### PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE. HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

Saturday, Feb. 8.

On motion of Mr. Boyd, The House went into committee of the whole, on a bill to amend an act, intituled "an act to repeal the laws now in force for appointing Firewards in the Town of Saint Andrews," and to make regulations more suitable to the said Town, and for other purposes therein mentioned. Mr. Hannington in the chair of the committee. Mr. Speaker resumed the chair. The Chairman reported that the committee had the bill referred to them under their consideration, and agreed to the same.—Ordered, That the report be accepted, and the bill engrossed.

Monday, Feb. 10.  
Mr. Hill brought in a bill, to amend and continue an act, intituled "an Act for the appointment of Firewards and the better extinguishing of fires which may happen in that part of the parish of Saint Stephen, commonly called Milltown, and its immediate vicinity," which was read a first time.

Mr. Boyd brought in a bill, to regulate the assize of bread in the Towns of Saint Andrews and St. Stephen, in the County of Charlotte, and to repeal the acts now in force relating to the town of Saint Andrews, which was read a first time.

Read a third time as engrossed, A bill to continue the act to regulate the inspection of dry & pickled fish for home consumption and for exportation.—Resolved, That the bill do pass.—Ordered, That Mr. Boyd take the said bill to the Council, and desire their concurrence thereto.

Read a third time as engrossed, A bill to continue the act for the more speedy and effectual punishment of persons keeping disorderly houses.—Resolved, That the bill do pass.—Ordered, That Mr. Hill take the said bill to the Council, and desire their concurrence thereto.

A bill to authorize the Grand Jurors of the several Counties within this Province to inspect the public accounts.—Resolved, That the bill do pass.—Ordered, That Mr. Boyd take the said bill to the Council, and desire their concurrence thereto.

Mr. Boyd presented a petition from Julia Crowley, setting forth that in August last she established an infant school in the Town of St. Andrews, and praying that a grant may pass to aid her in the undertaking; which he read.—Ordered, That the said petition be received, and referred to the committee for taking Petitions for school allowance under their consideration to report thereon.

Mr. Boyd brought in a bill, to provide for the expenses of Grand and Petit Jurors serving in the several courts of Justice in the County of Charlotte. Leave granted.

Tuesday, Feb. 11.  
Mr. Boyd presented a petition from Alexander M'Douall and 75 others, Freeholders of the County of Charlotte, praying that the present line of road from St. Andrews to St. John may be continued, with the exception of some alterations suggested by the petitioners, and that no new road may be opened from Saint Andrews to Waycig; which he read. Ordered, That the said petition be received, and referred to the Committee appoin-

ted on the 28th January for taking into consideration the state of all the roads of communication in the Province, to report thereon.

Mr. Boyd presented a petition from Cornelia Hitchings, of the parish of Saint Andrews, in the County of Charlotte, praying that the usual allowance may be granted to her, for teaching a school at that place for a period of 6 months, ending on the 17th Nov. 1839; which he read.—Ordered, That the said petition be received, and referred to the committee appointed for taking petitions of a like prayer under their consideration, to report thereon.

Mr. Boyd presented a petition from Samuel Frye, Physician and Vaccinating Surgeon, in the town of Saint Andrews, praying that a grant may pass to him for his services in that capacity; which he read. Ordered, That the said petition be received, and referred to the committee of supply.

Mr. Brown presented a petition from Edward Wilson and Joseph Wilson, of Saint Andrews, in the County of Charlotte, on behalf of the owners of the brig Thomas (London), of Cork Ireland, praying for a return of moneys paid to passengers brought to St. Andrews in that vessel during the last season; which he read.—Ordered, That the said petition be received, and referred to the committee of supply.

Mr. Boyd presented a petition from the Hon. Thomas Wyer, the Hon. Harris Hatch, Samuel Frye, and John M'achlan, Esquires, formerly Directors of the Savings' Bank at St. Andrews, praying to be relieved from the responsibility occasioned by the defalcation of the Cashier to that Institution; which he read. Ordered, That the said petition be received, and referred to the Committee of supply.

Mr. Brown presented a petition from the Justices of the Peace for the County of Charlotte, praying that an act may pass to authorize an assessment to pay off the County debt; which he read. Ordered, That the said petition be received, and lie on the table.

Mr. Brown brought in a bill, to authorize the Justices of the Peace for the County of Charlotte, to levy an assessment to pay off the County debt. Leave granted. The said bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Brown brought in a bill, to continue an act relating to the navigation of the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy. Leave granted.

Mr. Brown brought in a bill, to continue an act for the better regulating the office of sheriff in the Province. Leave granted.

On motion of Mr. Hill, whole went into committee, to continue a bill to amend an act, intituled "an act to amend the act, intituled 'an act for the better extinguishing of fires which may happen in that part of the parish of Saint John, commonly called Milltown, and its immediate vicinity.'"

The Chairman reported, that the committee had the bill referred to them under their consideration, and agreed to the report.—Ordered, That the report be accepted, and the bill engrossed.—Mr. Boyd brought in a bill, to provide for the expenses of Grand and Petit Jurors serving in the several courts of Justice in the County of Charlotte.
