Some of the firms which are alleged to have taken Berlin's worthless paper are: W. R. Bishop, optician; Dicks & Sons, florists; Oak Hall, gentlemen's furnishers; Norman W. Emerson, druggist; George H. O'Neil, proprietor of the Tecumseh House; Mrs. Walper, of the Walper House; B. A. Mitchell & Co., druggists; A. H. Brener. recently of the City Hotel, and Masor

& Risch, pianos. The amounts are said to range from \$5 to \$10, excepting in the case of the piano house, where a check for \$150 vas presented. Berlin did not succeed getting the money in all cases. Each of the checks was drawn against an account which he opened in the Home Eank after coming to London. The account was soon overdrawn, but varlous merchants continued to present checks, which were rejected. blame, of course, attaches to the bank. Operated in Toronto.

According to information furnished to Crown Attorney McKillop and the Parliament of Canada by common detectives by a gentleman from Tocouncil of the said Dominion of Canada ronto this morning, Berlin appeared in that city after leaving London, immediately commenced big business

The information furnished the police was from a prominent wholesale drygoods merchant, from whom ordered silks worth about \$1,500. He also negotiated for \$900 worth of drygoods from John McDonald & Co., there, and \$500 or \$600 worth from another firm. In addition it is said that he passed a check for \$15, 25 cents o which he had when arrested here.



#### PANAMA CANAL NOT A DANGEROUS ISSUE

Ambassador Bryce Starts Diplomatic Discussions on Matter at Washington.

Washington, Oct. 20.-Ambassador Bryce, who has just returned to Washington after an absence of several months, called at the state department yesterday in connection with the controversy between the United. States and Great Britain regarding Panama Canal tolls. His call at the augurated a series of diplomatic discussions which will continue between the two Governments until the matter is settled.

Officials here who are fully cognizant of all that has passed between the United States and Great Britain on the subject are confident that the Panama Canal controversy is no longer a dangerous issue between the two While no hint is obtainable as to the manner in which settlement is to be brought about, every confidence is expressed that an amicable adjustment will be reached.

It is understood that there will no be any formal communication from the British Government other than what has already been received. Discussions between Ambassador Bryce and the state department will form the basis of the negotiations to be carried on. #### BLED TO DEATH

Farmer Near Hepworth Was Caught in Micken called on the constables to take Threshing Machine.



ologists. A second revelation of the tables is the remarkable prependerance of halfeducated persons among criminals as contrasted with well-educated and altogether uneducated ones. The well or fairly well educated contribute about half as many culprits as do the totally from the class meagerly educated that all but a trifling number of wrongdoers spring.

At present not far from half a million cases are brought before the lowest police courts in a year. It appears that criminality of a serious character has shown practically no change for the past ten years. Crimes against property have de-

creased notably in number, the result, it is said, of the exceptional severity with which such matters are treated not only by judges, but by juries. The same can scarcely be said for crimes of violence against persons,

French juries in particular being all too ready to wax sentimental over the pleas of passion so on, invariably put forward by accused persons.





Ottawa, Oct. 21. - During the six months, April 1 to Oct. 1, of the curcent fiscal year, 278,649 immigrants arrived in Canada. Of this number 183. 990 arrived at ocean ports, and 89,659 from the United States. These figures show an increase of 13 per cent. as compared with the number of arrivals for the corresponding months of last iscal year, which were 158,614 at ocean ports and 83,317 from the United States, making a total for the six months, April 1 to Oct. 1, 1911, of 241,981 rersons.
