HORRIBLE ACCIDENT.—About four o'clock  
on Friday afternoon a man named Smith,  
in employment of Messrs. Inglis &  
Hunter, of this town, was driving a valu-  
able single horse along Quebec Street,  
leisurely, and when opposite Knox  
Church, was surprised to observe a run-  
away team, owned by Messrs. Burns &  
Co., coming towards him. Before he  
could get out of the way the horses had  
passed, one at each side of him, leaving  
the sleigh in front of him. The animal  
which he was driving fell down, and upon  
examining it was found that the team  
of the sleigh to which the runaway team  
had been attached, had gone clean  
through the animal, and remained there,  
entering the side, about half-way up, and  
coming out just above the hip. The  
poor brute was knocked in the head at  
once, thus ending his misery. The driver  
had a narrow escape indeed, and ought to  
feel thankful that he did not receive a  
scratch. The horses ran from the West-  
ern Station, and came down the hill and  
round the corner of the Queen's Seeing  
Machine Factory at a fearful rate, and  
were upon the animal driven by Mr. Smith  
before he had time to see them. The  
team which ran away were not injured in  
the least.

### Guelph Axle Works.

There is nothing gives us greater  
pleasure than to show, from time to time,  
as opportunity affords, the manufacturing  
industries of the town of Guelph and  
County of Wellington. It has been con-  
ceded on all hands that the people of  
Wellington are as industrious as they are  
enterprising, and a community of which  
this can be truthfully said must and will  
advance in commercial, manufacturing  
and social importance. We point with  
pride to the enviable position of our  
agriculturists, who are known throughout  
the length and breadth of this broad  
Dominion for the excellency of their  
cereal crops, the quality of their beef,  
and the abundance of their root crops.  
While we are elated at the position thus  
occupied by our agriculturists, it behooves  
us also not to neglect our manufacturing  
interests, and in connection with this  
largely increasing branch of our indus-  
tries, not the least amongst which we  
notice that of the Guelph Axle Works.  
The building is of stone, commodious  
and well lighted, and situated near the  
grist mill of Mr. Present. The proprie-  
tor, Mr. Joseph Hirsch, has just com-  
menced operations on a scale commensu-  
rate with the present demand, and will  
extend his works as occasion calls for it.  
At present he gives employment to ten  
men, and operates on three lathes, of the  
most approved pattern, one running  
machine, one drill, one furnace, and a  
mammoth and powerful trip-hammer.  
The machinery is driven by a fifteen  
horse power engine, of Guelph manufac-  
ture, and works to a charm.

There is only one other manufactory  
of this kind in Canada, and until re-  
cently, our American neighbors held a  
monopoly of the light work which we are  
now enabled to supply ourselves with.  
About ten tons of iron and steel, per  
week, is used, costing on an average  
nearly \$250; another hundred dollars are  
paid in wages—while the cost of coal, and  
other incidental expenses, amount to a  
considerable sum weekly. By the aid of  
the trip-hammer, twenty set of axles per  
day, of one hundred and twenty set per  
week, are turned out, at which rate this  
important section of Canada can be sup-  
plied with axles of home manufacture,  
and of a quality superior to the imported  
article, in many respects. Mr. Hirsch  
contemplates being able to compete  
successfully, both as regards workman-  
ship and price, with our American  
cousins, as none but the best workmen  
are employed, and the material is of the  
first quality. We wish our enterprising  
townsman abundant success in his new  
undertaking, and trust that his efforts  
will be crowned with that profit which  
his indomitable perseverance merits.

A Pleasant Evening.

REFRY.  
Mr. Anderson made a suitable reply,  
during which he acknowledged his inabil-  
ity to make a speech such as he would  
like to have done, and said that it was  
hard to say that little but expressive  
word—Farewell. He referred to the very  
high compliment paid him by the  
brethren of Speed Lodge, in preparing  
an address, couched in terms the most  
endearing, and presenting it to him pre-  
sented to his departure from Guelph. Mr.  
Anderson said he would always look back  
upon his connection with Speed Lodge  
with pleasurable feelings, and trusted it  
would go on and prosper, and be a pat-  
tern to all other Lodges. Masonry had  
something in it more than a name—a

brotherly love which drew out all the  
better feelings of our nature—and it  
grieved him to part from those he loved.

A number of toasts were given and  
ably responded to, many songs were sung  
and heartily encored, speeches character-

### Ontario Legislature.

Mr. Laurier asked when the leader of  
the Government proposed to bring down  
his scheme for the settlement of the  
Municipal Loan Fund question.  
An Attorney-General Mowat said he was  
daily receiving additional information, so  
that he found it impossible to bring down  
his scheme as early as he had wished.  
He would give notice to-day of the intro-  
duction of his resolutions on Tuesday  
next, and he hoped then to be in a po-  
sition to make a full statement to the  
House of the policy of the Government  
and the reason on which it was based.

Hon. Mr. McKellar moved the adoption  
of the report of the Committee of the  
Whole on the resolution authorising the  
purchase of municipal debentures issued  
for drainage purposes. He said that this  
measure was only a re-enactment of the  
Act of last session, and no objection was  
taken to this provision then. The invest-  
ment was limited to \$200,000, and not  
more than \$20,000 could be repaid to  
any one township. They would have the  
very best security for this investment.  
They had not only the security of the  
lands drained, but the security of the  
whole township, those who had no lands  
to drain becoming endorser for the others.  
Therefore this money, as it returned to Gov-  
ernment, could be re-invested with per-  
fect security. He thought it was very  
likely that in a year or two the Govern-  
ment would have to ask for more money  
for drainage purposes. The townships  
were beginning to see advantage in the  
offer of the Government, and they should  
give them every opportunity of getting  
money in that way so long as the security  
was perfectly good. It had been stated  
that this would create another municipal  
loan fund. That was utterly impossible.  
If the same protection had been secured  
in the case of the municipal loan fund,  
it would have been a great benefit to the  
country, because at the time that fund  
was created county debentures were sell-  
ing at a discount in England. So that  
by exchanging them for Government  
debentures, which sold at par, they gained  
a great advantage. But the mistake was  
that no limit was placed to the amount  
that might be borrowed. In the present  
case the Government were perfectly secu-  
re.

After some discussion several clauses  
of the bill were carried in Committee.  
The bill to establish liens in favor of  
mechanics, masons and others was  
advanced a stage.  
Hon. Mr. Farlow moved the second  
reading of the bill respecting institutions  
for the education and instruction of the  
deaf and dumb and blind in Ontario. In  
doing so the hon. gentleman stated that  
the section of the statute referring to  
these institutions decomposed. He stated  
as educational institutions, but as asyl-  
lums. The Government judged it would  
be better to enact a special law for these  
institutions, correcting any false impres-  
sions which might be abroad concerning  
them. The bill introduced provided that  
the institutions should be invested in the  
Province.—Carried.

Hon. Mr. McKellar introduced a bill  
founded on his resolutions respecting  
drainage.

OVER 3,000 LBS. OF BUTTER.—Mr. James  
Ellis, of the Town of Pakenham, has  
made during the past year over 3,000 lbs  
of butter, all of which he sold at 20 cents  
per pound, to customers in Pakenham,  
Perth, Ottawa Toronto and other places.

FIRE AT PORT ELGIN.—The dwelling  
house and its contents of Mr. Arch. Mc-  
Lean, of Aram, was totally destroyed by  
fire on Friday morning. Mr. McLean  
and his family had barely time to save  
themselves. It is not known how the  
fire originated. The loss will be about  
\$1,000.

CURLING MATCH AT HAMILTON.—The  
annual curling match was played on  
Friday evening between the Galt and Ham-  
ilton clubs. The ice was good. Ham-  
ilton skips—G. H. Gillespie, 24 shots;  
J. Simpson, 40; G. Morrison, 41. Galt  
skips—R. Minto, 16; B. Webster, 15; R.  
Wallace, 13. Majority for Hamilton, 61  
shots.

AN ELOPMENT.—The Hamilton papers  
say that a young woman named  
Yeal, 16 years of age, left the house of her  
mother, who is a widow and keeps  
boarders, and went to Toronto with a  
man named Thowless, a silver-plater by  
trade, who is said to have a wife and family  
in Guelph. It being expected that the  
runaway couple would pass this way again  
en route for the States, some of the girl's  
friends with the police, were in attendance  
at the station, and secured her, but her  
companion suddenly disappeared. She  
was taken before the Police Magistrate,  
arrested as being under age, and was  
afterwards sent home. Nothing has been  
heard of any marriage taking place, and  
it is said that the law has no hold upon  
Thowless to punish him, even were he in  
custody.

EXPORTATION OF HOPS.—The Galt Re-  
porter says—Messrs M. A. Abbey of Pres-  
ton, and Thos. Todd, of Galt, have  
bought and exported to St. Louis, Mis-  
souri, the past year, 450 bales of hops, about  
90,000 lbs., weighing therefor about \$90-  
000. In the year 1871 the same parties  
bought and shipped to Baltimore, Md.,  
and to Pittsburgh, Pa., about 100,000 lbs  
of hops, at an expense to them of about  
the same as last year. These parties  
will continue to buy in the future, and  
ship to different parts of the States, and  
thus relieve Canada of her surplus hops  
—the quantity grown in this country  
exceeding the demand.

A public meeting to raise funds for the  
erection of a monument to the poet  
Campbell, was held in Glasgow on Wed-  
nesday night. The sum of \$2,500 was  
subscribed on the spot.

It is reported that some American  
bankers in London loaned Napoleon III.  
\$200,000, to facilitate a coup d'etat he  
was meditating, and that since his death  
the money has been returned to them.

The Allan steamship Peruvian, which  
arrived at Halifax yesterday, experienced  
fervent weather during her voyage. She  
had two boats stove by a sea, and  
washed away, besides having  
skylight broken and one of her  
filled with water.

Municipal Drainage Act.

The Hon. Mr. McKellar has introduced a bill—a copy of which we have before us—entitled an Act to authorise the investment of certain moneys in debentures to be issued for the construction of drainage works for municipalities. The Act provides that in case municipal Councils, after procuring the report of competent engineers, are of opinion that the drainage of certain localities is necessary, they may pass by-law providing for the same, and borrow the necessary funds, on the credit of the municipality, by issuing debentures in sums of not less than one hundred dollars each, and payable within fifteen years from date, with interest at a rate of not less than five per centum per annum, the property benefited by such improvement to be taxed for the payment of the same. Before the final passing of the by-law it shall be published four weeks in some newspaper within the municipality, or some other newspaper, together with a notice that any one intending to apply to have it quashed, must, within ten days of the passing thereof, serve a notice in writing upon the Reeve and Clerk of the municipality of his intention to make application for that purpose. Should it be deemed necessary to continue the drainage into adjoining municipalities, in order to carry off the water, the lands so benefitted shall bear a portion of the cost, and maintain and keep in repair the same within its own limits. The Lieutenant Governor in Council may invest any surplus of the Consolidated Revenue Fund in the purchase of debentures issued under by-laws so passed.

We think that the Bill is just and equitable, and will be found—should it become law—to work well. The importance of draining lands is becoming better appreciated as the good results are known, and thousands of acres would have been thus improved ere this had the owners of the soil been in a pecuniary position to do so. We are glad for the sake of those interested, that the Bill introduced by Mr. McKellar makes such ample provision for many poor settlers. The utility of land drainage cannot be overestimated.

It is understood that Sir John A. Macdonald has a misunderstanding with the management of the Mail, which may possibly result in his withdrawing his support from it. It is understood Mr. Patterson is retained in his position contrary to the wishes of many shareholders, solely through the Hon. John Cartwright's influence. *Le Nouveau Monde* says—Most of the members of the Quebec Cabinet are in Montreal, and will meet Mr. Langevin. It has reason to know that at the meeting many important appointments of judges will be made. In view of the interests of the party in next session, it is probable that Mr. Oliver, Senator, will be made a judge, and Dr. Paquet, M. P., will replace him in the Senate, and that a Conservative candidate will be elected with his support in the County of Berthier.

Wellington County Council. Jan. 31. Council met at two o'clock, p.m. The Warden in the chair. Present all the members. Mr. Massie read the report of the County Property Committee, which made the following recommendations: That in accordance with the report contained in the petition from the Junior Jubilee, the room formerly occupied by the Clerk of the Peace, be set apart for his use, and that the committee be instructed to provide what furniture may be necessary. That they be instructed to provide the additional accommodation required in the office of the Deputy Clerk of the Crown and Pleas, including a fire-proof vault of sufficient capacity to protect the books and papers of value left in his charge, and that the same be proceeded with so soon as the weather will permit, provided that the whole can be completed at a cost not exceeding ten to fifteen hundred dollars. That no action be taken by this Council in the communication from the County Council of the County of Elgin. That they be instructed to provide sufficient accommodation to cover the vault of the Registry Office in Arthur, and to replace the worn-out portions in the Guelph Court House. That the following accounts be received, and the Treasurer instructed to pay the same: J. & B. Crab, \$4.50; Collins & Lynch, \$3.30; W. Hamilton, \$2; J. McFarlane, \$2.10; W. S. S. \$1.15. A list of the articles for the use of the jail, for the current year, was also submitted in the report.

Chairman. Moved by Mr. Massie, seconded by Mr. Telford, That the report of the County Property Committee be received and adopted. Carried. Mr. Chadwick read the report of the Special Committee appointed to consider the new Act respecting Municipal Institutions in the Province of Ontario, by which it appeared that the Committee had gone through the Act as carefully as possible, but had not sufficient time to fully consider it. The Committee asked to be allowed to report at the Council on Feb. 1, and to forward to the Legislature such amendments or suggestions as they considered advisable. F. J. Chapman, Chairman. Moved by Mr. Chadwick, seconded by Mr. Bell, That the report of the above Committee be adopted. Carried. Mr. Leslie introduced the report of the Standing Committee on Finance, which recommended the payment of the following accounts: Jas. Webster, for gas and fuel, \$13.55; John Hoeman, sundries for jail, \$28.10; J. F. Hollinger, rent for Jailery Office, \$12; T. Frankland, printing, \$1; Walker & Co., printing, \$2.10; John Foley, printing, \$18. The Committee also recommended the payment of Wm. Stronach's account, so as on as the chairman of the County Property Committee reported that the charges are correct. That the jailer's salary be increased to \$500. Also stated that the statement furnished by the Treasurer was very explicit and satisfactory. W. Leslie, Chairman. Moved by Mr. Leslie, seconded by Mr. Telford, That the report of the Standing Committee on Finance be adopted. Carried. Moved by Mr. Howard, seconded by Mr. McCarthy, That leave be given to introduce a By-law for the appointment of School Trustees in the County, which shall be read a first and second time.

Falling 175 Feet Down the Shaft of a Mine and Still Alive and Well.

Christmas Eve at the Julian Mines furnished one of the most remarkable incidents in all the annals of curious casualties. Charles Fox is one of the San Diego Lead. Their shaft is sunk to the depth of 175 feet. On the afternoon of the 24th of December he took his place in the bucket to go down to the lower level. It had been on the way during the day. The break on the wheel which raises and lowers the bucket in mines not supplied with steam power, was held in its place by a rope. This had become very wet and of course relaxed its tension. Fox had hardly taken his place in the bucket before he went careering like lightning down the shaft drop 175 feet. The break was absolutely useless and down, down hurried the bucket and man, bumping now against one side and now against the other, until finally both struck the two-inch planking which covered the wall. The bucket was smashed to pieces, and poor Charles plunged through the two inch planking as though it had been paste-board, into the well. This was six or eight feet deep. He sank to the bottom and when he arose, was hauled out by his comrades who were working in the level.

The mystery of the business is that although Fox was pretty thoroughly jarred and bruised, a broken ankle was the only serious injury resulting from the fall.

Mrs. Fitzpatrick, widow lady residing at Orono, was burned in a shocking manner on Wednesday night, and died from the effects of her injuries yesterday morning.

On Saturday last a span of horses, owned by Charles Preston, fell into a well near Fleming's Hotel, in Garafaxa, and when taken out one of them was dead.
