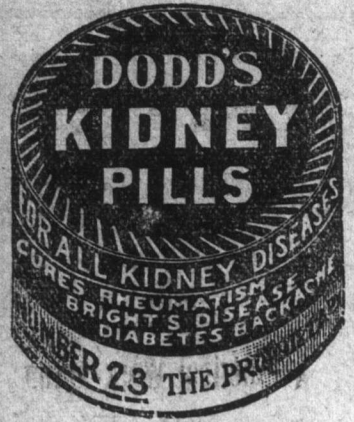

A Federal Parliament.

While parliamentarians, the press and people at home, are discussing the place, powers and make-up of the House of Lords, we notice that Capt. Malcolm Kinaird Smith considers it a reasonable time to consider the establishment of a Federal Parliament of the Empire on the basis of the population of the white inhabitants in the Empire Review for the current month he gives publicity to his views on this subject. The grounds on which he considers the time opportune are the following:—

1. That it is impossible for Great Britain alone, without substantial and permanent help from the self-governing overseas Dominions to maintain the two power standard in naval armaments laid down as essential to the safety of the Empire.
2. That it is unreasonable to expect from these overseas Dominions any large voluntary contributions, either in ships or money, unless they receive representation in the councils of the Empire and participate in the control of the whole Imperial navy.
3. That a policy of Dominion navies under local control will not give the most effective help in proportion to their cost, even though placed in time of war at the disposal of the Imperial authorities. (This argument does not apply to land forces.)
4. That the time has now come when the self-governing overseas Dominions, thanks to their rapid growth in wealth, population and world influence, may reasonably expect to participate in the management and control of Imperial affairs.
5. That some reform in the constitution of the House of Lords is inevitable.
6. That the necessity is rapidly increasing for the separation of imperial from domestic questions in Great Britain, where acute antagonism over domestic questions issues too often prejudices sound national judgement on Imperial matters.
7. That with the creation of a Federal parliament it may be possible to find a final solution of the problem of Ireland and her government.
8. That with South Africa union an accomplished fact, it is now possible to include her in any scheme of Imperial Federation.

Festival of Empire.

A meeting of the general committee of the Festival of Empire was held last night in the Board of Trade Room. There was a good attendance. Mr. Outebridge was in the chair. The hon. secretary, Mr. Gosling, acquainted the committee with the contents of the correspondence he had recently received. The reports of the sub-committee showed that most of the exhibits were ready for shipment. The mineral exhibits may be sent today by the S. S. Ameriana. Certain skins and heads which are to be dressed and mounted will also be sent today. The last shipment of exhibits will probably be sent by the Uluda. Mr. James Howley who will have general charge of the Newfoundland Court at the Crystal Palace will be leaving next week. There will be a very good exhibition of trophies, representing Newfoundland sport, including sporting camp, mineral and forest resources, including a logging camp, and working pulp and paper models, fishery operation with a model of a fishing village, pictures, moving and still, and photos of life and scenes in Newfoundland, together with a collection of rare books relating to Newfoundland, making altogether an excellent showing of the life and resources of the Oldest Colony.

Spared by the Enemy.

A Dramatic Incident in the Career of General de Gallifet.
It was on that fatal day, Sept. 1, 1870, that General de Gallifet distinguished himself by commanding the cavalry charges intended to clear the elevation at Illy, with the view of opening a passage toward Floing, where it was hoped the army might retreat. The first charge overthrew the Eighty-third regiment of the Prussians and penetrated among the German troops, but the latter formed again rapidly after the retirement of French cavalry.
General Ducrot when asked if they could renew the charge with what remained of the light cavalry and hussars, and then Gallifet answered in the words that have become historic, "As often as you wish, general, as long as a man remains!" The second charge was not so successful as the first. Only a few men, with their general at their head, succeeded in penetrating the first ranks of the enemy. It is known that the King of Prussia, who was watching the battle from the top of the hill of Marfee, exclaimed with admiration, "Oh, les braves gens!"
Just at this moment an astonishing event occurred in the midst of the battle. As Gallifet was returning with a few survivors, their horses for the most part wounded or foundered, he passed before the Nassau regiment. The Prussian officers ordered their men to cease fire an even stunk up some of their guns. The French saluted and shouted, "Vive l'empereur!" and the German officers acknowledged the salute, some of them applauding.—Westminster Gazette.

Gets Beresford Estate.

Negro Woman Made Rich Through Compromise of Mexican Claim.
Galveston, Texas, April 2.—Following the sale of part of the estate of the late Lord Delaval Beresford comes the report that the negro woman who said she was his common law wife has received \$500,000 and about 100,000 acres of land in Durango in a settlement of her claim. About 20,000 acres are under cultivation. She owns 1,000 head of cattle.
Lord Delaval Beresford was killed in a railroad accident four years ago in Canada. Following a trip to England a year ago, when the woman attempted to make a settlement of the estate with the brother of the man she said was her husband, Lord Charles Beresford of the British Navy, the latter came to Mexico several months ago and entered suit to oust the woman from the estate. She proved to the court that Lord Delaval Beresford had introduced her as Mrs. Beresford.
The part of the estate sold to Michigan men was the Ojitos ranch near Casa Grandes, and the price authorized by the court was \$200,000 in American gold.
A WOMAN SENTENCED.—Yesterday Mr. Hutchings, Dept. Minister of Justice, had the following wife from the magistrate at Burn:—
Ellen Harre, convicted to-day of attempting to obtain money under false pretences, was sentenced to two months imprisonment.

NAVAL RESERVISTS GO ON STRIKE.

MARSEILLES, April 12.
The strike of the Naval Reservists which started yesterday has taken on new life. All the city is now occupied by the troops. The sympathetic strike of the tramway employees gave considerable trouble to-day, but they have decided to resume work to-morrow. The members of the store Clerks' Union also inaugurated a sympathetic strike, and this will be continued, it is announced, until the Reservists secure satisfaction. The bakers will begin a strike to-morrow, and the Prefect of Marseilles has called on the military bakers to replace them. During the course of the afternoon the strikers in an attempt to prevent the cars from running came into collision with the police and many were hurt on both sides.

WHITNEY FOR THE ARCTIC AGAIN.

NEW YORK, April 12.
Another expedition to the Arctic during which he expects to stop at Etah to recover the instruments of Dr. F. A. Cook, is being planned for this summer by Harry Whitney of New Haven, the first white man encountered by Cook on his return from the north, and who first heard Cook's assertion that he (Cook) had reached the North Pole. Paul Rainey, known as a horseman and yachtsman, will accompany Whitney. Negotiations commenced to-day to charter a suitable vessel, and it is expected the expedition will leave St. John's, Nfld. in July. Overtures are said to have been made to Capt. Samuel Bartlett, master of the schooner Jeanie, sent to the Arctic last year to carry relief to Commander Peary, to command the vessel. The principal object of the trip will be to obtain specimens of big game for museums and parks, and the recovery of Dr. Cook's instruments will be but incidental. Whitney is said to feel that since he left them at Etah it is incumbent upon him to see that they are brought back and delivered.

Efforts are being made to obtain other films of interest, such as the marching of the massed brigades, salmon fishing, etc.

No definite answer has yet been given as to who will have charge of it, although quite a number of applications are in, too many in fact.

His Lordship Bishop Cameron Passes Away.

This morning the community was shocked as the news went round that His Lordship Bishop Cameron had passed away. It was known that, for some days past, he was not in his usual health, but no one suspected that the end was so near. Last evening, however, a sudden change for the worse came on; high fever set in; and a few hours afterwards, at half-past ten o'clock, he calmly breathed his last.

His Lordship was born at South River on February 16, 1826. Having received his early training in his native district and at the famous Grammar School at St. Andrew's, he was sent by Bishop McKinnon to the College of the Propaganda, which he entered on November 12, 1844. He studied in that famous seat of learning for ten years with distinguished success. He received Holy Orders on July 26, 1853. The esteem in which he was held is evidenced by the fact that he was the first prefect in the College at the time and that he was ordained before his classmates to take charge of the students during vacation that year. He arrived home, in September, 1854; and, a few weeks afterwards, we find him at the head of the new college at Arichat. The following year that college was transferred to Antigonish, and Dr. Cameron became its first president there. In fact, he was appointed parish priest of Antigonish and West River in June, 1855, and acted, at the same time, in the capacity of rector of the new institution, which after its transference was known, as it has been ever since, as the College of St. Francis Xavier. The institution was at that time a scribbled also, and Dr. Cameron, in addition to his other onerous duties, taught the ecclesiastical dogma and scripture for two hours each day. In 1863, he was appointed parish priest of Arichat, and laboured there as such until 1870, when he was summoned to Rome, which he had visited five years previously, and consecrated Bishop in the chapel of the Propaganda by Cardinal Cullen on the 22nd of May that year. 1870 was the year of the Vatican Council, and so Bishop McKinnon was in Rome also; but, owing to ill-health he set out for home before the Council was over, leaving the newly consecrated Bishop in his stead. Soon, however, the Council closed on account of the Franco-Prussian war, but Bishop Cameron did not leave the Eternal City before he witnessed its capture by the hordes of Victor Emanuel. In 1877, he was appointed administrator of the diocese, but continued to live in Arichat until 1880, when he transferred his residence to Antigonish.

The deceased prelate was a great churchman, and in his palmy days, had few equals. His prestige at the propoganda, as a student, was an early index to his merit; and, in after years no bishop in Canada enjoyed more fully than he the respect and confidence of the Holy See. Of that we have ample evidence during the long and glorious reign of his episcopate. On two occasions he was sent beyond the limits of his native province to adjust quarrels that arose in Church administration. The first charge of this nature was imposed upon him the very first year after that of his ordination, and the second in 1885, when he was sent to Quebec, sine mora to report on difficulties that unfortunately disturbed the peace of the Diocese of Three Rivers. On each occasion complete success crowned his mediation showing him to have been a prelate of rare tact and prudence, and well worthy of the confidence reposed in him. In fact, he has always been known, on all sides, as a man of superior mould. Endowed by nature with a strong and vigorous mind, he won his first laurels at the Urban College, and ever after, whether he acted in the capacity of college rector or professor, parish priest or bishop, he commanded the highest respect, and even admiration. Nor was this standing determined by his learning and ability alone, but hand in hand with scholarship went a sterling character, a strong personality, lofty ideals, and a frank and generous disposition, coupled with piety, humility and charity worthy of his exalted position—all of which stamped him as a figure, in many respects, unique in this country.—The Casket, April 7, 1910.

Colleges Grovel in Dust

To Gain Carnegie Foundation Grant, Says Chancellor Day. Poughkeepsie, N. Y., April 5.—At the closing session of the New York Methodist Episcopal Conference, Chancellor Jas. R. Appropriate anecdotes were here and there related by Mr. Goodland, the entertainment. Mr. Grey operated the lantern slides. A pleasing innovation and one that met with the warm approval of the audience was the singing of the "Green Half-Door" by Miss K. Murphy. The poem is a composition of the late Mr. St. George, and although it has been floating around for a quarter of a century it had never been sung before. Miss Murphy was encored vociferously and repeated the last verse. Miss Clara Smith accompanied her on the piano in perfect tune and time. No doubt the "Green Half-Door" will become a popular song in the future, and to Mr. Goodland belongs the credit of unearthing it. At the conclusion a vote of thanks proposed by Mr. A. H. Martin and seconded by Mr. Maunder was carried by acclamation. We understand that Mr. Goodland has been asked to repeat the lecture.

The beauty of expression and perfection of finish with which he endows every work of the pianoforte poet stamps him as a fearless exponent of the ultra-refined romantic school. The delicacy of his tone in the passages is delicious to the ear, while the grace and charm with which he invests the dainty sprays of ornamental grace notes cannot be set down in words."
