## D. J. BRUCE DIES FROM WOUND

Dr. W. W. Doherty Stabs Him in the Eye with Umbrella, Penetrating Brain.

The community was slowly recovering from the severe blow sustained in the tragic death of Mr. D. J. Bruce, who died early on Friday morning, as the result of a blow struck him by Dr. W. W. Doherty.

From information received it appears that Dr. Doherty called on Mr. Bruce on Thursday afternoon, into a store to see him and then stabbed him in the eye with his umbrella. At the same time, "There, take that, Bruce!" The injured man was immediately rushed to the Hotel Dieu Hospital, where he was attended by Dr. Lynam. The wound did not appear serious at first and he was removed home in the evening; but unfortunately, he never regained consciousness and died on Friday morning at 6 o'clock. Immediately after the occurrence, Dr. Doherty was arrested by Chief Hughes and held in the lock up, bail being refused.

It is impossible to get the facts leading up to the stabbing, but it is supposed to have started in a political argument, deceased being a prominent conservative while Dr. Doherty is a Liberal. It is said that the doctor, who was also an ardent advocate of temperance, accused the deceased of selling liquor contrary to the local option law, and this highly incensed the doctor who struck deceased as above. It is also said that Dr. Doherty was somewhat under the influence of liquor when this happened.

Mr. Bruce was a native of Prince Edward Island and came to Campbellton sixteen years ago, and conducted a gent's furnishing store, occupying a handsome block on Water Street. He was twice married, his second wife, who, with two children, survive him, was a Miss McKinnon of New Mills. He also leaves to mourn his loss, a brother in California and a sister in Rhode Island.

Mr. Bruce was one of our most respected citizens and was looked up to and honored by all classes. For many years he has been a devoted worker in St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, and an earnest member of the session, and as a devoted husband and father, had the great joy of a perfect home.

From many sorrowing hearts and from the whole community their prayers and tender sympathy are extended to the grief-stricken family, but who yet rejoice in the fact that the life, so suddenly shortened, was spent in the service of God and to the benefit of his fellows. The funeral will probably take place on Monday.

## THE INQUEST

The inquest commenced in the Asker building Friday morning at 10 o'clock, Mr. D. J. Bruce, M. D.

The following jurymen were selected: George St. Onge, Thos. W. W. Doherty, W. L. McRae, M. E. Moore, Jas. P. Jarvis and Jas. Fitzworth.

The jury then proceeded to the home of deceased to view the body.

Upon returning the following witnesses were examined:-

DR. LUNAM, M. D.--I am practising medicine in Campbellton. Have a New Brunswick license. I saw deceased at about 4.45 at the hospital on the 21st. When I moved cloth from face I noticed he had a cut on the upper lid of left eye, the whole eye, eye and lid, were swollen and bleeding, which showed that the injury was recent. Would say perhaps, half hour. I raised the lid of the eye and saw that whatever had caused the external wound had caused the internal wound, the ball having also been pierced. That was all I saw. I did not probe. I washed the eye. Did not notice any substance of this eye ball escaped. Deceased was sitting in chair when I dressed wound. Was full conscious. Saw him again at 8.45 same day. I was called to his house. He was absolutely unconscious. Swelling was no larger. I could not explain it any other way than that the instrument which penetrated the eye had penetrated through the skull and ruptured some blood vessel, which formed a clot on the brain substance which would cause unconsciousness. The external wound in itself was not serious. A clot might be formed by a blow. In my opinion the cause of death was a clot of blood formed on the brain, caused by the perforation of the eye and extending in to the brain and rupturing a blood vessel. Could not swear that death resulted from this. When I arrived at hospital Dr. Price was there and we dressed the wound together. When I saw him at his residence at 3.45, I called in Dr. Pinault in consultation. We agreed that there was a clot pressing upon the substance of the brain which caused unconsciousness, and we did what we saw fit.

A. E. G. McKenzie, upon whose request was deceased removed from hospital to his home.

Ans--He was asked to be removed to his home and I gave permission.

Coroner--Did you examine for any other wounds?

Yes, I examined deceased but found no other wound.

Adjourned until 10 o'clock.

Ottawa. A bulletin on the field crops of Canada issued today gives their average condition by provinces at the end of August, together with estimates of the production of spring wheat, oats and barley at that time. The per cent condition of wheat is given as 86.80, of oats 84.44 and of barley 84.73, which is about five to seven per cent higher than last year and nearly the same as two years ago. The other crops range in condition from 80 to 86 per cent and are generally somewhat lower than in 1909 and 1910. The rains of August hindered the ripening of grain and some injury was caused by hail storms, low temperature and rust. Towards the end of the month frosts prevailed in many sections of the Northwest provinces, the full extent of which could not be determined at the date of the reports but in the case of wheat oats and barley production was lowered by probably 12 per cent which has been followed in the table. In the older provinces the grains ripened earlier and little damage was sustained excepting from drought in some localities, and the reported condition was 75 or over.

The average yield of spring wheat is estimated at 19.14 bushels per acre for the Dominion, which is seven bushels more than last year and the total yield at 186,925,000 bushels being grown almost wholly in Ontario and Alberta. The total wheat yield of the country is therefore estimated to be 204,634,000 bushels or 81,849,000 bushels more than last year at the same rate. The average per acre is 19.80 bushels or 6.36 bushels per acre more than last year.

For the Dominion the field of oats is given as 368,153,000 bushels which is 84,906,000 bushels more than last year's estimate at the same date and the average at 35.81 bushels per acre being more than last year by 7.10 bushels. The average for barley is also higher than last year by 7.31 bushels and the total yield is estimated at 51,559,000 bushels as against 39,388,000 bushels for last year.

The estimated yield of spring wheat for Manitoba Saskatchewan and Alberta this year is 181,535,000 bushels of fall wheat 3,193,000 bushels of oats 20,205,000 bushels and of barley 30,205,000 bushels as compared with 98,808,000 bushels spring wheat 1,082,000 bushels fall wheat 92,201,000 bushels barley in the previous year.

In Prince Edward Island Nova Scotia and New Brunswick the estimated yield of spring wheat is 1,453,000 bushels of oats 437,000 bushels in Quebec 1,777,000 bushels spring wheat 44,619,000 bushels and 2,389,000 bushels of barley and in Ontario 2,163,000 bushels spring wheat 14,513,000 bushels fall wheat 102,077,000 bushels of oats and 18,528,000 bushels of barley.

The final estimate of last year printed in this December Monthly gave the production for the whole country as 16,610,000 bushels fall wheat 133,379,600 bushels spring wheat 323,449,000 bushels of oats and 45,147,600 bushels of barley. The October number of the Census Monthly will give the statistics of the areas of field crops of the Dominion this year as taken by the Census of the first of June.

#### A New League Has Organized to Abolish Public Smoking

The "Non-Smokers' Protective League" has been organized with the avowed purpose of abolishing public smoking as a nuisance.

It is true, of course, that the smoking public is considerably in the minority, counting men, women and children, and that the folks who smoke in public places, do so because they dare to, not because they have any logical right to, but even when cheerfully admitting these truths, the average smoker will keep the event of his habit to himself, and when asked to do about it, is in his only defense, if indeed he thinks it worth while to offer any defense at all.

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### WATER AN OLD ANAESTHETIC

#### Found to Be As Useful Today as Ever

The use of lukewarm water as the sole anaesthetic in operations for appendicitis at Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, reported in The Times, was declared by surgeons here to be quite possible and in line with the use of water anaesthetic, first tried in this city years ago.

One surgeon who has performed successfully more than 5,000 operations with no other anaesthetic than an injection of water into the skin, declared, however, that the use of this simplest of all anaesthetics could probably never come into general use, and that, while it was applicable in many minor abdominal operations, it was not applicable in a majority of such cases, especially where inflammation or an abscess had formed.

As long ago as 1855 Dr. J. Leonard Corning of this city, pointed out in his book of "Local Anaesthesia" the value of heating the anaesthetic before injecting it. The use of water as an anaesthetic in a certain class of operations was explained by Dr. Samuel G. Gant in a paper before the Medical Association of the city in 1903.

Dr. Gant mentioned Burney Vee, and Griffith, of England, as among the pioneers to suggest the use of the pain by the subcutaneous injection of water.

The theory on which water is used is, however, not according to Dr. Gant, is that the water provides a pressure of the nerve ending, which blocks all sensation or pain so long as the water continues unabsorbed or unscattered. Dr. Gant said recently he had found that any other fluid that gave pressure and was not absorbed would have the same anaesthetic effect. The method was applicable, he said, in nearly all skin operations, and he had tried it successfully in some operations for laparotomy, colostomy and appendicectomy, all of which necessitate the opening of the abdomen.

"Water anaesthesia, however, is no good at all for operations where an abscess has formed, or inflammation sets in, as, for example, in cancer or in case of a ruptured appendix," said Dr. Gant. "To be successful, the water anaesthetic must be applied to the whole part where the operation is to be made, and in the majority of such abdominal operations, as I have mentioned there is in the first place, uncertainty as to where to operate, and in the second place the tissues refuse to hold the water, and allow it instead to scatter."

Dr. Gant, at the last meeting of the Maryland Medical Society, in a paper telling of some 2,000 skin and muscle operations he had performed with water anaesthesia in the past eight years, and it is thought he may have suggested the most recent application of water anaesthesia reported in operations for appendicitis at Johns Hopkins.

Hon. Jacques Bureau, solicitor-general, is also numbered among the fallen, while Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, in Rouville; Dr. Beland, in Beauce, and ex-Speaker Marcell in Bonaventure, retained their seats.

The defeat of Mr. Gilbert in Drummond-Arthabaska removed from the parliamentary scene the man who showed a year ago the strength of the tide against the naval policy of the government. The Conservatives gained seven seats in Quebec, and lost four those lost being Soulanges, where Sir Wilfrid Laurier was victorious over Dr. Lortie, and Quebec West, where William Pric was defeated by Mr. Power, of Sherbrooke, and Drummond-Arthabaska.

The Quebec standing as a result of yesterday's polling is 38 Liberals and 57 Conservatives, with two deferred elections yet to be held in Gaspé and Chicoutimi.

Another feature of the result was the lack of strength displayed by the Nationalists in counties which seemed to be their stronghold. The Conservatives not only held their own in the majority of the constituencies represented by them in the last parliament, but they added considerably to the number.

Conservatives Elected Over Seventy Members Against Thirteen Liberals

Toronto, Sept. 21—Greater than the sweep made by the National Policy in 1878 is the complete victory in Ontario of the Conservative party.

There is just a handful of Liberals left to tell the tale. Hon. G. T. Graham, Hon. William Paterson, Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King, all of whom were strong for reciprocity, went down to defeat.

There is no reciprocity sentiment in Ontario judging from the vote which at this time is 71 Conservatives and 12 Liberals.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier made the mistake of his life when he allowed Americans from Detroit to get in on his platform and cheer for the set in the province of Ontario.

Another fact that contributed to the defeat of the Laurier government was the activity of W. R. Hearst, of New York, in the affairs of Canada. An army of United States correspondents invaded this city just as if it was part of their country and they had some real right to educate the people of Canada.

There are 221 members in the house of commons and five of these constituencies will not be heard from until later. Thunder Bay and Rainy River are the two in Ontario.
