Tupper-phobia.
We have excellent authority for saying that the petting up of the old Dominion building now being effected, is about the last it will receive of the many attentions that kind bestowed upon it since it passed into the Government's hands.

Mr. John E. Turner, Inspector of Dominion Buildings, came here last Thursday to look after repairing the damage done by the late fire which consumed the Dominion corner, adjoining, and we understand that he is also to have some interior decoration done, such as the filling up of the cracks in the walls, which are the only new thing about the structure, papering the same over and painting some of the woodwork, etc. It is assumed that he found things looking so badly that he reported upon their condition, and we are glad to know that orders have been given to make other repairs which may be expected that a grant for a new public building in Chatham will be asked for when the estimates for the current year are laid before parliament at the session, which is to begin on 29th inst.

As we are, therefore, to have a new Dominion building for the Post Office, Custom House and other offices of the federal government, the question of site is one that will, no doubt, have a good deal of public attention. We have heard of quite a number that have been proposed. The present one is, of course, too small, but it is thought by some that the property adjoining, occupied by Mr. Macdonald's mill, is more eligible to be taken and thus fill the bill. The premises, including the old Canada street and wharf, occupied by the N. B. Trading Company, is another site favored by many. The Ritchie wharf property has also its advocates. The Henderson property on Duke Street, bounded by Cunard Street and the lane running down at the rear of the present Custom House, is also another proposed site, as is also the corner lot belonging to the same estate running from Cunard along Duke Street to Ulfok's stables. All of these are centrally located and will have their advocates. We do not think the Government is committed to any of them, and it is to be earnestly hoped that the subject will be very carefully considered before a choice is made. Let the convenience of the public be the first and only consideration.

Another question of importance is the character of the building to be erected. The Public Works Department will commend itself to practical people if it entrusts the duty of designing the structure to an architect capable of realizing that the leading idea of its exterior form and finish must be in conformity with climatic and other conditions existing in this part of the country. A good deal of Canadian money has been wasted by amateur architects, who, lacking both originality and structural soundness, have simply adapted designs from buildings in countries entirely different from ours, and, imagining they were erecting monuments to commemorate their own genius, have worse than wasted the money spent on their productions. We want a solid, plain and useful building, as free as possible from gables, gutters, dormers and other devices for retaining water, which are suited to winter as well as summer and not like some of the "pagoda and mosque" affairs on which so much money has been wasted elsewhere. We have stone, brick and wood in abundance and the Public Works Department will have an excellent opportunity to make good use of them in the proposed building. We do not think that any important town in the Dominion was ever so long neglected in the matter of a public building as Chatham has been for the present structure. It is a reproach to both the town and Government. It is therefore right that there should be as little delay as possible in making up for lost time.

made that would be entirely satisfactory to him. The statement he made to me is that he wishes to emphasize now. He would consider the height of injustice to remove the present Queen's printer from office. The bill was introduced so as to have the machinery ready to take over and administer the office of Queen's printer in the event of a vacancy occurring. The present Queen's printer gets a considerable part of his income from the advertisements in, and the subscription to the Royal Gazette. In future, when this bill comes into force, the revenue from these sources will go into the public treasury. He believed public opinion would sustain the government in the proposed change, which would be to the best interest of the province. The Queen's printer proposed by the bill would be a clerk under the provincial secretary. It would be his duty to attend to the advertising, the making of collections and the like. He would not have the extraordinary power stated by the leader of the opposition as to making his appointment the government would not be seeking to shift any responsibility. It was absurd to say that the Queen's printer would have power to make printing contracts for 10 years. He read section 12 of the bill.

What did it mean? That for no reason for printing or other work done under this act should be paid out of the provincial treasury without a certificate from the Queen's printer or that the work has been properly done, and that the party doing the same is lawfully entitled to receive the amount certified. That did not mean to convey the idea that the Queen's printer was to be entrusted with the amount to be paid upon the account, or that the amount would have to be passed upon by the auditor general as a present.

After supper Mr. Blair continued. The hon. member from Westmeath, some days ago, was charging that the office of Queen's printer was being created for Mr. Logan. Now he mentions the name of a St. John newspaper publisher. The latter had not applied for the office before the bill was passed, and he doubted very much if a gentleman of his journalistic ability and reputation would be found willing to accept if it were offered to him.

Mr. Hamilton replied claiming that his previous statements were about correct. He read different sections of the bill which he claimed defined the responsibility from the government to an irresponsible Queen's printer.

The bill was agreed to. Mr. Blair introduced a bill authorizing the trustees of District No. 16, Bathurst, to issue debentures.
