Act to Regulate the Exportation of Salt Codfish.

Be it enacted by the Governor, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows:-

1. There shall be a Codfish Exportation Board (hereinafter called the Board) which shall consist of seven members, namely the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, who shall be Chairman, four members appointed by the Governor-in-Council, who shall be licensed exporters of Codfish, and two members appointed by a majority of the exporters of Codfish holding licenses thereunder. Three members shall constitute a quorum of the Board at any meeting thereof for the transaction of business. The Minister of Marine and Fisheries shall have power to appoint a substitute to act in his place as Chairman at any time during his absence. A vacancy in the Board shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment was made, and in the temporary absence, through any unavoidable cause, of a member, the Governor-in-Council or the licensed exporters, as the case may be, may appoint a substitute to act in his place during such absence. Failure on the part of the said exporters to or appoint any members of the Board shall not prejudice or invalidate any acts or proceedings of the Board

2. It shall be the duty of the Board to advise the Governorin-Council generally as to the exportation and marketing of salt Codfish; and more particularly to recommend to the Governor-in-Council rules to regulate:—

(1) The issue, holding, suspension and cancellation of licen-

ses to export salt codfish (2) The conditions and terms of sale abroad.

(3) The minimum prices for the sale of salt codfish in par-

ticular markets at particular times. (4) The maximum quantity of salt codfish which may be sold for or exported to any particular market at any particular time.

(5) The Board may also from time to time recommend the suspension, or reneal of any rule already approved and published in the Royal Gazette.

8. Any rule recommended by the Board, approved by the Covernor-in-Council and published in the Royal Gazette shall have the same force of law as if included in this Act. Such rule may be modified, suspended or repealed by a new rule, recommended by the Board, approved by the Governor-in-Council and published in the Royal Gazette. Immediate notice by telegram of any new rule or the amendment of any existing rule shall be given by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to all licensed exporters of codfish. In recommending any rule respecting the fixing of prices the Board shall not have power to interfere with any contract lawfully made under Rules and Regulations existing at time of the finalizing of such contract.

4. (1) No salt codfish shall hereafter be exported except under license. Such license shall be granted to any applicant who undertakes to comply with the rules made under this Act. A fee of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) shall be payable by the applicant on the issue of every license, and in addition a fee of ten cents per quintal on every quintal of cured salt codfish, and five cents per quintal on all green codfish; provided that the initial fee of Fifty Dollars shall not be payable by any fisherman exporter who exports codfish in shipments of less than one hundred quintals each. The Board shall have an absolute discretion to determine whether or not any applicant is a fisherman exporter.

(2) Such license shall be in force until the thirty-first day of December of the year in which it is issued (3) Such license may be suspended or cancelled by the Governor-in-Council for non-compliance with or breach of, the provisions of this Act, or the rules is-

sued under the authority of this Act. & A meeting of all exporters of Codfish shall be convened by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries during the first week in September in each year to consider and discuss with the Codfish portation Board all matters relating to the exportation of Codfish for the ensuing season. Such meeting shall be held at St. John's and two weeks' notice thereof shall be given.

6. It shall be the duty of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to carry out the provisions of this Act; to forward to the Governor-in-Council the advice and recommendations of the Board; and to report to the Governor-in-Council the non-comwith and breaches of the provisions of this Act or the Rules issued under the authority of this Act.

7. The Governor-in-Council shall have power to appoint Trade Commissioners or Government Agents, to act in any country or place in the interest of this Colony and its trade, and shall have powers to prescribe their duties and fix their salaries, which shall be payable out of the revenue of the Colony. The Minister Marine and Fisheries shall have power to authorize and direct the carrying on of research work in connection with the fisheries of the Colony, the cost and expense of which shall be payable out of the revenue of the Colony. All fees paid under the provisions of section four of this Act shall be collected by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries and paid by him into the public

8. Sections 3 and 4 of this Act shall have effect as though they were included in Chapter 22 of the Consolidated Statutes (Third Series), entitled "Of the Customs"; and the provisions of that Chapter, and of any Act amending or extending that Chapter shall apply accordingly; and if any person ships, or atints to ship, codfish in contravention of any rules made under this Act with respect to exportation, he shall be liable to a per-alty equal to the value of such codfish including the duty thereon. aug17,21,24,28,31,sep4,7,11

- Doctors practising in St. John's will write on the reverse side of each prescription issued, the house number and name of street and of the person prescribed for.
- City Doctors prescribing for non-residents will write on the reverse side of prescription the name of locality and the name of district of the person prescribed for.
- Prescriptions issued by City Doctors for residents of localities outside St. John's who may be visiting the city must show such person's temporary City address in addition to their permanent residence.
- 4. Doctors practising outside St. John's will write on the reverse side of prescriptions issued by them the name of locality and the name of dis-trict of persons prescribed for.
- 5. Outport Doctors prescribing Spirits for persons residing in St. John's must write on the reverse side of prescription the house number and street of the person prescribed for.

On and after September 1st, compliance with these conditions will be insisted on by this Department and by all Druggists dispensing Spirits. Prescriptions issued prior to September 1st under the old form will be honored up to and including Sep-





My own opinion is that, if something is not done promptly to let trade go through its proper channels, and regulations for shipping are done away with, then a crisis will overtake us quicker than we ever anticipated, not only with the shippers of fish, but with the Colony, and in proof of that it is only necessary to look at the drop in the revenue the past two months, which I understand is approximately \$100, 000.00, not including outports, each month. Need I say more?

FISHERY REPORT.—Between Safe Hr. and Cape Freels the catch of codfish is reported as 3000 qtls. with 700 for the past week. Sixty-eight boats are fishing. The bait supply is poor and there is very little improvement in the fishery prospects.





War Spy Released. How Secret Code Was Discovered. Following upon the death of the clever female syp, Lizzie Louise Wertheim, another espionage drama of the war is recalled by the release from Portland of Johann Hahn, who was convicted as a German agent. Early in 1915 the Scotland Yard authorities laid by the heels one of the leading Hun spies in Karl Frederick Muller. It was soon after the outbreak of war that the authorities discovered that naval and military matters in code and by the aid of secret writing ink were being sent over to various addresses on the Continent. Generally these were written in between the lines of the ink apparent to the naked eye, and the secret writing could be decoded by the use of lemon-juice.
One day a letter addressed to a spy at Rotterdam came into the hands of the authorities. It looked quite an innocent epistle, but, on being treated for invisible ink, revealed this brief message: "Co has gone to Newcastle. so I am writing this from 201 instead." The letter had been posted from a London district, and 201 was believed to be the number of the house in one of the streets. Very soon the place was located. It proved to be a baker's shop, and, when the police officers visited it they found Hahn. He was taken to Scotland Yard, but, when asked, refused to say who the mysteritime to discover but the efforts of the police were finally rewarded, and Muller was tracked to Newcastle, where he was arrested. There was no doubt that Hahn was simply the tool of Muller. Hahn was born in Battersea, his father being a naturalised German. The pair were tried at the Old Bailey by three judges in secret, in May, 1915. Muller was found guilty of espionage and sentenced to be shot, while Hahn, who all along protested that he was only acting under orders, was sent to prison for seven years. Muller paid the extreme penalty at the Tower of London on June 23, Hahn being removed to Brixton, and thence to Portland convit prison. A third man, Kuperfelt, who was arrested for having communicated information to the enemy by messages written in invisible ink, committed suicide in his cell at the Old Bailey during the progress of the trial.
