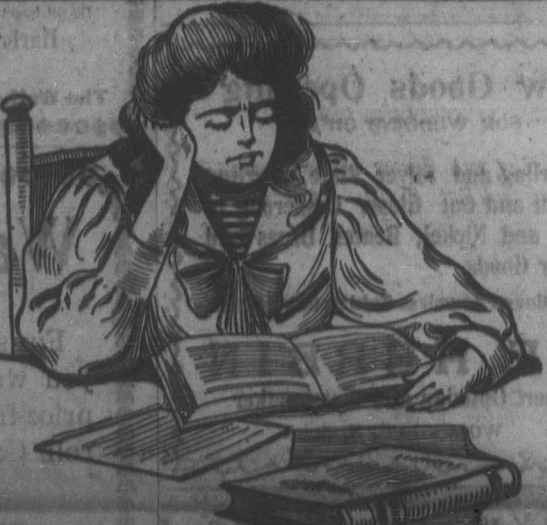

Editorial Notes.

The Chinese Republic.

The announcement that Great Britain is ready to recognize the new Chinese Republic as soon as the latter agrees to maintain existing treaties, is good news. The Chinese, all things considered, have been behaving very well under the new regime. Their behavior has been vastly better than that of Mexico, which had the audacity to refuse them recognition a few months ago when Mexico herself was in the throes of an intermitting peace.

China will, one day, be a very desirable ally for some Power. It that Power, as is likely, should be Japan, the yellow peril will be less illusory than it is now. The vast resources of the country and the integrity of the people should make China the predominant partner in this alliance. The recognition of the Republic is merely logical after it has become a further debtor to Europe for a considerable sum. If the money borrowed is to be used to the best ends, the Chinese must be given every kind of encouragement. Prosperity will do more than anything else to make the new government stable, and the more Britain helps towards it, the sater will be her own interests in India and elsewhere in the East.

Wolfville's Grand Old Man.

The recent commencement exercises in connection with Acadia College were marked by one event, which will render them memorable to a large number of the citizens of Wolfville as well as to the members of the University. We refer to the retirement of Dr. Jones from the chair of Classics which he has held for considerably over half a century. Graduating from Acadia in 1860, Dr. Jones has since then remained uninterruptedly a member of the College faculty. He has served, if we are not mistaken, under five presidents, Drs. Cramp, Sawyer, Trotter, Hutchinson and Catten, and has seen scores of professors come and go. Generation after generation of students, including the last two presidents and seven professors have passed through his hands, totaling it is likely considerably over a thousand. He has seen the College grow from a membership of thirty, and with a faculty of four professors, to its present membership of nearly two hundred and fifty and a faculty numbering about twenty. He has also seen every College building go up, some of which were rebuilt, the majority however being entirely new. During all these years and through all these changes Dr. Jones has pursued the even tenor of his way, esteemed by his conferees, beloved and honored by his pupils, and accorded the full and ungrudging support of the authorities. A record like this would be hard to beat, if indeed it is surpassed in the college annals of this continent. For the good doctor has shown both as an admirable teacher, who dug deep and laid enduring foundations, and as a man of singularly winning and attractive personality that he possesses not only the art of imparting his great classical knowledge, but also of gaining the confidence and affection of those who sat under him. It is hardly too much to say that every one of his students became his personal friend. College students, we know, are a critical race, probably the most ruthless and merciless in existence, to them little is sacred. With their youthful confidence in their own untiring powers they set up standards which very few ever reach, and by which they judge their preceptors and instructors. It was always and everywhere so, and probably always will be. But for Dr. Jones there was always a kindly and respectful word. The most blatant and irrepressible to whom professors are "natural enemies," and all outward and visible signs of an authority symbol of tyranny, made an exception in favor of the Doctor. He was a good sort anyway and what he said went. Writing as an outsider and a looker on and as one on friendly, sometimes intimate terms, with many of the students of Acadia, I can bear reliable witness to the singularly warm personal regard, in which the Doctor was held by the great body of the undergraduates. To many of the students of this generation Acadia will hardly seem the same without him and to the older graduates his withdrawal will mean the ending of one very strong link that has bound them to their Alma Mater. As a citizen of Wolfville for considerable over half a century Dr. Jones has won the esteem and affection of all his fellow citizens of whatever age or condition. Every man, woman and child in Wolfville, who enjoys the privilege of his personal acquaintance, has something kind and appreciative to say of Dr. Jones. The hearty good wishes of the citizens of Wolfville will follow Dr. Jones into his well earned retirement. Long may he and his amiable partner be spared to enjoy the pleasures of a green old age. The Doctor, we understand, is to retain his position as an honorary professor. He will, we presume, therefore remain a member of the faculty, and it is to be hoped, occasionally, give the College the benefit of his wide experience, shrewd well balanced judgement and massive learning. One Hundredth Anniversary.

Sunday, June 1st, was the 100th anniversary of the naval battle, off Boston, between the American Frigate Chesapeake and the British Frigate Swanton. The engagement lasted but fifteen minutes, and during that time 150 of the American frigate's crew were laid low by the tremendous broadsides of the Swanton. The British frigate's list of wounded numbered 15. With the British colors flying above the Stars and Stripes, the vessels set sail for Halifax, arriving there the following Sunday. Judge Haliburton, famous as "Sam Slick," then a youth of seventeen, boarded the Chesapeake as the two battered ships sailed into Halifax. "The deck," he wrote, "had not been cleaned, and the coils and folds of rope were steeped in gore as if in a slaughter house. Pieces of skin with pendant hair were adhering to the sides of the ships and in one place I noticed portions of fingers protruding as if thrust through the outer walls of the frigate."

Only the prompt action of a woman, says the Montreal Witness, saved the international express from Halifax, with its heavy load of people en route to the Provincial assembly at Toronto from certain wreck between Halifax and Moncton. The train was running nearly on time, but a washout occurred near the place accident, and a woman warned the general railway official, who held up the train. As a result, when Little Miss was reached, the train was seven hours late, a circumstance very inconvenient, but very small in view of the 100th anniversary of the battle.
