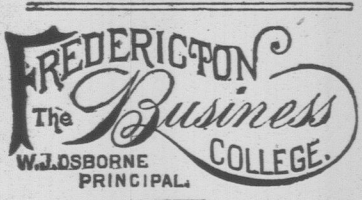

Bank of Nova Scotia. The ADVANCE has received the 67th annual report of the Bank of Nova Scotia to 31st Dec. The bank's assets totalled \$16,827,517; while its general liabilities were \$13,511,975; its paid up capital \$1,500,000; its reserve fund \$2,725,000; profit and loss \$30,542; and dividend payable in February \$60,000. It will be noticed that the reserve fund now exceeds by \$225,000 the paid up capital. The net profit for 1898 after the usual deductions totalled \$248,908 and \$125,000 were transferred to the reserve fund; \$60,000 set aside for dividends and \$30,542 carried over. The Bank has lately opened branches in Toronto, Boston and Winnipeg, and has in fact, besides the head office in Halifax, 14 branches in Nova Scotia, 10 in New Brunswick, 8 in the United States, 2 each in P. E. I., Quebec and Newfoundland and one each in Toronto and Winnipeg. The North shore branches and their managers are, Chatham, R. H. Anderson; Newcastle, Alex. Wilson; Campbellton, D. R. Laird.

De Senneville, Gesteau. A wild-eyed young man burst into the ADVANCE office the other day and said in an ominous tone that Messrs. S. and S. (names of neighboring counties) were in town. Christian Duty and Courtesy. The following correspondence will, no doubt, be read with interest by many to whom the principal parties to it are personal and otherwise known, especially as Dr. Chiniquy has since died:—

A copy of the letter addressed by Archbishop Brochu to Rev. J. L. Morin, Archbishop of Montreal:

"Sir—I hear that Mr. Chiniquy is very seriously ill, and that he may soon die. Although he separated from us a long time ago, I cannot forget what he always remains in the eyes of the Church, and I consider it a duty of my pastoral charge to write you that should he desire to see me, I would feel happy to comply with his wish. Kindly make known to the patient that I have taken the step, and accept the expression of my devoted feelings."

PAUL, Archbishop of Montreal. The following reply was sent to the Archbishop by Rev. Professor Coursiat:

"Monsieur—Mr. Morin, gripped and laid up in bed, requests me to write you, since he cannot do himself. He, as well as his family, were deeply touched with the interest which you take in the spiritual welfare of Mr. Chiniquy. His highly appreciative Christian courtesy of the step you have taken.

I have the honor to convey to you as exactly as possible the reply of Mr. Chiniquy to the wish expressed by you and which was communicated to him by the reading of your letter.

"I am thankful to the Archbishop, but I have definitely retired from the Church of Rome. I am perfectly happy in the faith in Jesus Christ. God and Jesus suffice me. I long for the moment of leaving."

I asked him whether he would not be happy to see you in the event of his being restored to health: "Certainly," said he, "most happy."
