ASSASSIN'S BULLET NARROWLY MISSES GERMAN EMPEROR

Three Shots Fired at the Kaiser, Two of Them Striking Tonneau of His Automobile.

New York, May 8 .- A news agency dispatch from Rome, published here this forenoon, says. Kaiser Wilhelm had a narrow escape from an assassin's bullet while motoring in Berlin, a Zurich dispatch to the Corriere d'Italia asserted toda y. An unidentified man fired three shots at the kaiser's car, two of them striking the tonneau, the third going wild. He was arrested. The dispatch said the police were silent on the incident.

FOE STRIKES TO TAKE IT

(By Stewart Lyon, Special Correspond ent of Canadian Press In France.) Canadian Army Headquarters, May 8 .- After a heavy bombardment, including the discharge of a large number of gas shells, the enemy this morning launched an attack in force in the region to the northeast of Fresnoy Village held by the Canadian corps. In the first rush our line was penetrated. The Germans did not long retain their advantage. A counter-attack was at once organized and by 7:30, after two hours of sharp flighting, the line occupied before the attack was re-established, except for a small projecting angle at the extreme east of the position. Have Put Damper On Recruiting Appeal of Hierarchy.

FAILED TO GIVE MESSAGE

Inspector-General Issues Statement Over Disturbances at Montreal.

Montreal, May 8.—Major-Gen. Lessard, who is conducting a recruiting campaign in Quebec Province with Col. Blondin, and who was present at the meeting in Monument Nationale last night while the disorders were taking place, today gave out an interview in regard to the recruiting problem in this province. He said:

"If I have come to Quebec to help Col. Blondin, it is with a view to rendering a service to the French-Canadian race, to which I belong. I have not come to cast aspersions of apathy and cowardice on my compatriots. I feel confident their qualities of gallantry and energy have not deteriorated. He questioned if those who represent th French-Canadian race have done their duty in coming into close contact with the people and whether they have exercised themselves sufficiently to mold the opinion of the race, and have sought to draw it away from its smaller individual interests to set its vision on the larger matters of its public obligations and its higher responsibilities."

BRITISH RAIDS IN NIGHT HAVE **GOOD RESULTS**

Enemy Was Harassed at Points Between Fresnoy and Loos.

COUNTER RAIDS STOPPED

German Assaults Along the Chemin-des-Dames Are Repulsed by French.

London, May 8-2:06 p.m.—Fight-ing continued yesterday in and around the village of Bullecourt, Reuter's correspondent at British headquarters telegraphs today. A party of 300 Germans who succeeded in forcing their way through the southwest corner of the village, were held up and punished heavily. The British airmen had a good

day, bringing down seven large German observation balloons, three of them in fiames, and considerably restricting the enemy's means of observing our movements. The weather today is mild with a much-needed rain falling.

London, May 8-12:20 p.m.-"Th enemy's artillery was active at inter vals throughout the night at a number of places along our front, particularly in the sector between Fresnoy and Loos," says today's official statement. artillery replied.

A Successful Raid. "We made successful raids during the night in the neighborhood of Neuve Chapelle and Fauquissart. Our posi-tions northwest of Armentieres were raided yesterday evening by a small party of the enemy. Combat Rages All Around Bullecourt; Foe Striking Hard

Germans Hurling Masses of Troops At British Line In Effort To Hold Stronghold --- British Airmen In **Bold Exploits.**

(BY WILLIAM PHILIP SIMMS.) [Special Cable to The Advertiser.] With the British Armies in the Field, May 8.—Seven British aeroplanes today shot down seven German balloons in a resumption of vigorous aerial offensive by British flyers. The weather was clear and especially favorable for fighting in

Balloons Ablaze. Three of the German balloons were set afire by incendiary shells while far aloft and fell flaming to the ground. Two more were struck down by British planes while hov ering close over the German lines. In the case of the other two, the British airmen, careless of anti-aircraft gunfire, slippedup to hangars and dropped explosives on the "sausages" not yet loosed for flight. Still Fighting for Bullecourt. Fighting was still going on vio-lently today around Bullecourt. At the time this dispatch is sent, the Germans were vigorously assaulting that portion of the Hindenburg line held by the British troops on southwest border of the village itself. Big bodies of German troops were massed in the southwest part of the village for the attack, but it has so far proved fruitless. During last night a violent Ger-man counter-thrust at a British sector northeast of Fresnoy succeeded in gaining the enemy a little ground, but despite the superiority of the attackers in numbers, they did not attain their evident objective—ousting of the British from their trenches

THE WAR SITUATION

Haig's Human Nippers Closing-German Press "Doctors" War News-Allied Offensive Near In the Balkans.

Bullecourt's Fall Near.

The bitter resistance offered by the Germans to the British advance has centred in their defence of Bullecourt, 2½ miles west of Queant. To the south the British have forged well beyond Queant, but have been forced to mark time until Bullecourt falls. The capture of the village was intrusted to the Australians, and these hard-fighting colonials have almost surrounded the German stronghold, so that its surrender or extinction is expected momentarily.

The Drocourt-Queant line forms a broad salient in the British front, eighteen miles at its top, and paralleling the Doual-Cambrai line. Drocourt is seven miles from Doual, and Queant about ten miles from Cambrai. The crushing in of this salient will mean that the German grip on the great Lens coal region will be broken, and the entire German line in Northern France imperiled.

There are many signs that the Germans realize the menace to them in the alternate sledge-hammer blows of the British and French, beneath which their choicest troops are being steadily driven from position after position. News from the western front is not merely being suppressed in Berlin, but is being doctored for the consumption of German newspaper readers. Disdoctored for the consumption of German newspaper readers. Discrepancies between the German and Allied official versions are apparently arousing suspicions in some German minds at least, and the Berlin newspapers are being bombarded with questions that their military critics seem to find some difficulty in answering. There is significance also in the fact that the German emperor, in the latest of his congratuatory telegrams, speaks of a "serious and decisive time," instead of exulting over victories, real or imaginary. Apart from France, the only fighting of significance reported from the war theatres is taking place in Macedonia. The reports from this front are meagre, but they indicate an increasing activity which may presage a general offensive by the presage a general offensive by the Allies.







FLOUR PRICE IS

Unable To Make Contracts. and Price Soars.

WHEAT IS BEING HELD Elevators Full While Speculators Wait For Rise

in Price. Little hope for lower bread prices was expressed by local bakers today in discussing the increase to 10 cents a loaf which went into effect here after the rise in Toronto on Monday. The steadily-increasing price of flour is given as the reason for the rising bread prices, but whether the high quotations on this principal ingradient are due to a real shortage or to speculation and "corners," the majority of them claimed they were unable to say with authority. A number of them stated that they would be in favor of Government control, or at least an investigation. Some of the bakers claim that they are no longer able to make contracts for flour, and point to this as an indication that the flour is being held for higher prices. Quotations on barrels of flour are now at \$15.50 and \$16 and the bakers ex-Quotations on barrels of flour are now at \$15.50 and \$16, and the bakers express themselves as unwilling to buy a large quantity at this figure even if it were obtainable. A sudden drop in prices if they had a large-sized stock on hand would mean a loss of hundreds of dollars to them. A drop of 40 cents a hundredweight only a short time ago gives foundation, they say, to their fear that the bottom may drop out of the market. market.

If Properly Handled.

One of the larger breadmen was of the opinion that there were no "corners" here. "If wheat is being held by anyone, it's by the Allies' food commission," he said. "Would Government control of the supplies here improve conditions here?" he was asked. "I should think so, if it were properly handled," he replied.

That a Government investigation of the causes of flour shortage would produce much good even if it were not followed by control of the product was the opinion held by another baker. He thought it possible that thousands of bushels of wheat might be held in the large grain elevators of the West possibly because of inadequate transportation facilities, but more likely in the hope of still higher prices. The majority of the bakers, however, would not commit themselves to similar statements, as they were in touch only with the smaller millers, and had not the opportunity to study the larger markets.

An interesting article by W. W. Swanson, Ph. D., in the Journal of Com An interesting article by W. W. Swanson, Ph. D., in the Journal of Commerce, treats of one phase of business which has been too often neglected in the past in Canada, that of the creation, management and distribution of surplus. This neglect has been the cause of many business failures. Too many corporations overlooked the necessity of assuring stability of dividends and of business, discounting the future in their surfeit of revenue, with the result that hey were not able to provide for the lean periods. The necessity for creating

and handling a surplus properly is thus defined by the writer:
"During the merger period, 1909-1913, when many large combinations were formed in Canada, most of the assets taken over from the constituent companies, were capitalized at their full value, and hence it may be said that very few Canadian companies, outside of the banks, have acquired a surplus through inheritance. Neither have many corporations in this country, at the time they were consolidated out of the various constituent companies, created any considerable surplus by the sale of stocks and bonds above par. A few corporations have disposed of some of their fixed and semi-fixed assets no longer required in the business, but the sums realized in that way have not generally been set aside and ear-marked for surplus account. In only a few cases, and, notably, in connection with our banks, have surplus funds been built up by the revaluation of assets, or by the bringing into light of concealed assets on the balance sheet. In almost every instance surplus funds have been acquired through the slow, but most desirable process of saving, and it is in that direction that our hopes must be placed in the future for the development and augmentation of surplus funds in connection with the industrial corporations of this country. It may be remarked in passing that the American trusts were in no wise mor provident than Canadian industrial combines, with respect to the building up of surplus, at the commencement of their career. The most notable exception t general policy pursued is found in the iron and steel concern in which Mr. ractice of putting back into the business the larger part of the profits earned that has been followed in the United States, with such results as our readers' well know.

A SPECIFIC USE.

"Once it has been determined upon to create a surplus, the next point to ainly as a 'rainy-day fund' to meet emergencies when earnings fall off, to the well as the Hamburg-American Line, have followed the former practice, and have set aside each year a considerable part of their earnings as a sort of insurance fund. The Cunard Company has about one-third of its assets invested in securities outside of the steamship business, the object being to draw upon this fund to make up any deficit that may otherwise occur in years of depression when ocean traffic has fallen off. The theory is that if the surplus is invested over a wide range of high-class securities, it is hardly likely that income from that source will show a corresponding decline with that in the regular business makes for permanency in the declaring of dividends, but, on the other hand, it is obvious that if the surplus is invested in high-grade securities, a rate of interest is realized not much higher than can be secured at the bank. Moreinterest is realized not much higher than can be secured at the bank. Moreover, if a company that follows this practice should ever be forced into liquidation, its creditors—the bondholders—would gain at the expense of stockholders,
who are entitled to all that the company can make. This undoubtedly is a
serious defect in the 'rainy day' theory of the management of the surplus, and
explains why most companies either distribute the net earnings above expenses
of operation, depreciation and reserve to the stockholders to whom, of course,
the whole net income really belongs. This is the policy generally practiced by
English corporations, and in a few patable interages—exactally by the Pennsyl-English corporations, and in a few notable instances—especially by the Pennsylvania Raliroad—in the United States. On the other hand, most American and Canadian corporations are convinced of the necessity of building up a surplus whether they translate that belief into practice or not. STRIKING EXAMPLES.

"The majority of corporations on this side of the water which have enough foresight to create a surplus put it back into the business. The most striking examples in Canada are found in connection with our banks. The Bank of Montreal, the Canadian Bank of Commerce and the Royal Bank of Canada have

Montreal, the Canadian Bank of Commerce and the Royal Bank of Canada have each accumulated large surplus funds, which they have reinvested in the ordinary business of banking. This has given the three institutions mentioned a commanding position in Canadian finance, and has placed them, indeed, among the strongest financial corporations in the world.

"It is evident that if a surplus is merely turned back into the business, earnings are made more stable and dividends kept at a steady level, or at least made more uniform. In behalf of this practice it may also be pointed out that no individual could hope to make as good use of his share of the surplus fund as the corporation can do for him.

A STOCK DIVIDEND.

"The corporation, however, may decide to declare a stock dividend to the end that it may itself retain control of the surplus, but distribute to stockholders all the earnings. As has often been pointed out, stock-watering is quite a different matter from over-capitalizing a company. There is no valid reason why a corporation that can pay eight per cent on each \$100 par value of stock should not issue two shares on which it will pay a four-per-cent dividend. It is sometimes forgotten, however, that this may be very desirable from the stockholders' point of view, because two shares at four have a greater speculative value than one share carrying an eight-per-cent dividend."

BUSINESS OF THE STOCK EXCHANGE

Stocks are the paper representatives of transportation, industrial, mining, mercial, and other properties. The stock exchange is an organization of commercial, and other properties. The stock exchange is an organization of professional traders or brokers, which conducts speculation and investment in these securities. The chief functions of the stock exchange are to provide a wide, permanent, and at all times, available market for the sale of stocks, bonds, and other securities, and to establish the market or current prices for such securities based upon the best available information.

The stock exchange is in reality the primary market for capital, and that in New York has been admitted to be the most important financial institution in the world. There from day to day, and hour to hour, during session, is registered the average of the best expert opinion as to what properties are worth. The stock exchange of London, England, is about 200 years old, and still holds first place among the exchanges, in that securities listed and traded in there represent a larger party value, were international interests, and a wider range of sent a larger par value, more international interests, and a wider range of national, state, industrial and other corporate securities throughout the world. This exchange has occupied the present quarters one hundred and fifteen years, and has a membership of about 6,000, while that of Paris is but 70, and New

A membership in the Paris Bourse is worth \$400,000, while the same privileges In New York's exchange range from \$30,000 in dull times to \$99,000 when trading

For the ten years ending 1912 the average annual sales of stocks amounted to 196,500,000 shares, with a par value of about fifteen and a half billion dollars, and the average sale of bonds about \$800,000,000.

Quotations on the stock tickers, found in brokers' offices, banks and elsewhere in all large cities, and brokers' offices throughout the country, are furnished by attendants to telegraph operators stationed on the floor of the exchange and a few minutes after a transaction has occurred on the floor the name of the security and the price may be read in Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago, Denver, San

Francisco and London, Ont. Evidence of the trading which warrants maintaining high rent offices, private Evidence of the trading which walrants maintaining high refer offices, proceedings and other heavy overhead expenses, is rarely seen in the offices. The large traders are never "seat warmers," as the bulk of the office frequenters are known in New York and Chicago. Their business is privately given over the phone or by letter, and such orders are never alluded to by the attendants in charge of filling same on the exchange.

Some of the largest traders in New York are very rarely seen even in the vicinity of Wall Street. Large fortunes are won and lost in the stock market every year, but losses are more often made by timid traders, with thin purses and a restricted credit at their bank, coupled with an intense desire for gambling movements. 

There are two ways of making a new lawn. One is by sodding and the other by seeding. In either case the ground should be previously well dug, and the being ewed roots removed. It must then be raked and levelled, any depressions being firmly packed with soil, so that later they will not be noticeable in the lawn. All the stones should be removed from the surface, and the whole thoroughly rolled. If sod is used, it should be as free from weeds as possible, each piece being about three feet long and one foot broad. Lay the sods with their edges just touching. It is not necessary to wedge them toreaber. If any sods seem lower than others they should be packed underneath with loose soil and any spaces between should be filled up with bits of sod. The whole should then be packed down with a beater, and for a time at first, rolled frequently and plentifully watered. It is best to sod in a rainy season if possible, if seed is used, the kind best suited to

Gentlemen,—As chairman of the board of health of the city of London, I hereby respectfully submit for your consideration the following matters:

1. That the estimates prepared by the board of health to cover the running expenses of the board for this year (1917) were set at the lowest figures under which it was possible to conduct the work of the board, taking into account the very favorable conditions for economy in the board of health work then existing.

2. Developments since that time, particularly the resignation of the physical particularly the resignation of the physical property is a strong recruiting speech.

Developments since that time, particularly the resignation of the physician in charge of the field work in contagious diseases, on account of the reduction in his salary, have resulted in the absolute need for the expenditure of emergency sums never contemplated in the original estimates, and also in the evident requirement for the rest of this year at least of the payment of a salary in excess of that provided for in the estimates.

Estimates Were Cut.

3. Notwithstanding that the estimates of the board of health as submitted to you were very low, as above explained, they were cut in two important items, one that already mentioned, the other an item of six hundred dollars for a public health nurse, greatly needed.

4. We respectfully request that your honorable body reconsider the whole matter of the financing of the board of health for this year with a view to adjusting both estimates and appro-

matter of the financing of the board of health for this year with a view to adjusting both estimates and appropriations to a figure which will make it possible to give to the citizens of London that protection of their health from contaglous diseases to which they are entitled, and for which the board of health is held responsible.

5. The situation is acute. Four months of this year have passed without any settlement of these vital questions. The whole country is facing a grave situation in many directions, on account of the war. Infantile paralysis threatens again this summer, as it did last summer, as it did last summer. Many places are preparing against it, as well as other troubles, by special measures. This is no time to run chances in health matters. At the present time numbers of cases of various infectious diseases are reported daily to the board of health. Cases previously reported and quarantined are daily coming due for release.

6. The present board of health is ready and willing to act, and to act promptly, if assured of the financial support necessary, and awaits earnestly
