Amalgamation Of Montreal Power With Street Railway Concern Discussed And Is Likely To Go Through.

The White Mountain Express Crashed Into Switching Engine At Concord, N. H., With **Disastrous Results** 

Concord, N. H., Sept. 20.—Five passengers were slightly hurt, two locomotives were badly damaged, and tracks were blocked for some time when the White Mountain Express. Funning over the Boston and Maine tracks from Bretton Woods, N. H. for Boston, crashed into a switching engine, at the extreme north end of the Union station here this afternoon. # **BRUTAL MURDER OF WOMAN AND** HER CHILDREN

John Zoos, Of Westchester, Pa. **Returned Home To Find Wife** And Family Of Three All Slain.

ROBBERY MOTIVE

FOR THE CRIME

Westchester, Pa., Sept. 20.—Mrs. John Zoos, and her three children, a boy aged 7, and two girls aged seven months and three years were murdered late today at Byers, a small town about 12 miles from this place. The police officials are making a desperate effort to locates a boarder with the family, who is missing.

The husband and father was the first to discover the horrible crime. While on his way home Zoos saw his seven year old son lying in the bushes alongside the roadway. The child had been terribly beaten about the head and was unconscious. Lying on the floor of the kitchen in his home the distracted father found the bodies of his two little girls and his wife, the latter still breathing, but with her brains oozing from a great fracture of the skull.

Father Gave Alarm.

The almost frantic father rushed from the house and gave the alarm. A physician was quickly summoned but a glance told that there was no hope for the wife. Attention was then turned to the wounded boy, but he died within sight of the Phoenixville hospital in which he had been rushed 8 miles in an automobile. It was evident that the murderer had gone to the Zoos home for the purpose of robbery.

The fact that the three persons in the dwelling at the time were disposed of by the brutal burglar would seem to bear out the theory of the police officials, that the robber murdered the family to prevent being recognized. At the time the woman and little girls were murdered, the boy was in school. It is supposed that he met the slayer when a short distance from home and the murderer placed the little fellow in such a condition that he could not identify him.

The weapon used by the murderer was the axe. The house had been ransacked.

Rome, Sept. 20. — The Italian government has decided to gratify to the full the Neapolitan gamblers who raised a riot last week over the suspended payment of their winnings, a sum of \$1,500,000 being distributed today. The government was not obliged to paymore than \$1,200,000.

Nevertheless, on several occasions in recent years, when the local gains have been greater, the government has disbursed the full amount without demur. Why do the various European nations struggle for colonial extensions? The basis of their campaign is trade. They desire to secure for their people the market which a new possession affords. Unless they are misinformed as to the benefit of closer union with other parts of the world, the policy of closer union within the Empire must be worth trying.

The pretence that Canada is 'insulted' because it is said that 'drift' may result in separation, or because our loyalty is represented as 'based upon commercialism, is as absurd as the allegation so full of theatrical sympathy for the British workman. What we have before us are the declarations and the actions of the ruling mind in our government. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has publicly avowed his purpose with reference to the relations of Canada to the Empire. He stated in Parliament that the goal at which he aims is separation. He add do that he did not wish to bring about this change by war or by bloodshed. His programme looks rather to a severance of the British ite, slowly, and, to cite his ewn words, 'as the ripe fruit falls from the parent tree, ewn words, 'as the ripe fruit falls from the parent repeated to the first son of the Hudson Bay Rallway. Wilfrid Laurier may be successful unless action be taken to thwart it, what sort of treatment does Canada receive from the public man who promulgates the separation scheme, and announces that he is bent on carrying it through? We have the actions as well as the words of Sir Wilfrid Laurier to guide us on this momentous question. Since this gentleman has directed our destinies, he has, according to his own statement, made us 'a nation.' The connection with the Empire has thus, in his opinion, been distinctly impaired. This boast is not without warrant. All the little things that can be done have been done to make the union less certain. Two illustrations suggest themselves at once in this connection. One is that afforded by the creation of a Foreign Office; the other is the navy. Both have been justified from within the party as steps towards separation. Both are in harmony with the 'ripe fruit' policy of which Sir Wilfrid Laurier has spoken.

"Contemporaneously with the assault upon Sir James Whitney for his opposition to the policy of drift, and for his advocacy of closer commercial relations within the Empire, comes the announcement that there are to be reciprocity negotiations with the United States. The bargain is to be small at first. But it is to be gradually enlarged until complete free trade between Canada and the Republic is established. Under this policy a preference with Britain will be impossible at any time, and according to Hon. Edward Blake, separation from the Empire is the condition that is most likely to come from it. It is not without reason, therefore, that Sir James Whitney issues his warning against drift. Do something to strengthen the Empire, and to avert the movements that tend to weaken it, he says, and what he says, although fiercely criticized by separatists, is patriotic and true."
