

CANADA'S RECORD IN GREAT WAR IS ONE OF WHICH TO BE PROUD

Loadon, Jan. 30 .- Revised figures compiled by British statisticians on the contributions of the various allied nations to the fighting forces during the war, place Canada well in the lead of the overseas dominions not employing native troops. The Dominion is credited with 640,886 effectives, Australia coming next in the list with 416,809. India's army composed largely of native troops, was 1,401,350. The statement shows that Great Britain during the period of the war

placed a grand total of 8,654,467 men in the field. The contribution of the United States was 2,000,000 men. The casualties of the troops of the British Empire, including Canada, India, Australia and other colonies, total: Killed, 851,117; missing and prisoners, 142,057; wounded, 2,067,442.

PROVINCES MAY HAVE GOVERNMENT TO DECIDE QUESTION WITH BOARD OF AN EIGHT-HOUR DAY

Government Seeks Information Regarding Canadian Delegates.

LEFT FOR PARIS

Tom Moore and F. A. Acland Sailed On Liner Delayed by Storms.

Ottawa, Jan. 30 .- By Canadian Press-Cables were sent to Paris today to disover the whereabouts of Canadian delegates to the governing body of the international labor office. Atlantic storms have given rise to a disappointing situ-

The two delegates, F. A. Acland, deputy minister of labor, representing the Dominion Government, and Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress, representing orgaized labor—sailed from New York for Cherbourg on the Kaiserin Aguusta Victoria. Apparently they were in plenty of time for the opening of the conference in Paris on the 26 inst. But, delayed by the rough weather at sea, the Kaiserin was late. When last seen she had put in one of the English channel ports. There is, therefore, no question of the safety of the delegates; but it is questioned. of the delegates; ut it is questioned here if they have been able to reach ParisParis before the conclusion of the more important business.

The situation is regarded as particularly disappointing in view of the fact that at the international labor conference held in Washington during November, Canada made a strenuous fight for representation of the governing body. important business.

To Determine Legislation.

What its conclusions have been will largely determine whether labor legislation will be introduced at the coming session of the House of Commons. Canadian Government delegates assented to five out of six conventions adopted by the conference.

When the two delegates left Ottawa, they expected to be absent at least six weeks. Deliberations of the governing body, it was thought, would cover probably a fortnight or three weeks. Press dispatches tend to indicate, however, that although only in session since Monday, the governing body is nearing the end of its deliberations.

So far as Canada is concerned, there is the additional question of the jurisdiction of the Dominion Parliament. This is particularly the case in regard to the eight-hour day convention. The department of justice still has the point under consideration. There has been much searching of authorities, under the B. N. High Prices Will Remain For Some Time to Come

London, Jan. 30 .- Lower prices will be slow in coming, said Reginald McKenna, former chancellor of the exchequer, and now chairman of the London City and Midland Bank, addressing stockholders today. Any attempt suddenly to bring about a decrease in the cost of living, he said, would mean disaster.

"The spending power of the public has increased from 1.198,000,000 pounds sterling in 1914, to 2,693,000,000 at present," he said. "This, with loans to the state, has raised bank deposits, and consequently increased the buying capacity of the public. With increased currency, prices of commodities have soared, but increased production will bring prices down. "I would urge a reduction of the country's expenditures to a figure less than the tax revenues, by which means alone the issuance of currency can be restricted, and London re-established in her old position as a financial centre and the free gold market of the world. It is my opinion that this country's rate of taxation is higher than any other in the world, and is dangerously near the point where thrift, business enterprise and the needed development of capital may become seriously impaired."

Business Profits Tax Frightens Away Foreign Capital, Curtails Expansion, Declares C. R. Hunt

Gives His Reasons From Manufacturers' Point of View For Opposing Renewal of the Impost-Would Abolish It Imme diately.

Charles R. Hunt, president of Hunt Bros., Limited, is strongly opposed to the business profits tax, declaring it unfair and bad business, and in the following letter gives his reasons:

I read with interest your article on federal taxation appearing in your publication under date of January 2, and feel that there is a broad scope for enlargement on this important question.

The daily newspapers of Canada should put clearly before their readers the rulings and effects of the present business profits tax, in effect up to December 31, 1919, and I feel that you would no doubt be willing to at least listen to a review of the matter as it appears to me, and I think I may easely say, to the majority of Canadian manufacturers, both large and small.

To begin with, the business profits tax.

I would appear to me that a remediate production and penalizes efficiency.

What Has Been Done.

We have only to look at what the business profits tax has done to curtail expansion in some lines of Canadian business. Briefly I give you four cases:

1. A steamship company operating from Canadian ports under Canadian register has already transferred a large percentage of their ships to the register of a country having no excess profits tax.

2. A certain shoe manufacturer who was offered orders in excess of the company's capacity decided early in 1919 for an extension of plant, including the purchase of additional real estate. Immediately upon renewal of the business profits tax all extension plans were dropped.

Secondly—It applies only to certain kinds of industrial enterprises, agricul-

Secondly—It applies only to certain kinds of industrial enterprises, agricultural undertakings being entirely ex-

empt.
Thirdly—If the manufacturer has a bad year he must bear the loss himself. If the following year is a good one, the government takes the excess profit and refuses to allow any portion of it to be applied against the previous year's losses.

of it to be applied against the previous year's losses.
Fourthly—Large professional incomes are not affected, except in the way of an income tax, whereas the businessman who takes a risk and succeeds is in reality taxed for his successes.

Effect on Capital.

At this time, when Canada should undergo a period of commercial expansion, the business profits tax is about the worst measure that could be in effect, as no foreign capital would

THE MEN ALWAYS IN DEMAND. From Ottawa there comes the word that every deputy minister has been warned that staffs must be reduced and the less useful people dismissed. No doubt this is necessary, even though it may appear harsh and must cause considerable hardship. It is noticeable that one class of employes are not being let out, indeed, they are being given special inducements to remain where they are. These are the specialists, the men and women who have so mastered their field that they are indispensable. And so it is always, the man who can make himself master of that field in which he has chosen to do his life work will find the world coming to his door seeking his advice and his help. John Bunyan puts the matter very concisely in some remarks on the medical

"Physicians," he says, "get neither name nor fame by the pricking of wheals or the picking out thistles, or by laying of plaisters to the scratch of a pin; every old woman can do this. But if they would have a name and a fame, if they will have it quickly, they must do some great and desperate cures. Let them fetch one to life that was dead, let them recover one to his wits that was mad, let them make one that was blind to see, let them give ripe wits to a fool-these are notable cures, and he that can do this, if dost thus first, he shall have the name and fame he deserves; he may lie abed till

It is an old lesson, but one that must constantly be impressed upon youth, that what the world wants always is men and women who know more than their fellows. And whatever the vocation the process is ever the same: first to acquire a knowledge of the fundamentals of the work, then to become familiar with the methods by which advances in knowledge are made and last and all the time abundance of hard work done with the utmost thoroughness. There is no other road to real success.

PROTECT THE FORESTS.

At the Northern Ontario convention held a few days ago it was stated that at the present rate of destruction the forests of Northern Ontario would be wiped out within fifteen years. As this estimate was based on expert knowledge and investigation, it is a startling revelation of the Hearst Government's failure to protect and conserve a basic resource, and of the necessity for the immediate and vigorous application of a forest policy that will remove the menace. Few things are so surely tied up with Ontario's rapid and healthy progress as the forests. Their disappearance would involve the loss of immense water powers which in time could be harnessed for the use of the entire province. As well immense resources in fisheries and game would vanish with the passing of the forests, and there would be a serious depreciation in the value of our mineral wealth. Reckless, wasteful lumbering operations, inadequate fire protection and the lack of an up-to-date comprehensive policy of reforestation are given as the principal reasons for the present unfortunate situation, according to those who have care-

fully investigated. In this matter of forest conservation Quebec is far ahead of Ontario. The Gouin ministry has put into force a vigorous policy of conservation that is registering excellent results. Reforestation is being applied vigorously and widely, fire guards are numerous and are equipped with the latest forest fighting apparatus. Even the aeroplane has been recruited to this most important service of the people. The Drury Government might to excellent advantage study what our eastern neighbor has accomplished in the vital matter of forest conservation. Whether in co-operation with the Federal Government or on its own initiative, the new administration will be expected to at once act to remedy this situation, which so seriously affects the entire community.

WELL MEANING, BUT UNFORTUNATE. Queen Mary is to be the recipient, if the president of the International Anti-Cigarette League has her way, of a letter from this individual, Miss Gaston of Boston, drawing to her majesty's attention the rumor that she smokes a cigarette after luncheon, and asking for a denial. The letter as written ends with this sentence: "It will be exceedingly unfortunate if English standards fall below those of this

county through your example." Within a few hours of this news tit-bit being sent from Boston, there comes a dispatch from Chicago announcing that a theatre in that ety had opened a smoking room for women at a cost of \$10,000 and quoting the manager as gaving that women drove him to it by smoking

in the washroom, boudoir and lobby. It is to be supposed that this president means well and merely is afflicted with that ocular trouble which makes the view of things near at hand hazy while permitting excellent sight of those afar off. Unfortunately, well-meaning people often make themselves rather ridiculous. There are hundreds of thousands of women and men, probably many millions, in Britain and in the United States who never have had this smoking rumor brought to their attention, and never would have heard of it had not Miss Gaston written her letter and announced her action in the press. Now that she has succeeded in making a fuss about it, many of those who are

the credit or blame belongs to Miss Gaston not to the Queen.

So far as is known, no theatre in Britain has found it necessary to take the step to which the Chicago manager was forced, so a logical inference is that the zealous lady might find enough to occupy her whole anti-cigarette energy near home, without dabbling in foreign personal and private business which does not concern her. If the letter reaches the hands of Queen Mary and she takes the trouble to have it answered, she will be exhibiting a courtesy which ought to be crushing. If the epistle gets only its deserts, it will have its resting-place in the waste basket.

GOMPERS AND THE REDS. Samuel Gompers, through the Federationist, the official organ of the American Federation of Labor, condemns the Red movement completely, finally and for all time. Gompers ex-

poses the Bolshevist constitution. He shows that Lenine's "dictatorship of the proletariat

and peasantry" doesn't exist. It is reassuring to learn that American trades-unionism is awake to the danger of Bolshevistic propaganda in the new world. Gompers says of this that while it is causing a lot of trouble it is doubtful if it is more effective than that "conducted by those who claim to be entirely detached from Russian influence and Russion payrolls." What he strikes at is the whole doctrine of disorder and destruction, whether it emanates from Moscow or the parlor Rolshe-

That there is a Russian Bolshevist menace to the United States can be proved out of their own mouths. In the Review, a New York weekly, Jerome Landfield gives the following statement made by the president of the Petrograd soviet last February:

We are willing to sign an unfavorable peace with the Allies. . . It would only mean that we should put no trust whatever in the bit of paper we should sign. We should use the breathing space so obtained in order to gather our strength in order that the mere continued existence of our Government would keep up the worldwide propaganda which Soviet Russia has been carrying on for more

Lenine himself, however, sets forth the whole plan with singular clarity and characteristic Bolshevic logic in his proclamation calling the Congress of the Communist International:

The present is the period of destruction and crushing of the capitalistic system of the whole world, and it will be a catastrophe for the whole European culture, should capitalism with all its insoluble contradictions not be done away with.

The aim of the proletariat must now be immediately to conquer power. To conquer power means to destroy the governmental apparatus of the bourgeois and to organize a new proletarian governmental apparatus.

In the same proclamation Lenine puts him-

self on record as follows: The dictatorship of the proletariat must be the occasion for the immediate expropriation of capital and the elimination of the private right of owning the means of production, through making them common public property. The socialization (meaning doing away with private property and making it the property of the proletarian state, which is managed by the workers on a socialistic basis, of the large-scale industries and the central bodies organized by the same, including the banks, the confiscation of the capitalistic agricultural production, the monopolization of large-scale commerce, the socialization of the buildings in the towns and in the country; the establishment of a workmen's gov-ernment and the concentration of the economic functions in the hands of the organs of the proletariat dictatorship - are the most

essential aims of the day. In order to protect the socialist revolution against external and internal enemies, and to assist the fighting proletariats of other countries, it becomes necessary to entirely disarm the bourgeoisie and its agents and to arm the

proletariat.

The world situation demands immediate and as perfect as possible relations between the different groups of the revolutionary proletariat and a complete alliance of all the countries in which the revolution has already

The most important method is the mass action of the proletariat, including armed struggle against the Government power of

The destruction of state authority is the aim which all Socialists have set for them-selves, Marx included and at the head; without the realization of this aim true democratism, that is, equality and liberty, cannot be

For the past three days the people of Winnipeg have been without daily newspapers, owing to a famine in newsprint. The absence of their favorite sheets has already taught the public to appreciate big a part the newspapers play in their daily life. Naturally when there is no authentic method of distributing news the city has been flooded with foundationless rumors of happenings in the world at large. Stories that lose nothing in vividness as they pass from one to another have been circulated and as a result the telephones of the newspaper offices have been kept constantly busy by citizens anxious to ascertain the truth about some of the stories that spread through the city. The experience of Winnipeg calls attention to the value of the daily newspaper in keeping its readers informed of the real facts of what is occurring in the world. The service that is given in this respect is understood until a crisis like that in Winnipeg shows how effective is the work of the newspapers in the prevention of wild rumors and false reports that would be daily features were it not for the corrective influence of the press. Again, the absence of the newspapers has had a discouraging effect upon businss, and upon every other line of the city's activity. Three newspaperless days have been enough to give Winnipeg people a much higher opinion of the press than they have hitherto

FATHER AND SON-CHUMS. [Farmer's Sun.]

Some few years ago a wealthy businessman in conversation with a friend said: "Can you guess what I am going to give my boy this year?" The friend, knowing the man to be very wealthy, at once thought of a check of huge proportions. After making a number of guesses as to the amount of money he was likely to give the boy, the businessman interrupted with the remark: "I am going to give my boy an hour of my time every day in the week, and two hours on Sunday, to use in any way he may desire."

That was the beginning of the Father and Son movement, which has for its object the development of a closer and more intimate relationship between the two. We have mothers' days and children's movements of various kinds, all of which are important and most worthy, but, after all, no movement is fraught with greater possibilities than this Father and Son undertaking.

Many fathers make the mistake of thinking that they fulfill their whole duty towards their boys when they provide them with food, clothing, shelter and pocket money. They then wash their hands of the responsibility, forgetting that companionship means more to a boy than all the riches in the world. Better by far for the father to leave the son a smaller amount of money and invest some of his time in cultivating a closer acquaintance with his boy and thereby help develop the lad's character.

During a certain period of a boy's life he looks to his father as his ideal, and if that father will but interest himself in his child's pursuits, he can retain the boy as a chum. This relationship keeps the father young, while the father's comradeship is infinitely better for the boy than if he were allowed to go out on the streets to find his chums and associates among questionable companions.

In the country there are exceptional opportunities for a closer and more intimate relationship between father and son. The work on the farm and the closer relationship in the home make for comradeship. Father and son can have a commor bond, and yet develop a healthy rivalry in stock-raising etc. Give the boy a few animals of his own and notice how interested he will become We may as well frankly admit it. Many boys have left the farm because they were not given an opportunity to share in the management of the

farm, nor were they given even a small interest in it. A boy who has his own chickens, pigs, calves horse, is certain to be more contented and grow up to be a happier and better farmer than one who denied these rights. The Father and Son movement possesses great

possibilities for every parent, but perhaps it affords greater opportunities for the farmer than for any other class of citizen. The first week in February is known as Father and Son Week. Let those of us who are parents take stock of our shortcomings in this respect and resolve to make the balance of the year one of comradeship with out sons, Be your boy's chum!

At the beginning, the declaration says that it is incumbent on the Polish Government to decide whether or not to make war on Russia. It proceeds to accuse the agents of Winston Spencer Churchill, the British war minister, and M. Clemenceau, the former French premier, of endeavoring to incite Poland to a "senseless, commercial war against Soviet Russia."

Recognize Independence.

The. declaration, asserts, that the Soviet Government from the first, recognized.

Soviet Government from the first, recognized the independence and sovereignty of the Polish republic, and that this will be confirmed at the February meeting of the supreme executive committee of the Soviet. ROAD BUILDING TO BE RUSHED AS FAST AS MONEY ALLOWS

Hon. F. C. Biggs Tells Large Meeting At Stratford of Government Plans.

BE MAINTAINED

Minister of Public Works Strongly Opposed To Statute Labor.

STRATFORD, Jan. 29 .- "As long as I am in office, road development in Ontario will be pushed with every vigor, as fast as money and labor will permit," was the declaration this afternoon of Hon. F. C. Biggs, minister of public works, addressing upwards of one hundred delegates from municipalities interested in the proposed straight line highway from Toronto to Sarnia, together with as many more from Stratford and the adjoining municipalities this afternoon. From as far east as Georgetown and as far west as Parkhill delegates were present. Large delegations from Sarnia and Arkona were held up at London because their trains missed connection. They sent a spirited telegram to the meeting strongly urging their sentiments in favor of it. Ontario will be pushed with every vigor,

favor of it.

"For my part I do not think one trunk road is sufficient for Western Ontario," declared Mr. Biggs. "You can take what assurance you like from that." This was in reference to the rivairy between certain sections as to the location of the main trunk highway. The address of the minister was listened to with much interest, and his address was punctuated by applause, indicating the sympathy of the audience with his policy as outlined. The movement for the straight line highway was formally launched here in February, 1519, when at a meeting of several hundred delegates a Central Ontario Good Roads Association was formed.

County councils in session in different parts of the province were well represented, Perth County was there in a body; six were present from Wellington, four from Waterloo and Kitchener, the clerk and reeve of London Township, and representatives from Huron County. Mayor Stevenson extended a civic welcome, and he pointed out that it was not Stratford alone, but a wide area, that was seeking this road. The proposed road would run through a country rich in agriculture, in industrial activity and well populated.

Warden McCallum of Perth held that the desirability of the straight line road could not be questioned. Perth had taken the front rank in road construction and would be behind the highway proposition.

SATURDAY SEES **POLICE FORCES' AMALGAMATION**

Dominion and Mounted Bodies Become One With New Name.

No Change in Western Provinces Except in Name of Corps.

OTTAWA, Jan. 29 .- (By Canadian Press.)—On Saturday at midnight the Dominion police force, as it is at present constituted, ceases to exist, and the personnel is absorbed by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, the title of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police being changed with the coming into effect of the act at midnight Saturday. effect of the act at midnight Saturday. Headquarters of the new organization will be in Ottawa, and Commander Perry is already here. Col. C. Stearns, commander, will be second in command at Ottawa headquarters. There will be little change in regard to the Dominion police as that force at present exists in Ottawa. The Ottawa force will be division "A" Canadian Mounted Police and will be a dismounted division, and the mounted section of the force will be extended in its operations to the east, so that a series of detachments will be available in all the provinces for the enforcing of federal laws and also to assist the provincial authorities at any time such provincial authorities at any time such assistance may be needed. The Ottawa division will be under a superintendent, and in the other sections of the east there will be inspectors, non-commissioned officers and men as needed.

Headquarters Moved.

It was emphasized by Commissioner Petry today that so far as the mounted police organization is concerned the only change is that the title is altered by the substitution of "Canadian" for "Northwest," and the headquarters are moved from Regina to Ottawa. With the Dominion police the difference is that that force ceases to exist on January 31. The Ottawa division Royal Canadian Mounted Police will retain the blue uniforms which have become so familiar to residents of the capital and visitors, but there may be some slight changes made in the equipment to align and match the uniforms of the men worn in the mounted division. Outside of Ottawa all detachments will be mounted, and will wear the red coats which have so frequently struck terror to the hearts of lawless characters in the western provinces.

Too Many Applications.

Commissioner Perry stated that the call which had been made for recruits brought forth more applications than could be handled. The barrack accommodation, it was found, was too limited to care for the great number of men wishing to join the organization and recruiting consequently had to be suspended. The commissioner was high in his praise of the class of men who were being enlisted. They are being carefully chosen, he stated, and were all men of splendid type and physique.

The great majority of them have good war service records behind them, and quite a number of former members of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police and Royal who having taken their discharge and served overseas, are now anxious to get back to the old force again. In accordance with the provisions of the act setting forth the terms of the amalgamation Comptroller A. A. Mc-Lean of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police becomes financial comptroller of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. The new organization will be under Hon. N. W. Rowell as minister.

When the necessary names are provided formal charges will be formulated by the board. The investigation will probably come about February -6 at Hamilton.

Asks Vote on Saskatchewan Liquor Import

Attorney - General Turgeon Wants Referendum On Importation.

REGINA, Sask., Jan. 29 .- In the egislature tonight Attorney-General Turgeon moved the second reading of the Saskatchewan temperance act, 1920. At the same time he moved that the Legislature petition the Dominion Government to take a referendum vote under the provisions of the Canada temperance act to determine whether the people of Saskatchewan want the importation of liquor prohibited or not. The new bill provides for the appointment of a commission of three members, with headquarters here, who will devote their full time to the administration of the act, aided by such inspectors as may be deemed necessary.

The commission is given control of imports of liquor in wholesale quantities for sale in the province and may require all persons handling to submit an inventory of all stocks on hand and under order, but not delivered. If the quantity should exceed the small maximum amount allowed to be kept, the excess may be seized and disposed of or retained, as it is deemed advisable.
