Huge Quantity Held by New York Brokers Lies in Halifax Warehouse — Deterioration Is Setting In As a Result of Warm Weather-Slump in Price Likely To Mean a Big Loss To Owners.

Halifax, N. S., Sept. 2.—While Nova Scotlans were paying 25 cents a pound for sugar most of the summer (one of the reasons given for the high price being an alleged scarcity), millions of pounds owned by New York speculators were stored right in Halifax, in the Dominion Government warehouse at the cocan terminals. Having been stored there for nearly four months in the hottest season of the year, part of the sugar which still remains is deteriorating in value. If the hot weather continued much longer, a large part of it would cause a big loss to the New York owners, who will probably welcome the coming of cooler weather.

Early in May 112,000 bags of sugar were sold by a refinery to some New York brokers, and the whole was stored

Berlin, Sept. 1 .- Dr. Walter Simon the foreign minister, addressing the Reichstag foreign affairs committee, today declared he had been urged to col-laborate with the Russian Bolsheviki against the western powers as a means of breaking the bonds imposed by the treaty of Versailles, but that after ma-ture consideration he had rejected this

**Bolshevik Force Under General Budeney Is Wiped Out.** 

OUTFLANKED BY POLES

Large Number of Reds Are Lost in Battle With Polish Forces

Warsaw. Sept. 2.-The Bolshevik rmy of Gen. Budeney, noted cavalry eader, was annihilated during the perations in the Lemberg sector, which isorderly retreat. Gen. Budeney's mounted men had been

Gen. Budeney's mounted men had been endeavoring to break through the Polish lines and march upon Lublin. They had virtually completed an encircling movement against Zamosz, midway between Lublin and Lemberg, but were outflanked by the Poles and attacked from the east, the communique states. The engagement resulted in the defeat of the soviet forces along the entire centre of the front, and the Russians were compelled to retreat in disorder, with the Poles in close pursuit.

Reds Lose Many Men.
The Bolsheviki lost heavily in killed and wounded, adds the statement, the Poles capturing thousands of prisoners, sixteen guns and enormous quantities of material.

#### MISSIONARIES ARE **URGENTLY NEEDED**

Dr. McKellar, in India Thirty Years, Narrates Experiences To Presbyterians.

The urgent need for more medical nissionaries in India was impressed upon a large audience at St. Andrew's Hall on Wednesday evening, when Dr. Margaret McKellar, a returned medical missionary, gave a brief talk on her work during the last 30 years in India. Dr. McKellar, who is a London lady, said during her address last night that it was 38 years ago in St. Andrew's Church that she decided to be a missionary. Dr. McKellar is home on furlough, and is renewing old friends and acquaintances. One of the most ap when she went to India 30 years ago palling things she mentioned was that there were two medical missionaries in her field, and when she and a fellow her field, and when she and a fellow-worker left for home recently they left only two there, and many schools had been built in 30 years. This she said showed the dire need for more medi-cal missionaries. Most interesting were the details the speaker gave of the un-rest, chiefly political, in India at the present time. Dr. McKellar related an incident of a raid on the missionary incident of a raid on the missionary settlement, on which occasion the missionaries. The treaty-making power of the president and Senate, said Mr. Taft, had been the subject of contention from the very beginning of the United States. Congress held the pursestrings, and if a treaty was consummated involving the expenditure of

strings, and if a treaty was consummated involving the expenditure of money it sometimes felt called upon to protest. Congress, however, had never refused to perform the obligations entered into by the treaty-making power of the nation.

Mr. Taft said that the result of the presidential election in the United States would not necessarily mean the decision of the people of the United States regarding the League of Nations. There were other issues involved in the election. It was claimed that to enter the league the United States would have to part with some of her sovereign

the league the United States would have to part with some of her sovereign powers. This contention he disputed. The fact of the matter was that a sovereignty which could not enter into an agreement with other nations was a minor and ought to have a guardian. Any nation living with other nations must have the power to enter into agreements with them. A sovereign had the right to enter into agreements, and he had also the right to break them if his conscience would permit it. 

Ottawa, Sept. 1.—(By Canadian Press.) — Imperial relationships and Canada's part therein were discussed at tonight's gathering of the Canadian Bar Association. The speakers were Viscount Cave. a lord justice of the court of appeals of Great Britain, and Hon. W. E. Raney, attorney-general of Ontario. Lord Cave's reference to imperial relations came at the end of an address in which—as a former home secretary and solicitor-general—he had been able to present an intimate view of the British war legislation.

The League of Nations, Lord Cave said, was a grand conception. But much time and effort must be expended before it came to full fruition. Meantime there was in existence the League of British Nations, and the bond which united its great component units was no chain of possessions, but the handclasp of free men. It was founded on two principles, the autonomy of each and the voluntary cooperation of all, and "while we are true to those principles, to each other and to our King, no enemy can prevail against us."

Mr. Raney spoke of Canada's growth to nationhood, suggesting a reconstitution of the judicial committee of the privy council with jurisdiction to consider questions arising between the different

council with jurisdiction to consider questions arising between the different nations represented.

The minister of justice presided.

Feeling Tribute.

Lord Cave opened with a feeling tribute to the part which Canada had played in the war, making the sense of brotherhood deeper and more vibrant. He gave a review of the war emergency legislation in Great Britain and of the great part which members of the bench and bar had played.

"You," Lord Cave remarked in passing, "were prompt in adopting the compulsion of military service which we adopted just in time and without which the war would have been lost."

Lord Cave was of the opinion that the British Government had made an error at the commencement of the war, in adopting the declaration of London as a guide for contraband.

"In saying this," Lord Cave added, "I do not intend for a minute to depreciate the value of the established rules of international law, or of well-considered agreements operating in war time. England kept her agreements and observed all the rules by which she was bound. Even Germany kept some of them; and there was no beligerent nation which did not pay at least a verbal romage to the principles which suffered in this war a partial eclipse; but I still think they were of service."

Lord Cave referred to the effect of the war upon the constitutional relations between the old country and the dominions.

It may be that the problem has been solved quietly and almost unconsciously (as our habit is) by the establishment of the imperial war cabinet as an effective council of the empire. That ussembly of the leading statesmen of the self-governing parts of the empire, first called together in 1917 for the purpose of discussing the conduct of the war and some of the higher issues of imperial policy, proved to be of so much service both to its members and to the countries concerned that it was unanimously determined at the instance of the British prime minister to keep it in being.

THE RAILWAY BURDEN.

[Halifax Chronicle.]
Interesting facts about the high cost of railroading are given by the Railway Age. A locomotive, which in 1914 cost \$27,870, now costs \$75,750, and on money borrowed to make the purchase 7½ per cent is paid, against 5 per cent. To meet the interest charge on the locomotive, \$5,681 per annum is now necessary, instead of \$1,394, an increase of

310 per cent.

An average box car in 1914 cost about \$1,000; it now costs about \$3,000. Thus a car adds \$225 to a railroad's fixed charges, an increase of 350 per cent.

Bridges, plates, rails, ties and ballast are all up in proportion. To build a mile of side track takes more than double what it did in 1915. The genera increase in prices makes a heavier demand for freight lost or damaged in transit. A car of Washington apples, for example, is worth \$2,300, instead of \$900, while the freight charges are up but 25 per cent from the rate of 1909. 

Horticultural Grounds.

Despite its low iron content, infants up to one year can thrive on milk, because, normally, they have at birth enough iron stored in their bodies to last almost a year. Another very important constituent of milk is its vitamines. These are present in some foods, but not in others. In some they are destroyed by cooking or storing. There are two kinds of vitamines, known as Fat Soluble A and Water Soluble B. Milk possesses both. It is the chief source of Fat Soluble A. and is a most important source of Water Soluble B. 




