Given a Raise in Wages

Marine engineers throughout Nova Scotia, have received the desired increase from ten to fifteen per cent. Steamship owners throughout the province, employing one hundred and fifty skilled mechanics, acceded to the demands of the National Association of Marine Engineers, prepared last March, and submitted to the steamship interests in April, with notice that they must go into effect the first of June. This request for increased wages was made collectively was applicable to about twenty-five steamers plying in Canadian trade

Notable among those coming to an amicable settlement were the owners of the Yarmouth-Boston Steamship Company, who granted an increase of thirty-three and a third per cent.. and the Dominion Coal Company's entire Black Diamond and collier fleet. 




