IN SALE OF GRAIN BACK TO COMMONS

Advances in Corn and Oats Are
Turned to Advantage by
Brokers.

Chicago, July 15—Profits of between \$1,500,000 and \$1,800,000 are estimated by brokers to have been made by Arthur W. Cutten, Chicago grain merchant, in a sale of 300,000 bushels of July corn at around \$1.12 in addition to large profits on recent wheat advances of from 20 to 25 cents a bushel in the Chicago and Winnipeg markets.

James A. Patten, whose attempts to corner wheat corn, oats and cotton, have made him famous and brought him fortunes, is also reported to have reaped considerable profits through recent disposal of 2,000,000 bushels of oats, purchased in May, when dealers predicted big losses.

Cash corn yesterday sold for \$1.13, Cash corn yesterday sold for \$1.13, a cent less than last year's high point, while July corn was quoted at \$1.10. The recent jump of corn of 40 cents caused Cutten's profits, brokers say. July wheat reached the highest mark of the season with \$1.231/2 in Chicago

MAY MAKE SURVEY OF PROVINCE SOON

Campaign Against Tuberculosis is Suggested at Hospital Conference.

That an intensive campaign against tuberculosis, including a survey of all cases in the province, would be started in the near future in New Brunswick was the opinion expressed at the dinner meeting of the executive committee of the New Brunswick Tuberculosis Association held at the St. John County Hospital last evening. The meeting was attended by Dr. L. G. Pineault, of Campbellton; Dr. C. D. Parfitt, Gravenhurst, Ont., president of the National Tuberculosis Assocation; E. L. Rising, president of the St. John Association; H. B. Schofield, board chairman of the County Hospital; Dr. H. A. Farris, superintendent, and Dr. Stewart Skinner, of the D. S. C. R. Dr. Parfitt addressed the meeting and informed those present of the danger of T. B. The report was discussed by the meeting and, during the discussion, it was pointed out that 2,500 children under 19 years of age in New Brunswick, were infected with active tuberculosis germs at the present time. Ten per cent of all tuberculosis in the province and 45 per cent of children's cases might be directly attributed to infected herds, it was said. was attended by Dr. L. G. Pineault, of Death Rates Cut.

It was also reported at the meeting that the death rate of tuberculosis victims in places where extensive preventive campaigns had been carried out had been reduced 75 per cent. If a similar campaign was instituted in this province the death rate could be easily lowered 50 or 60 per cent in the next 10 or 15 years, it was argued.

It was recommended that the secretary communicate with Dr. J. H. Allingham, president of the N. B. Medical Society, concerning the appointment of a traveling diagnostician for the province. The appointee would travel to all the principal centres in the province and act as consultant to physicians. Every centre would hold its sicians. Every centre would hold its own clinic to which would be brought all tuberculosis cases from the sur-rounding districts, the diagnostician to be present and give instruction to phy-

sicians.

This tuberculosis problem, in the view of the meeting, did not lie solely in the hands of medical men. The laymen, when properly instructed on the ravages and prevention of this "white plague," would be enabled to take action individually.

It was further recommended that the New Brunswick Association take advantage of the Federal grant of \$1,000 granted to each of the nine provinces of the Dominion for tuberculosis work. It was expected that the Provincial Government also would be ready to support this campaign.


Twenty to Start From New Rochelle on the 27th of This Month.






