## HOSPITALS TO TAKE ACTION

**Asking for Amendment to Workmen's Compensation Act in Reference to Fees.**

As a result of a conference at St. John between representatives of the Provincial Hospitals and the Workmen's Compensation Board, the following resolutions were drawn up for presentation during the approaching session of the Legislature:

AND WHEREAS the Workmen's Compensation Act makes provision for the payment of the Dole and Fifty Cents per week and pro rate per day for Hospital fees in cases of Patients under such act;

AND WHEREAS, owing to the large increase in the cost of everything required for the maintenance, upkeep and running expenses of all Hospitals, such as surgical apparatus, dressings, anaesthetics, medical supplies, laundry, fuel, labor and food;

AND WHEREAS, no patient can be cared for at any Hospital for less than three dollars per day at present prices;

AND WHEREAS, all Hospitals in this Province are kept up by Public grants, and private generosity and are not for the purpose of making private gain but for the alleviation of suffering to rich and poor alike;

AND WHEREAS, any deficits incurred must be made up by still further public grants or private generosity;

AND WHEREAS, the coming Session of the Legislature, changes can be made in the Provisions of the Act to provide for more adequate payment of Hospital and physicians' services rendered to the patients under the Act;

AND WHEREAS, present tariff will not begin to pay actual cost of maintenance of such patients, but will only add to the deficits now experienced by the Hospital;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED THAT the Trustees of the various New Brunswick hospitals memorialize the Government to amend the Workmen's Compensation Act as to provide for the payment of the usual fees charged by the provincial Hospitals for like services rendered to patients, and for reasonable physicians' and surgeons' fees;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That copies of this resolution be forwarded to the Lieutenant-Governor-in-General and Council and to the Representatives of the various Counties in the Legislature, asking that they urge before the Government and Legislature that such amendments be made.

## FORMER CHARLO MAN WINS PRIZE

**Has Best Yield of Potatoes in United States—\$1000 is the Prize.**

(Presque Isle Star-Herald)

The gold, silver and bronze medals for the largest yields of potatoes in the United States in 1919, awarded by the Farm Journal of Philadelphia, went to the winners as quickly as the names and bushels can be engraved upon them. These medals and the three cash prizes of \$1000, \$500, and \$250 all go to Aroostook County. The winning yields were: Alex. McPherson, Presque Isle, Me., 530.5 bush. per acre; Robert Cleaves, Presque Isle, Me., 529.7 bush. per acre; E. C. Hoyt, Fort Fairfield, Me., 526.3 bush. per acre.

The Farm Journal contest offered medals and cash prizes aggregating \$10,500 for each of six crops—corn, oats, wheat, potatoes, alfalfa and cotton. The announcement of this contest was made in 1918 when it seemed certain that the war would continue well into 1919. The crops selected all had a direct bearing on the production of things which would win the war afterwards.

Aroostook county early gave notice that it's hat was in the ring; and it won out by a good margin over all other districts.

The splendid yields which captured the prizes were not accidental. Aroostook county has been building up production of potatoes for a long period, and the limit has not yet been reached. Maine methods may well be studied in the districts which are producing what Maine thought was good enough a few years ago. For the other prizes there was an active and close competition. In every case, except wheat and potatoes, the three prizes have gone to three separate states, showing clearly that good crops are not so much a matter of location as of intelligent methods.

The interest in the Farm National Crop Contest has been widespread and intense and has been greatly stimulated by the co-operation of State, Extension Departments, County Agents, Farm Bureaus, Banks and other agencies interested in progressive agriculture.

Moncton, March 10.—The annual election members of the Provident Fund Board of the Intervolontal and Prince Edward Island Railways Employees has been held, balloting closing on March 5th.

The ballots were counted in Moncton by a committee of 15 members, resulting in the election of Mr. Ellis A. Bourgeois, Assistant to the Comptroller and Treasurer and Mr. Willard P. Hutchinson, train dispatcher, Moncton, with a total ballot each of 4,740 and 4,935 respectively.

**SOUTH RUSSIA AS CEREAL PRODUCER**

Data Secured by International Institute of Agriculture on Conditions Prevailing Provide Interesting Facts

Rome, March.—Data secured by the International Institute of Agriculture here on conditions in the chief cereal producing provinces of South Russia, which in normal times provided the grain supplies of Northern Russia, furnish the basis for an estimate in a special bulletin issued by the Institute that the quantity of wheat available for export from South Russia in the season 1919-20 should reach at least 1,500,000 tons.

The bulletin goes into details regarding the Kuan district, the Government of which it says, has calculated that from the crops of 1919 alone there should be available for export in the present season about 430,000 tons of wheat and 370,000 tons of barley, with the addition of stocks of cereals remaining from the previous season.

The figures for the other provinces—the Ukraine, Terek and Don—were provided it is stated, by the British mission sent thence by the Supreme Economic Council.

**THE MANAGER SCHEME.**

The Town of Woodstock is working under the Town's Incorporation Act but a special amendment was put through sometime ago, allowing that Municipality to centralize its departments under one head. Towns in the States have decided that it is wiser to have a special charter or ordinance passed by their local legislatures before changing their form of government.

The Town of Woodstock adopted the town manager form of government on July 11th, 1919, and engaged their town manager at a salary of \$3000.00 per year.

Under this form of government they are working on the same basis as a private corporation; the electors correspond to the stockholders, the council to the board of directors and the manager to the company manager. As formerly, the council is divided into committees, each committee being responsible for a certain department. The general policy to be adopted in handling this department is decided by the committee and the executive and detailed work left to the manager. In department taking up the questions of his department with his superintendent, he takes them up with the manager and holds him responsible. The same thing applies to the other departments. The manager then knowing what is needed in each department can arrange his work, supplies, etc., so that everything is working together for the common good of the town. There is therefore no overlapping of effort. Under the old form of government the chief of the fire department, the chief of police, the superintendent of the water department, etc., were directly responsible to the chairman of their respective committees, and any data that was kept concerning any one of these departments, was kept in the private offices of the chairman who might be the then head of the department. The Secretary-treasurer was directly responsible to the council. This method did not seem to tend towards general efficiency.

The present staff consists of a manager who has an office assistant acting as stenographer and book-keeper, and under the manager's direction looks after cost data, water records, tax bills, etc. We have a chief of police, a chief of fire department—who gives part time to this work, and an outside general foreman, all directly responsible to the manager. The Council have supported the manager in every way, and if the system is a success a large measure of thanks for this success should go to the council. So far the system has been successful, and there is not one of the council who is not enthusiastic over the present methods adopted. This applies chiefly to the older members of the Board who have known the slackness of former methods, and who were somewhat opposed to the town management form of government when it was first advocated.

The progress business men of the town too seem to be pleased. In the recent election which was held, owing to the fact that the people seemed generally satisfied, there was very little interest taken in the election, and the three old councillors were re-elected without any effort being made on their part.

An account of all material purchased is kept by a cost data system which shows the cost of both labor and material of each detail carried out. In the old days a bill used to be brought before the council for payment and the only check was the memory of the chairman of that particular committee. Now each bill has a slip attached showing what portion goes against each appropriation, and the detail of this appropriation. This information is all taken from the cost records and nothing is left to memory, or guessing work. In buying everything is watched very closely and quotations received on all material outside of small emergency purchases. In the closing up of contracts in connection with the new filtration plant the town easily saved \$1000.00 on what

**HELD INVESTIGATION AT BATHURST**

Charges Made Against First Ranger by Discharged Helper.

BATHURST, N. B., March 5.—Officials of the department of lands and mines held an investigation into charges against Edward Baldwin, a forest ranger of the department, preferred by Albion Dolan, his helper, who had been discharged by Baldwin. Hon. E. A. Smith, minister of lands and mines, conducted the investigation and will give his decision in a short time. Witnesses were questioned by T. G. Loggie, deputy minister. Other departmental officials present were Chief Forester G. H. Prince, Chief Scaler, A. T. Marchie and Chief Game Warden, L. A. Gagnon.

The charges investigated were:

1. That Baldwin received a present of a pig which was kept at one of the camps of the Bathurst Lumber Co.
2. Falsifying his diary, which was returned to the crown land office.
3. Undercharging logs cut on operations of the Bathurst Lumber Co.

The inquiry was held in the court house at Bathurst and attracted large audiences.

**132nd COLORS TAKEN FROM ABBEY**

Last of Canadian Colors to Be Sent to Their Final Destination

The Canadian regimental colors that during the war were draped for safe-keeping about Wolf's tomb in Westminster have now all been returned to the units to which they belong or to representatives of those units, later to find a final resting place in some Canadian church or memorial hall. The last colors to be received from Westminster Abbey were those of the 132nd Battalion, a unit recruited in New Brunswick. These were placed in the Abbey in December, 1916 when they remained until January, 1920 when they were handed by Rev. Canon Barnes into the keeping of Sergeant John Lewis, 1st Divisional Cavalry, N.C.O. who had been selected to attend Westminster Abbey and there receive the colors. Sergeant Leslie is in charge of military police at Canadian Headquarters, Argyll House. An interesting feature of the proceeding is the fact that although no officer of color party were present the regular service was not omitted, and the colors were returned with all due ceremony. They will be sent to New Brunswick headquarters, where a proper resting place will doubtless be accorded them by the military authorities.



**NOTICE OF LEGISLATION.**

Notice is hereby given that the Town of Campbellton will at the next session of the Legislature of New Brunswick, make application for the passing of an Act to amend the Town of Campbellton Incorporation Act as follows—

1. Section 70, 51 Victoria, Chapter 31 as amended by Section 5 V Edward Seventh, Chapter 70, so as to provide for the taking of a vote of the ratepayers of the Town before granting such exemptions as are provided for in the section.
2. Section 16, 51 Victoria, Chapter 31 so as to provide for the holding of the annual election of Mayor and Councillors on the second Tuesday in January.
3. Section 18, 4 George Fifth, Chapter 69 to provide for the issue of licences to assist in deterring the expenses and cost of construction and equipment of a Fire Station for the said Town in denominations of fifty dollars each at a rate of interest not to exceed six per centum per annum rather than in denominations of one hundred dollars each at a rate of interest not to exceed five per centum per annum.



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
