President and Ministers of Germany Said to be Merely Puppets in Control of Military Caste Which is Organizing New Armies

SIGN ECICTS AS THEY ARE REQUESTED

(Special to The Journal)

London, March 17 .- Special despatches from Berlin say that the suppression of the recent Spartacan outbreak there has shown that a military and monarchist reaction is growing and overshadowing the new government The Berlin correspondent of the Mail, who on February 27th, sent a despatch outlining the plans for the monarchist uprising in Germany, has arrived in London, having left Berlin on March 14th after a residence there of three months. He reiterates the statements made in his despatch saying that President Ebert, Chancellor Scheidemann and Minister of War Noske are merely puppets. He declares that for the purpose of retaining power they have allowed the members of Military Caste to reappear as organizers of the New Republican armies. "These men are the real governors of Germany" he say's "They make the edicts and Chancellor Scheidemann and his colleagues willingly sign them."







LEGISLATURE PASSES THE

PREMIER HEARST MAKES STRONG PLEA SAYING HE LOST MANY PERSONAL AND POLITICAL FRIENDS OVER THE ONTARIO

After a lengthy debate the Government's bill to submit to the electors referendum on the temperance issue passed its third reading at midnight. The Prime Minister made a carefully prepared statement on the second reading of the bill in which he elucidated the four questions which are being referred to the people. He justified the action of the Legislature in adopting the Ontario Temperance Act, quoted the distillers to say that it was a good measure, and declared that on the contrary of being confusing, the ballot was a most simple one. While the Government had been strongly censured for the stand it had taken, had he the three last years to live over again he would have followed the same course.

Premier Hearst, when speaking to the bill, declared with considerable feeling that he had lost many personal and political friends over the Ontario Temperance Act. He said, however, that he did not regret what he had done in that connection, had no apologies to make, and would, if he had to live over again the past three years, pursue the same course.

The Liberal Leader, Mr. Proudfoot, had some strong criticsm of the Covernment for its method of drafting the bill. When the Government passed the Ontario Temperance Act the Opposition co-operated with it, but when the Prime Minister and his colleagues drafted the referendum bill they did not consult the Liberals at all. The Prime Minister said he wanted the bill passed unanimously; if objections were not to be raised, it was only proper the Government should have taken those on the opposite side

Few of the members took part in the debate on the second reading, but when it reached the committee stage the debate was participated in by a larger number, various minor suggestions and criticisms being voiced. Mr. H. Hartley Dewart, K.C., urged that the date for the taking of the referendum be fixed so as to remove any possibility of an election being held at the same time to conflict with it. DOWN WITH "DAVY" JONES CONDEMNED MURDERER MAKES GOOD HIS ESCAPE FROM JAIL

FRANK McCULLOUGH SAWED BARS OF DEATH CELL WINDOW AT TORONTO JAIL AND GAINS LIBERTY-WRITES LETTER TO THE PRESS SAYING HE DRUGGED THE GUARD, REWARD OFFERED FOR HIS CAPTURE

Toronto, April 17th.-With sixteen days more to live, Franch McCullough, condemned to hang for the murder of Acting Detective Frank Williams, drugged the death-watch, sawed through the iron bars on his window, and escaped in the open world some time between 10 o'clock Tuesday night and 5 o'clock Wednesday morning. The condemned man had a good start and nothing has yet been learned of his movements. A reward of \$1,000 for any information leading to his capture is offered by the Attorney-General's

Frank Currell, a returned soldier, who was the acting death-watch at the time, has been placed under arrest, and appeared in the Police Court yesterday to answer to the charge of aiding and abetting a prisoner to escape from the jail. He was remanded for eight days.

The escape of the condemned man was evidently premeditated, and every detail fully planned. The iron bars on the window of the death cell were one inch and a quarter in diameter, and two had been sawn through. To do this would have taken the prisoner two hours, sawing continuously, but from the rust marks on the bars and shreds of chewing gum the officials at the jail are of the opinion that the sawing had been done some time

Writes Letter to Newspapers In a letter written to the press McCullough described the way in which he made his escape. He declares that he obtained the drug from a friend, who had had himself sentenced to jail for the purpose. The saw had been pulled

in on a rope from the outside through the iron bars. After sawing the bars he had but to pull himself through the small opening, drop to a brick lean-to, crawl along the jail wall to the north and peace situation, Premier Lloyd George crop some sixteen feet to freedem outside the jail property.





Munich again is completely in the ands of the Communists, according to the Tageblatt, but troops loyal to the government have received reinorcements and are using artillery against the Communist stronghold in he Central Railway station.

Street fighting in the Bavarian captal is increasing. Many civilians have been killed or wounded.

Reinforcements for the loyal troops are being hurried to Munich from varous parts of Bavaria.

The Communist force in Munich, the newspaper adds, consists of parts of the garrison, red guards and unemploy ed. The Governmena forces are de clared to be having a hard batle with

THhe Government has declined to force a food blockade against Munch, owing to the distress it would cause in the city.





SLIGHT INCREASE IN RATES EFFECTIVE FIRST MAY

Wel find that for display, both local and foreign, the rates range considerably higher than those which have been charged by The Journal. An announgement will be made later as to the rates that will go into effect but they will not amount to enough to any one advertiser to be worth any objection from him, we feel certain, but a little advance here and there, distributed over hundreds of users in a year, will make the road a little easier to travel

Bringing Our Soldiers' Dependents to Canada

IN England, there is a colony of Canadian women who went overseas in order to be near their husbands. There are also in England and France many women who married Canadian soldiers and have never. seen Canada.

It is one of the duties that Canada has incurred through the war to bring back these dependents of our soldiers with all speed, and to help establish their home life.

Up till the time the Armistice was signed, some 22,000 women and children were returned. There still remain about 50,000 to be brought back.

These 50,000 soldiers' dependents will be returned to Canada at the public expense. Those who have already arrived in Canada since November 11th, 1918, will have their ocean and railway fare refunded by the Government.

The facilities for transporting soldiers and their dependents are limited to about 30,000 monthly. Therefore, women and children will be returned to Canada at the rate of about 5,000 to 7,000 each month. Many of the women will be accompanied by their husbands. On every boat carrying 200 or more unaccompanied women there is a Y.W.C.A. secretary.

At the Ports.

To these 50,000 returning women and children every care is being given. Until they reach the shores of Canada they are in charge of the Overseas Militia Department.

At HALIFAX they are welcomed by the Women's Reception Committee, composed of women who have been engaged in war activities. This committee has been organized for nearly two years and has been doing splendid work.

At ST. JOHN there is also a committee representing all the organizations interested. This committee, although more recently formed, is giving excellent service. The National Y.W.C.A. has assigned two secretaries for work at this port. On each of these Committees there is

a trained nurse to give necessary attendance.

At the ports the organizations meet every boat. Locate the women's luggage. Take charge of the babies. Bring the women to a cosy rest room. Here cots and baths are provided for the children. Hot lunch can be secured. Overnight accommodation is arranged.

Women who are too sick to proceed on their journey are taken to the local Women who are without hospitals.

money receive assistance from the Patriotic Fund; are provided with lunch baskets and money to buy meals on the

.These organizations also secure the railroad tickets for the women, get their money changed, give them such information as they need. The workers accompany the women to the train.

The Repatriation Committee have a nurse, trained in social work, lent by the Victorian Order of Nurses to act as the committee's representative at each port.

On the Train.

On each train carrying unaccompanied women and children there is a Red Cross' nurse, experienced in social service who, has been enrolled by the Canadian Association of Graduate Nurses. This nurse carries with her first aid supplies and an emergency fund of money furnished by the Red Cross Society.

Telegrams are sent ahead to the local branch of the Patriotic Fund and to the local Reception Committees giving the number who will arrive.

On Arrival.

The Rotary Clubs of Canada have undertaken to provide motor cars to take the women and children from the station to their homes.

The Patriotic Fund have undertaken to provide temporary accommodation and other necessary assistance at cities and towns en route and at points of destination.


The main function of this nation-wide organization is to care for soldiers' dependents. It is therefore fitting that they should be responsible for arrangements for all the returning women and children.

Many other well-known organizations have been doing admirable work-meeting trains, providing rest-rooms, canteens and hostels and generally caring for the women and children. It is important that these organizations continue this work and co-operate as closely as possible with the Patriotic Fund.

HOT BEDS AND COLD FRAMES.

By the use of hotbeds and cold framesh plants, can be grown through their earlier stag I; out of doors even before the growing season has arrived. By the use of these, garden crops can be secured much carlier in the season than if seeding is delayed until the soil is warmed up in the open garden. Such vegetables as pepp:14s, egg plant, melons, etc., can be so hastened in the spring as to ensure their maturing before the frost period arrives in many partso of Canada where these crops are not usually grown. Such crops as radish, letuce, spinach, and other vegetables can be made to reach a marketable size relatively early in the sum-

While hotbeds, as the term signifies, are heated with fermenting manura, the cold frame depends upon the sun shining through the glass sash to warm up the toil and start growth. The cold frame, for that reason, is more easily dopted, although it cannot be used to o great an advantage.

This information is taken from pamphlet No. 19 of the Dominion Experimental Farms, writen by Mr. W. T. Maconu, Dominion Horticulturist, and available at the Publications Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa. The method of constructing hotbeds and cold frames, as well as the system of using them, are fully described in this publication.

HANDLING TOMATO CROP.

As the tomato is a tender plant it is not set out until danger of frost is over, the time ranging from the middle of May in the warmer sections to the first week in June where frost comes laeer. Tomaeoes should be planted four or five feet apart dach way for field culture.

As cut-worms are often troublesome about the time the plants are set ont. poisoned bran in the proprotion of one pound Paris green thoroughly mixed with 50 pounds morstened and sweeten ed bran, should be at once scattered onthe surface soil about the plants. The cut-worms will eat this and die.

After planting, the chief work is cultivation, which should be done both ways in the plantation. Some hoeing will also be necessary. The surface soil should be kept loose from the day the plants are sit out until they meet one another._W. T. Macoum, Dominion Experimental Farm.

A Wonderful Fishing Region



Perry Creek Lake, Doyle's Lake, and Premier Lake. Perhaps the favorite rendezvous is Premier Lake. This lake is situated about thirty-eight miles from Cranbrook. It is three and a half miles long and one mile wide. Mountains surround it on every side, and it is very deep. There is no visible outlet for the waters. Springs that rise adjacent to the lake and

streams from the mountain sides gush to rest in its placid bed. On August 12th, 1915, the Game Conservation Board of the Eastern District of British Columbia furnish-ed Premier Lake, along the Kooteney Central Railway, a branch of the C. P. R., with 10,000 Kamloops trout fry, each one then being about three quarters of an inch long. A prophecy was made that the fry within four years would develop into fish weighing between twelve and thirty pounds. The accompanying illustration shows some of the fish caught when three years old.

Realizing the sporting possibilities of the Cranbrook region some of the residents met in Cranbrook on No-vember 7th, 1917, and formed the


