Schwab, the alleged wrecker of the United States Shipbuilding Company, threw up his hands in a hearing before United States Circuit Judge Kirkpot-riek in Newark Wednesday. His coun-sel, William D. Guthrie, broke away completely from the firm stand he had maintained. He admitted the insolvency of the shipbuilding company and withdrew his opposition to the appointment of a permanent receiver. ### FUR SMUGGLING SCHEME EXPOSED

Concerned in the Case—Big Seizure in New York.

New York, Jan. 15. — The World this morning, says: Several prominent persons in New York have petitioned the authorities in Washington to permit them to pay duty upon lot of smuggled furs and retain pos-session of the goods. Government of-ficials have a store of costly furs and so far have declined to consider them as anything other than confiscated

Recently the arrest of a man Tupper Lake, in the Adirondacks, who was caught transferring furs from a local express car to a car on the New York Central, bound for this city, put the Government into possession of facts on which a large number of these furs were made here. A Montreal fur house had been selling furs to New Yorkers to be delivered, duties paid. The transactions were all made in Montreal, the furs being bought there by persons traveling. The purchasers were told that the house had a large trade in New York and made its deliveries here and that the prices askliveries here and that the prices ask-ed included all delivery charges. Special treasury agents went to the houses of many New Yorkers in the holiday season and seized furs that had been delivered without the formality of paying duty. The persons who

#### PARTIES TAMOUS FOR ITS FLOWERS

The Wonderful Chrysanthemums Grown There

WERE SEEN AT ROYAL PARTY

Perfect Blossoms Are Formed by Wizard Gardeners.

Tokio, Dec. 14.-I read in a Washngton newspaper a year ago that Secretary Wilson had opened the finest exhibit of chrysanthemums ever seen there, in the greenhouses of the department of agriculture. Furthermore, the prize flower measured fourteen inches. I telephoned for an automobile and went to see it at once. There was a greenhouse full of potted chrysanthemums-easy enough to grow them that way and place them effec tively—and there were many superb blossoms. But what a ragged, disor-derly, uneven lot of chrysanthemums they were, to be sure! The flowers on one plant grew at every height, higgledy piggledly on the parent stem Some were tall, some were short. They branched out wildly and drooped Some were buds, some blossoms, overblown, faded flowers, and the leaves were ragged and uneven, even dusty, and many all dead brown or dead in patches. Search failed to reveal anything approaching fourteen inches in diameter, and the gardener

was hunted up. "Here it is, now," and he pointed to the big "brocade banner" flower, re-curved red petals, lined with yellow. "But that is not more than seven

said, amazed. "O, yes, it's fourteen inches all right. We measure right up over the top, over the biggest part of the flower"in reality the semi-circumference. At the royal garden party, already referred to in a previous letter, there was a tent full of grafted chrysanthemum plants, huge bouquet bushes, with three, four, five and six different varieties of blossoms, all in full flower on the one parent stem. A great silk tent held three plants, that were really trees, each tree bearing more than 1,100 yellow chrysanthemums of the ordinary garden variety, their sharp petals and blossoms not more than two inches in diameter—exactly the chrysanthemum that the Empress Dowager had sent as gifts not a fortnight before to the Pekin legations.

Once before, I had seen plants of 1.-200 flowers, and one year the wizard gardener attained 1,500 flowers. Four Americans who had tried to tone down enthusiasm by telling that they had seen them larger in New York, did not see the grafted bushes, the 1,100 flower arrangements, nor yet the teninch flowers erect on the single stalk. 

PNEUMONIA AT TORONTO

Said To Be On Increase-Thirty-six Deaths in December.

Toronto, Jan. 15. - Pneumonia is on the increase in Toronto. The increase in pneumonia is put down by Dr. Sheard to the coming of an extremely cold spell just after a period of com-paratively soft weather. In New York he believes the pneumonia epidemic is due to the sudden changes in the weather and the raw sea winds. Conditions in Toronto and conditions in New York are different. The law, for instance, now being enforced in New York for the cleaning of the side-walks from snow and slush would be of no benefit in Toronto, for the reason that there is a solid layer of snow here. whereas in New York a snowfall never means anything but slushy streets.
The city's pneumonia records shows that the hold of the disease is stronger this month than it was last. In December there were 36 deaths, an increase of only four over December of 1902, but this month there have already been 25 cases. The number of deaths is a fraction only to the total number of cases which do not terninate fatally.


