Change in Methods Result of Imperial Cabinet Conferences.

FIGHTING MEN

Ottawa, Aug. 20.—Except in matters of discipline and/military operations, Canada now has complete control over all her troops overseas. Recent interimperial developments which brought the change about are regarded here as the most momentous since confederation.

The change in control over Canadian troops comes after continued negotiations with the Imperial Government. From the outbreak of war, Canada has controlled her troops till they were dispatched overseas. On arrival in Great Britain, they were taken over by the war office. Now, except as regards military operations and discipline, the Day war office. Now, except as regards military operations and discipline, the Dominion Government retains control. Here the change also made in regard to what is officially termed "channels of communication" is regarded as being of vital importance. Direct communication between the prime minister of Canada and the prime minister of Great Britain, it is felt, will do away with delays incidental to the old method of communication via the governorwith delays incidental to the old method of communication via the governorgeneral and the colonial office. In regard to communications between Canada and the United States, it is pointed out further development has been made. In matters of commerce, Canada now communicates directly with Washington through the war mission there instead of by way of the colonial office and the British embassy.

London, Aug. 20 .- Hundreds of pec ple were killed and wounded in a regular battle between Lettish guards and rioters during food disorders in Petrograd, according to an Amsterdam dis-patch to the Exchange Telegraph Com-

The dispatch which quotes Petrograd advices by way of Berlin, says that after the city had been without food for two days a procession of workmen marched through the streets, shouting: "Down with the Germans; down with the Kremlin!"

The battle between the rioters and the Lettish guards occurred before the Smolny Institute. Martial law was proclaimed in Petrograd the same evening.



THE WAR SITUATION

New York, Aug. 20 .- The Assoclated Press this morning issued the following:

The German forces holding the vital sector of the battlefront between the Alsne and Olse Rivers have been hurled back over a 10-mile front this morning by the French, according to reports reaching London. It is stated that the French have penetrated the enemy positions to a depth of two miles.

This attack, which is a continuation of the assault made northwest of Soissons on Sunday night, is said to endanger the whole German posttion at Solssons and the Alsne, It is added that the French success will probably be followed by a German retirement from Solssons to the Chemin-des-Dames.

New York, Aug. 20 .- Allied pressure against the German lines from Soissons northward to the Somme and in the Flanders sector continues. Just northwest of Solssons, the French have occupied the village of Vassens, which is on the eastward bank of a small stream which flows Into the Oise River at Morsain, town to the southeast which was captured by the French yesterday.

Further north, in the mountainous region, between Lassigny and Dreslincourt, reciprocal artillery fire is reported. It was in this region that the French debouched from Thiescourt forest yesterday and also captured the village of Pimprez on the Oise above Ribecourt. In the old Picardy battlefield, the

Germans have been launching repeated counter-attacks against the British line in the region southeast of Chilly, which is north of Roye. These assaults were repulsed by the Flattening Out Salient.

The old Lys salient is being rapidly flattened out by the German retirement from the extreme westerly positions held by them after their April offensive. The British official statement shows that the line now runs from Merville, on the north, to the vicinity of Locon, on the south. leaving a large triangle of abandoned territory in the direction of St. Venant, which has been occupied by the British.

Brilliant Early Morning Attack By Poilus Takes Them In For Two Miles On A Ten-Mile Front-Germans May Withdraw to the Chemin-des-Dames.

FRENCH DRIVE IN TWO MILES.

London, Aug. 20, 1 p.m. The French 10th Army attacked again this morning on a front of ten miles, between the Oise and the Aisne, and reached a maximum depth of two miles, according to a dispatch from the battlefront.

The advance of the French troops endangers the whole German position at Soissons and on the River Aisne. It is possible that the Germans will withdraw to the Chemin-

Before 9 o'clock this morning the French had captured 500

Germans in the sector attacked. North of Roye the French have taken the Bracquemont and Fendu Woods and have occupied the greater part of Beuvraignes, according to advices. It is also reported that they have made progress to the southeast of Beuvraignes.

ATTACK ON TWELVE-MILE FRONT

London, Aug. 20 .- The attack of the French yesterday between the Matz and the Oise was on a front of twelve miles, and although the Germans offered a stubborn resistance the French made an advance of about a mile. At 6 o'clock last evening the battleline ran as follows: Lapravim Farm, which is northwest of Freasnieres; Arbe-de-Canny, the western outskirts of Lassigny, La Rue-des-Boucandes, the southern outskirts of Orval-le-Hamel, the southern outskirts of Dreslincourt and Pimprez.

Though the advance was a small one, it is regarded as important, as it carried the French line further down the slopes of Lassigny Massif. The French also moved up the valley of the Activity in Emperor Karl's Oise, the line being between five and six miles from Noyon.







Germany Hustling To Get Strong Bases for Future Operations.

A RACE AGAINST WINTER History Will Have Something

Berlin Enlists Aid of Churches and Moneyed Interests to Create Monarchy.

BY ARTHUR S. DRAPER. (Copyright, 1918, by the Tribune Association, New York.) Association, New York.)

LONDON, Aug. 19.—Events in Russia are likely to develop rapidly within the next few weeks, for the winter is coming soon, and then operations on a large scale are impossible. The Allies are racing for positions which serve best to link up the various pro-Ally forces in Russia, while the Germans aim at consolidating for themselves strong bases for future activities.

The report that the enemy has established himself in the enormously strong fortifications of Kronstadt is believed to be the first move toward the occupation of Petrograd and then of Moscow. Evidence accumulates that Germany's real aim in Russia is to re-establish a monarchy with the help of churches and moneyed and landed classes, while the Allies are intervening at invitation of Social Revolutionaries and the anti-German Social Democrats.

For like barley—the most neglected of cereals—barley flour has been almost unknown to many thousands of house-keepers. Now in our desire to conserve the precious white flour, we are beginning to learn how much can be done with this nutritious cereal.

Barley flour can be used very much as cornmeal is used—and its possibilities are many. You can cook it as a breakfast cereal, make delicious pancakes, puddings, bread and even cake. It needs a fairly long cooking, just as cornmeal does—anywhere from 45 minutes to two hours, depending on the dish cooked.

Barley Breakfast Cakes.

Stir the barley meal into the boiling water and boil ten minutes. Remove to double boiler and cook 45 minutes. Set aside to cool, add sugar, beaten egg and fat. Beat well, then drop a spoonful at a time on a hot, greased griddle. The most convenient way of handling this is to cook the barley the night before, and in the morning simply add the sugar, egg and shortening and bake. A fireless cooker makes it possible to cook the cereal overnight after the ten-minute boiling.

2½ cupful of molasses
4 cupful of cold milk
2 tablespoonful of salt
2 tablespoonful of butter



THE BIGGEST LIBERTY LOAN YET. 36,000,000,000 Fiotation, While a 41/4 Per Cent Issue, May Have Some Tax-

Exempt Privileges. A resumption of weakness in Liberty Bonds, all but the 3½s making new low prices on the movement downward, has started a renewed discussion as to how it will be possible for the Government to sell \$6,000,000,000 of Fourth Loan 4% per cent bonds at par when the Third 4% are selling at better than a 450 per cent basis. The answer by investment bankers who have studied the situa-tion is that in all probability the Government will make some further concessions as respects exemptions of the new bonds from taxation to make them more atractive, and it is being already suggested that instead of exempting only up to \$5,000 worth, the exemption be made \$50,000 or \$100,000 before any taxation of he income shall begin. An exemption of \$100,000 would make the new bonds bearing 41/4 much more attractive to the wealthy, who are, nevertheless the multi-millionaire class. New legislation, permitting conversion of the existing issues into the Fourth Liberty Loan issue bearing the tax-exempt privilege. would help the present issues.

It appears that among the advocates of increased exemption the idea is held that there is need of some competition with tax-exempt municipal bonds, and that making the Fourth Liberty Loan tax-exempt up to \$50,000 or \$100,000, would afford a very good bond to compete with municipals. The new plan has gained so much favor among the banks and investment houses that it will be urged on Secretary McAdoo at some of the numerous conferences that are to be held at Washington and in New York prior to the adoption of the Liberty Loan campaign. Discussion with respect to the rate of interest has not risen, and on all sides it is the consensus of opinion that the rate will be only 4½ per cent.— New York Financial World.

CLOSING OF RUG INDUSTRY OF TURKEY AND PERSIA MEANS BUSINESS FOR CHINA.

The old centres of the rug supply in Turkey and Persia have been practically closed by the war. The result is seen in an increased demand for Chinese rugs, most of the Chinese exports being made in Tientsin, Pekin and vicinity. The bulk of the product is made under the direction of the foreign buyer or expert.

As is well known, rug-making in China is a very old industry, dating back many centuries. In China, where the labor problem is unknown, the methods used are

quite primitive. Thus, in some localities spinners may be seen strolling along with wads of wool and hand spindles, and by the mechanical working of the spindle, the spinner gradually accumulates a ball of yarn. The Chinese rug is a hand-made product all the way through. Chinese rug dyers are famous. Rugs can be boiled to shreds without affecting the dye in the least, and the dye worker depends entirely upon his memory for records and formulas. The rugs are tied, not woven; strictly speaking, there is no woof. The cotton filler is run in after each row of knots has been tied and pounded down. Only an expert who has studied the rug market in China can tell the value of a Pekin rug. Some years ago a beautiful Pekin rug, made from the finest quality lamb's wool, best dyes and workmancould be bought for from 50 to 55 cents per foot. In 1915 the price was \$3.50 to \$4. The arrival of four or five American buyers, with orders for a few thousand square feet, will send the dealers' demands up 15 to 20 per cent. Many American firms in China have factories, or control the product of

Chinese factories, and by reason of their wide experience are in a position to guarantee their products.

BE INDUSTRIOUS, BUT WITHAL BE FRUGAL. There is no workingman who serves his employer efficiently, faithfully and

cientiously, who will not secure constancy of employment. There is no workingman in uninterrupted employment who may not look forward confidently to independence, if he will but be frugal.

There are hundreds of persons who can work hard and faithfully to every ten who can save something from what they earn. As a rule those who toll the hardest squander with a recklessness the average rich man would not think of doing. Instead of saving anything to provide against the unexpected, such as sickness or want of employment, they spend all, with no thought of tomorrow, ext week or next month's untoward possibilities. Result, slavery to extravagance, discouragement with conditions which to their mind are unfavorable to hem ever being any better off, while to the frugal one who husband as wisely as he works, the same conditions of employment and opportunity would look most avorable for the attainment of a competency. To anyone who has observed the habits of the careless spender of his earnings, it is hard to account for such short-sightedness of conduct; but doubtless the main cause is contempt for small savings. They never look upon a few cents saved as the seeds for dollar growths. They never contemplate the possibility of a few dollars a month, previously saved, in a profitable investment where the money will make money while they

are working for more to employ in the same way.

Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton, in his essay upon "The Management of Money," says: "Every man is needy who spends more than he has; no man is needy who spends less. I may so ill manage my money that with £5,000 a year I purchase the worst evils of poverty, terror and shame; I may so well manage my money that with £100 a year I purchase the best blessings of wealth, safety and

It is quite a common opinion with many who work for a weekly wage that to save a little every week means being miserly and mean. This is as false as it is pernicious. Being economical for the mere purpose of hoarding up money is mean, but being prudent with what one earns and economical in spending for the purpose of being independent, is one of the soundest indications of manly character, and when the habit of saving something from each week's income has the object of creating an insurance of the living comfort of those dependent upon us,

Years ago a penniless boy on a journey paid for a meal by doing a job of work. Afterward he came to be the possessor of millions, which he bestowed upon works of charity and philanthropy. FOOD PRICES INCREASE 63 PER CENT. IN FIVE YEARS. The retail price of food for the United States on May 15, 1918, showed an in-

rease of 3 per cent over the price of April 15, 1918, according to a report of the Bureau of Labor Statistics to be published in the forthcoming Monthly Labor

A comparison of prices as between May 15, 1918, and May 15, 1917, shows that food as a whole increased 5 per cent. Seven of the 25 articles recorded showed a decline in the retail price. Potatoes declined 64 per-cent; onlons, 35 per cent; flour, 24 per cent; sugar, 9 per cent; beans, 7 per cent; cheese, 1 per cent and coffee less than 1 per cent. Ten articles show an increase of 20 per cent or more. Plate boiling beef increased 32 per cent; cornmeal, 30 per cent; hens, 29 per cent; milk, 26 per cent,

A comparison for the five-year period shows that food was 63 per cent higher n May, 1918, than in the same month of 1913. Every article increased 38 per cent or over. The latest increase of 38 per cent was shown in potatoes. Three articles how an increase of 100 per cent or more.




