Burning of St. Elizabeth Convent.

A terrible catastrophe occurred at the Convent of St. Elizabeth, Country Joliet, 45 miles N. E. of Montreal, Monday night at 8.45.

The Sister Superior of Convent made the usual visit through the whole convent, and neither saw nor suspected anything.

Neither smoke nor smell to lead any one think of fire. All the community were in bed, when at twenty minutes past nine the whole Convent was in flames. All that could be done for the persons in the Convent was to hurry them outside. Nuns as well as children had only time to run out themselves, without any clothing of any kind.

It is believed that the fire originated between the floors, but none could suspect the cause.

Thirteen persons are missing, and have perished in the conflagration. At one o'clock eight bodies had been found and taken from the ruins. They were all burned to cinders.

Some of the parents of these poor children were on the spot, and were to be seen crying and looking for their remains, seeking to recognize them by the pieces of linen or cloth found on them or otherwise.

It is said Elizabeth Gravel, one of the victims, was seen out of the Convent in 4 minutes, but that she went back into it either to save somebody or some of her things, apparently expecting to have time to come out safe, and that she could not return.

The Sister Superior, it appears, was present in remaining in the Convent, to save the children, and at last escaped with great difficulty.

The victims are supposed to have been burnt in the stairs, while running away or suffocated in the bed rooms.
