



Appeal Upheld.





Dear Sir,-Your correspondent of the 13th, signing himself as "Verbum Sap," tells us there is no law existing in Newfoundland regarding British ships of 100 tons and upwards carrying certified mates and masters. If Verbum Sap" will write the British Board of Trade at either Liverpool or London, he will be supplied with the necessary information regarding Trade Rules and Regulations. There has been something like 500 certificates of competency granted to mates and masters by the Examining Board of this Dominion. "Verbum Sap" tells us that there are only 31 certified masters sailing out of Newfoundland. and that none of these are unemployed, with the exception of one or two. who, "Verbum Sap" says, are otherwise competent. If "Verbum Sap" will rub the dust out of his eyes he will find nearly half the number he mentions of certified masters ready for employment and residing in the
