The latter report dealt with Canada's great problem in assimilating the representatives of 57 nationalities which resentatives of 57 nationalities which have settled in the Dominion; the necessity of keeping Canada thoroughly Canadian and British and of combatting Communist propaganda, especially in the schools. Miss Gordon, in her report, made a plea in behalf of Canadian magazines and other domestic issues, deprecating the patronage accorded to United States publications.

MORNING SESSION

After the session was called to order by the national president, Miss R. M. Church of Toronto, and the devotional office said, the minutes of the previous sessions were approved and the roll called.

The first report presented was that of the committee on immigration. The report in part follows: "The subject of immigration is one of supreme importance to all Canadians. The bringing into our land of a vast population from other countries is a special responsibility to such an organization as the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, as we are pledged to our utmost to safeguard the national life of our Empire and our Dominion. That is our charter and the reason for our existence.

NEW CANADIANS.

"The policy of allowing our New Canadians to settle in colonies or communities seems to be exceedingly detrimental to their becoming Canadianized. In communities such as the Doukhobors, Mennonites, etc., in which they have been allowed to settle, they live to themselves in absolute isolation from all Canadian influences, are almost entirely self-contained, often refusing to allow their children to attend the schools provided for them, and under these circumstances it may be generations before they become familiarized with Canadian habits and characteristics. If our new Canadian people were scattered among British or Canadian settlers, they must of necessity imbibe. settlers, they must of necessity imbib-our national customs and ideals.

ROBERVAL, Que., June 9—The trial of Mrs. Emily Sprague Gallop, charged with the murder of her husband, Abraham Gallop, is scheduled to take place during the assizes which opens here today.

Abraham Gallop died on August 6 of last year. His body was removed to Springhill, N. B., for burial. Some days later, at the request of his brothers, the attorney-general of Quebec ordered an autopsy, which subsequently revealed the presence of strychnine in the remains. A charge of murder was laid against Mrs. Gallop, and she was arrested in Moncton. A young man who boarded in the Gallop home, Walter Simpson, was detained by the police on suspicion of being connected with the case, but was released on bail. He will be called as a witness for the Crown.

Meeting Leaves Matters Worse Than Before, Is Report

NEW PROPOSALS

Mine Representatives Flatly Refuse to Consider Extens

[ONDON, June 9-Representatives of the miners and mine owners, after difficult underground negotiations, were finally brought together yesterday in an atmosphere hopeful of settling the strike of miners, now in its sixth week, but the meeting only leaves matters worse than before. Apparently there is no hope left of a renewal of these direct negotiations. The owners had advanced a new proposal, retaining the existing wage scale, but proposin that the miners work 46 hours a weel namely five days of eight hours, with

six hours on Saturday. Evan Williams, for the owners, and Herbert Smith and A. J. Cook, for the Herbert Smith and A. J. Cook, for the miners, were present with other delegates. After more than three hours discussion, said to have been very stormy, with much indulgence in personalities, it was found impossible to arrive at any agreement, and the gathering broke up abruptly.

NO EXTENSION

The miners representatives fiatly refused to consider an extension of hours; likewise it was found impossible to agree upon any common ground for negotiations. The miners delegates adopted a challenging attitude and the owners displayed impatiant framed so as to mislead the public.

It was admitted by the miners' delegates that they believed only about 50 per cent. of the mines could afford to pay the existing wages and that if the non-paying mines closed, some half million men would be out of employment. But the delegates insisted that the miners ought to have a voice in the selling terms of coal and that prices should be fixed on a basis that would allow the present wages to be paid.

All hope of an early cessation of the strike seems to have been dissipated by the meeting.



He writes of this plan, in part, as follows:

Think kindly of the angleworm,

Remembering that the carbonisation of coal calls for the break-ing-up of the original raw material ing-up of the original raw material into small pieces—in some cases to powdered form—the natural thought which arises in one's mind is, why not hack the coal out of the original scam in small pieces? Imagine an electrically-driven cutter traveling along the coal seam, like a lawn-mower cutting the grass, and imagine further a suction pipe like that on our home vacuum cleaner attached to the coal cutter; then it is clear that small coal in a continuous stream could flow from the coal seam direct to the carbonisation plant on the surface, without ever being touched by the human hand.

We can cut coal by machinery

We can cut coal by machinery and we can also move and lift coal through pipe lines by means of air currents. It is therefore within the bounds of possibility to carry through the above idea.

Such a scheme has had no particular attraction in the past, because there would be difficulty in disposing of the small coal; but the coming of the carbonisation process will completely revolutionize our ideas on coal "winning," and also, of course, completely change the working conditions of the miner; in fact, he will no longer be a miner. Why, a woman who doesn't love a good mother hasn't anything in her that is worth any man's loving. She has neither heart, nor appreciation, nor gratitude. She is as hard as a rock and as cold as a fish. She is a grafter

Why, a girl who doesn't love her mother is destitute of all natural affection. She is incapable of loving any human creature except herself. She has no tendern ess in her even to give to her husband. Her emotions are dried up at the source.

It angers you that when your wife married you she did not put her mother altogether out of her life and be content never to see or hear of her again. Do you realize what that would mean if she could do it?

It would mean that she was utterly lacking in loyalty and could break all the ties that held her to her past life as easily as if they were pack threads. My husband wishes me to take an active part in his mother's life. What shall I do?

ANSWER:

Go to your mother-in-law and very frankly tell her of your dilemma, and ask her to give you the training that you failed to

That will serve a twofold purpose. It will teach you the ways of the new world in which you have gone to give and it will please your mother-in-law to have you for a pupil.

A great many young women make a very grave mistake when they refuse to take the help that their husbands' mothers would gladly give them if they could. But the bride is so cocky and so afraid that her mother-in-law is going to try to boss her or interfere with her affairs that she will not ask the older and more experienced woman for a word of advice, or even listen to her sug-
