

THE CITY ELECTIONS. Elsewhere will be found the results of the civic elections in London yesterday, as well as those throughout the Province. They contain some surprises, both locally and in other places. The election in the city was very quietly conducted, despite the fact that there were contests for the great majority of the offices in the gift of the people. Owing to the change in taking the assessment the voters' list was an old one, and that probably accounts for the decreased vote polled.

that the two by-laws which the ADVER-TISER championed, as being in the public interest, were indorsed by the electorate by large majorities. The by-law to grant a bonus of \$100,000 to the Grand Trunk railway on condition that the company concentrates its car shops for Western Ontario in this city was carried by a majority of ,675 to 535. It was not necessary to carry this bylaw by more than a majority, owing to the fact that the special act which brought South London into the city kept this class of bonus out of the category of bonuses requiring a much larger majority. But the freeholders by their votes made the result doubly sure. Let us hope that the concentration may be brought about at as early a date as possible.

The plebiscite on prohibition resulted in wor of the view that the liquor traffic hould he absolutely prohibited. The majority of 927 places the position of the citizens in a most significant light, especially when it is recollected that there is a majority in favor of prohibition in every ward of the city. At the time of writing there are few particulars of the polling on this question in other parts of the Province, but the impression seems to prevail that the same verdict, if by a less decided majority, has been achieved else-

Two money bylaws before the people of London were slaughtered. One calling for \$75,000 to provide a second main between the waterworks and the city was voted down, because apparently deemed unnecessary for the present needs of the city. It may be that the texpayers will look more kindly upon the proposed expenditure for increased pumping power. We should have an ample supply of water even in the driest of seasons.

The bylaw to provide funds for the purchase of an electric light plant was voted down, because it had been placed before the electors at too late a date to have the subject fully understood. The ADVERTISER warned the aldermen that such would be the result of the delay, traceable in legree, though it was, to the occupancy of the council with other weighty subjects during the year. We have faith that the citizens will yet indorse the view that all great monopolies, in which the taxpayers are equally interested, such as public lighting, shall be owned and operated for their benefit, just as the waterworks areby a commission. The friends of municipal Swhership should turn their attention to this view of the case before they again submit a bylaw on the subject. The present experience should teach that no money by-law can be passed without a hardorked, well-arranged, preliminary camon, in which the facts shall be fully and rly stated.

-January of last year was unusually sold. Fortunately severe frosts do not often strike the same period in two succesive years.

Some remarkable statements regarding the people of North America are made by the Buddhist delegates from Japan to the World's Fair Parliament of Religions. The two principal delegates were Bourin Yatsubuchi, a priest of Kamakura, and Shaku Soyen, a great scholar and the most talented priest in Kiushiu. There were ten Japanese priests in all at Chicago, but the report of their work was made by the two priests named. The meeting at which they gave the account of their travels was held in Yokohama. Some of the speeches describing the World's Fair experiences of the delegation read like a chapter out of Goldsmith's "Chinese Settlers," except that they lack Goldsmith's delicious satirical humor, They are too serious. One of the priests, apparently the chief of the delegation, described the suspicions with which they received the invitations of the World's Fair authorities to attend the religious parliament. They believed that "it was a shrewd scheme of the Christians" to entice them to the western world either for the purpose of converting them or to turn them and their religion into ridicule. Acting under this misapprehension they determined to visit Chicago, but merely as individuals, not in a priestly representative character, "It was a wonderful surprise which awaited us," he said, and added, "our ideas were all mistaken." He then gave the conclusions which they adopted in regard to the entire affair, as follows:

"The parliament was called because the western nations have come to realize the weakness and folly of Christianity and they really wished to hear from us of our religion and to learn what the best religion is. There is no better place in the world to propagate the teachings of Buddhism than in America. During the meetings one very wealthy man from New York became a con vert of Buddhism and was initiated into its rites. He is a man of great influence, and his conversion may be said to mean more than the conversion of 10,000 ordinary men, so we may say truthfully that we made 10,000 converts at that meeting. Christianity is merely an adornment of society in America. It is deeply believed in by very few. The great majority of Christians drink and commit various gross sins, and live very dissolute lives, although it is a very common belief and serves as a social adornment. It lack of power proves its weakness. The meetings showed the great superiority of Buddhism over Christianity, and the mere fact of calling the meetings showed that the Americans and other western peoples had lost their faith in Christianity and were ready to accept the teachings of our superior religion.

This confession of impressions is unique. It will be difficult for many Westerners to conjecture by what process of reasoning these disciples of Buddha reached the conclusion that the people of America have be come tired of Christianity, and wanted to learn Buddhism. The charming simplicity of the assertion that one New York crank converted to Buddhism equals the winning of 10,000 ordinary converts also goes to show how far Oriental enthusiasm can carry the votaries of this peculiar faith.

It has to be admitted that there is some truth in the allegations that Christianity is regarded by many people in these part as a mere "social adornment"; that shallow belief or unbelief is prevalent; and that the drinking habit and other dissolute practices are part of nominally Christian lives. The terms in which these charges are set forth aresweeping, but we believe are, in the main, as ill-founded as the conclusions reached by the Buddhist visitors on other points. We must, however, remember that Eastern people regard all Europeans and Americans as Christians. They make no distinction between those who are members of or adherents of churches and those who never darken a church door, and who, whatever their inner convictions, are practically heathens. By the life and works of these nominal Christians, it must be regretfully conceded, is the Christian religion judged by these Eastern peoples of other faiths. If we keep this fact in view, and reflect on what an observant visitor from abroad can see and hear in the course of a prolonged visitation in the centers of population on this continent, we will be the less surprised at the deductions of these Buddhist priests. The reports made by the Buddhists, though manifestly distorted, and though charging to Christianity the sins of mere professors of Christianity-men who, as a rule, are neither hearers nor doers of the Wordare useful as showing the extent of Mongolian culture, the egotism, and the boundless faith of the best of Oriental scholars. We have in this word picture an instructive mi rror in which we canview ourselves as others see us.

-The fact that Gladstone has just celebrated his 84th birthday, and remains in harness, though he is three years the senior of Palmerston, who died in office a few days before he had reached his 85th year, has set the cable correspondents speculating regarding the busy grand old man of Great Britain. Almost only surviving schoolfellow of Gladstone at Eton, Lord Arthur Hervey, who is also Bishop of Bath and Wells, and nearly two years his senior, has been recently giving lots of reminiscences. When Wellington opened Waterloo bridge in 1817, and distributed commemorative medals to select invited spectators, this future bishop put his hand in the bag and was sternly admonished by the duke to take only one. The House of Commons contains one member six years older than Mr. Gladstone, the Hon. Chas. Villiers, who has sat now 58 years for a single constituency. When on rare occasions he visits the club,

Even older still is Admiral Jones, of Greenwich Hospital, who actually bore part in the Walcheren expedition of 1809. Surely there is no other country where men live like this. In the Daily News' list of deaths for Christmas Day there are 40 entries, and of these twenty give an aggregate age yielding average of over 81 years. The climate of Britain may not be the best, but the comparatively leisurely way in which the people live is conducive to long life. The people of this continent exhaust their nervous energy before they get past middle age. They would enjoy life better if they took more leisure by the way.

THE MAN THEY ARE AFTER.

Additional interest has been developed with regard to King Lo Bengula of Matabeleland since the report that he had turned upon his pursuers and massacred a large number of them. The best picture of the fugitive monarch is given by Mr. Archibald R. Colquhoun, the first administrator of the adjoining territory of Mashonaland. Mr. Colquhoun gives an interesting description of King Lo Bengula. "Lo Bengulaliterally 'The Defender,' and the bearer of many grandiloquent titles, such as 'The Great Elephant,' 'The Eater of Men, and 'The Stabber of the Sun'-is 60 years of age, suffers from gout, and is enormously fat and unwieldy in person, which tends greatly to diminish his otherwise kingly appearance. He is close upon six feet, weighs nearly twenty stone, and rarely takes physical exercise, although he has in his early days been active and powerful. He is a man of extraordinary character and ability, with great power of work. The descriptions of Lo Bengula's personal appearance range between that of a most truculent and blood-thirsty savage, with a 'deadly cruel' look in his eyes, and a pleasant, mild-mannered old gentleman, with a winning, childlike smile. It is probably wise to adopt neither of these extreme portraits. His natural disposition is said by those who known him well to be not cruel; but the exercise of unrestrained despotic power, surrounded by intrigues, has led to indifference to life whenever it seemed to him a matter of policy, or, as not unseldom, self-preservation. Relations and friends at the Matabele court alike have been removed when found to be 'inconvenient.' In his cattle kraal, with his bodywrapped in a colored blanket and feet swathed in dirty flannel bandages, in the midst of dirt and discomfort, and surrounded by skulls of slaughtered bullocks and mangy pariah dogs, the King was frequently to be seen. The chief Queen, Loskay, is typical of the 80 others. Her massive form on the occasion of a 'war dance' in 1890, was partly clothed in a colored cotton sheet, while from her waist hung a black goatskin kilt. The head was encircled with a coil of pink beads, the neck with tip, brass and iron chains, probably taken in some of the many raids on the Mashonas, who, unlike the Matabele, have some skill in working in these metals; on her ankles and arms are more beads. When in State dress during the 'war dance' the queens present a picture of bright and effective coloring.





In last week's Truth, however, Mr. Labouchere, first of any English journalist, notes the fact that the Premier has aged greatly-in appearance at least-during the past few months, and, ardent Liberal though he may be, Mr. Labouchere joins with the Times in suggesting that the time has come for the chief's retirement. This is undoubtedly symptomatic of a

very obvious restlessness in the more radical wing of the party. But it seems clear to an outside observer that the Premier's retirement would be very perilour to the Liberal majority in the present Parliament, whatever might be its effect in a general election. ## Liberal Tariff Platform.

We, the Liberal party of Canada, in convention assembled declare:

That the customs tariff of the Dominion should be based, not as it now is, upon the protective principle, but upon the requirements of the public service. That the existing tariff, founded upon an

unsound principle and used as it has been by the Government as a corrupting agency, wherewith to keep themselves in office, has developed monopolies, trusts and combinations:

It has decreased the value of farm and other landed property; It has oppressed the masses to the enrichment of the few;

It has checked immigration: It has caused great loss of population; It has impeded commerce;

It has discriminated against Great Britain. In these, and in many other ways, it has occasioned great public and private injury, all of which evils must continue to grow in intensity so long as the present tariff system

remains in force. That the highest interests of Canada demand a removal of this obstacle to our country's progress, by the adoption of a sound fiscal policy, which, while not doing injustice to any class, will promote domestic and foreign trade and hasten the re turn of prosperity to our people.

That to that end, the tariff should be reduced to the needs of honest, economic and efficient government. That it should be so adjusted as to mai free, or to bear as lightly as possible up the necessaries of life and should be

arranged as to promote freer trade we the whole world, more particularly Great Britain and the United States. We believe that the results of the protective system have grievously disappointed thousands of persons who honestly sup-ported it, and that the country in the light

of experience is now prepared to declare for a sound fiscal policy. The issue between the two political parties on this great question is now clearly defined.

The Government themselves admit the failure of their fiscal policy, and now profess their willingness to make some changes, but they say that such changes must be based only on the principle of protection.

We denounce the principle of protection as radically unsound and unjust to the masses of the people, and we declare our conviction that any tariff changes based on that principle must fail to afford any substantial relief from the burdens under which the country labors.

This issue we unhesitatingly accept and upon it we await with the fullest condence the verdict of the electors of Canada,

The services of two doctors were secured, but despite their efforts she died. The doctors say they have never seen a similar case. Miss Reichling was just budding into womanhood, and was the daughter of Jacob Reichling, coal and lumber merchant, of Piermont.

Gult of California Cannibals. St. Louis Republic: Unlikely as it may seem to some who read these lines, it is a fact, nevertheless, that there is an island in the Gulf of California, not more than 60 miles from the Mexican mainland, which is inhabitated by the remnants of a race of giant cannibals. 
