South London, have already a guarantee of nearly \$2,000, with a number of interested members of the congregation yet to call upon. The present building has long been too small, and the additional accommodation will be a decided comfort for the little folks. A transept or vostibule will be added where the choir entrance now is, and this will be connected with the Sunday school building by a covered and inclosed arch, thus affording plenty of cloak room and library and other necessary conveniences.



INFECTIOUS AND CONTAGIOUS
DISEASES IN LONDON.
It is really time that the Board of Health
and its officers adopted some stringent means to compel the proper reporting and placarding of infectious and contagious

diseases in the city.

Complaints are made that diseases are Complaints are made that diseases are not reported promptly by some modical men or by householders, and it is alleged that children living in houses where so vivulent a disease as searlet fever exists are permitted to attend both Sunday and

In the absence of placards, or of reports In the absence of placards, or of reports to school teachers, it can easily be seen how infectious and contagious diseases can be spread to an alarming extent. Typhoid fever is not so dangerous an affection as soarlet fever, because it is not so communicable, and it is rarely communicated by mere personal contact. But, for the protection of the community, it is just as necessary that typhoid should be called by its right name, and not dubbed "malaria," and the outbreak promptly reported to the health authorities, as it is to report infectious diseases like scarlet fever or diphtheria. In every case, the object of or diphtheria. In every case, the object of the law makers is to have prompt means adopted to discover the source of the disease, to isolate those afflicted by it, to disease, to isolate those efflicted by it, to adopt all necessary remedies to prevent its spread. Scarlet fever, which now prevails in London more extensively than is generally supposed, is more difficult to combat than typhoid, because of its highly contageous character. The infectious material remains for a long time in garments, etc., preserving its power of reproducing the disease. As complete protection can be secured only by avoiding the infection through contact with or proximity to patients and disinfecting every. the infection through contact with or proximity to patients and disinfecting everything which may convey it, the necessity for the utmost precaution on the part of householders, dectors and teachers of schools must be evident to all.

Why, when there is so much danger from neclecting the precautions laid down

why, when there is so much danger from neglecting the precautions laid down by law on the advice of the best medical authority available, is there any trouble in carrying out the regulations? The trouble may be traced to a mistaken idea regarding the question of placarding residences. Many people do not like to have it announced that there is an infectious or contagious disease in their house. They object to it for various causes, and it is not reported to the school teachers, and disastrous results are apt to follow. But no objection can be sufficiently strong to overcome the vital necessity for having the disease reported, neighbors warned children kept isolated from other children, the disease combatted and confined in its operations. We can easily see how a child going to school from a house in which there is searlet fever can carry infection that will take the disease, and, it may be, death and desolation into many homes. Can any peeded precaution to avert so great a any needed precaution to avert so great a calamity be too stringently enforced? As-

thorough investigation into the manner in which the public health regulations are which the public health regulations are carried out, with the view of insisting that there shall be no laxity, no matter who the persons affected may be. THE VOTERS' LISTS NOW READY FOR REVISION.

"A Taxpayer" asks us to explain the purport of the recently published advertisement by the city clerk of London regarding the Ontario Voters' Lists.

The notice is given by the clerk in accordance with the Ontario Voters' Lists Act of 1889, which made some interesting provisions regarding the rights of voters in elections for municipal officers and for nembers of the Legislature.

By this act the clerk of each municipality nust, immediately after the final revision and correction of the assessment roll in every year, make a correct alphabetical list in three parts of all persons of the full age of 21 years, British subjects by birth or naturalization, and appearing by the assessment roll to be entitled to be voters in the municipality.

assessment roll to be outlied to be voters in the municipality.

The first of the three parts of the list must contain the names, in alphabetical order, of all male persons of full age, etc.,

order, of all male persons of full age, etc., appearing by the roll entitled to vote in both municipal elections and elections for members of the Legislative Assembly.

The second part must contain the names, in alphabetical order, of all other male persons of full age, etc., and all widows and unmarried women of full age, etc., entitled to vote in the municipality at municipal elections only.

lections only.

The third part must contain the names, in alphabetical order, of all other male persons, of full age, etc., entitled to vote in the municipality at elections for members of the Legislature only. The name of the same person must not be entered more

the same person must not be entered more than once in any such part.

It is this list which City Clerk Kingston hung up for inspection in his office on Sept. 20, in order that any person whose name is omitted from the list, who is wrongly described, or who may object to any name being on the list, may take the necessary action to have the wrong righted. The list may also be seen in the postoffice. Under the act, this revision must be effected by written application to the city clerk (as provided in form 6 of the act) within 30 days of the first publication

ROUEN, Oct. 3.—Twenty-six horses competed yesterday in the world's championship leaping sweepstakes for 25,000 francs and the gate receipts. 
