

The beef trust has given another lift to meat prices in the United States, and a howl has gone up from one end of the country to the other. In New York the retail price of sirloin steak has advanced to 24 cents per pound, porterhouse steak to 28 cents, prime ribs of beef to 24 cents, pork to 17 cents and mutton to 16 cents. These increases have come right on top of the judgment of the United States Supreme Court, declaring the packers' combine to be in violation of the anti-trust laws. They have come at the very moment that the federal authorities are investigating the trust's methods, and taking criminal proceedings against it in the courts of Illinois. The other day federal officers seized six trunks of books believed to contain records of trust transactions. Eight heads of departments in the big packing concerns who were wanted to give evidence before the federal grand jury disappeared and could not be served with subpoenas. 

### The Fossilized Head of Prehistoric Animal Just Discovered.

A curious relic of bygone times is now in the possession of Mr. Henry Taylor, Ridout street, South London. It is a stone or fossilized head of some large prehistoric animal that lived during the tertiary period in North America. It was found in the drift near the town of Ingersoll, by parties who saw it protruding from the Thames River embankment.

For a fossil of so ancient a date it is well preserved. One side of the head is especially well marked, the eye, ear and nostril being quite distinct. There is a strong resemblance between the head and that of a horse, and as the earliest of the horse tribe (Orohippus) is found in this age, it may possibly belong to this species. It is remarkable that these horses had four toes instead of one only, like the modern Mr. Taylor will have photographs of

the specimen sent to some of the best-known naturalists and the specimen may in this way find a resting-place upon a shelf in some Canadian museum. It is to be regretted that London has no place provided for the reception of such relies, which are frequently found in this vicinity.

The transmission routes are as follows: From the power site to Brantford via Hamilton thence to Ingersoll, Woodstock, London and St. Thomas. with branch lines from Brantford to Galt, Preston, Berlin and Stratford: Preston to Guelph via Hespeler; and from Hamilton to Toronto. A Power Canal.
