THE PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

The Finance Minister yesterday laid the the House of Assembly. Elsewhere will be found some of the facts which they show. Exclusive of the redemption of public debt on the one hand, and the receipts from the sale of debentures and sinking fund on the other, the transactions of the year show an income of \$9,760,316 34 against an expenditure of \$10,742,807 41. This latter includes \$481,116 17 for militia purposes—a a sum much larger than that expended in former years. It also includes an extra expenditure of about \$200,000 for legislation -an expense which was due to the holding of two sessions of Parliament in the year 1863, and to the general election of last summer. These two additional expenses alone would cover more than half of Mr. Holton's deficiency. The increased militia expenditure is one to which the ultra-loyal. ists of the Opposition cannot very well obthe end of the present year, if he is allowed to remain in office, he will doubtles be able to report a good many further reductions. The anticipation that next year there will be no deficit is, we think, pretty well warranted.

The bodies of the victims presented nost sickening spectacle-one which in its oathsome horror can hardly be imagined. Death, in its ghastly reality, is at all times a hing of awe; but when in the shape of some fearful accident, it pounces upon its victims in the midst of life, and hurls them in one moment into the awful presence of their Maker, its terrors are increased a hundred fold. A shrivelled member—a minute before the hand of a strong man—was picked up in St. John street. A burnt shapeless mass—a short time before the head containing an active intelligent brain—was discovered beyond the wall in the direction of Glacis street. Legs and arms were found far from the Legs and arms were found far from the bodies to which they had once belonged. A vet warm trunk was dug out of the ruins. It was a sickening lump of charred flesh and broiled entrails. A few short minutes elapsed since the man stood full of that life and health which his creator had bestowed upon him—now his mourning comrades could hardly distinguish that what they had raised from the blood and filth and stench of the health which his creator had bestowed upon him—now his mourning comrades could hardly distinguish that what they had raised from the blood and filth and astench of the ground was once a being like themselves. The remains of the gunners Burr and Finn had suffered most mutilation of the whole.
