





#### **Criminal Fake**

Caused Much Trouble.

At four o'clock on Saturday afternoon the Editor of the St. John's Daily Star received a startling message, the news of which spread through the city like wild fire, and in some quarters came very near having serious results. The message reads:-

"Brigus Junction-"Foran Dowden drowned in Angle Pond; send particulars lat-

Signed, PARSONS." The contents of the message were mediately communicated to the Ed itor of the Daily News, in which employ Mr. T. J. Foran has been working for twenty years. The message was accepted as bona fide and believed to have been sent by Mr. Vincent Parsons, a representative of the Star, who was returning from Trinity Bay. Mr. Puddester, business manager of the News, acquainted the Palace and the Rev. Fr. Conway broke the news to Mrs. Foran and family. At the same time, Mr. Thistle, business manager of the Star, got in touch with the Rev Dr. Jones, who at the time was visiting the General Hospital, and being acquainted of the supposed facts performed a like sad duty to Mrs. Dow

The Postal Telegraphs Department n the meantime kept the lines busy and soon learned that there was reason to believe the message was a fake, and in answer to further inquiries, nessage was received from the postal

"Message signed Parsons, fake; to truth in it; meant for joke or Dowden; both in best of health few minutes ago.

A period of twenty minutes had elapsed between the receipt of the two messages and an attempt to reach the omes of Messrs. Dowden and Foran n advance of the clergymen failed, though the messenger to Mrs. Foran eached the house while Rev. Fr. Conway was present. Mrs. Dowden was also communicated with.

Friday evening last the two men in question left town for a day's fishing and stayed off at Brigus Junction. On inquiry being made it was found

that Parsons was in no way responsible for the nefarious message, as at the time of sending he was quite a distance away. The operator is unable to identify the sender, who, if discovered, should receive severe punishment for his senseless and heartless conduct.

# With a Flying Pupil

Hero of Chicago-New York Flight and Cary B. Epes, Plunged to Death at Newport News-Biplane Collapses in Air-Aviator, Cool to the Last, Strives to Right His Machine-Met End as He Had Predicted.

Newport News, Va., May 9 .- Victor Carlstorm, instructor at the Atlantic Coast Aeronautical School here, and an army student, Cary B. Epes, met instant death early this afternoon when a biplane plunged 3,500 feet to earth. The tragedy was witnessed by hundreds of persons. Carlstrom, who was piloting the machine, made a valiant fight for his life and the life of his puipl. Calrstrom was a famous aviator, his most widely known exploit perhaps being his Chicago to New York flight for the New York

Several theories are advanced as to the cause of the accident. All that is known is that watchers on the ground saw the machine suddenly crumple and then begin an end over end descett. Although one wing had been tern loose and was fluttering down behind the machine, Carlstrom manoeuvred in such a manner as to bring the airplane to its proper position, while he was yet 1,500 feet from the earth. He held it in such a position and it struck the ground right side up. However, the loss of the wing made it impossible to glide, and the nachine shot almost straight downward, burying its nose more than






