The carb stones for the new pavement to be laid this season, are being moulded to shape by Contractor O'Brien on the Post Office grounds.

New iron screen shutters have been added to Mr. Jennings' tailoring establishment and to the Maritime Bank premises, much improving their exterior appearance.

Daniel H. Kenny, only son of Mr. Kenny, gardener, Regent street, died at Lock Haven, Pennsylvania, on the 18th inst., and his remains were interred in the E. C. Cemetery there.

Mr. J. E. Collins, formerly editor of the Star, has written a clever biography of Sir John A. Macdonald, which is highly spoken of by the press. Mr. Collins is still connected with the editorial staff of the Toronto Globe.

Mr. Sam. T. Austin of McFarlane, Austin & Robertson, stationers and paper dealers, Montreal, was in town this week, looking after the wants of his customers. Mr. Austin is extremely popular with the newspaper fraternity, who are among his best patrons.

The Woodstock Press since its enlargement presents a lively and readable appearance. Mr. Fletcher, the proprietor, deserves all the success he anticipates for his enterprise. The mechanical department of the Press is in charge of Mr. Austin Dunphy this city.

Rev. A. J. Mowatt of St. Paul's Church, spent yesterday and Sunday this week in Rev. Mr. Mullin's charge, Nashua and St. John. He attended the tea meeting at Nashua, given by Mr. Mullin's congregation Monday night and conducted service there last night.

After the snow storm of Friday night, the weather rapidly became warmer, and the snow has disappeared in haste since then. In the city, wheels will soon be in use, and already the rise of the river is making the approaches to the city, dangerous. Local weather prophets promise an early spring.

Rev. Joseph McLeod's friends will be pleased to learn that he is rapidly recovering his health in the warm and pleasant climate of Palatka, Florida, where he is journeying at present. He will not likely be home before the 1st of June. Mrs. McLeod, who has been with her husband, is expected to return this week.

The down, freight train on the N. B. Railway, Saturday afternoon, broke through Macle bridge. Four cars loaded with potatoes went into the stream and six other boxes jumped the rails. Nobody was hurt. The Macle bridge is thirty feet high, and the escape of the whole train from destruction, and the train hands from injury was a miracle.

The members of Albion Lodge, I. O. G. T., are to give a dramatic entertainment in St. Dunstan's Hall, on Monday evening. An amusing comedy, "The April Fool," and a musical farce, entitled "The Last of the Mohicans," will be presented by a company, many of whom have before appeared in a dramatic role, and with success. During the evening songs by well-known vocalists will be given and the management anticipate a full house.

Frank Jones, of Norton, King's Co., a brakeman employed on the St. John & Maine Railway, was caught between two cars in shunting at Gaspereaux station, on Thursday, and received such injuries, that he died soon after reaching Fredericton Junction. Dr. Currie of this city, who happened to be there, was called to attend the young man, but his injuries were too severe to give any hope of saving his life.

Some changes have recently been made in the staff of the Bank of N. America. Dr. D. Simpson, of the St. John office, has been transferred to Toronto; Mr. Geoffrey from the Halifax Branch, succeeds Mr. Simpson; Mr. A. G. Christie, who has been in the Fredericton agency for a year and a half, takes Mr. Geoffrey's place, and Mr. John Miller, of the St. John branch, has come to Fredericton, succeeding Mr. Christie. All the young gentlemen named are well known here. Mr. Miller was here a few weeks last summer, and made many friends.

The Williams Sewing Machine Factory, represented in this Province by Mr. W. F. O'Brien, well known in this city, at St. Henri, suburb of Montreal, was burned Saturday night. The fire began shortly before 7:30 o'clock, and before the firemen could reach the scene, the building was a mass of flames. There was a great lack of water, and the water of the factory being soaked with water, burned furiously. Two wings were saved. The building was a brick one and cost \$250,000. The machinery was valued at \$75,000, and the stock at \$100,000. Insurance about \$80,000. About two hundred men are thrown out of employment.

A serious accident, which might have been attended by fatal results, occurred at Messrs. O'Toole & McCall's Foundry last Wednesday afternoon. The men were engaged in coining, when suddenly Mr. McCall, one of the proprietors and two workmen, Isaiah Staples and Frank Muniz were prostrated by coal gas poisoning. Mr. McCall and Staples soon came around when they got into the open air, but Muniz's case was more serious, and he was taken to Dr. Dunphy's Hotel, where Dr. Dunphy attended him, and soon restored him to consciousness. He was exceedingly weak for a time but is now all right again. Mr. O'Toole was also somewhat affected by the gas, but was able to continue his work.

A curious robbery was committed at the residence of Mr. Barker, Brunswick Street, a few nights ago. A back entrance was left open, and during the night, a small thief entered the dining apartment of Arthur Barker, and stole Mrs. Barker's gold watch and chain, to which was attached a gold locket containing a photo of Mr. Barker, who heard the robber making his escape and gave chase too late however to recover the property. A few evenings later while the household were sitting quietly talking, the front entrance was heard to open and close again quickly. Judge of Mrs. Barker's surprise to find her watch chain and locket, minus the photo however, safely returned.

The electors after the returns were read were addressed briefly by Hon. Mr. Blair and Mr. Estabrook.

The Deaf and Dumb Asylum.

The Deaf and Dumb Asylum, at Hawthorne Hill, a mile and a half below the city, with all the outbuildings attached, was entirely destroyed by fire Monday night, the fire originating accidentally in the barn at 8 o'clock. The fire burned very slowly, and it was after midnight before the main building succumbed. A great many people from the city gathered on the spot, but without appliances were unable to stop the progress of the fire. All the furniture was saved, as well as effects of the inmates. The building was insured in the City of London Company, Mr. John Black, Agent, for \$1,000. It was leased by the Asylum Directors last September till the first of May next, and it was their intention to purchase the property at that date. Mr. Woodbridge at the time of the fire was absent from home, but Mrs. Woodbridge, her children, and the inmates, including fifteen male and three female deaf mutes, were kindly cared for by the neighbors. The buildings which occupied one of the most pleasant and commanding sites in this locality, were erected nearly a quarter of a century ago by George Botsford, Esq., and used by him until within a few years ago as a residence. They were owned at the time of the fire, by Hon. Senator Botsford. The House was most substantially built and thoroughly finished, and general regret is expressed, apart from its loss to the institution, that it should fall a prey to the flames.

The County Court.

The County Court, Mr. Justice Steadman presiding, concluded its business yesterday, and adjourned sine die. Only three cases, two civil and one criminal, were tried during the term. In the case of Mrs. Kirin, as the City of Fredericton, in action to recover damages for alleged injuries to property by the overflowing of a sewer, the Jury disagreed. H. B. Reinford, for plaintiff, and C. W. Beckwith, City Clerk, for the Corporation. In the case of D. J. Stockford, as James Gibson, the plaintiff got a verdict for \$35. The defendant had offered to pay a judgment for \$50, the plaintiff declined to accept, and the plaintiff not having recovered that amount, will have to pay the costs of the trial. A. L. Byles, for plaintiff, J. A. & W. Vauvart, for defendant. In Guter as Mowatt, an undefended case, the plaintiff recovered judgment for \$40.16, the full amount claimed. J. A. & W. Vauvart, for plaintiff.

Robert McIntosh, convicted of stealing a sum of money from Thomas Gort, was sentenced to three years in the Dorchester Penitentiary. He was taken thither this afternoon by Constable Richardson Boone.

Wm. F. Bunting, Esq., Deputy Grand Master of the New Brunswick Masonic Grand Lodge, has in his office a gavel made from wood of the old Parliament Buildings, Fredericton, and which was presented (at the last meeting of the Grand Lodge) to the Craft by A. G. Beckwith, Esq. The Grand Lodge decided that a suitable inscription should be placed upon it, and this has been done by Mr. Vennings, the engraver, who inscribed a heavy silver inscription in the gavel head, with this inscription: "This gavel made of portions of the old Parliament Buildings, Fredericton, was presented to the Grand Lodge, F. & A. M. of New Brunswick, April 26 A. L. 5882, by W. Bro. Beckwith, 'P. G. D.'—Telegraph.

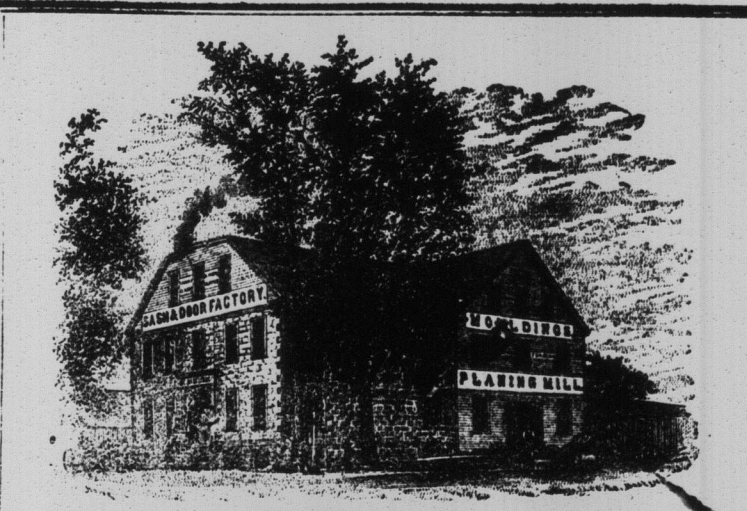
