BULGARIANS FOR REVENGE ONCE MORE 'GAS' MONASTIR, KILLING MANY CIVILIANS

Corfu, Greece, March 22.—Via London,—A semi-official Serbian statement from Saloniki today declares that the Bulgarians, in order to avenge themselves because they were being forced by the pressure of the Allies army to retire gradually from Monastir, renewed on March 18 and 19 their bombardment of the open town of Monastir.

Six hundred additional shells, many of which contained asphyxiating gases were dropped upon the city. The victims, it is said, were again only old men, women and children. The death list numbers 25, while 23 persons are dying, and 10 others are suffering from less serious wounds. Fifty-nine houses were demolished.

War Conditions Bring Greatest Opportunities in the World's History.

Members of the Y. W. C. A, board yesterday afternoon obtained a broader vision of the possibilities of the work than perhaps ever before in their lives in an illuminating address given at the monthly meeting by the national secretary, Miss Una Saunders.

Telling of the marvelous expansion of the work of the present time, Miss Saunders dwelt especially upon the new obligations and responsibilities confronting the Young Women's Christian Association owing to war conditions which are resulting in the forcing of women into fields of labor undreamed of for them before.

Canteens are being established under Y. W. C. A. management in munitions factories where women are employed and in one of these alone in Ontario, 1,200 meals a day are served. The Association is also accepting the responsibility for the housing and care of girls volunteering for agricultural service during the coming season and of these 500 are already enrolled at Toronto University in connection with the National Service League.
