



The following correspondence in regard to the tug Lorne explains itself: Hon. Mr. Davies, Minister of Marine

and Fisheries, Ottawa: DEAR SIR,—We are the managers and agents of the British tug Lorne, and this vessel is engaged in general towing of ships in British Columbia and Puget Sound waters. When towing vessels to Port Townsend or Tacoma, on Puget Sound, we are called upon to pay the British consular fee of \$4.40 for no serrices rendered to us and the American insist upon us calling at the former port for quarantine. Several partners of our firm being consuls for other coun-tries on this side we know they (British onsuls) are entitled to a fee twice a year, but it appears we are called upon to pay fees every time we touch at an American port where there is a British consul, and in fact it looks as if we would be called upon to pay fees dailylifour vessel touched at the same port. We feel sure that there must be some regulation concerning the payment of fees to British consuls in foreign ports, and we would respectfully ask you to advise us of the laws governing this question, and if there are not any regulations in vogue concerning the payment of such fees.

It seems to us to be altogether out of

reason that if our vessel was to touch at an American port where a Britis consular is situated daily that she would have to pay about \$1,500 per annum to the consul alone. Awaiting the favor of our reply, we have the honor to be, sir,

Mr. Consul Laidlaw has therefore been requested to inform the vice-consuls at Port Townsend and Tacoma that consular intervention is not necessary, and that consequently no fees are leviable in

such cases. I am to suggest for the consideration of Mr. Secretary Chamberlain that copies of this correspondence, or a sum-mary of its contents, should be forwarded to the Canadian government in order that they may cause Messrs. Ward to be informed of the state of the case.—]
