 TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF 1898.

FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—The Commission re Connexional Fire Insurance held its first meeting on October 5th, 1896, when it proceeded to put into effect the instructions of the General Conference, viz., "To prepare the details of the scheme and its basis of operation; " which, in accordance with the order of the General Conference, were duly submitted to the General Conference Special Committee.

The Special Committee, as appeared in its report already submitted to this General Conference, made a number of changes in the scheme proposed to them, which were embodied subsequently in the scheme of the Commission. The General Conference Special Committee subsequently gave consent for the company to "be organised and put in operation."

The Commission in October, 1896, in order to obtain as much information as possible as to the prospect of success of a Connexional Fire Insurance Company, issued a circular to each superintendent minister, in all 1,429, asking the following questions:

(a) Name of each appointment on circuit? (b) Value of building and value of contents?

(c) Is it insured, and if so, in what office or offices?

(d) What is insurance on building, and what on contents? (e) Is the term one or three years?

(f) What is the premium?

(g) When does term expire?

(h) What is estimated loss (if any) by fire on Connexional property on your present circuit since the Union of 1884?

(i) How much was covered by insurance?

Seven hundred and sixty-two replies were received, which represent rather more than half the amount of the property owned by the Methodist Church as given in the statistics reported in the Journal of the General Conference of 1894. From these replies it appears that:-

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The Commission made enquiries as to the results of the operations of similar Fire companies in Great Britain, and they found that without an exception such companies had been eminently successful. The Wesleyan Methodist Trust Assurance Company, besides paying interest and dividends in the preceding year, amounting to £2,047, made a grant to the Wornout Ministers' Fund of £1,100. This company has accumulated since its organization in 1872 a reserve fund of £60,000.

The Ecclesiastical (Anglican) Insurance Office, though established only about nine years, paid last year £1,208 in dividends, and granted to various Church societies the sum of £3,000. This company has a reserve

fund of £30,000.

Still another example of successful operation is that of the Primitive Methodist Insurance Company, organized in 1863. With a nominal capital of £20,000, only £50 had been paid by the shareholders. On this, while no dividends have been paid, as the subscribers undertook the business from benevolent motives, a reserve fund of £25,000 has been accumulated, and in the preceding year £1,065 was distributed to needy Trustee Boards.

After due sanction had been obtained from the General Conference Special Committee, steps were taken to obtain the necessary Act of the Dominion Parliament. B. M. Britton, Esq., Q.C., M.P., kindly took charge of the Bill in the House of Commons, and the Hon. J. C. Aikins in the Senate. The Act was assented to 21st May, 1897.

The Provisional Board of Directors named in the Act consists of all the members of the Commission with the addition of the names of the Hon. W. E. Sanford; B. M. Britton, Esq., M.P.; and Edmund D.

O'Flynn, Esq.

The Act of Incorporation having been obtained, the Commission was merged in the Provisional Board of Directors, which has subsequently had charge of the business of the proposed company.

A copy of the Act of Parliament is herewith submitted.

The expenses incurred by the Commission amount to \$441.50, which includes the parliamentary and legal fees in obtaining the Act. The detailed statement of the account is appended.

2. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE INSURANCE OF CONNEXIONAL PROPERTY.

Your Committee begs to report as follows:

That in relation to the subject of the Insurance of Connexional Property, your Committee has had under review and consideration,

(a) The proceedings of the Commission appointed at the last General Conference.

(b) The statistics and information that were compiled as to the value of Connexional property, and the Insurance thereon; as well as premiums and losses, etc.

(c) The Act of Incorporation obtained from the Dominion Parliament.

(d) The steps taken by the Provisional Board, issuing prospectus, obtaining estimates, etc.

And has also had full verbal explanations of the "Basis of Estimate" and the calculations relating thereto; and would respectfully recommend:

1. That the proceedings of the Commission appointed at the last General Conference, and the steps taken by the Provisional Board of Directors be approved.

2. That the declaration of the last General Conference bearing upon

this subject be re-affirmed.

3. That inasmuch as the Act of Incorporation, as it stands, does not afford proper protection and compensation for the cash capital to be obtained from shareholders, such steps to be taken and such amendments to the Act be secured as the Directors may deem suitable in that behalf.

4. That Boards of Trustees of our Church be requested to lend their prompt, active and hearty co-operation with the Board of Directors and Management of this company to husband the resources of our Church, so that there may be secured out of these contributions of our people liberal allotments for the benefit of the faithful ministers of our Church on the retired list: thus reserving the churches' money for the Church's use.

5. That measures be adopted to have the necessary capital subscribed as quickly as possible; and, inasmuch as the enquiries of the Committee would go to show that with experienced, but economical management, the enterprise will prove successful, these subscriptions are commended to the favorable consideration of friends in our Church having money to invest.

6. That we recommend that only the Report of the Commission appointed at the last General Conference be printed in the journal of this

General Conference.

7. That the expenses of the Commission on Connexional Fire Insurance, \$441.50, and also the expenses of the Provisional Board of Directors of the Methodist Trust Fire Insurance Company, \$139.85, making a total of \$581.35, be paid by the General Conference Fund. Provided, however, that as soon as the company is in a position to reimburse the Fund, it shall do so.

2. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

1. The Montreal Conference asks that the Clerical Treasurer be not also Treasurer of the General Conference Fund. Your Committee recommends non-concurrence.

2. The Montreal Conference asks that no further loans be made to the General Conference Fund. Your Committee recommends that in view of the perfect security afforded, and the mutual advantage to both funds, the loan be continued within the limit at present directed by the Board, viz., \$20,000.

3. The Montreal and British Columbia Conferences, and also the Rev. J. R. Gundy, ask that the constitution of the Fund be so amended as that all annuities may be paid in full. Your Committee recommends the following, viz.:

We exceedingly regret that the Board, during the past quadrennium, has not been able to pay the annuities of superannuates and widows in full. This appears to have arisen from two causes, the abnormal increase in the number of claimants, and the financial depression that has prevented any expansion of salaries and Connexional funds, which form the basis of percentage on which the income of the Fund is largely based. We confidently expect that during the coming Quadrennium there will be an improvement in these conditions, and it is our sincere conviction that it is not in the interests of the claimants that there should be any increase, either in the assessment on the circuits, or on the ministers; and we must ask our superannuated brethren, and the widows of our ministers, to bear this burden a little longer in the hope that it will be alleviated in the near future.

We can necessity of superannu reception maturely

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We cannot too strongly impress upon our Annual Conferences the necessity of sacredly guarding this Fund by a conservative policy in the superannuation of ministers, and by the adoption of such a policy in the reception of candidates for the ministry as will not press ministers prematurely out of the active service of the Church.

4. A memorial of Rev. A. H. Going, forwarded by the London Conference, asks for the division of the Fund so that circuit contributions shall be applied only for the benefit of those whose income is less than a certain minimum.

It is recommended that as this matter was given serious attention four years ago, it is inexpedient at the present time to reopen the question or make any change. We would also remind those who favor a division of the Fund, as suggested in the memorial, that the ministers, directly or indirectly, already contribute almost enough to meet the claims of their superannuated brethren; or more exactly, the sources of income other than circuit contributions last year paid 87 per cent. of the superannuated ministers' claims, thus leaving almost the entire circuit contributions to be disbursed to the widows and orphans.

5. The Montreal Conference and the Walkerton District of the Hamilton Conference, ask for amendments to the constitution of the Fund by which better to enforce the provisions of Pars. 383, 384 and 385. It is recommended to amend the constitution by adding the following, viz., "Par. 385 (a.) Non-compliance with the provisions of Pars. 383, 384, 385 and 387, by any circuit, minister or probationer shall be reported specifically by the Chairman of the District to the Annual Conference, and if the chairman fails to make such report, it shall be the duty of the General Treasurers to proceed against such chairman, in disciplinary form for failure to 'observe and enforce our discipline.'"

6. The British Columbia Conference protests against missionary contributions being made part of the basis of circuit assessment. Committee recommends no change.

7. The Exeter District of the London Conference asks for legislation making uniform the exemption of salary from assessment on account of horse keep.

It is recommended to amend Par. 384 by adding the following, viz., "The exemption of salary on account of horse keep or hire shall in no case exceed \$60."

8. Dr. W. C. Henderson presents motion to increase circuit assessment from five to five and a quarter per cent. Committee recommends non-concurrence.

9. Dr. W. R. Parker presents memorial of Toronto Conference to make the circuit assessment a first claim on circuit funds, or failing this, that the sum paid by the minister to make up circuit assessment be deducted from the salary as reported.

Your Committee recognizes with satisfaction the increasing number of Quarterly Official Boards that makes the circuit assessment part of the appropriations, and trusts that this practice will in the near future become universal, but cannot recommend that the practice be made compulsory, neither does the Committee concur in Dr. Parker's alternative proposal.

10. The Quarterly Official Boards of the Grace Church, St. Thomas,

and of the Port Elgin Circuit, memorialize the General Conference against the principle of compulsory circuit assessment.

The Committee rejoices that there are so few memorials of this kind

and recommends no change.

11. The Rev. W. Kettlewell moves to amend the constitution of the Fund by striking out Par. 389 and substituting the following, viz.:

389. (a) The initiative in the superannuation of a minister, or in his restoration to the active work, may be taken by himself, by his Annual

District meeting, or by his Annual Conference.

389. (b) Each Annual Conference shall have a Committee on Conference Relations, consisting of the ministerial members of the Superannuation Fund Board in the Conference, and seven other ministers appointed by the Conference, to which all cases of superannuation, or restoration to the active work, shall be referred.

389. (c) No superannuated relation shall be granted by an Annual Conference, except on the recommendation of the Committee on Conference Relations. The said Committee in making its recommendation shall not take into consideration anything else than the question, "Is the minister recommended for superannuation, or asking for the same, really worn out or temporarily disabled in the itinerant service?" Provided, however, that in case the Committee report adversely, the Conference may, by the vote of not less than three-fourths of the ministers present, grant a superannuated relation.

389. (d) A minister who is superannuated, or the payment of whose annuity is suspended, or who is restored to the active work, by the regular action of his Annual Conference, shall have no option but to

accept the decision of the same.

Your Committee recommends the adoption of this amendment.

12. Rev. T. M. Campbell moves to amend Par. 389 by adding the

following, viz.:—

"The said Committee on Conference Relations shall have power to require a medical examination of the minister, recommended for, or seeking superannuation, by a physician, named by itself, who shall make the examination in behalf of the Annual Conference; nevertheless, this shall not apply to ministers of 40 years' standing."

Committee recommends the adoption of this amendment, the same to

follow Par. 389 (c).

13. The Superannuation Fund Board recommends the following changes in the constitution of the Fund, viz.:

(a) That Par. 406 be amended by inserting in the 6th line after the words, "unprovided for," the words "even though beyond 16 years of age."

(b) Add to Par. 414 the words, "And it shall be optional with a superannuated minister as to whether he shall accept commutation or not."

(c) Amend Par. 417 by inserting, in the third line, after the word "have," the words "one-half." Also amend same paragraph by striking out the words "if a superannuated minister be deposed from the ministry," and substituting therefor "if he is a superannuated minister."

(d) Amend Art. VII. of the Constitution of the Fund by inserting a

new paragraph after Par. 388 as follows, viz.:

"388. (b) The initiative in the superannuation of a minister, or in his

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restoration to the active work, may be taken by the minister himself, by his Annual District meeting or by his Annual Conference."

(e) Amend Par. 408 by inserting in the 7th line, after the word

"shall," the words, "in its discretion."

(f) Amend Par. 387 by inserting in the 5th line, after the word "serves," the words, "or by himself."

Your Committee recommends that items (a), (c) and (f) be adopted.

That the following be substituted for item (b):

Add to Par. 414, "and it shall be optional with a superannuated minister, who has a standing of 23 years or upwards, whether he shall accept commutation or not, but in all other cases the decision of the Board shall be binding on the minister concerned."

Item (d) is dealt with in another connection, and therefore requires no

action.

For item (e) substitute the following, viz.:

"Amend Par. 408 by striking out all after the word "Conference" in the 7th line, and substituting therefor the following, viz., "May recommend the suspension of the payment of his annuity. The Board of Management shall have power to act on such recommendation, and the decision of the Board in such matters shall be final."

14. The Board of Managers of Albert College ask for relief from the provisions of Par. 387, as being burdensome to the weaker educational

institutions.

The Committee recommends no action.

15. J. J. Maclaren, Q.C., and Rev. T. M. Campbell, each moves to

It is recommended that Par. 416 be amended by adding the following, viz., "If he has rendered 23 or more years of service his interest in the Fund shall be commuted by the Board on the scale hereinbefore provided.'

16. Mr. J. J. Maclaren moves to amend Par. 116 by striking out the

last sentence thereof.

It is recommended that Par. 116 be amended by striking out the words "superannuation or " in the 10th line thereof.

17. Dr. W. R. Parker presents memorial of Toronto Conference to so

amend Par. 387 as to relieve evangelists from its provisions.

Your Committee recommends non-concurrence.

18. Rev. J. A. Ferguson memorializes the General Conference to allow him to "level up" so as to be relieved from the restriction imposed by Par. 398.

The Committee recommends no action.

19. Rev. Jas. Elliott moves that the children of Rev. J. Holmes be recommended for special provision, as contemplated by Discipline.

Your Committee has already recommended that Par. 406 be so amended as to bring such cases clearly within the discretion of the Board, therefore further action is unnecessary.

20. The report of the Board for the quadrennium was carefully considered by your Committee and it recommends the adoption of the same by the General Conference.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

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XIX.—SUPERNUMERARY MINISTERS' AND MINISTERS' WIDOWS' FUND.

1. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

The delegates of the Eastern Section met, according to Discipline, in Room "L" of Metropolitan Church, Toronto, on Wednesday, September 14th, 1898, to consider the affairs of the Supernumerary Ministers' and Ministers' Widows' Fund, and report as follows:

1. Changes in the Constitution of the Supernumerary Ministers' and

Ministers' Widows' Fund-

(1) That Par. 447 be amended by the insertion of the following after the words "annual subscriptions": Provided always that it shall be lawful for the General Treasurer to pay to the parties properly authorized to receive them, any amounts due by the party or parties claiming repayment, to the Book Room of the Eastern Section of the Methodist Church or to that of the Western Section, or to any Fund of the Methodist Church, and the receipt of the aforementioned properly authorized parties shall be a sufficient discharge as against the claimant or claimants as aforesaid.

(2) That Par. 433 be amended in the first line by changing "the"

into "a," so as to read "a Secretary-Treasurer."

(3) That Par. 435, after "District Meeting," read: Nevertheless, this shall not be held to permit any minister to pay who is a supernumerary or has leave of absence from his Conference for such time as he is a supernumerary or has leave of absence.

(4) That we memorialize the General Conference to insert the word "supernumerary" after the word "superannuation" in Par. 139, Sub-

section 2, Clause 9.

(5) That Par. 425 be amended so as to read: "It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to collect and disburse from year to year all the monies constituting 'The Current Income,' according to the provisions of the Constitution, and in any case in which there are, or shall hereafter be, arrears of payments due by ministers who are members of the Fund, it shall be the duty of the Treasurers to report such cases to the General Committee, which shall thereupon take such steps as may be necessary to collect said arrears, with interest at the rate of six per cent., compounded annually; nevertheless, in the case of any such arrears existing at the date of passage of this amended article of the Constitution, it shall be competent for the General Committee, when the interests of the Fund appear to demand it, to compromise with the parties concerned by accepting payment for a less number of years than are due (with interest as above for the number of years accepted), or to cancel the full amount of the arrears and interest. In every such case it shall not be competent for the General Committee to allow, in respect to such years paid for, a greater number of years' claims on the Fund than that to which said payments would entitle the parties under the Constitution, as provided in ERS

Par. 442; and, further, it is enacted, in the case of any members of the Fund who have been in arrears as above, and have for any term of years been on the list of supernumeraries, or who may now be on said list, or in the case of any widows now on the list of claimants, or who may have been on said list, that they shall not have a claim for payment for any number of years for which during the time they were supernumerary claimants they did not receive allowance on account of the fact that they were then in arrears in their payments to the Fund."

2. A ballot being taken, Rev. E. Evans, D.D., and Rev. C. H. Paisley,

M.A., were duly elected General Treasurers of the Fund.

3. Appended is a summary of the financial business of the quadrennium, marked "A." Also the last annual statement, marked "B" and "C."

1. That we have considered carefully the memorial of Mr. T. G. Mason respecting the increased ritual in the ordinary services of the Church, and while recognizing the thoughtful character of the memorial itself and the excellent spirit which pervades it, we do not consider it expedient to recommend any change in the direction indicated by the memorialist.

We would, however, call the attention of the General Conference and the Church at large to the great importance of becoming seriousness, reverence and dignity in all the exercises of religious worship, and the duty of ministers to avoid and repress everything of an opposite tendency and to maintain uniformity in the order of worship as now provided in the Discipline.

We would also urge the desirability of a public administration of the rite of baptism wherever practicable, and the duty of the disciplinary observance of our impressive service of reception into full membership of the Church

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

Regarding that part of the General Superintendent's quadrennial address, which refers to the Order of Precedence for the Clergy in State functions in Canada, the action of the Government of Sir Mackenzie Bowell in changing the same at the funeral of Sir John Thompson, in response to the protests of our Conferences and the memorials of the

4. The Montreal Conference has requested the General Conference to make such representations as may be deemed proper to the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States, regarding the reception of ministers and probationers of our Church into their Conferences without official credentials. We recommend that the General Superintendent write a friendly letter to the Board of Bishops respecting this matter.

5. A memorial from the Perth District, endorsed and approved by the Montreal Conference, calls attention "to the growing neglect in the public worship of our Church of the appropriate and scriptural attitude of kneeling in prayer," and asking the General Conference to call attention to the neglect and to recommend proper width and kneeling forms in the pews. We recommend the prayer of the memorial.

6. Touching a memorial on the subject of Freemasonry, your Committee do not consider it advisable that the Conference should enact legislation prohibiting ministers and other official members of our Church from becoming members of Freemason or similar societies, believing that this would be an undue interference with Christian liberty.

Nevertheless, we think our ministers and members should keep steadily in view the duty of holding all things in subordination to loyalty to Christ and the establishment of His kingdom in the earth.

7. Laid on the table, having been previously dealt with.

8. Not concurred in.

9. The Memorials of the

(1) Nova Scotia Conference,

(2) New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference,

(3) British Columbia Conference,

- (4) Bermuda District, with the endorsation of the Nova Scotia Conference,
- (5) Milton District, with the endorsation of the Hamilton Conference, and
- (6) Mount Forest District of the Woman's Missionary Society, praying that women be admitted to the District Meetings, Annual Conferences, and the General Conference on the same conditions as men, have been considered.

Your Committee, while pronouncing no opinion on the merits of the question, has no reason for believing that there is any considerable number of women in our Church who desire the change proposed. It is therefore recommended that no action be taken by the present Conference.

Henderson, of Toronto, praying the General Conference "to protect congregations against the growing evil of manuscript preachers," your Committee has no evidence before it that the reading of sermons in the pulpit is generally prevalent; therefore see no necessity for making any recommendation further than suggesting that this method of delivering sermons be employed as little as possible.

(2) That the sphere of the Temperance Committee be enlarged so as to include all moral reforms, and that that Committee be called "The Committee on Temperance, Prohibition and Moral Reform."

2. With reference to the memorial of the Rev. J. C. Ash, we report: That, whereas the contents of the memorial have received already the careful and judicial consideration of the Court of Appeal, and whereas the subject of location and all other parts of the Discipline are now undergoing the usual quadrennial consideration and revision, we are of the opinion that no action should be taken as affecting the personal interests of the memorialist.

XXI.—ITINERANCY AND TRANSFERS.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE, No. 1.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

1. That they have taken into careful consideration the various memorials, resolutions and notices of motion referred to them, relating to the pastoral term, and recommend:

That the proviso in Sub-section 4, Par. 140, page 65 of the Discipline. be so amended as to read as follows:

Provided, however, that at the request of a Quarterly Board, expressed

by a three-fourths vote of those present and voting by ballot at a regular meeting (notice having been duly given that the question of the pastoral supply will be considered thereat), the Stationing Committee may appoint a minister to a circuit or station for four or five years in succession.

2. That all memorials, resolutions and notices of motion referring to the abolition or regulation of what is known as the "invitation system"

have been considered.

Your Committee recommend that in regard thereto no action be taken.

REPORT No. 2.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

3. That we have carefully considered the several memorials referred to us on the general subject of facilitating the transfer of ministers,

and make the following recommendations:

(a) That Par. 110, page 50 of the Discipline, be struck out and the following substituted therefor, viz.: The Transfer Committee shall be composed of the General Superintendent and the Presidents of the Annual Conferences, except Mission Conferences. The Committee shall meet annually at the call of the General Superintendent.

(b) That Sub-section 4, page 50 of the Discipline, be amended so as to read, viz.: "And that no minister be transferred without his consent,

except by a two-thirds' vote of the members present."

(c) That Sub-section 8, page 51 of the Discipline, be amended so as to read: "The ultimate claims of any minister or probationer upon the connexional funds shall not be prejudiced by his transfer."

(d) That Sub-section 11, page 52, be amended to read: "The General Superintendent, and the Presidents of the two Conferences concerned, shall have authority to transfer any probationer on the list of reserve to any Conference where a supply is required."

(e) That Sub-section 12, page 52, be so amended as to read: "The General Superintendent and the Presidents concerned shall have authority to transfer, during the year, any minister from one Conference to another for the purpose of filling a vacancy, provided it be not done without the consent of the minister concerned.'

(f) That Sub-section 14, Par. 110, be repealed.

4. We recommend that at least four married men shall be transferred from the Newfoundland Conference to the other Conferences during the quadrennium, if such men so desire. The men transferred into the Newfoundland Conference shall have the right to return after ten years, if they so desire.

That not more than one of the ministers transferred from the Newfoundland Conference shall be transferred into any one Conference with-

out the consent of the President of such Conference.

5. We have duly considered a notice of motion referred to us to amend Sub-section 4, Par. 140, and recommend non-concurrence.

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6. We have also considered the memorial referred to us re a Central Stationing Committee, and do not recommend the same to the favorable consideration of the General Conference.

7. The decisions of the Committee in all cases of transfer shall be

final.

XXIII.—TEMPERANCE.

1. REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

At the close of the last General Conference a meeting of the Committee was called by the General Superintendent for organization which was effected by electing the Rev. D. L. Brethour, Secretary-Treasurer.

Your Committee has nothing startling to report, but there has been a quiet, steady growth of public sentiment in favor of national prohibition, and an increasing dissatisfaction with the license system, as a final settlement of the question of the relation of the liquor traffic to the State.

ROYAL COMMISSION.

The report of the Standing Committee at the last General Conference declares the appointment of the Royal Commission unsatisfactory, and refused to accept that action as a sufficient and proper answer to the petitions of the Churches which asked for immediate prohibition.

In 1895, nearly three years after its appointment, the Commission presented to Parliament its final report, whose findings were adverse to

prohibition—a result which surprised no one. However,

There is nothing of importance in the license legislation of the quadrennium in any of the Provinces where the plebiscite votes were taken, though these votes were splendid indications of the advanced prohibitory sentiment of the people.

DOMINION PLEBISCITE.

Regarding the importance of the plebiscite previously taken, the Reform party of the Dominion, in its Convention of 1893, pledged itself, if elected to power, to submit the question of the prohibition of the liquor traffic to the vote of the people of the whole Dominion. At the general election of 1896, the Reform party was placed in power, and, after some tedious delays, brought down a Plebiscite Bill, and is now asking the will of the people.

Efforts were made by the liquor party to complicate the form of ballot, making it much more difficult to secure a favorable verdict at the polls. But strong protests were offered, and our friends in the House of Commons, backed by the power of Christian sentiment, prevailed against their cunning artifice, thus leaving the submission of the question to the people in the form most simple and easy to be understood.

We consider this present time in our history to be very favorable for an advanced movement in the line of the greatest social and moral reform of the closing years of the nineteenth century.

The high standard of morals prevailing in Canada, and the comparative homogeneity of our people indicate Providential favor. It is the plain duty of all the Methodist voters of Canada to go to the ballot box on the 29th inst. and vote for prohibition, and then stand by the Government that gives prohibition. The success of the temperance reform during the present generation would seem to largely turn upon the verdict received on that date. A prohibitory liquor law on the statute books without an administration behind it to enforce the law will be sadly disappointing.

It is worthy of note that recently the House of Commons ordered the closing of the liquor section of the House restaurant, and no liquor is dispensed to any one.

It is to be regretted that the Senate has not followed the excellent example set by the Lower House. It is earnestly to be hoped that the honorable members of the Upper Chamber will, at the next session of the Senate, bow before the force of Christian sentiment and abolish the bar at that Chamber.

During the quadrennium the Temperance Reform has suffered serious loss by the death of some of its most earnest leaders:

Neal Dow, the father of prohibition, Frances E. Willard, the uncrowned queen of American womanhood; Letitia Youmans, the mother of the Woman's Movement in Canada, and our own indefatigable and intense A. M. Phillips and James Van Wyck are among the number.

2. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE AND PROHIBITION.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows :-

1. The report of the Standing Committee on Temperance has been received by us. We find that valuable information has been gathered by it, and we cordially approve the wise action of the General Conference in its appointment. We would recommend the publication of said report in the JOURNAL of this Conference and the appointment of a Committee for the coming quadrennium.

2. In view of the clear and emphatic utterances of the General Superintendent in his quadrennial address to this Conference on the Plebiscite, and the action of the Conference thereon in ordering the publication of a large number of copies of said address for immediate circulation throughout the Dominion, we deem it unnecessary to make further reference to the same, except to urge our people everywhere to exercise their influence in all possible and proper ways to roll up such a majority as will remove all doubt as to the wishes of the people of Canada in regard to this question.

3. It is a matter of regret that so many of our ministers and active laymen are absent from their various fields of action at this critical time, and we would therefore urge those who are at their respective homes to more than make up by increased activity for this enforced absence.

4. From all information received we find the various provinces to be well organized. The apathy so painfully apparent at the beginning of the campaign is rapidly disappearing, public meetings are being largely held and immense quantities of Prohibition literature are being circulated.

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5. The situation in Quebec is especially interesting and hopeful. The part which Bishop Bond is taking in the public advocacy of prohibition is commanding and influential, and is greatly helping the workers in that The churches are actively sympathetic, and our own Methodism is taking part in the contest in the very front rank with unabated zeal and hope.

6. That "the liquor traffic cannot be legalized without sin" is a deliverance of Methodism which indicates the highest flood tide of advance yet reached in the evolution of the Temperance question, and is an utterance that cannot be too often repeated. Slavery was designated "the sum of all villainies." Surely, as the century closes, the same may be said of a business which traffics in the bodies and souls of men; and no candidate for parliamentary or municipal honors who does not practically recognize this, should receive the support of our Methodist people. The bar-room is the creature of license; license is the creature of legislatures; the Legislature is the creature of the people. Let the people vote Prohibition and the license system will perish.

7. In the summer of 1894 the late Hon. W. E. Gladstone, in a letter to Lord Thring, declares the condition of England brought about by license, to be "a disgrace to the country, and that the mere limitation of numbers (of licenses), the ideal of Parliament for the last twenty years, though pretending to the honor of a remedy, is little better than an im-

posture."

8. Sir Oliver Mowat said, referring to the 82,000 majority in the Ontario plebiscite, that the "vote removed all difficulty in the way of the people demanding prohibition. There are many subjects on which the people have not been sufficiently educated for advanced legislation, but upon this subject (Prohibition) the people have been sufficiently educated."

9. The righteousness which exalts a nation is identical with that which regenerates a man. That which is wrong for the individual is not right for the State. Anything that would degrade the individual would equally degrade the State. If it is not right for the individual man to sell liquor, how can it be right for the collective man—the State to sell it?

10. It is the duty of Christian electors in this crisis hour of our history to so fix the policy which must be adopted by the Government of Canada after the 29th of this present month by giving such an overwhelming vote in favor of Prohibition that all succeeding governments during the coming twentieth century will not dare or even attempt to change it--the

policy of Prohibition.

11. Your Committee learns with profound regret that intoxicating liquors are sold in canteens in connection with the Militia and Volunteer camps of the Dominion, as well as in the barracks of the Mounted Police. Large numbers of young men are thus led into temptation, and it is commonly reported that drunkenness largely prevails in some of those places. As a consequence parents, who have freely given their sons to the service of their country, have found that when they have returned home many of them have fallen under the power of the liquor habit. We therefore strongly protest against the sale of any intoxicating liquors at any canteen or barracks, and would recommend this Conference to appoint a deputation consisting of the General Superintendent, Rev. Dr.

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Rose, Rev. Thomas Crosby, Thomas Nixon, Esq., and Dr. Boulton, to interview the Minister of Militia and the Minister of the Interior, urging the issuing of such instructions as shall lead to the prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors in said canteens.

12. Your Committee is deeply pained to learn that a system of permits for the introduction of intoxicating liquors into the Yukon Territory has been inaugurated, thus exposing to terrible temptation the multitude of people who have gone into that inhospitable climate, where it is certain very many of them will fall under the curse of the drinking habit, the precursor of crime, degradation and utter ruin, after having left communities and homes of virtue and sobriety. We would earnestly urge that the Dominion Government be petitioned by this Conference to enact and put into force similar laws to those which prevailed in the North-West Territories during the building of the Canadian Pacific Railway and other public works. The experience of those resident in the Territories during the time of the Lieutenant-Governorship of the Hon. Mr. Laird, and the stipendiary magistracy of Colonel McLeod show that it is quite possible to carry into effective operation a prohibitory law in such districts.

13. In the Cassiar District of British Columbia, a sad state of things exist. The late government of the province issued two liquor licenses, one at Port Simpson, in the midst of seven hundred Indians on that mission station; the other at Port Essington, amongst the salmon canneries. These licenses have been hindered for ten years by the wise activity of those most deeply interested in the people, including many of the business men of the Northern coast.

In Cassiar proper, on the Upper Stikine River, there are several liquor licenses among the miners and heathen Indians. All reports from that country go to show there is great consequent degradation and demoralization among the native tribes.

14. The influence of the whole Church should be brought to bear upon that province to revoke these licenses at the earliest opportunity for they are certain (where there is such a preponderance of Indian population) to work much harm to those Indians as well as prove a great barrier in the way of their evangelization. We would recommend the Conference to take immediate action in this matter.

15. The results of the appointment of the Royal Commission on the Liquor Traffic by the late Government, as feared by the Temperance people, show that such Commission was an evasion of the demand of the Churches for immediate prohibition. The majority findings of the Commission were favorable to the traffic. The minority report, however, declares that the evidence produced before the Commission would have justified the immediate enactment of a prohibitory law.

16. In the report of your Committee of 1894, reference was made to the granting of a brewery license in Neepawa, Manitoba, which was within local option territory. We have pleasure in saying that, owing to earnest protests to the Government re that matter, the result has been the withdrawal of the license, for which we are grateful, and trust that our further representations against other glaring evils along similar lines will bear equally good fruit.

17. It being true that the liquor traffic is an enemy of the Church, it

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must of necessity be inconsistent and unchristian to countenance it in any way or to aid in the smallest degree those who engage in it. We therefore call the earnest attention of our members who have thoughtlessly or otherwise signed petitions asking for liquor licenses, to the wrong of While we cannot believe any considerable number of our people are guilty in this respect, it is nevertheless a fact that names of not only members but officials of our church are occasionally to be found on such petitions. We are persuaded that to mention this matter will be sufficient to correct it.

18. As it is important that the Standing Committee on Temperance and Prohibition be in possession of the necessary funds for properly carrying on the work of the coming quadrennium, your Committee would respectfully call the attention of superintendents of circuits and missions to p. 228 and Pars. 470 and 471 of the Discipline of 1894, governing the holding of Public Temperance Meetings, the taking of Collections and forwarding the same to the Treasurer of the Standing Committee.

We desire to recognize the grand work being done in the public schools of Canada in imparting instruction upon the nature and effects of intoxicating liquors, and to express our hearty appreciation of the same.

DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES.

19. In view (1) of the verdict of science regarding the nature and effects of intoxicating liquors; and (2) of the experience of the world regarding their use for beverage purposes and of former declarations of this General Conference; and (3) of the teachings of Holy Scripture we make the following declaration of principles:

(1) That the traffic in intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes is

immoral, and it is the duty of the civil government to prohibit it.

(2) That total abstinence from all intoxicating beverages is the imperative duty of every individual.

(3) That the liquor traffic is a business antagonistic to every interest of the Church and the State.

(4) That we condemn the license feature of all statutes by which money is accepted for the legal protection of an immoral traffic.

(5) That the Government—Dominion, Provincial or Municipal—that accepts money from liquor licenses becomes a partner in the business justly declared to be an enemy of God and man.

(6) That we protest against this unholy alliance.

(7) That the only proper attitude of the Christian toward the liquor traffic is that of relentless hostility; and all members of the Methodist Church who possess the elective franchise are hereby strongly recommended to use their influence to secure the nomination of municipal and parliamentary candidates known to favor and support prohibition, and to use their votes as a solemn trust to elect such candidates, thus promoting the rescue of our country from the guilt and dishonor which have been brought upon it by a criminal complicity with the traffic.

(8) That civic righteousness demands the extirpation of a traffic so fruitful of corruption in every department of civil government. And the time has come when all good citizens should unite for harmonious and aggressive action at the ballot box to secure this end.

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traffic so And the ious and (9) That we adopt the declaration of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the United States "That the pronounced and stupendous need of the hour to meet this enemy of everything American and Christian is an aroused Church consecrated to the extermination of the traffic"

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We respectfully urge all our ministers and Sunday School workers to give greater attention to and diligence in temperance work in the Sabbath Schools on the lines of pledge-taking and of the discipline of our Church. Careful, wise and persistent instruction here is imperative if our children would be able in later years of life to successfully meet the deceptive and deadly influences of this great enemy of the home, the Church and the State.

The report of the treasurer showed that the income of the quadrennium was \$107.83, and the expenditure \$43.51, leaving a balance on hand of \$64.32.

XXIV.—CONFERENCE BOUNDARIES.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

That memorials affecting the boundaries of four Conferences were presented from the Montreal, Bay of Quinte and Hamilton Conferences. These have been carefully considered, and your Committee begs to recommend as follows:

1. A memorial from the Hamilton Conference, asking that the Cataract Appointment, on Alton Circuit, Orangeville District of Toronto Conference, be transferred to Erin Circuit, Guelph District of the Hamilton Conference. Your Committee recommends that the transfer be made.

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2. Referring to the memorial from the Nipissing and Sudbury Districts of the Montreal Conference, and the recommendation of the Montreal Conference of the said memorials, asking that the Nipissing and Sudbury districts be transferred from the Montreal Conference to the Toronto Conference, your Committee recommends that the transfer be

3. Regarding the memorial from the Nipissing Financial District Meeting, asking that the transfer of the Nipissing District from the Montreal to the Toronto Conference, if made, shall take effect on the rising of the Montreal Conference of 1899. Your Committee recommends non-concurrence.

4. A memorial was presented from the Montreal Conference, asking that the Napanee and Tamworth Districts be transferred from the Bay of Quinte Conference to the Montreal Conference; also, a memorial from the Bay of Quinte Conference, and one each from the Napanee, Campbellford, Brighton, Cobourg and Madoc Districts of the Bay of Quinte Conference, in opposition to the transfer asked for by the Montreal Conference. Your Committee recommends that no change be made.

XXV. SOCIAL QUESTIONS.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Your Committee, to which has been assigned the task of expressing the mind of the Conference on the relation of Christianity to social questions, and which has also had under consideration a memorial from certain members and adherents of the Methodist Church respecting "the laws that affect our social and industrial relationships," begs leave to report as follows:

The Christian Church has not perhaps always fully recognized the importance of social conditions. There may be danger to-day that dependence on environment may be by many exaggerated well nigh to the denial of man's distinctive glory of self-determination. Yet such a danger must not lead us to underestimate the importance of the social framework in which the individual finds himself.

The Christianization of the conditions and relations of the individual is as strictly, if not as primarily, the duty of the Church as the Christianization of the individual himself; and there can be no struggle, whether for juster laws, more equitable distribution of the rewards of labor, or for the conditions of a healthier and fuller human life, which the Church can regard without deep sympathy.

The extremes of wealth and poverty are to be deplored, not only because of their injustice, but because of their unfavorable influence on The wise man has said, "Give me neither poverty nor

But while sympathising deeply with all movements for the improvement of social conditions the Church would deprecate the idea that social wrongs can be righted by blind impulses of sympathy. Wide observation and profound study are also essential, and the Church does not assume to anticipate in all cases conclusions which the Creator has apparently left for our discovery. Only so far, therefore, as reforms have approved themselves as righteous does the Church as a Church feel justified in advocating them.

That such approved measures of reform there are to-day, we believe, and some of them we would state.

1. THE TEMPERANCE REFORM.

First in importance we would place the Temperance Reform.

The economic influence of intemperance we believe to be very great. It induces idleness and poverty, entails heavy social burdens, and by lessening the consumption of all products, save those in the production of which the labor is least in proportion to the capital, diminishes opportunities of employment.

But the subject of Temperance falls more strictly within the province of another committee.

2. THE UNEMPLOYED.

Another reform and a pressing one is the securing of employment for every man willing to work.

It is a grievous hardship that in a Christian land there should be a hungry mouth where there are willing hands. Conversely, if any man will not work neither should he eat. The tramp should be transformed or suppressed. Employment bureaus in connection with various churches have been found of great benefit. Labor colonies should be established in our country as in Germany, where men out of work could go or be sent, and find employment that would at least support them until better opportunities should be found. Begging should be discouraged. Charity organizations should be consolidated, so as to prevent overlapping or neglect, and should be placed under municipal supervision.

3. Wages and Conditions of Labor.

All legitimate efforts should be made to secure to every worker a living wage.

There should be also, we believe, constant and vigilant oversight of the conditions of labor, as, for example, the number of hours, the sanitary and other conditions, to the end that men may, as far as possible have pleasure in their work, and sufficient leisure for recreation and for social, intellectual and religious development.

The weekly day of rest and worship should be preserved inviolate as the sacred right of labor, and we would strongly urge that a weekly halfholiday (on the Saturday, whenever practicable), should be steadily 1898]

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violate as ekly halfsteadily advocated as a good thing in itself and a most valuable safeguard of the Lord's Day. We rejoice that such a movement has in many places been successfully inaugurated.

Not less earnestly, we believe, should be emphasized the duty on the part of the employees of faithful work. Carelessness and indolence should be recognised as dishonesty. Taking advantage of a necessity to exact unfair terms, is to be condemned, whether on the part of employer or

organized employees.

Finally, in regard to the relations between capital and labor, we feel that there is great need that it should be made clear to all that there is no necessary antagonism between capital and labor, the difficulties that arise from time to time being, we are of opinion, largely if not chiefly due to each party looking at the question from a personal or selfish point of view.

4. Co-operation and Communal Action.

The principle of co-operation, we are glad to note, is becoming more widely recognized, and is destined, in our judgment, to receive a more extended application as time goes on, in our social and industrial life.

It is in harmony, we think, with the spirit of Christian brotherhood and mutual helpfulness that the community which now provides for every child a free education should still further extend its beneficence. generous expenditure of public funds is, in our judgment, commendable in the direction of parks and playgrounds in crowded quarters of our cities, free libraries, concerts and art galleries, free baths and gymnasia; in short, in the direction of everything that tends to equalize rich and poor in all that is essential to a full human life. As far as possible opportunity, at least, should be equalized.

5. Conclusion.

Standing on the threshold of another century, we rejoice in the emancipations and ameliorations that have been wrought during the last. Emphatically, it has been the century of the workingman. Much, very much remains to be done, but we ought not to be blind to the progress already made. The increase in comfort and well-being achieved through science and invention, and the vast development of commerce has not been shared by the few alone. If the rich are richer, it is not, we conceive, generally true that the poor are growing poorer.

The discontent of to-day we attribute not so much to aggravated conditions as to higher ideals of life and broader conceptions of human duty And it is to these higher ideals and these broader conceptions, as inspired by the spirit of Christ, and applied to all the relations of life, that we look for the removal of the injustice and avoidable suffering which still challenge the truceless hostility of the Church of Christ.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

After a careful review and a thorough discussion of the general state of the work, we see abundant reason for our people to thank God and to take courage. In most, if not in all, respects the prosperity of our Church during the last four years compares very favorably with that of any similar period in the history of Canadian Methodism.

The encouraging features of the review are both numerous and gratifying. Our educational institutions are progressing, our missionary societies are prospering, our Epworth Leagues are multiplying, our Sunday Schools are flourishing, our Church membership is increasing, and, notwithstanding the financial depression through which the country has been passing, our Church debts are gradually decreasing.

The attendance at public worship on the Lord's Day, we are glad to find, continues good. There seems to be an unabated interest in the practical exposition of divine truth. As a rule, the people come out well to both the morning and the evening service; though, in some of our town and city congregations, there is a growing disposition on the part of the younger people to stay away from Church on Sunday morning, and on the part of the older people to stay away on Sunday night. The number of children who attend these public means of grace is not so large, we believe, as it might be or as it should be; and we suggest that an effort be made to secure their presence in larger numbers at one of the services, at least.

The attendance at the social means of grace, the prayer-meeting and the class-meeting, varies very much in different parts of the country and at different seasons of the year, and the proportionate number of members who attend them is much larger in some places than in others; but we are strongly of the opinion that much more might be done to increase the general interest in these meetings. We feel persuaded that such services might be made a great deal more profitable as well as a great deal more effective, if all who participated in them would give more thought to them during the week. While much depends on the special preparation of the leader, either of a prayer-meeting or of a class-meeting, much also depends on the spiritual preparation of those who take part in such a service.

Respecting the prevalence of domestic worship, we hesitate, because of insufficient information, to speak with certainty. We have some reason to fear, however, that it is scarcely keeping pace with the growth of our Church, and that prayer in the family and with the family is not nearly so general now as it formerly was. In multitudes of Christian homes it is not observed at all, and in multitudes more its observance is irregular and intermittent. But the duty of domestic worship is so scriptural, and the influence of such worship, when reverently observed, is so beneficial, that, in our judgment, it will be little less than calamitous to the households of Methodism if the family altar be allowed to fall into ruins.

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Our annual increase of membership, we regret to find, is not so large as that reported at the last Conference; and the whole quadrennium shows an increase of scarcely 20,000, whereas the total increase of the preceding quadrennium was about 27,000. This difference, though considerable, affords no real ground for uneasiness, however, as it may be reasonably explained. The smaller returns are owing partly to the too prevalent dependence on professional evangelists, partly to the more rigid revision of our church registers, partly to the comparatively slow growth of the population of our Dominion, and partly to the unusually large number of removals to the United States, the Yukon District, and elsewhere.

Still, however we may explain it, the fact remains that we seem not to have grown so rapidly during the past as during the previous term, and it is hoped that all our people, both lay and clerical, will lay the matter seriously to heart; so that, if they discover any evil causes of hindrance, such as secularism, materialism, false liberalism, reckless criticism, old modes of thought, or old methods of work, they should endeavor at once to have them removed. It is only by the removal of that which impedes alike our personal and our collective progress that we can rationally expect either to advance the cause of religion or to promote the prosperity of the Church.

In this connection, we desire to emphasize the duty of adapting our institutions to the special needs of this progressive age. Therefore, we should seek to have our organization as complete and our machinery as perfect as it is possible to make them. If our machinery is antiquated, we should modernize it; if our methods are obsolete, we should revise them; if our ways of working or our modes of thinking are out of date, we should bring them up to date. But, while we emphasize the duty of adapting our institutions to the changed conditions of our time, we have a feeling of distrust towards many modern methods of evangelization and revivalism. Hence we deprecate the use of novel and sensational means of working up revival meetings and the employment of untrained and inexperienced revivalists. Every Christian minister should be an evangelist, and every local preacher, every class leader, every church member, an evangelistic worker.

At the present time, there seems to be a tendency to think too much of organization, and to rely too much upon machinery. As a consequence, we help to discourage the work of the individual. We form so many different societies and hold so many special meetings that little time is left to the active worker for private prayer, or personal study, or individual effort. Even our young people's associations, we regret to find, are sometimes having this effect; and it is disappointing to learn that, in some localities, they are also operating disadvantageously by dividing the membership of the Church into two classes and by creating a gulf between the old and the young. In certain neighborhoods, we have been assured, their influence has not added either to the numerical or to the spiritual strength of the congregation.

There is one means of replenishing our membership of which, we feel, far greater use could be made. We often speak of the Sunday School as the nursery of the Church, but the number transplanted from the one to the

other is not nearly so large as it should be. We believe that the Sunday School might be utilized much more fully than it has been for the purpose of bringing the young people into fellowship with the Church, if the teachers would talk more frequently with their scholars upon the duty of taking a stand for Christ, and of offering themselves for admission to Church membership on a public profession of their faith.

In conclusion, we would like to urge upon our people the need of cultivating a deeper spirituality of mind and heart. With the heart man believeth unto righteousness, and out of the heart are the issues of life. The true prosperity of the Church rests primarily upon the individual members of it; and the power, the success, the usefulness of the individual rests fundamentally upon the life. Much as depends on prayer, more depends on work, and much as depends on prayer and work, more still depends on life. No other influence is so subtle or so powerful for good as a life that is hid with Christ in God.

XXVII.—DEACONESSES.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

1. The Deaconess Movement is no longer in the experimental stage. It has already more than justified the expectations of its promoters, and has shown itself by the unanswerable argument of large practical usefulness, providentially adapted to fill an important place in the work of the Church.

2. So far, the centre of Deaconess activity, and especially of Deaconess training, has been in the city of Toronto, and in connection with the Toronto Conference. Through the generosity of the executors of the estate of the late Hart A. Massey, Esq., and the liberal aid of friends of the movement in the city, a valuable property on Jarvis Street, Toronto, has been secured for a Deaconess' Home and Training School, which is now one of the best on the continent, and which affords ample facilities for the thorough and practical training, not only of Deaconesses, but of evangelists, home and foreign mission workers, Sunday School teachers, and any and all others of our own denomination, or any other, who may come seeking special instruction and preparation for Christian philanthropic work.

3. The Training School has a staff of instructors numbering thirtyone, including many of the most scholarly and distinguished ministers, teachers and specialists in the city, who give their services gratuitously, and with great enthusiasm and success, to the work of preparing the candidates for their self-denying calling.

The Home is under the efficient management of Miss E. Jean Scott,

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who may be regarded as providentially given to the movement at the most important crisis in its history, and who is stamping her own capacity for enthusiastic self-sacrifice, and her own lofty ideals of life and service deeply on the characters of those brought under her influence.

- 4. An Examination Board has been organized in connection with the Training School, and suitable regulations established, under which a course of study may be completed and acknowledged by a graduating diploma. Suitable candidates are admitted to all the educational advantages of the Institution without distinction of sex, and without payment of any fee, except the small sum of two dollars on entrance to cover incidental expenses. French students are boarded in the Home for three dollars per week.
- 5. As an evidence of the valuable work done, it may be noted that last year the Deaconesses made 2,070 canvass visits, 5,059 missionary calls, and 1,362 visits to the sick. They spent 2,598 hours visiting the sick, they gave away 2,119 half-worn garments and 371 new garments, and spent \$305 in relieving emergent cases of distress.
- 6. The Committee recommends that the following shall be the Course of Study for Deaconesses, to be completed in the first year:

The Board of Management may vary the Course of Study to meet the circumstances of individual students and the possibilities of the Training School when deemed advisable.

SECOND YEAR.

The second year's reading shall consist of the Life of St. Paul (Stalker), Makers of Methodism (Withrow), Women of Methodism (Stevens), History of Canada (Clement), New Era (Strong), Modern Cities and their Problems (Loomis), Socialism and Christianity (Behrends).

7. It is recommended that Sec. 5, Par. 126 (a), of the Discipline be amended by striking out the words, "No vow shall be exacted from them, neither shall life-long service or enforced residence be necessary," and inserting the words, "Nor vow of life-long service shall be exacted from them; "also by the elision of the paragraph referring to dress and the insertion of the words, "Deaconesses shall wear the distinctive dress registered by authority of the General Conference in the office of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa."

FORM OF SERVICE.

8. The following is recommended as a form of service for the setting apart of Deaconesses in the Methodist Church:

After an introductory service at the time appointed, the Chairman of the Deaconess Board, or some other Minister, shall present to the General Superintendent or President of Conference, having charge of the service, the person or persons to be set apart to Deaconess work, saying:

Mr. President-I present unto you these persons, to be set apart as Deaconesses in the Methodist Church.

The President—Have you reason to believe them to be fit and qualified by a godly life and by skill and training in womanly ministrations, to discharge the duties of a Deaconess?

Answer-They have given satisfactory evidence, during probation, by practical service and by the prosecution of the prescribed studies of meet-

ness for this calling.

Then shall the President say to the congregation:

Dearly Beloved-In the record of the earthly life of our Divine Master we learn that He accepted and honored the service rendered Him by loving and devout women. In the apostolic age it was the practice of the Church to give employment to the activity of all believers. Notable among their activities was the employment of godly women of suitable gifts as deaconesses or servants of the Church. St. Paul, writing to the Philippians, says, "Help these women which labored with me in the Gospel." He also commends unto the Church at Rome Phœbe, a Deaconess of the Church, which was at Cenchrea. To this honored service these persons now come to be admitted. We have good confidence that they are apt and competent thereto, nevertheless, should there be any of

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you who know any reason for which it is inexpedient that these persons, or any of them, should be so set apart, let it now be declared.

If no impediment be alleged, the President shall read and the Candi-

date shall respond as follows:

President—The spirit of the Lord God is upon me; because the Lord hath sent me to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to them that are bound.

Response-Unto every one of us is given grace according to the

measure of the gift of Christ.

President—Then shall the righteous answer him, saying, Lord, when saw we Thee an hungered, and fed Thee? or thirsty, and gave Thee drink? When saw we Thee a stranger and took Thee in? or naked and clothed Thee? or when saw we Thee sick, or in prison, and came unto Thee?

Response—And the King shall answer and say unto them, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto Me.

Then all kneeling, the President shall say: President—Unto Thee lift we up our eyes.

Response—O Thou that dwellest in the heavens;

President—As the eyes of servants look unto the hand of their masters; Response—And as the eyes of a maiden unto the hand of her mistress;

President—Even so our eyes wait upon Thee, O Lord;

Response—Until Thou have mercy upon us.

President—Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who didst call Phebe and other devout women to be the servants of Thy Church, enabling them to minister to Thine Apostles and to many others also, we thank Thee that Thou hast called these, our sisters, now being set apart to the office of Deaconess, to undertake the like ministration. We beseech Thee to look graciously upon them at this hour and bless them; anoint them with the spirit of wisdom; clothe them with the spirit of power, and enrich them with all spiritual gifts and graces. Let Thy work appear unto Thy servants, and let the beauty of the Lord our God be upon them; and establish Thou the work of their hands upon them; yea, the work of their hands establish Thou it. Look upon all Thy servants here present in compassion and love, and grant unto them the fulness of Thy salvation, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The candidates shall then rise, and the President shall say:

Dear Sisters—We rejoice with you that in the providence of God an open door of usefulness has been found for you in the service of the Church of Christ. In our loving Master's wide vineyard there are manifold forms of labor, and to each disciple some fitting task is assigned. To you are accorded peculiar privileges and opportunities. Released from other cares, you give yourselves, without reservation, according to the will of God, to the service of the Lord and of His Church, wherever your lot may be cast. Like our blessed Master, you are to go about doing good, ministering, as He did, to the wants of a suffering, sorrowing and sin-laden world. You are to be angels of mercy to the poor, to visit the sick, pray with the dying, care for the orphan, seek the wandering, comfort the afflicted, save the sinning, and ever be ready to take up any other

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duty proper to your calling. Such a ministry confers upon you a great honor, and involves a solemn responsibility. We are persuaded that you have not entered upon it lightly. No doubt, in the sacred stillness of the sanctuary of the heart you have already consecrated yourselves to this office and work. What you have done alone with God you are now to do formally and publicly, as the Church sets you apart for her special service in co-operation with her pastors.

The President shall then ask:

Question—Do you believe that you have been led by the Spirit and Providence of God to engage in this work, and to assume the duties of this office?

Answer—I do.

Question—Do you, in the presence of God and this congregation, promise faithfully to perform the duties of a Deaconess in the Church of God, so long as you remain in this calling?

Answer—I will endeavor so to do, the Lord being my helper.

Question—Do you accept the Bible as God's Word, and will you take it as the guide of your life and the source and authority of your spiritual instruction?

Answer—I so accept it and will so employ it.

Question—Will you strive to walk so close to your Saviour that you may ever carry His presence and benediction to the hearts and homes of those to whom you minister?

Answer—I will endeavor so to do.

Question—Will you accept the direction of those whom the Church may set over you, in the prosecution of your work?

Answer-I will cheerfully do so.

HYMN 923.

She loved her Saviour, and to Him Her costliest present brought; To crown his head, or grace his name. No gift too rare she thought.

So let the Saviour be adored, And not the poor despised: Give to the hungry from your hoard, But all, give all to Christ.

Go, clothe the naked, lead the blind, Give to the weary rest; For sorrow's children comfort find, And help for all distressed.

But give to Christ alone thy heart, Thy faith, thy love supreme; Then for His sake thine alms impart, And so give all to Him.

All present shall kneel and join in silent prayer for the candidates. Then the President shall say:

Almighty God, who hast given Thy handmaidens the will to do all these things, grant also unto them power to perform the same, so that all

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their works may be begun, continued and ended in Thee, and that they may glorify Thy holy name, and finally obtain everlasting life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Then all shall rise, and the President shall present each candidate with her license, saying: Take thou authority to discharge the duties of a Deaconess in the Methodist Church.

The President may then offer a few words of counsel, and close with

the following invocation:

May the Holy Spirit of the Living God descend upon you and abide with you evermore. May His holy anointing impart unto you grace for every trial and gifts for every duty. May His presence be to you a pillar of cloud by day, and a pillar of fire by night, all along the journey of life; and may the blessing of God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit be with you, now and evermore. Amen.

XXVIII—SYSTEMATIC BENEFICENCE.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

1. That having duly considered the Memorial from the Bay of Quinte Conference in regard to the matter of Christian Stewardship, praying that a Stewards' Guild be formed on every circuit and mission, we are of opinion that the time is not ripe for the addition of another society to the many organizations already in the Church, but would recommend that each circuit and mission be urged to take such steps as may be deemed advisable for the instruction and encouragement of the people on the subject of systematic and proportionate giving.

2. Re the notice of motion presented by Rev. J. H. Hazlewood and J. B. Grafton, Esq., and referred to us, asking for a deliverance on this question, we gladly recognize the importance of this subject, so long neglected by the Church, to the serious impairment of her efficiency and

power.

We would call attention to the Bible teaching upon this question as contained in the report adopted by the last General Conference, which may be summed up as follows: The Old Testament clearly states that God asked of His people tithes and offerings. Inasmuch as this law received Christ's endorsation and was practised in the early Christian Church, it will furnish a valuable standard for the guidance of God's people in the discharge of the duties of Christian stewardship, while the law of love lifts the whole question from the basis of duty to the gospel platform of privilege, calling for still larger free-will offerings from those whom God has blessed with abundance.

While we gladly recognize the good done by our Woman's Missionary Society and the Forward Movement in Missions and the Tenth Legion in our Epworth Leagues, as well as the seed sown in sermon and Sabbath School lesson, producing a healthier condition of Church finances as well as increased spiritual life, and whilst we recognize the importance of developing the social element in our Church, we deprecate many of the commercial methods often resorted to for enlarging the funds of the Church. "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store, as God hath prospered him." "It is more blessed to give than to receive." If these words of the Master were only borne in mind, the Church would not be so handicapped in her plans, nor so meagre in her achievements. A "million dollar fund" will never again be a necessity, and God's hosts will go forth "clear as the sun, fair as the moon, and terrible as an army with banners," conquering the hosts of sin and winning greater victories for their glorious leader.

In view of the abounding privileges of this dispensation and the obligation of the Church to "disciple all nations," this Committee recommends that the Conference adopt the following resolutions, to be printed in the Journal of Conference, and regarded not as legislative, but recommendatory, in their character:

(1) "That all our people be urged to give to the cause of God at the rate of at least one-tenth of their income, and that the use of all unscriptural methods of raising money for Church purposes be discountenanced as unworthy of a Christian people."

(2) That a special sermon be preached in every Church throughout the Connexion, at least once a year, on the subject of systematic and proportionate giving.

(3) That more literature on the subject be distributed by ministers and Quarterly Boards, and that the *Christian Guardian* and *Wesleyan* give a special number to the treatment of this important matter.

(4) That an annual meeting of each congregation throughout the Connexion, presided over by the minister in charge, be held at which literature treating of systematic giving may be distributed, and the subject in general, and the financial claims of that church in particular, may be discussed.

XXX.—ECUMENICAL CONFERENCE.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Your Committee on the Ecumenical Conference had before it, with other correspondence, a letter from Dr. Carroll, Secretary of the two commissions of the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church South, asking the Methodist Church to participate in the Ecumenical Conference to be held in London, England, in 1901.

It was resolved to recommend as follows:

1. That this General Conference expresses its entire approval of the proposed Ecumenical Council of 1901, and also its readiness heartily to co-operate in carrying it out upon the plan proposed.

2. That Dr. Carman be the Commissioner, with Dr. Shaw as alternate,

representing the Methodist Church.

3. That the advisory of the preliminaries for the Ecumenical Confer-

ence be the General Conference Special Committee.

4. That said Committee, on learning the number of delegates allowed the Methodist Church, equitably allot the apportionment to the several Annual Conferences which, at the session of 1900, shall elect by ballot the delegates and alternates.

5. That in harmony with the action of the General Conference of eight years ago, and in view of the state of our General Conference Fund, we hereby record our judgment that all the delegates sent pay their own

expenses.

XXXI.—REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH UNION.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:

1. The section of the General Superintendent's address relating to Church union, also a memorial from the Hamilton Conference relating to union with the Evangelical Association, were under consideration, and your Committee would recommend that the General Conference, desiring to co-operate in the union of all Christian bodies, appoint a Committee to confer with and consider any proposals from the representatives of other Christian denominations, and report to the next General Conference.

The following names are suggested to constitute that Committee:

Rev. Geo. Richardson. Thomas Hilliard, Esq. John George, Esq.

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2. Regarding the question of a Federal Court for Protestant Churches referred to in the section of the General Superintendent's address submitted, your Committee recommends the re-affirmation of the action of the General Conference of 1894, and that the following be named as the representatives of this General Conference in such Court, viz.:

The General Superintendent.

Central Section.—Revs. Dr. A. Sutherland, Dr. T. G. Williams,

Dr. W. C. Henderson, and Judge Deacon and A. Shaw, Esq.

Eastern Section .- Revs. S. F. Huestis, Dr. Borden, Dr. Heartz, Dr. Inch, Wesley Smith, Revs. C. H. Paisley, M.A., and R. W. Weddall, M.A.

Western Section .- Revs. James Woodsworth, J. F. Betts, Thomas Lawson, and J. A. M. Aikens, Q.C., and E. Odlum, M.A.

Newfoundland Section.—Revs. Dr. Milligan, J. Nurse and Hon. J. J.

3. Communications from the Presbyterian General Assembly, the Canada Congregational Missionary Society and the Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec were submitted, and your Committee are of the opinion that these call for no action of the General Conference.

XXXII.—RULES OF ORDER ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE.

1. The President shall take the chair at the hour to which the Conference may stand adjourned, and cause the same to be opened by the reading of the Scriptures, singing and prayer.

2. The roll of the members of the General Conference, as certified by the President and Secretary of the Constituent Conferences, shall be called

immediately after the opening of the first session.

3. The following shall be the order of business: (1) Reading the minutes of preceding session. (2) Communications. (4) Reports of Standing Committees. (5) Reports of Special Committees (6) Motions of which notice has been previously given. (7) Notices of motions. (8) Questions of which notice has been given. (9) Miscellaneous.

4. On the call for Reports of Committees, all reports that are ready

shall be called in before action is taken on any one of them.

5. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal the question shall be taken without debate. When a member rises to a point of order, or the President calls any member to order, in either case the point of order shall be distinctly stated.

6. No member shall remain standing during debate, except the member addressing the President.

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7. The President shall nominate all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

8. When a motion is moved and seconded, or a report is presented and is read by the Secretary or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; nor shall any motion be withdrawn by the mover after being debated, without the consent of the Conference.

9. All motions shall be presented in writing by the proposer.

10. The following motions are not debatable:

(a) For the previous question.

(b) To lay on the table.

(c) For indefinite adjournment.(d) For indefinite postponement.

11. No new motion shall be entertained until the one under consideration is disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which motions shall have the precedence in the order in which they are placed, viz.:

(a) Adjournment.

(b) Lay on the table.

(c) Indefinite postponement.

(d) Postponement to a given time.

(e) Reference to a Committee.

(f) Amendment.

(g) Amendment to the amendment.

12. When any member is about to speak in debate or deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and address the President, and shall proceed only when the President announces his name.

13. No person shall speak more than once on the same question without leave of the Conference, except the mover, who shall be entitled to a general reply.

14. No person shall speak more than ten minutes at one time without leave of the Conference, which shall be granted or refused without debate.

15. Any member who voted in the majority may move a reconsideration of a resolution. A motion to reconsider may be carried by a majority.*

16. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order.

17. Motions relating to the rights and privileges of the Conference, or of individual members, and orders of the day, shall be considered questions of privilege.

18. The previous question being moved, the President shall put it at once by asking, "Shall the vote be now taken?" If the previous question is carried, all debate shall cease save the right of reply on the part of the mover of the original motion, and after the mover shall have replied the President shall proceed to take the vote on the several motions before the Conference.

19. No member shall absent himself from the sessions of the Conference without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

20. No member who is not within the bar when any question is put

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^{*}This may be done during the session in which it was passed; but if done at any other time a notice of motion for reconsideration must be given at the session immediately preceding that in which the vote for reconsideration is to be taken. A resolution may be reconsidered once only.

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by the President shall be allowed to vote on such question, except by leave of Conference, and it shall be compulsory upon all members of Conference in attendance at the time the question is submitted, to vote, unless excused by the Conference.

21. Before the President rises to put a motion to the Conference, he shall ask, "Is the Conference ready for the question?" No member shall speak after the President has risen to put the question; and all members present shall vote unless excused by the Conference.

22. No member shall be interrupted when speaking except by the President, to call him to order when he departs from the question, uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President when he deems the speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he is misrepresented.

23. No business shall pass from individuals to the committees without

reference through the Conference.

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24. Any member may call for the yeas and nays on any question before the Conference, provided he be sustained by twenty members. Any member may require that the number of votes for and against a resolution be announced.

25. When yeas and nays are ordered in relation to any motion, they

shall be taken at that session of the Conference.

26. In the General Conference fifty members shall constitute a quorum.

27. The Secretary shall provide a bulletin, upon which announcements of meetings of committees and relating to other Conference business may be made.

28. Members presenting memorials, petitions and other papers for reference, shall prepare the paper by writing in a plain hand on the back of it the following items in the following order, viz.: (1) Subject to which it relates. (2) Name of the member presenting it, and the Conference to which he belongs, or the name of the body sending it, as the case may be. (3) Name of Committee to which the Conference refers it. Papers thus presented shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Conference, and by him sent to the Committee according to endorsement.

29. A motion consisting of two or more distinct propositions shall, if a call for its subdivision be sustained by two members of the Conference, be subdivided into two or more sections, and the vote shall be taken on each section separately.

30. In all cases in which an amendment of the Discipline is moved, the motion shall be so framed as to show the form in which the section or paragraph, as the case may be, will stand when amended.

31. Committees reporting changes in the Discipline shall so frame their reports as to show how the section or paragraph, as the case may be,

will stand after the changes shall have been made.

32. When a motion is submitted, it may be amended, and an amendment to the amendment is also in order. In case the amendment to the amendment be rejected, it is in order to propose other amendments to the amendment, which shall be disposed of one by one. When these have been voted on, if one be adopted, the vote shall then be taken on the amendment thus amended, and if it be adopted the discussion may

proceed, and other amendments to the main motion as thus amended are then in order. When all amendments have been disposed of, the motion as then before the Conference shall be voted on.

33. When any Committee shall ascertain that a subject which has been referred to it has also been referred to another Committee, it shall promptly report the fact to the Conference, and the Conference shall decide which Committee shall have permanent charge of said subject.

34. In all cases for which these Rules of Order do not make provision, the proceedings of the Conference shall be conducted according to the Rules and Usages of the House of Commons of Canada.

XXXIII.—FRATERNAL ADDRESSES.

1. BIBLE CHRISTIAN CONFERENCE, BARNSTAPLE, DEVON, ENGLAND—RECOGNITION OF DR. DEWART'S FRATERNAL VISIT.

This Conference desires to place on record the unfeigned pleasure which the visit of Dr. Dewart, as the representative of the Methodist Church of Canada, has afforded us; heartily reciprocates the kindly expressions of good-will of which he is the bearer; gratefully acknowledges the excellent service he has rendered us by his public services; greatly rejoices in the prosperity of the Methodist Church of Canada, markedly so since the union in 1883; and earnestly prays that through the abundant blessing of God its success in the future may greatly exceed that of the past.

2. THE PRIMITIVE METHODIST CONFERENCE.

To the General Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada, to be held at Toronto, September, 1898:

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—This Conference of Primitive Methodists (representing 1,088 ministers, 10,418 class leaders, 61,000 Sunday School teachers, 465,000 scholars, 197,000 Church members, and 600,000 adherents, and holding church property to the value of £3,618,489) being informed of your Conference at Toronto, sends hearty Christian greeting.

We remember with much satisfaction the good feeling that prevailed between the Primitive Methodists and other branches of the Methodist family before organic union was accomplished, and that, since its accomplishment, that same good feeling has been maintained, and under the Divine blessing much prosperity has been vouchsafed to both you and us. It was not found practicable to send a fraternal deputation to

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hodist ce its under h you ion to your Conference personally and directly to address you, but we, none the less, heartily reciprocate the good wishes you have from time to time expressed, sometimes by mail and several times by distinguished deputies. We have pleasant memories of visits paid us by Dr. Potts, and later by Dr. Dewart, whose addresses made a great and gracious impression upon us all.

We are rejoiced to hear of your continued prosperity, material and spiritual. We learn from time to time of your success in the training of able ministers, who preach the Word with power, and give thanks to God for a faithful ministry faithfully trained.

We are also delighted at the influence exerted by the literature emanating from your Book concern, which cannot but have a good effect upon the social and moral condition of the Dominion, and are often refreshed by the intelligence conveyed to us in the pages of the *Christian Guardian*.

We most earnestly pray that by your ministry, your literature, and the exemplary lives of your people, you may be made a yet greater blessing.

You will be pleased to hear that as a denomination we are making gratifying progress in all departments of our work, both on home and foreign missions. Since your last General Conference, four years ago, our church membership has increased by 3,552, and the number of our scholars by 9,478. The value of our church property has increased by £122,142; and whilst we have increased our property we have reduced our debt by £27,838. During the same term (four years) we have started our Connexional Christian Endeavor Society, in which we have already 566 enrolled societies, with 15,651 active and 2,129 associate members.

In Temperance work the period has been marked by increased activity, and the number of total abstainers has increased by 63,753.

Our good relations with other Methodist churches continue, and although we have not seen our way to organic union in this country, it is not because of any unfriendly rivalry, much less antagonism. We are one in purpose and one in spirit, our aim being that of our common founder, who so happily phrased it, "To spread scriptural holiness through the land."

We are glad to know that your great Church is heartily engaged in this great work. We send you our hearty congratulations on your glorious past, and pray that you may have a still more glorious future.

3. ADDRESS OF THE METHODIST NEW CONNEXION CONFERENCE.

To the Ministers and Representatives of the Methodist Church in Canada assembled in the General Conference:

DEAR BRETHREN,—On behalf of the Annual Conference of the Methodist New Connexion held at Halifax, June, 1895, we gladly

Our Conference listened with interest and satisfacion to the statement of your representative in relation to the progress and prospects of your work. We rejoice to hear that the fusion of the Methodist bodies, formerly unconnected, into one united Church has been followed by a large measure of prosperity, and that the combined and consolidated Methodism of Canada is gaining a broader and firmer hold upon the widespread population, and making efforts full of promise to fill the whole region from the Atlantic to the Pacific with the blessings of Christianity and civilization. Our prayer is that the Lord of the harvest may furnish an adequate supply of laborers for the vast fields of your enterprise, and that your missionary zeal may be upheld and encouraged by still increasing triumphs in all the provinces embraced in the Dominion.

We offer you our congratulations on the success of your exertions to diffuse wholesome Christian literature, and especially on the efficiency of your educational agencies and establishments. The report which was given of the state of Victoria University and of other institutions devoted to liberal intellectual culture was interesting and welcome in a high degree. In your ample provision for higher education, with its multiplied facilities for advancing the kingdom of light, we see at once a pledge and prophecy of an ever-brightening future for your Church.

We are glad to hear that you are striving together with heartiness and vigor for the removal of intemperance and other social hindrances to the spread of religion. The piety and benevolence of the Church should be sufficiently manifold in operation to reach and correct men's lesser and transient ills, as well as to remedy their great spiritual woes.

It was with special thankfulness we learned that in these times of theological unrest and fluctuation, tendencies to depart "from the faith" are not appearing among you, and that, not with blind unexamining assent, but with enlightened and sober conviction, the "faith once delivered to the saints" is held sacred and dear.

On both sides of the Atlantic Methodism is pursuing substantially the same work and receiving from the Divine Head of the Church like signs of favor and supplies for service. Confining attention to ourselves, it is cause for gratitude and humble joy that for a long succession of years we have been favored with numerical increase, that our churches and circuits are pervaded with peace, and bound together in happy fellowship, that our institutions are stable and prosperous, and that depending on wisdom from above we are aiming at further advancement.

Our denomination will soon complete the first century of its history. We have resolved to celebrate the centenary by special solemnities and by liberal thank-offerings, to be appropriated to local and Connexional interests and objects. The sum of £60,000 is the aim it is proposed to

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accomplish, and many who mark the liberality already displayed, munificent beyond all parallel in our annals, are sanguine that by 1897 a higher result will be realized. Under the judicious direction of the General Centenary Secretary, now our esteemed President, the religious aspect of the occasion is kept in view, and prayerful hope is indulged that abundance of grace will crown the whole movement, and that the centennial year will inaugurate an era in our history of signal energy and spiritual enlargement.

We cannot conclude our reply to your fraternal message without recalling your previous proof of your interest in us afforded by the deputational visit of the Rev. Dr. Potts, in 1892, to our Conference at Ashton. The eloquent and edifying addresses in which your thoughts toward us were then communicated, in common with the sermon and speeches of Rev. Dr. Dewart, are not to be forgotten. It will always give us pleasure to receive the expression of your brotherly kindness, and by reciprocation of the same to sustain and strengthen the ties which unite us in the Methodist division of "the household of faith."

Affectionately commending you, and all the members of your churches throughout the vast Dominion of Canada, to God, and to the Word of His grace, which is able to build you up and to give you an inheritance among all them which are sanctified,

4. THE ADDRESS OF THE IRISH CONFERENCE OF 1898 TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA.

REVEREND AND DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN:

We duly received at the hands of the Rev. E. H. Dewart, D.D., your honored representative to our Conference of 1895, the Address of your last General Conference, and we gladly avail ourselves of the present opportunity of expressing our grateful appreciation and our very hearty reciprocation of your fraternal greetings.

We were cheered by the tidings which your delegate brought us of your unabated interest in our welfare, and of the strength and tenderness of the ties which bind the Methodism of the great Dominion of Canada to that of our own beloved land.

We rejoice to know that the work which the great Head of the Church has entrusted to you is still furnishing such unmistakable evidences of the presence and power of God amongst you, and that there is being given to you a goodly succession of faithful men, who have understanding of the times and know what Israel ought to do.

In the great success of your efforts in the department of higher

education, and in the progress and efficiency of your schools generally, we recognize a fact of great significance, and one full of promise for the future of your country. We congratulate you on the healthy growth and expansion of your literature. In this department you are also true to the cherished traditions of Methodism.

The Methodist Church has always taken a leading position in Foreign Mission work; you have not been slow to recognize this, and we are profoundly thankful that your efforts to reach those in the regions beyond have been so graciously furthered by God. We give unceasing thanks to Him for the blessing with which your labors have been crowned, and pray that in all your work you may have still more abundant success.

You will be glad to learn that during the four years which have elapsed since we last addressed you we have enjoyed a considerable measure of material and spiritual prosperity. For ten years, with one exception, we have been enabled to report an increase in our membership, and though our numbers must appear to you small comparatively, yet there is abundant reason for thankfulness, that amid a population which is being constantly thinned by emigration, we are still maintaining our numbers.

All our Connexional departments are in a state of great efficiency. Chief among these is our Home Mission organization, which covers a wide area and serves many important interests. In this department our Church has enjoyed for many years, the rare ability and ripe experience of the Rev. Dr. Wallace McMullen, who is known wherever Irish Methodism is known, and although he some time ago celebrated his ministerial jubilee, he is still happily spared to serve us without any lessening of that ability which has so long marked his administration of this most important department.

The Central Missions formed in Belfast, Dublin and Londonderry, to reach the non-church going classes, have fully warranted the large expenditure bestowed upon them. Belfast mission especially has been a means of blessing to multitudes. In that city a vast population is accessible, and at the last Conference a further extension of this form of Christian enterprise and effort was heartily sanctioned for the northern portion of the city. Not the least notable proof of the success of these Central Missions is found in the fact that they have been the means of provoking other sections of the Church of Christ to employ similar agencies to reach the lapsed masses in our large cities.

In the matter of education, our colleges in Dublin and Belfast still hold a premier place. The lists of prizes and honors won year by year by the students from these institutions at the intermediate and university examinations have not been surpassed by similar educational establishments in Ireland.

Although our sphere of service is limited our work is many-sided, we are, therefore, endeavoring to so adapt our methods and distribute our agencies that no part of our varied work may be overlooked or forgotten.

At the Conference of 1897, we founded the Central Ireland Mission, in order to bring the Gospel, by means of preaching in the open air, within the reach of our fellow-countrymen who would never enter our churches.

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te our gotten. ission, en air, er our During the past year our missionaries have been proclaiming to large numbers of persons, of all creeds and classes, in the fairs and markets, the glad evangel of the love of Christ, and the Lord has graciously confirmed the word with signs following.

We have had to lament during the past few years the removal of several of our brethren from the scene of their earthly ministry—men whose piety and labors were an inspiration to all. Amongst these honored brethren was the greatly beloved Dr. William Crook, whose influence as a preacher and writer has been felt, far beyond the bounds of his own land, for well nigh half a century.

To take the places of those thus called to higher service, God has been giving us a number of young men of promise, who have already given the

strongest proofs of their divine vocation.

We have requested the Rev. Walford Green, who is well acquainted with our work, and highly esteemed amongst us, to be our representative. He needs no commendation to you at our hands, you will receive him in the Lord with all gladness, and he will assure you of our affectionate regard. And now, brethren, with confidence and joy, we commit you to the all-sufficient grace of God. May the fulness of the blessing of the Gospel of Christ ever rest upon you all, and may He comfort your hearts and stablish you in every good word and work.

5. THE ADDRESS OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE, 1898, TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA, 1898.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN:

We gladly embrace the opportunity afforded by the assembling of your General Conference to convey to you our fraternal greetings, and the expression of our affectionate interest in all that pertains to your welfare and progress. The lapse of time serves only to prove how deeply your Church is rooted in the national life, and how important the part it takes in the development of your institutions. We cannot review your history, as it has been so graphically described in the Centennial Memorial Volume, nor can we contemplate the strength and vigor which from small beginnings your Church has reached, without wonder and gratitude. Verily we may say, "What hath God wrought?" His guiding hand is seen in every stage of your advance, and, in spite of human error and frailty, and, sometimes, even using these for His own gracious purposes, the Great Head of the Church has brought you to a position of prominence and influence which we cannot doubt will make you, if faithful to the opportunity created, a mighty power for the salvation of your own country, and an instrument in His hands for hastening the day when the kingdoms of this world shall become the kingdoms of our Lord and of His Christ.

Your phenomenal increase of late years is doubtless due largely to the

union of the several branches of the Methodist family in one undivided Methodist Church, and to the advantage this has given you in undertaking new work in new communities. Your valuable universities and colleges, and the use you are making of these to secure a higher standard of ministerial efficiency, contribute very largely to your success; and also the wise adaptation of your economy to the conditions and needs of the times and of the places in which you labor. But high above all these human arrangements, and in them all, we recognize with unfeigned gratitude the evidence that the Lord God of our fathers is with you. There is no real and abiding success without that divine agency, which quickens into life souls that are dead in trespasses and sins, which leads to a conscious reconciliation with God, and to the new birth which is manifested in the Church and the fellowship of saints, and in the world by the strength and beauty of a holy life. We are convinced that the scepticism of the age must be met, not only by intelligent and forceful preaching of the Word, but by the testimony of Christian experience, and by those miracles of the dispensation of the Spirit, constantly repeated, yet ever new, by which God reveals himself in the work of His grace, and fulfils the promise of our Lord to His disciples that "greater works than these shall ye do because I go unto my Father."

Since we last addressed you the celebration of the sixtieth year of the reign of our beloved Queen has been the occasion of enthusiastic rejoicing in all parts of the British Empire. In the remarkable demonstration which took place in London last year we rejoiced greatly that the representatives of the Dominion of Canada were so conspicuous and distinguished. This event has served to illustrate not only the extent and power of the Empire, but the oneness of purpose and sentiment that possesses the great people that in different parts of the world are united under the same supreme authority. There are many evidences that English-speaking people and the subject races under their sway are drawing together more closely than ever. For this we cannot but be thankful, not that it may minister to national vanity, to the pride of empire, or the thirst of power, but because we believe it to be the mission of our race, in the purpose of the Supreme Ruler, to use power in order to secure to the world the blessings of peace, of free institutions, and above all of a pure, Bible-loving, Christian faith.

The position occupied by the Methodist Church, both in the Old Country and in Greater Britain, gives to us a special responsibility. It was not without significance that the great evangelical revival under Wesley took place at a time when new countries were first beginning to attract the older populations. The Methodist Church has in the past exerted a mighty influence for good in the formation of the colonial Empire, and, if faithful, will make itself felt everywhere in moulding and directing the future that is opening before us.

Of late years we have in this country encouraged our people to take a larger share in discharging the duties that devolve upon us as citizens. We cannot think it right to leave public offices in the hands of irreligious and superstitious men. Members of our Church are now rendering faithful service to God and to the State in the House of Commons, in county, eity and town councils, in Boards of Education, and in the administration of the law.

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The Evangelical Free Churches in England have recently entered upon a closer fellowship in a movement which we are assured has no political purpose, nor necessary antagonism to any other section of the Church, but which is intended to exhibit the essential unity of those taking part in it to maintain the scriptural ideal of the Church, to promote united effort for the salvation of the people, and to present a combined front against the insidious attacks of Romanism, which in late years have been more dangerous inside the Established Church than out of it.

Our Conference just closing has been characterized by a special sense of the Divine presence. The devotional exercises have received more than usual attention, and have been seasons of great blessing. Peace prevails through all our borders. We are again able to report a considerable increase in our membership. This, however, owing to our methods of computing church membership, is an incomplete indication of the progress we are making.

About forty additional ministers have been called out by this Conference to meet the expansion of our work at home, whilst the revived interest in Foreign Missions has justified us in sending out sixteen additional missionaries.

In chapel building we have had a record year. The outlay on new schemes sanctioned during the year exceeds £400,000. This includes several costly projects for the erection of large halls in the great centres of population designed especially for the working classes. Our missions in the large towns have been eminently successful, whilst some old chapels in the midst of poor populations, that were at one time a difficulty, and almost a despair, have been so adapted to the new conditions that they are crowded with the very people we most desire to reach.

Our trust property was never in easier financial circumstances. We have expended nine millions sterling on new undertakings during the last thirty-five years, and yet the total debt on our entire property does not exceed one year's income from the same. Our chapel fund for loans without interest has assisted in the extinction of a large amount of debt, the money previously paid in interest having been made available for the payment of debt. From this fund a sum of nearly £500,000 has been lent or relent to trustees of chapels, who have repaid the same in equal half-yearly instalments with perfect regularity.

We have resolved to celebrate the advent of the twentieth century by raising a fund of one million guineas to be applied in the erection of new chapels, halls and schools in the promotion of education, in aid of Home and Foreign Missions, and in the erection of a memorial building or church house in the west end of the metropolis. The special feature of this effort is that we are to aim at raising one million guineas by the gifts of one million Methodists. By this means we hope, whilst receiving the large contributions of wealthy friends, to secure the co-operation of all our people, even the poorest. The resolutions on this subject have been arrived at with perfect unanimity, and we trust that the financial result will not be the most important benefit, but that the spirit of prayer and consecration, associated with the effort, may be followed by an increase of spiritual power.

We were gratified to welcome again your honored representative, the Rev. E. H. Dewart, D.D., whose pulpit ministrations and lucid and able exposition of your aims and work were highly appreciated.

This address will be conveyed to you by our representative, the Rev. Walford Green, one of our ex-Presidents. We commend him to your affectionate regard as a brother greatly beloved, who has long held a front rank position in our ministry, and in the councils of our Church.

Now unto Him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy, to the only wise God our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever. Amen.

ADDRESS TO THE EARL OF MINTO, GOVERNOR-GENERAL.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable Sir Gilbert John Elliot-Murray-Kynynmond, Earl of Minto, Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada, etc., etc., etc.;

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,—We, the ministers and laymen constituting the General Conference of the Methodist Church, in quadrennial session assembled in the city of Toronto, representing 2,031 ministers, 280,537 members, and 1,000,000 adherents of the Church, in their name and on their behalf, as well as our own, approach your Excellency with assurances of our profound gratification that Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen has laid upon one so honored and worthy the high duties and responsibilities of representative of Her Majesty in the government of this Dominion.

We desire to assure your Excellency of our devoted loyalty to the aged and revered Sovereign of the Empire, and of our enthusiastic attachment to Her Majesty's crown and person. We rejoice in the fact of our British connection, and in the confidence that the links which now unite our young Dominion to the Mother Country shall be brightened and strengthened by the powerful influence of the Viceregal office during your Excellency's administration.

We beg to express also our great satisfaction and entire sympathy with sentiments already made public by your Excellency respecting the maintenance and promotion of the most cordial relations between our own land and neighboring countries.

We gratefully avail ourselves of the opportunity to assure your Excellency that the aim of the Methodist Church is still, as it has always been, to further the ends of good government by teaching and enforcing that righteousness which exalteth a nation, by endeavoring to promote reverence for the Divine name, obedience to the Divine law, the religious

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observance of the holy Sabbath, the diffusion of sound Christian education among all classes of the people, and by the inculcation, by both precept and example, of such sentiments concerning loyalty, sobriety, honesty and industry as shall contribute to a true, happy and useful citizenship; and we gladly tender to your Excellency, on assuming the burdens of government, sincere pledges of cordial and faithful support from the Methodist people throughout the Dominion in all measures designed to advance the moral and material welfare of our favored land.

We beg leave to convey to the Countess of Minto expressions of our highest esteem and of our unfeigned solicitude that her residence in this country may be memorable for uninterrupted happiness and satisfaction.

In your Excellency's high rank, character, abilities and experience we see ground for strong confidence that the government of this part of Her Majesty's dominions shall be wisely and impartially administered; and we shall devoutly pray the Most High God that the life and health of your Excellency and noble family may be graciously preserved, and that all your Excellency's official relations to our Dominion may be alike gratifying to your Excellency and to a happy and prosperous people.
