





The Race for Constantinople

Between British and Russians in the Balkans.

Former in the Dobrudia, Latter On the Struma, Making Drive.-Co-operation On Both Bulgarian Fronts-Roumanians Apparently Held Up, But the Allies in Macedonia Making

London, Oct. 7.—Constantinople is likely to be the first of the capitals under Prussian domination to fall to the Allies' arms. It is a race between the Russians in the Dobrudja and the British on the Struma to get there first. Of course, the public here would like to see the British armies win, but they will not begrudge Grand Duke Nicholas the honor if the Russians are first to erect the cross above the crescent on the Mosque of

St. Sophia.

The Russians are 240 miles away and the British 280, but the latter have the easier route. Both would follow the coast lines, the Russians coming down along the shore of the Black Sea and the British pushing along the Aegean by the railroad that runs from Salonica to Lake Doiran, crosses the Struma at Demirhissar and then by way of Seres and Drama to Dedeagatch, crosses the Maritza river at Oemotika and continues east to Constantinople. The further the British get along this line the easier will be their task. Once the Greek-Macedonian frontier is passed the way lies across the lowlands at the foot of the Rhodope mountains, and in Turkey Rhodope mountains, and in Turkey evel plains stretch all the way to

The Aluta, which runs in a southwesterly direction from Fogaras, makes a sudden bend to the south before Hermannstadt is reached and breaks thruthe mountains into Roumania by way of the Rothenthurm Pass. This was the scene of the Roumanian defeat last week which Berlin heralded as a great victory. The Prussians got the pass but the Roumanians escaped. The bulk of the army is still engaged on the right back of the Aluta, making the counter-attack in the mountainous region north of the pass.

While the Austro-Prussians apparently have the better of it in the fighting in Transylvania, they are hard pressed further north, in Galicia, where the Russians have by no means abandoned their drive toward Lemberg. The southern forces have halt-



Under the provisions of "Th War Measures Act, 1914," His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to order that the following Regulations shall come into effect as and from the 12th day of October

JOHN R. BENNETT, Colonial Secretary. Dept. of the Colonial Secretary, October 17th, 1916.

1. The Port and Harbor of St. John's is closed entirely to the entry of shipping at night, from nightfall on the 12th October, until further orders.

2. Lights will remain extinguished, until further notice, at Cape St. Francis, Cape Spear, Bull Head, Ferryland and Fer-meuse, also the lights at Fort Amherst and the leading lights

3. No street or other outdoor lights shall be shown in the City of St. John's, or in or near any of the settlements in the Districts of St. John's East and

4. No lights shall be lit in any public building, shop or private residence in the Districts of St. John's East or West, except the windows in such public building, shop or residence are covered by suitable blinds or shades, or such lights are otherwise suitably obscured.

5. No lights shall be lit on board any vessel or boat in the Harbor of St. John's, unless suitably obscured.

6. No head lights shall be used on any motor car or motor cycle in or near the City of St John's, or in or near any settlement in the District of St. John's East and West, or on any roads approaching St. John's or any of the said settlements, upon which lights may be visible at sea. Side lights on motor cars, motor cycles or vehicles of any description must be obscured, and shall not be of greater strength than

five candle power. 7. It shall be the duty of the members of the Constabulary to see that these Regulations are strictly enforced, and all orders issued by them for their better observance shall be forthwith carried out.

8. It shall be the duty of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to see that these Regulations are observed on all shipping in the Harbor of St. John's, and all orders issued by him for their better observance shall be forth-with carried out.

9. Every person convicted of a violation of these Rules and Regulations before a Stipendiary Magistrate or a Justice of the Peace shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars, or in default of payment to imprisonment not exceeding three months.
