BY TELEGRAPH TO THE MERCURY The Massachusetts Disaster

Fearful Loss of Life.

The Destitution Diminishing. Scenes in the Deluged Towns,

Beneficence of the Cities.

New York, May 18.—From the excel-lent account of the flood in the New York Wo-!d the 25" 20 ag is taken: A. M. Graves, whose great black horse is the pride of Williamsburg, set of infront of the flood at an awful pace, swinging his arms, and shouting from the horse Skinnersville is the nearest village nearly a mile away, and it has only five houses left out of thirty. Skinner's factory girls had just got to work when they saw Graves com' g, and heard the flood behind him. The factory bell rang out the alarm, and the building was empty just one minute before it was utterly swept away. Skinner's house was on high ground; one end of the was on high ground, out the house verandah was torn down, but the house escaped. Here the flood, with Graves whirling down ahead on his great black orse, was cramped by a bend in the course of the Mill river, and immediate ly raised a wall of timbers and stones which it drove, now perpendicularly, now broken and swinging straight over broad and level vs'leys. Millions of tons that torrent weighed, and nothing could resist it. Great bonders, sticks of timber, and dead human bodies too many, were driven down the stream headlong, and then came the great crash at Haydensville, where disaster was piled on disaster. The half of Hayden's brass works was washed out of the framework, and the boilers were carried down the stream The cotton mill lower down stood, but the dam was broken. A great tree trunk was driven through a dwelling-house on the east bank, and brought along the wrecked fram vork to its branches. In the bend of the river south of Haden's, was a clump of two dozen houses, of which no trace of the foundation is left. As the torrent reached Leeds, its supply failed, but was strong enough to wreck that one town more before its waves were stayed. At first a row of dwellings, flung them one upon another and twisted them. It descended upon a second batch, leaving untouched houses in its direct course, by a capricious work of running up hill to seek houses reckoned safe and drive out their lower stories, tip them on one side, leaving a bizarre village whose streets run every way, whose houses lie as likely one on the other, or in the other, as face to face. Next came Cruchlow's button shop, and as at Haydensville, the water sweet saway all of the buildings. Twenty lives were lyst here. Thirty dead bodies were found huddled together, brought by the caprice of torrent from all the villages about into one place.

The flood fell alm as rapidly as it rose, and with an hour from the time when the alarm was given at Williamsburg were destroyed, and hundreds of acres covered with stone and mud. In an eddy between Skinnerville and Williamsburg, were found the bodies of seven persons, including those of Dr. Johnson and some of his family.

The whole community is moving in the work of relief, and everything that can will be done to alleviate the loss and suffering.

The Reciprocity Negotiations. The American papers are at present busy discussing the question of renewed reciprocity with Canada, basing their remarks on the figures that have been published in connection with the negotiations now going on at Washington. The New York papers have devoted considerable space in giving alaborate at a second space in giving elaborate statements of the trade of both countries before the first Treaty came in force, during the time it was in operation, and since it was abrogated. Most of these journals, while demurring to the position taken by our representative at Washington, and to the proposed basis for reciprocal trade, are in favor of a new Treaty. The Tribune in concluding a very long and carefully written article on the subject, says:—"We have made a very full statistical exhibit to enable our readers to verify the statements of the Canadians, that while their foreign commerce has greatly in-creased since 1866, the proportion of it done with the United States,— which under the Treaty gradually rose to over fifty-two per cent. of their entire trade,—has since rapidly fallen away in consequence of our-changed policy, until it is not now thirty-five per cent of their trade,—a fact in itself most extraordinary and suggestive." In the face of such figures, and as a matter of selfinterest it pronounces in favour of a new Treaty. It concludes by say-

"It is clear that few more imporiant topics could occupy the attention of the authorities at Washington than the consideration of the
commercial relations between the
United States and the British North
American Provinces; and it is fair to
infer that negotiations may result
in an enlargement of domestic trade
which will prove most opportune
during the period of transaction
(which we trust we have now entered
upon) between irredeemable paper
and specie payments. We hope,
therefore, that Mr. Fish, without
vielding to all the pretensions of our
neighbours, will make a treaty."

1. The waiver of the money compensation by the United States for the fisheries under the Washington Treaty.

2. That the Canadian canals, from Lake Erie to Montreal shall be enlarged within three years, at the cost of Canada, so as to admit the passage of vessels 260 feet in length and 45 feet in breadth, and with a depth equal to the capacity of the lake harbors.

3. That during the continuance of the treaty, all the Canadian canals, and the Erie, Whitehall, Saulte Ste. Marie, and Lake St. Clair Canal, shall be open to the vessels and boats of both countries on the same conditions and terms.

4. That the free navigation of Lake Michigan be put on the same terms as the free navigation of the St. Lawrence River.

5. That the navigation of the St. Clair

Michigan be put on the same terms as the free navigation of the St. Lawrence River.

5. That the navigation of the St. Clair Flats shall be maintained at the expense of both countries, in proportion to their commerce thereon.

6. That the products of the farm, forest, mines and waters, and also animals, meats and products of the dairy, be admitted into both countries duty free, as was provided in the treaty of 1854. This list may possibly be extended so as to include agricultural implements, manufactures of iron and steel, and of wood, mineral oils, salt, and a few other articles. There may be other things which the contending parties may consider proper and just to include in this treaty, and which twould be equally satisfactory.
