EFFORTS BEING MADE FOR BETTER FERRY SERVICE ON RESTIGOUCHE

Appropriation of \$9,000 Placed in Estimates For Extension of Maguasha Wharf—Subsidy of \$500 Secured Towards Steam Ferry Service—Suitable Boat Not Yet Secured But Prospects Favorable.

(Special To The Graphic) Dalhousie, N. B., March 26.—The people of Dalhousie, Fleury, Maguasha and Carleton, who profited of the splendid weather on Saturday, to visit Dalhousie, returned to their homes delighted with the news, received here on Saturday morning from Hon. Chas. Macdill, M. P., in a letter addressed to one of our citizens, dated at Ottawa, March 20th, confirming the newspaper reports, that the Main Estimates contained an item of \$9000 for the extension of the Maguasha wharf and the addition of a slip for vehicles and autos which are to make access to and from Dalhousie very easy and do away with the round about route via Cross Point.

The business men of the shiretown and the people generally will be grateful to the M. P. of our neighboring county, for the great interest he takes in cementing trade relations between the people of the constituency, he represents which such honor and credit, with the citizens of the towns of Campbellton and Dalhousie, the natural market of the upper parishes of Bonaventure.

WRITER FAVORS CROSS-PROVINCE HIGHWAY TO ST. LEONARDS

St. Quentin Citizen Discusses New Road and Puts Forth Good Arguments in Its Favor.

Mr. Editor Graphic
The people of the Northern part of Restigouche County are greatly interested in the proposed International Highway Road between Campbellton and Madawaska County, and as I was reading the Carleton Observer last week I noticed a letter written by Mr. J. E. Waugh of Andover N. B., which shows that people along St. John River are also very much interested. Mr. Waugh is an important lumberman who has been doing extensive lumber business in the Northern part of Restigouche, Victoria and Madawaska Counties for a good many years, and there is certainly no doubt that he knows a good deal about this country. Mr. Waugh expressed his opinion why this Road should be built to St. Leonard, instead of to Edmundston, and I am convinced that his opinion is approved by the people living along St. John River south of St. Leonard and the entire population of the I. N. R.

Permit me to state a few reasons upon which we base our opinion if the road was built to Edmundston it would cost considerably more as there would be Green River, Quibisis River, Sagap, the head of Grand River and the head of Restigouche River to bridge besides being as up and down hill road and would have to be built across country—through green forest. In building this road to St. Leonard the road would be only a few small brooks to bridge and it is all good level country besides the fact that there is already a good highway road from Chat town along the I. N. R., 15 miles to St. Campbellton leaving a distance of about 20 miles to strike Huen settlement where you again find another good Highway leading to White Brook a distance of 22 miles. Along this Road are located St. Quentin Five Fingers, Arsenault, Maltais, Kedge-wick and Whites Brook, comprising altogether a population of about 7000. If this road was built to Edmundston instead of St. Leonard, any party coming from points south of St. Leonard along the St. John

River or from the State of Maine would have to drive twenty-six miles from St. Leonard to Edmundston to make the turn towards Campbellton and double this 26 miles to come towards Campbellton. The same inconvenience would be found by any party coming from Campbellton or points south or from along the I. N. R. and going to points south of St. Leonard while on the other hand the distance would be the same in either case for any party coming from or going to points north of St. Leonard and if the road was built to Edmundston while not saving any distances in coming towards Campbellton they would find a more difficult road to travel. Besides these facts we have no doubt that the Government means that this road will have a lot to do in bringing the Tourists from St. John River as well as from the States to visit Eastern New Brunswick. Does it sound logical that these Tourists from St. John River South of St. Leonard as well as those coming from the State of Maine would after reaching Edmundston where they are only 80 miles from St. Leonard River would double up the 26 miles and come through this way? I hardly think so and would be pleased to hear from some of your readers what they think of the arguments.

MAY BE REDUCTION IN THE SALES TAX

Premier King Intimates to Delegation That Such May Take Place

Ottawa, March 21—Premier King gave a broad hint to-day of reduction in the sales tax. He was speaking to a delegation of manufacturers of agricultural implements from Bradford, Paris, Galt, Tillsonburg and Smith's Falls, who had come to urge that there should be no reduction in the present customs tariff on agricultural implements.

The Premier declared he could not see why, from statements in the Speech from the Throne, it should be assumed that the tariff on agricultural implements was to be singled out. The reference in the Speech was to instruments of production in the basic industries.

"You have assumed," he went on, "that the reference means tariff elimination on agricultural implements. I take it that if we said that we are reducing the sales tax we should have every manufacturer holding up his hands for us to do it."

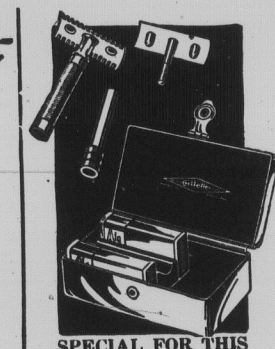

WRITES OF 1924 TOURIST BUSINESS

Pays Many Compliments To
Charlo as Delightful
Summering Place

Dalhousie, N. B., March 26.—The statistics submitted at the annual meeting of the Tourist Bureau of Montreal, showing that 133,000 American Automobiles visited the Province of Quebec last year and that approximately half a million tourists saw some of the beauties of Quebec, and in doing so spent a sum that is estimated at seventeen millions of dollars. The forecast is that two hundred thousand cars will come across the border during the current year, bringing three-quarters of a million visitors.

The eloquence of such figures is obvious, especially when it is recalled that eight years ago the visiting cars numbered less than three thousand five hundred. The Minister of Roads in Quebec is boasting the Hotel accommodation question. He claims that for the want of proper hotels the Province of Quebec stands to lose millions of Tourist money.

The statement made recently by Premier J. P. Veniot, before the members of the Automobile Association at the Pythian Castle, St. John, N. B., was impressive. He said that the Province of New Brunswick would entertain between 45,000 and 50,000 American Tourists, who will leave behind them between \$5,000,000 and \$8,000,000 during 1924.

The publicity that has been given the Tourist movement is being felt in Restigouche Co., a very encouraging degree. Of course the C. N. R. authorities could not have a hotel ready for the tourist business of 1924. Happily for the new year, the different attractive points of Restigouche, Bathurst, Carleton and Gaspesia for visitors, are and will be ready for the arrival in June, July and August of hundreds of City folk.

Letters are pouring into Tourist Headquarters in Restigouche Co. Apart from correspondence with City folks about Hotels and Cottages, letters have been received from the proprietors of the two Hotels at Charlo. The C. N. R. Pamphlet entitled "La Baie de Charlo" advertises Charlo as follows: "The village is beautifully situated overlooking the broad bay. At the foot of the shore cliffs there are stretches of smooth sand beaches, ideal for bathing. Comfortable accommodation is available, and there are several pretty bungalows occupied every summer. No finer site could be surmised for a summer home, and those desiring to build should have little difficulty in finding a suitable location. Mention should be made of the drive from Dalhousie to Charlo along the shore road, which is good for motoring."

The booklet that was issued some time ago by the C. G. R. entitled "Summer Provinces by the Sea" contains among other things the following about Charlo. "For Charlo is one of those delightful country places where fine woods abound, where glorious country roads stretch out in many a shady avenue of noble trees and where a romantic river lashes and plays over rocks, tumbles over falls, courses through gorges, ripples under bridges, rests by the meadows and slumbers under the shady hills."

The Charlo is a stream full of beauty, and one that the nature-lover may enjoy to his heart's content. The country around and every approach to the river is clean and picturesque. There are no excitements and no startling incidents

in the quiet life of the place. On the other hand, there is every suitable surrounding and inducement to enjoy nature, to live a life of quiet ease varied by healthful recreation amidst enjoyable surroundings—a life that best fits the vacationist for active winter work in the crowded city.

The conformation of the country through which the river runs is such that fishing may readily be done in many places without boats. Another advantage is that the river is close at hand. It is not necessary to go a considerable distance before a line may be well cast, for a short walk leads to woodland depths, leafy shade and the secluded stream.

A pleasant and comfortable place is found at Henderson's near the bay shore, not far from the mouth of the Charlo River, where there is a combination of country hotel, farmhouse and home. Here visitors will feel at home from the moment they arrive.

"Henderson's Hotel is known as the 'Ray Shore House' and caters to the transient trade. The LaViolette House, formerly the home of the late D. McMillan, Crown Land Surveyor, is only a five or eight minutes walk from the beach. It has a splendid bay view from the house, also nice lawn on the east side of the house. There is a hedge all around the garden. It is shaded by willows which makes the place very comfortable and cool to sit on the lawn. One can always find a shady place, it certainly is an ideal spot for those who are seeking quietness and rest. The table is served with the products of the farm, milk, cream, butter, eggs, vegetables, poultry, lamb, etc. Fish almost as it comes out of the water and a good sized ice house to keep food fresh.

The rooms are bright and airy. Mr. J. A. LaViolette can accommodate from 15 to 20 guests.

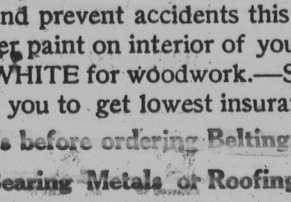
Charlo, then, is one of those rare places where the sportsman may take his wife and family, with the certainty of being comfortably housed and cared for, and where all may amuse themselves with quiet recreations of a beautiful kind while he is away fishing the stream for the noble salmon.

The Pamphlet issued by the N. B. Tourist and Resources Association, called New Brunswick, The Land of Big Game, Fine Fishing, lovely Lakes, and Majestic Rivers, Mighty Forests, Suberb Scenery, Beautiful Bays and Good Roads, on page 15, contains the following about Charlo: "Population about 325 is situated on the Bay Chaleur at its junction with the Restigouche River; on the C. N. R. A large saw mill operates during the summer. Nearest Bank is at Dalhousie. Garage. Excellent bathing, boating and fishing. Distance from Charlo to Campbellton, 24 miles; to Dalhousie, 7 miles; to Bathurst, 45 miles. Hotel—Bay Shore Hotel.

Charlo has two lovely churches, two large halls, fine stores and several convenient post offices.
