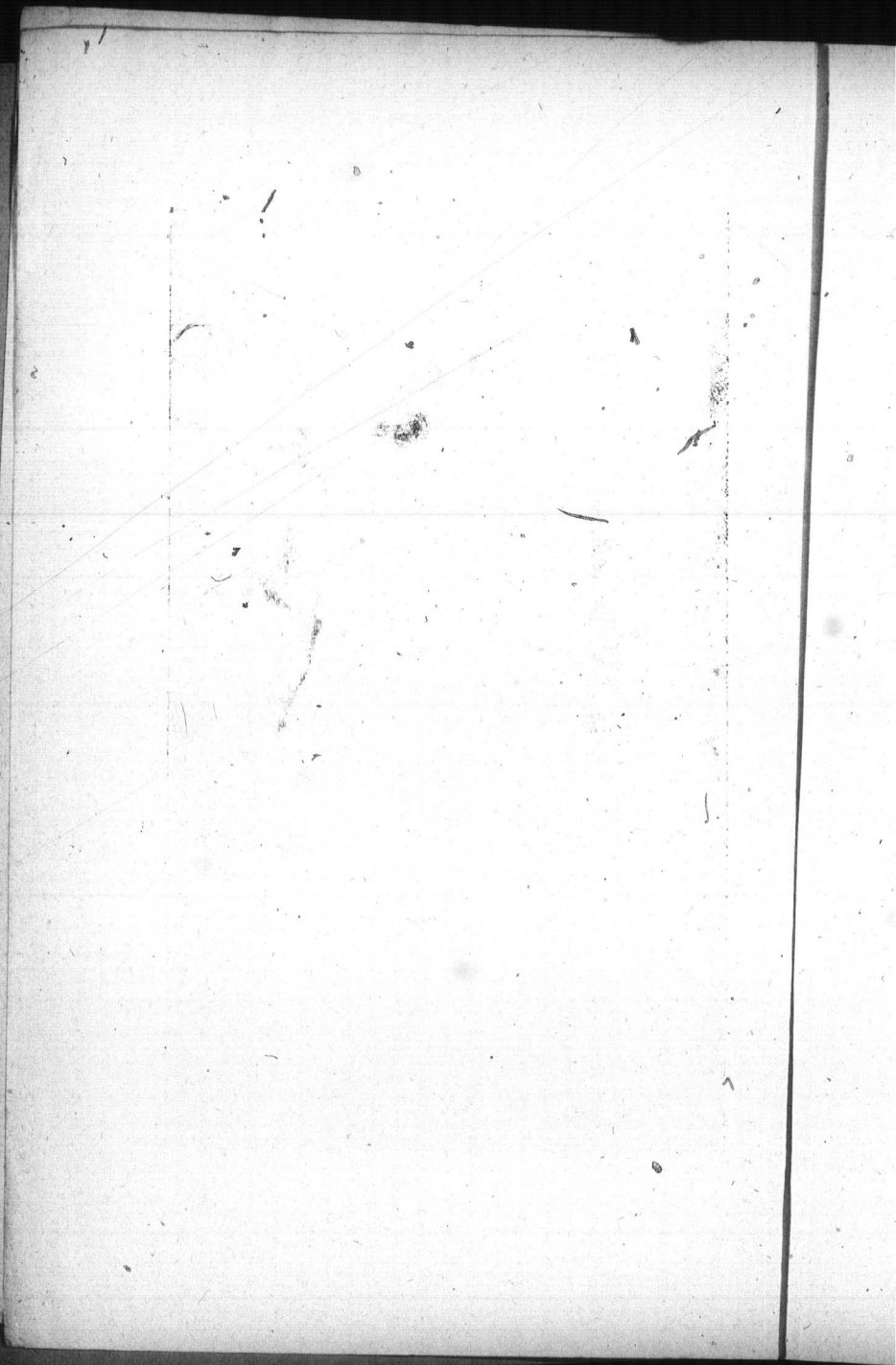

# St. Michael's College

**S**T. MICHAEL'S COLLEGE was established in 1852 by the Basilian Fathers from Annonay, France, at the request, and under the patronage, of the Most Rev. Dr. De Charbonnel, then Bishop of Toronto. For four years the College occupied the wing of St. Michael's Palace on Church street. In 1856 a more suitable edifice was erected on the present site, which was partly the gift of the late Hon. John Elmsley. Since that time the building has been more than doubled in size; and the chapel attached to the College also enlarged and improved. The location is one of the most beautiful and healthy in the City of Toronto.

The object of the Institution is to impart a thorough Catholic training, moral and intellectual, so as to fit young men for any position in life which they may wish to occupy. To secure this end the College is provided with a complete and efficient staff. Many are gentlemen of experience whose study and learning are for years devoted to education. All receive special training in the Scholasticate for the important work of teaching. Some are graduates of Toronto University. By reference to the List of the Faculty it will be seen that one of these is in charge of the class preparing for Matriculation at Toronto University and other Provincial Examinations.

The studies advancing steadily with the educational progress of the country, it was deemed to be to the advan

tage of those studying for the liberal professions to have the College affiliated with the Provincial University. In 1881 this affiliation was effected upon a basis similar to that of several of the Catholic Colleges in England and Ireland with the London University. An Act was passed in 1887 by the Local Legislature, according to which the same relations were maintained with the University, and provision for the teaching of certain departments in the curriculum was made by the Government. A confederating college may avail itself of this teaching or not, according to its own convenience. An examination before the University examiners is required in order that students may matriculate. The examinations of the second and third years are passed before the College authorities, whose certificates are received by the University Senate. At the end of the first and the fourth year the University Board examines. Throughout the course all the lectures in Mental and Moral Philosophy and History are given at St. Michael's College, so that the education is purely Catholic. The following University statute was passed afterwards providing for the fourth year examinations in Mental and Moral Science:—"In the honor department of Mental and Moral Philosophy of the fourth year the Senate shall institute two distinct examinations on the two systems of Philosophy taught in the confederating arts colleges." Thus *all* the examinations in Mental and Moral Science are upon the matters taught in St. Michael's College, upon the successful passing of which a student may obtain a degree from the Provincial University of Toronto.

The College is also the Provincial House of the Basilian Community in America, whose special work, besides other sacerdotal functions, is the education of youth. In addition to the canonical novitiate required for candidates entering a religious society, a Scholasticate is established to prepare postulants for their future duties as priests and teachers. Here the young men who, having

finished their College course and having made their novitiate, purpose to devote themselves to the Community of St. Basil, pursue a more advanced course of studies in literature and science as well as the art of teaching and the management of boys.

The Scholasticate and Novitiate are situated on St. Clair avenue.

All accounts must be paid in advance in two terms, on entrance and on the 1st of February. The amount for each term is \$80. A discount of \$10 on the second term will be allowed to all pupils who have paid the first term in advance in full.

No reduction is made for the absence or withdrawal of a student unless arrangements be made with the President or Treasurer.

Students in Philosophy, Rhetoric and Belles-Lettres are obliged to take Elocution.

Articles of clothing will not be furnished by the College unless a deposit for that purpose be left with the Treasurer, who will give a detailed account of its outlay in his regular statement.

It is important that students should have a full supply of clothing, underwear, towels, nightshirts, etc.

A physician visits the College regularly to attend to the health of the pupils; but no extra charge is made, except in case of sickness.

All possible care is bestowed upon the domestic comfort and cleanliness of the students.

No student will be allowed to remain in the College during the summer vacation. Suitable accommodation, when desired by parents or guardians, may readily be obtained through the authorities of the College.

## STUDIES.

The course of study comprises, besides an Elementary Department, three Departments, viz.: The Commercial, the Classical, and the Philosophical.

Since it is most important that every Catholic of education should possess a thorough knowledge of our religion, all possible care is taken to make this branch complete, and students have every opportunity of learning well the grand moral and dogmatic principles of our Holy Church. Christian Doctrine forms an essential subject in all the Departments. Besides a special class each week, some time is devoted to it every day.

Students are required to pass a satisfactory examination before a certificate is given.

As a number of our young men are anxious to enter the various professions of law, medicine and teaching, attention will henceforth be devoted to the special preparation of students wishing to take the university matriculation and other similar examinations of the Educational Department. To fulfil this demand a special class has been formed, which is known as the Matriculation Class.

#### MATRICULATION CLASS.

The work of this class embraces the subjects prescribed for Junior Matriculation in the University of Toronto.

All candidates for Junior Matriculation are required to take the following subjects: Latin, English, History, Mathematics, French or German, and either (1) Greek or (2) the second Modern Language with Physical Science (Physics and Chemistry).

The examination may be taken at once or may be divided into the following two parts, of which (I.) shall be Mensuration, English, Grammar and Rhetoric, Physics, and the History of Great Britain and Canada; (II.) Greek,

Latin, French, German, English Composition, English Literature, Ancient History, Algebra, Geometry and Chemistry. Either Part I. or II. may be taken first, at the option of the candidate and the parts may be taken in different years, or in the same year at the July and September examinations.

As the subjects are not fully announced for 1900, we subjoin those for the Junior Matriculation in the general course for July, 1899:

## PART I.

**ENGLISH GRAMMAR AND RHETORIC:** The main facts in the development of the language. Etymology and Syntax, including the logical structure of the sentence. Rhetorical structure of the sentence and paragraph.

**ARITHMETIC:** Proofs of elementary rules, fractions (theory and proofs). Commercial Arithmetic.

**MENSURATION.**

**HISTORY OF GREAT BRITAIN AND CANADA,** from 1763 to 1871, with outlines of the preceding periods of British History. Geography relating to the History prescribed.

**PHYSICS:** Elements of Mechanics, Dynamics and Heat.

## PART II.

**GREEK:** White's Beginner's Greek Book (pp. 304-428), Homer Iliad VI. Translation at sight of Attic prose. Grammatical questions on the passages from the texts.

**LATIN:** Virgil Æneid I.; Cæsar, Bellum Gallicum V., VI. Translation into Latin of easy narrative passages. Translation at sight of some Latin prose author.

**ALGEBRA:** To end of quadratic equations of one and two unknown quantities.

**GEOMETRY:** Euclid, Bks. I, II. and III.; deductions.

**FRENCH:** Grammar; translation into French; translation at sight of modern French. Authors prescribed.

**GERMAN:** Grammar; translation into German; translation at sight of modern German. Authors prescribed.

**ENGLISH:** Composition; Literature—Lady of the Lake; Selections from Wordsworth.

**ANCIENT HISTORY:** Outlines of Roman History to the death of Augustus, and of Greek History to the Battle of Charonea. Geography relating thereto.

**CHEMISTRY:** Properties and compounds of hydrogen, chlorine, oxygen, sulphur, nitrogen and carbon. The atomic and molecular theories.

#### GERMAN.

The study of this language is optional. The course embraces two years.

## PHILOSOPHICAL DEPARTMENT.

This course is adapted to two years, and consists in a thorough training in Christian Philosophy and the kindred subjects. The students of this course have private rooms, and rules referring particularly to their department.

Special classes in the higher study of English are added.

Students attending the University of Toronto may, upon application, receive instructions upon the matters prescribed in the Curriculum.

## SCHOLARSHIPS AND MEDALS.

The following are the scholarships and medals open for competition for the year 1899 in the various subjects and years to which they are assigned :

The Archbishop's scholarship of \$25, the gift of His Grace Archbishop O'Connor. It is given for the subjects of Christian Doctrine and Natural Theology. It is awarded to the three candidates who shall have passed the best examinations in the subjects as taken by the highest class of religious instruction and the Philosophical Department.

The McEvay scholarship of \$20, the gift of the Right Rev. Monsignore McEvay. It is awarded for the subject of Mental Philosophy.

The Campbell silver medal, the gift of the late Very Rev. Father Campbell, is awarded for success in the Classics of the Fifth Year.

The O'Connor silver medal, the gift of the Right Rev. Dr. O'Connor, Bishop of Peterborough, is awarded for success in Mathematics.

The Dowling silver medal, the gift of the Right Rev. Dr. Dowling, Bishop of Hamilton, is offered for the best essay upon some subject connected with the American Church, and is open to members of St. Michael's Literary Society.

The Maddigan silver medal, the gift of the Rev. P. J. Maddigan, is offered for success in the studies for the Third Year in the Commercial Department.

A gold medal, the gift of the Ancient Order of Hibernians of Toronto, is awarded for the best essay upon some subject connected with Irish History.

With the exception of the medals for essays, all these scholarships and medals are awarded upon the merit of special examinations.

Before being eligible for holding any scholarship or medal, a candidate must have obtained an average of 66 per cent. upon such examination.

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### EXAMINATIONS AND REPORTS.

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Competitions are held every week upon one of the subjects of class matter.

Two reports each term will be sent home concerning the pupils' progress and conduct. The first will be given about the middle of the term, and the second at the close of the examinations:

A general examination in all classes is held at Christmas, Easter, and at the close of the scholastic year.

The prizes, at the annual distribution in June, are awarded to those who attain the required excellence in the weekly competitions and the terminal examinations.

Promotions ordinarily take place at the beginning of the first term.

Students obtaining an average of at least sixty per cent. in the weekly competitions will be placed in honors in the various classes to which they belong.

## DAY SCHOLARS.

The hours for day scholars are from nine o'clock in the morning until noon, and from a quarter to two in the afternoon until five o'clock.

Wednesday and Saturday afternoons are regular holidays. Day scholars are to remain at the College on these days until noon.

Parents are earnestly requested to co-operate with the Professors in seeing that their boys study regularly at home. The time to be given to home work will depend upon the class. In the Classical Department and the highest Commercial Class, not less than two hours' work is required; and in the other classes about an hour and a half.

In cases of absence, parents will kindly send, on the student's return, a note explaining the reason. As a student's progress largely depends upon his regular attendance, his non-attendance should be as rare as possible and only for a grave reason.

Here the student is afforded ample opportunity and facilities for preparation of essays, themes and more extensive reading in connection with his studies. Various games and amusements have also been added for the enjoyment and instruction of the students.

A Gymnasium is also fitted up with a number of athletic appliances conducive to health and physical development.

For the use of the Reading Room and Gymnasium a fee of fifty cents is levied from each student.

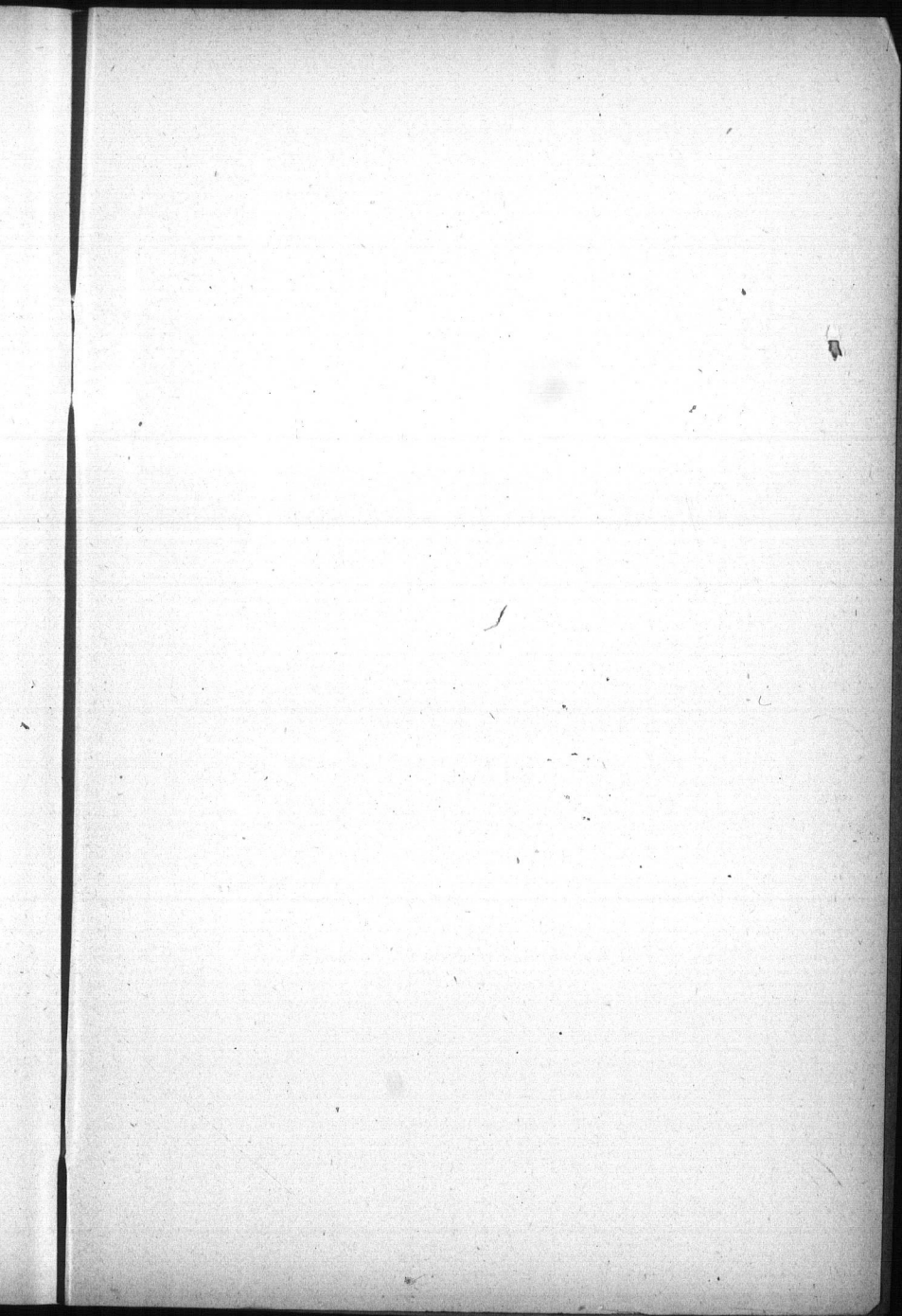
