CHEAP POWER TO MAKE WHEELS TURN IN MORE ST. JOHN FACTORIES

Industries Will Bring More Work and More Money for the Workers-Increased Taxation Bogey Ousted by Experience of 280 Municipalities in Ontario.

All big movements start with small beginnings.

Even the Ontario Hydro Electric system-which is now the argest electric distribution system in the world and the outstanding example of municipal ownership started in a small way. In 1910 the Ontario hydro system started by delivering 750 h. p to ten municipalities on the Niagara system. Since 1910 it has grown immensely, until at the present time it comprises a network which covers practically the whole of Ontario, and consists of fourteen different systems, having 3,000 miles of transmission lines and supplying power to 236 urban municipalities and forty-four townships, having a total number of consumers, in 1921, of 265,000, to add distribution 275,000 have a fartish 170,000 have and distributing 375,000 h. p., of which 170,000 h. p. was exported to the United States.

If the Idea back of this immense scheme was not the correct one, it certainly would not have pr tacks and misrepresentations of the power interests. That idea was "Power at cost for the People."

Nor is Ontario the only Canadian example of municipal ownership of electric light and railway utilities. In the Canadian West there are eighty-four municipal electric light and power systems in successful operation, including such cities as Winnipeg, Moose Jaw,

Saskatoon, Regina, Edmonton, Calgary and Lethbridge.
In the United States, the city of Detroit has lately purchased the street railway system, and it is now being operated by the municipality for the benefit of the citizens. The city of Los Angeles owns and operates its municipal electric light and power system, and the state of California is contemplating starting a hydro system modelled after the Ontario hydro. It is understood that the state

of Georgia is also contemplating a hydro system.

The New Brunswick Electric Power Commission is offering St.

John the opportunity of joining the ranks of progressive municipalities in offering the city power at cost—not to exceed 1.2 cents ner kilowatt hour. per kilowatt hour.

SAVE \$600,000 A YEAR

Based on a consumption of 10,000,000 to 15,000,000 K.W.H. at hydro rates, the citizens of St. John using electricity for light and power now have an opportunity of saving approximately \$600,000 per annum over New Brunswick Power Company rates, as well as having the opportunity of using numerous labor-saving devices in their homes at small cost if they so desire.





Chicago, Oct. 18—With hints of winter weather before the coal shortage is relieved, Chicago physicians have found a new use for their prescription blanks, according to Marshall Keig, a coal company official, who exhibited a large batch of vari-colored slips, all urging that certain consumers, because of illness or other emergencies, be preferred in coal distribution.

Lesson No. 132. RADIO DICTIONARY.

BAND FILTERS. Types of circuits which have the property of transmitting oscillations within a presribed range or band of frequency and eliminating other oscillations which are not included within the limits of the desired band. These circuits perform important functions in connection with wire telephony and may be used to replace the tuned transformer in radio circuits.

When alternating current flows in a conductor the tendency of the current is to flow in the outer portions of the conductor instead of being distributed uniformly over the cross section. If high frequencies are employed, the current flows in a thin layer at the surface of the conductor with the result that the resistance of ordinary conductors at radio frequencies is considerably freater than the resistances of low frequencies. The conditions arising from this non-uniform distribution of current is known as "skin effect."

When oscillations are created by an electric spark discharge the shape of the train of waves is such that theratio of any oscillations to the one preceding it is constant and this ratio is called the damping of the oscillation. The Neperian or natural logarithm of the ratio between two successive amplitudes in the same direction is known as the "logarithmic decrement" and in order to comply with United States regulations the decrement of the emitted wave must not exceed 0.2, which necessitates twenty-three complete oscillations for each single spark discharge.

SPECIFIC GRAVITY. The relation between the density or weight of one cubic centimeter of a substance and the weight of one cubic centimeter of chemically pure water. In a storage cell the specific gravity of the electrolyte is determined by means of a hydrometer. POLARIZATION.

A condition which exists in an electric cell when hydrogen bubbles col-lect on the positive plate and reduce the potential of the cell by generating an opposing potential.

The unit of capacity is to the Farad. A condenser has a capacity of one Farad when the addition of one coulomb of electricity increases the voltage across the condenser one volt. This uint is so large that the microfarad or one-millionth part of a Farad has been adopted as the practical unit.

A device commonly employed in storage battery installations for the purpose of operating the circuit and stopping the flow of current in case the voltage of the charging source should fall below the voltage of the battery. Winnipeg, Oct. 18-"Bootlegging" oon may be a lost art in Wester Canada if predictions of police are to be taken as a criterion. Bank robbery as a profession, seems to have taken its place. The change of profession is not considered due to the outgoing of one band of crooks and the incom ng of another, but to the machinations of the same band of "thugs" whose neadquarters Canadian police have good reason to believe is in Minot, N. D., the biggest little criminal city on the North American continent.

American continent.

There is no question in the minds of provincial and mounted police that bank robberies and "bootlegging" in Western Canada are presided over by the same gang. Facts prove this. The other day at Bienfait, Sask., the bandits adopted a novel method. Instead of endeavoring to steal a quantity of liquor from a storehouse, they bought the liquor and shot the agent dead after the money had been paid over to him, later stealing the whiskey on its way to the border. Police declare it was a very clumsy effort to evade suspicion. Contempt For The Law.

Well-known border "bootleggers" emboldened by their success in running contraband liquor across to thirsty souls in the United States and hardened to a contempt for the law as a result of many brushes with custom officers, undoubtedly have organized the series of bank robberies that have terrorized residents of Saskatchewan and Manitoba during the last six weeks. Police claim they have proof for making these

residents of Saskatchewan and Manitoba during the last six weeks. Police claim they have proof for making these statements, although they are exhibiting considerable reticence, falling back on the excuse that too much publicity would result in the crooks making their escape undetected.

Also there is no doubt that the series of bank robberies was the work of United States crooks, for of the seven or eight attempted during the last six weeks, no town visited has been more than 80 miles from the border—just far enough away to enable the robbers to get back across the line before day-light. That their method of operation was well founded is evidenced by the fact that although the entire police forces of two provinces have been concentrated on rounding up some of these crooks, their efforts up to the present, have been without success.







Another Declares He Will Go to Country if KILLED ON HER Unionists Back Leader—Henderson Outlines Principles of Labor Party.

Thus, if these prophets be correct, the dissolution of parliament seems imminent in either case, as it is not supposed the Conservatives could carry on without the prominent and tried leaders who would quit the government with Chamberlain if he resigned.

Among other reports published by the morning papers is one that the ministers started new efforts yesterday to ensure postponement of the general elections until January, prompted, it is said, by fear of a complete split in the Conservative party.





GERMAN BEET

SUGAR INDUSTRY

IS CRIPPLED Will Never Regain Its Pre-War Position, Says-American Investigator.

Washington, Oct. 18.—Germany will never again be able to export 1,000,000 tons of sugar, as it did before the war, according to Alfred P. Dennis, special representative of the Department of Commerce in Europe. Perhaps ten years from now it may have a surplus of 500,000 tons, but for the immediate future it will have all it can do to supply domestic needs. Germany for years has been the leading beet sugar producer of the world. Second place in world production, formerly occupied by Russia, has now been taken by the United States. With production cut approximately in half by the war, the recovery of the German sugar industry is a matter of practical concern to American beet growers and sugar refiners.

American beet growers and sugar refiners.

For the past seven years Germany has been entirely out of the sugar export trade, and during the last season was under the necessity of importing 150,000 tons or more to cover absolute domestic requirements. Within the territory turned over to Poland by Germany under the terms of the peace settlement were 296,400 acres of beet sugar land. Indeed, some of the best beet sugar soil of the old empire was in the Posen region and the so-celled the Posen region and the so-called Danzig corridor. Washington, Oct. 18. - Maternal nortality is increasing and no progres is being made toward its reduction deis being made toward its reduction despite extensive research and development of modern methods, Dr. W. T. Bell of Toronto, pediatrician to the maternal and child welfare bureau of the Ontario Provincial Board of Health, told the delegates attending the annual convention of the National Child Hygiene Association. Much work remains to be done before the maternal death rate will be lowered, he declared, expressing the belief that a large percentage of this mortality is preventable. He added that health education through the public nurse, recently inaugurated in Ontario, was expected to aid greatly in reducing the maternal death rate.
