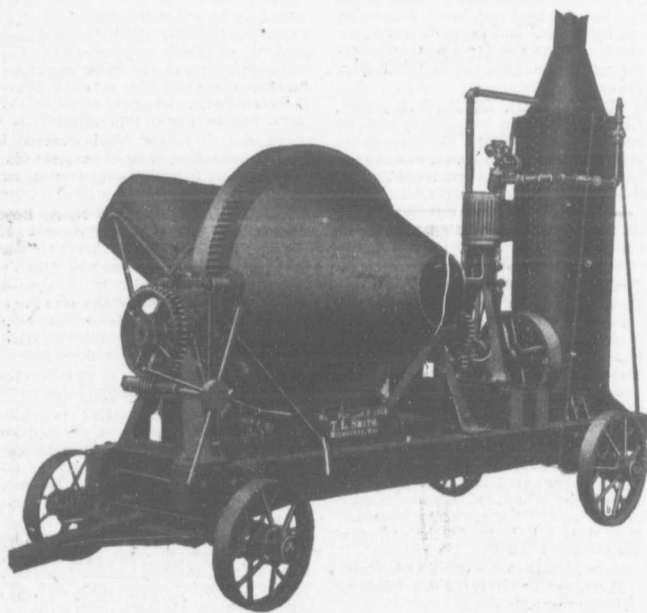

FORT FRANCES, ONT.—The loss by the recent fire will probably exceed \$200,000, but most of the establishments will be rebuilt. Paul & Wilson intend building on Mowat street and Frailey & Breckon on Portage ave. L. Christie has had plans prepared for a two-storey block corner Church and Mowat streets, cost \$16,000. William Bishop will likely build on his old site. A. E. Blow will build a residence on Victoria ave.

CALGARY, N.W.T.—The J. I. Case Threshing Machine Co. have purchased property on Tenth ave. on which they will erect a three-storey brick and stone warehouse 250 x 88 feet.—The Calgary Colonization Co., who have awarded contracts for ten large grain elevators between Edmonton and Macleod, intend building ten others of equal size this fall. They are also figuring on the erection of a large mill ng plant here.

STRATFORD, ONT.—A deputation representing the County Councils of Wellington, Perth, Oxford, Waterloo and Brant last week requested the Ontario Government to aid them in building a sanitarium for consumptives.—The City Council will submit a by-law to the ratepayers on July 26th to guarantee the bonds of the Dominion Tread Co. to the extent of \$30,000, for which they agree to erect a brick factory costing \$45,000.

FORT WILLIAM, ONT.—The Baptist congregation have decided to procure plans for a \$10,000 church to be built on corner of Donald and Archibald streets.—John Galt, C. E., Toronto, has submitted his report on a water supply, which he estimates will cost \$215,000, made up as follows: Loch Lomond and tunnel, \$120,000; 16-inch supply main, \$17,000; compensating steel storage tank, \$16,000; 18-inch cast iron main, \$48,000; River crossing, \$14,000.
